

"This is the way it was"

From June 1949 through 1954 there was an all colored rodeo in Ozona. The first rodeo was Saturday night, June 19, of 1949. Events were calf roping, goat

roping and goat sacking.

Miller Robison and myself, members of the Ozona Roping Club, sponsored the first show. The ranchers helped with horses. I imagine the roping club had calves and goats.

The ropers came from distant cities and most worked on ranches.

A huge crowd attended. We turned the money over to the roping club. There was an old house between the grandstand and dance platform. I remember Miller and myself sitting on the porch counting money.

The roping club set the second rodeo for June 18-19, Sunday afternoon and Monday night. They wanted a barbecue and were given \$50.00 to have it. There was a dance Monday night on the plat-

This year colored announcers were added. Events included calf

roping, goat roping and goat hair pulling. I believe that ranchers brought outlaw horses in and there was bronc riding from this rodeo

Evart White had a horse on the ranch he named Juneteenth, and he was never ridden.

and sponsors with June 18-19 as the dates. At that time there were a lot of colored ropers and riders, and to mention from the first till the last in 1954, crowds filled the grandstands.

At the time of the 1953 rodeo there was an all colored baseball game and of course a dance on the platform each night. At this show, Benny Metcalf of Oklacrowd. At the 1954 rodeo, a Bandera cowboy won top honors.

This was entertainment out of this world. People came by the shop after the rodeos were over and wanted to know when we would have another.

TPWD proposes regulation changes for mule deer

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will hold a public hearing in Iraan to take public comments on a proposed wildlife regulation change that would expand the Managed Lands Deer (MLD) permit program for whitetailed deer to include mule deer. The habitat focused, incentive based MLD permit program is designed to facilitate management goals of landowners and land managers. The hearing will be at 7:00 pm on Monday, May 12, 2003 in the Iraan Community Building at the square on 6th


The program requires an approved wildlife management plan for deer permit issuance. Requirements of the plan include 3 years population data, 2 years harvest data, 3 habitat management practices, and harvest quotas for antlerless and antlered mule deer. The incentive is an extended hunting season that would begin 1 week prior to the opening of the general mule deer season and ex-

tend through December 31.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department staff encourages everyone interested in knowing more about the proposed wildlife regulation change to attend the public hearing. Questions about the meeting or the proposed wildlife regulation change can be directed to TPWD staff at the Wildlife Field office in Sonora (325) 387-5539 or the Wildlife District office in Alpine (432) 837-2051.

Individuals who cannot attend the public hearing can send their comments on the proposed regulation change to Mr. Robert MacDonald, TPWD, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX, 78744; voice(512)389-4775; (email: robert.macdonald@tpwd.state.tx.us) or by voicing their comments at the TPWD Commission meeting May 29, 2003 in Austin at TPWD Headquarters.

If approved by the TPWD Commission, the proposed program will take effect September





PFC EDWARD E. **EVANS II**

Pfc. Edward E. Evans II has returned home to Iraan from South Korea where he served with the United States Army as an infantryman with the 1-506th Infantry Battalion. He was stationed at Camp Giant with A Co. 3rd Platoon from April 2002 to April

During his year in South Korea, Pfc. Evans was trained in Tae Kwon Do and Jui Jit Su, earning the black belt in both forms of martial arts. He also became Air Assault qualified, which is Black Hawk helicopter tactical operations ranging from rappelling 90 ft. from the Black Hawk and sling loading HMMWV's (hummers), BFV's (armored personnel carriers) and assorted military equip-

Pfc. Evans also earned several recognitions from his Battalion Commander, including the Army Achievement Medal. He earned this medal by taking charge of a three-man fire team and gaining control over a seven man LPOP (listening and observation point).

His fire team was equipped with a M-4 carbine rifle, M203 (40mm grenade launcher) and a M-249 SAW (squad automatic weapon). The LPOP was equipped with a M-240B (7.62 mm fully automatic machine gun), several M-4's and 203's, and two M-249's. This was during the Strike Army Readiness Training Exercise Program from May 28-June 18, 2002.

He also qualified as an expert marksman with the M-9 (9mm pistol), M-4 carbine and the M-249 SAW. Pfc. Evans was also qualified to fire the javelin missile. This is a shoulder fired, antitank and anti-helicopter fire and forget missile.

During his year in South Korea, Pfc. Evans was trained in several aspects of civil disturbance control and various military movement drills.

After being home in Iraan on leave, he reported for duty with the 4th Infantry Division in Fort Hood on April 25. He will finish his military contract there.

Pfc. Evans is a 1998 graduate of Iraan High and a member of the 1996 State Champion Braves. His parents are Eddy and Gay Evans and Wes Evans is his younger brother. Grandparents are Johnnie Mae and Skip Lackey of Iraan and Elva R. Navarro of Odessa. He is the great-grandson of Elvira G. Housing programs for rural areas

The Texas USDA Rural Development has Housing Loan Programs available to assist qualified very low, low and moderate income applicants in the construction or purchase of a home.

These loans require no downpayment nor mortgage insurance and can be made for up to 100% of the market value of the property, which in some cases allows for financing of the closing costs. Loan terms are from 30 to 33 years, with fixed interest rates. Payment assistance is available, based on family size and income, which may reduce the interest rate on the loan to as low as one percent (1%).

Grant funds are available for homeowners 62 years of age and over who cannot repay a loan and must be used to remove health and safety hazards. Such hazards as repairing roofs, heating, electrical and plumbing systems, water and waste disposal, installing windows, insulation and other items to make the home safe. Grant assistance may not exceed a lifetime maximum of \$7,500.00.




