

First day enrollment in Ozona schools dropped to 823, down 17 from the 2002 figure of 840. On the first day of school in 2000, enrollment was also 823, the lowest first day total in the 1994-2003 period. Highest enrollment for the first day of school in this time frame was 990 students in 1997.

Ozona's Fire Department

was an old model T with some tank. hose, etc. The truck was kept at Joe North's North Motor Co. Chevrolet, Buick, etc.

could not put a roof so he stretched canvas. It caught on fire.

The old Ford had been and hose. robbed of its coils and would not run. It was pulled to the fire.

Then the county purchased a Chevrolet fire truck through North Motor Company. Not much compared to today, a 250 gallon pump and carried some water. Later the truck was moved to James Motor Company.

In 1947 the need for a fire department was great, so a number of people met at James Motor Company in the spring and organized a fire department.

Dick Henderson was elected president, Arthur Kyle vice president, Bill Cooper chief, Miller Robinson first assistant fire chief and Gene Williams second assistant chief, Oscar Kost fire marshal, Charles Ratliff secretary and Rev. Clifton Tennison chaplain.

A new grass fire truck was purchased in 1969. Trucks were bought in 1971 and 1972 for grass fires. In 1992, 2000 and 2001 new grass fire trucks were added. The county employees built the trucks locally.

In 1982, the county purchased for the department a new GMC 750 gallon pumper built by Sims in San Antonio. The bunker, clothes, helmets, coats, pants, boots the county buys started in 1971. Firemen purchase individually dress uniforms.

A custom rescue pumper was added in 1999 at a cost of about \$275,000.00. This truck, a 1250 pumper with 1,000 gallons of water, foam and all rescue equipment and a full complement of ladders, carries 1,000 feet of 5" hose, 800 feet of 2 1/2" hose. A local contractor currently is building a new grass fire truck. The department acquired through the Texas Forestry Service a tanker that carries 4,000 gallons of water for use with grass fires.

Two industries, education and health services and leisure and hospitality, did show growth in July with gains of 2,200 and 2,600 July's figures from the Texas jobs, respectively. Professional no minor of gar have added more than 50,000 jobs

Employment losses in trade, transportation and utilities, which includes airlines and other traverelated industries, slowed to 500 jobs in July, after a loss of several thousand positions in June. The largest job decrease in July was in government, which shed 13,200 jobs as state and local government agencies continued belt-tightening measures in response to budget reductions.

Construction employment dropped slightly in July by 500 jobs. Employment in this industry has increased in seven of the last 10 months, for an annual growth rate of 1.6 percent, or 8,900 jobs added since July 2002. Employment in natural resources and mining fell for the second consecutive month with a loss of 900 jobs in July. Though still negative, the annual growth rate in this industry has steadily improved over the year.

"Certainly, in the short term, the small increase in the number of unemployed is troubling," said Commissioner for Employers Ron Lehman. "When we look back over the last year, though, we can easily see that our state's employers are continuing to create new jobs for Texas."







Texas ranks second in heritage tourism

AUSTIN - As the second most visited state by historic and cultural travelers, Texas is paving the way for heritage tourism and the Texas Historical Commission (THC) is at the helm. A new study from the Travel Industry Association of America and Smithsonian magazine lists Texas just behind California as a top destination for cultural, arts, historic and heritage activities.

"Today's travelers want to discover their heritage and experience Texas history firsthand," said Larry Oaks, executive director of the THC. "We encourage tourists to venture off the beaten path, to rural communities full of history, and in the process, stimulate small town economies."

The Texas Heritage Trails Program, a main THC initiative, ter. uses scenic driving trails to highlight historic sites. It increases was always evident and readily visitation to cultural and heritage sites, revitalizes local economies through regional marketing and heightens awareness of the importance of historic preservation to

Traveler reports 81 percent of U. S. adults who traveled in the past year are considered historic cultural travelers. These travelers included historical or cultural activities on almost 217 million, oneperson trips last year, up 13 percent from 192 million in 1996.

An increase in heritage travelers results in more money circulated back into the Texas economy. Heritage travelers spend more per trip than non-heritage travelers, averaging \$623 versus \$457, excluding cost of transportation, and they stay longer and pay for lodging more often than those staying with family and friends.

Contentment the Mark of a Christian

What is your level of contentment? Most of us lack real contentment of heart. Why? Because deep contentment comes from God. He promises, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is perfected in weakness." Listen to how the apostle Paul responded to this promise. "Most gladly, therefore, I will rather boast about my weaknesses, that the power of Christ may dwell in me. Therefore I am well content with weaknesses, with insults, with distresses, with persecutions, with difficulties..., for when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:10-11). Would you respond in this way? I probably wouldn't. In the midst of weakness, insults, and difficulties I'm prone to grumble. We often grumble when we're discontented. We grumble about the boss. He's just too bossy. Or we grumble about our pay. That grumbling shows we need to learn to make do with what we have while we are looking to the future and working hard to achieve specific educational goals and employment goals. But in order to learn contentment, we need spiritual help. The proper place to turn is Jesus Christ. The Bible tells us Jesus Christ is our source of contentment. Again, listen to the testimony of Paul. "I have learned to be content in whatever circumstances I am. I know how to get along with humble means, and I also know how to live in prosperity; in any and every circumstance I have learned the secret of being filled and going hungry, both of having abundance and suffering need. I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:11-13). Yes, we can learn to be content in every situation God places us if we are strengthened by Jesus Christ.

Medical Center at Dallas say that fialure to follow directions on medicine bottles can be a medical problem.

"Many people do try overthe-counter medicine to treat what ails them," sayus Dr. Kurt Kleinschmidt, associate professor of emergency medicine. "Unfortunately, attempts at home treatment often fail because people don't follow the directions listed on the medicine bottle.

It sounds simple, but taking the right amount of medicine at the right time intervals can mean the difference between treatment success and failure.

"If you don't take a prescription in the prescribed way, it isn't given a fair chance to work," he says. "Even when used correctly, medications don't always work. However, if used correctly, the chances for success grow considerably."


