School Registration to be held on August 5 and 6

School registration begins on Tuesday, August 5 for approximately 830 students who will be attending Ozona Public Schools this year. Classes registering on that day include first grade, second grade, third grade, fourth grade, sixth grade, seventh grade, and students who are new to the district and who will be enrolling in Ozona High School.

Registration dates and times for Ozona High School are: seniors and juniors-Wednesday, August 6 from 9:00 a.m. until noon, and sophomores and freshmen-August 6 from 1:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. Students may pick up their class schedules during the above times. Also, students who are new to the district and who will be enrolling in high school will enroll on Tuesday, August 5 during any of the above registration times.

Ozona Middle School will register students according to the following schedule: sixth grade-August 5 from 9:00 a.m. until noon; seventh grade-August 5 from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m.; and, eighth grade, August 6 from 9:00 a.m. until noon.

Third grade students in Ozona Intermediate School will register on August 5 from 9:00 a.m. until noon, fourth grade students will register on August 5 from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m., and fifth grade students will register on August 6 from 9:00 a.m. until noon.

The schedule for registering students in Ozona Primary School is: first grade-August 5 from 9:00 a.m. until noon; second grade-August 5 from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m.; prekindergarten-August 6 from 9:00 a.m. until noon; and, kindergarten-August 6 from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m.

To be eligible to enroll in pre-kindergarten, a child must be at least four years of age and must be unable to speak or understand the English language or from a family whose income is at or below the sustenance level, as determined by applying the formula used to qualify students for free or reduced lunches under the National School Lunch Program.

Parents of kindergarten students are reminded that even though their children participated in the screening clinic that was held in the spring in Ozona Primary School, it will still be necessary to enroll them in kindergarten.



The Traditional View of the Bible

By Dr. Dennis J. Prutow In the span of twenty-five years there have been two terrible riots in Los Angeles. I heard one talk show host ask the question. "Where did we go wrong?" The answer is that we have turned our backs on the Bible. For example, we no longer allow the Ten Commandments to be posted in schoolrooms. The Supreme Court declared this public display of the Ten Commandments unconstitutional on November 17, 1980. The court was deeply concerned that if these plainly religious values were posted in schoolrooms students might be encouraged to follow them. Since then, three generations of high school students and two generations of college students have graduated. By implication these students were taught that God's absolute moral standards summarized in the Ten Commandments are taboo. And Ted Koppel actually angered people when he said Moses did not come down from the mountain with the Ten Suggestions! Now these three generations of students have entered the mainstream of society. The 1992 Los Angeles riots, although shorter than the previous riots, were the occasion for more looting, violence, and murder. There is a correlation. When we turn our backs on the Bible and the standards of God in the Bible, we can expect more violence, more murders, more rapes, and more thefts in our society. The problem is that we no longer believe in absolute truth coming to us from God. We no longer believe in God who has spoken to us in a book. So we are a society that is adrift. We desperately need to get back to the traditional understanding
