Gamma globulin has been tested on more than 54,000 children and the results are now under study, but once the polio virus has reached the nervo cells, GG cannot alter the course of the disease.

You can find out whether or not your child is eligible to receive gamma globulin by asking the health officer in your county. He is familiar with the formula for GG distribution in effect

Meanwhile, don't isolate your youngsters when you hear of a case of polio in the community. There is no point in letting them contact strangers, but they ought to be allowed in their usual

Keep them clean and see that they rest in the afternoon. A nap is fine, but even playing quietly part of the day will help conserve their strength.

Last, but highly important, call our doctor at the first onset of any of these signs: headache, fever, sore throat, upset stomach, stiff neck, or back. The earlier a case of polio is diagnosed, the better are the chances for recovery without lasting damage.


