Lions take 2nd tournament championship

The Ozona Lions competed in the Sterling City Tournament on Dec. 27-30, ultimately winning their second tourney championship trophy this season. "This was a very good tournament for us. Our guard play has been very good and very consistent all year. Our post players brought their game up a notch in this tournament" Coach Osborn said.

The first round of play pitted the Lions against the Forsan Buffaloes. The Buffaloes played the Lions close for three quarters before the Lions dominated the final quarter, winning the game 80-

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 4 Americans will become sick, 1 in 1,000 will become hospitalized, and 5,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

During the past legislative session, a statute was amended that allowed the Texas Department of Health (TDH) to require each food establishment to have

one certified food manager. Recently, the Texas Board of Health adopted rules to implement this statute. Many of you have already received a letter from the Texas Department of Health regarding this. Under these new rules, each food establishment permitted by the Texas Department of Health must have one certified food manager. New food manager certificates will be valid for 5 years.
