

Court members voted to execute a contract with Hospice of San Angelo and to execute HIPAA business associate agreements with Hudspeth Memorial Hospital, Community Hospital and Shannon Rural Health Clinics Inc. These actions are made necessary by the implementation of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA).



The Emerald Underground Water Conservation District will sponsor students from Crockett County to attend this year's Water Camp.


The week-long camp focuses on water quality and conservation education and features field trips, tours and hands-on group project work.
