





The more starches and sugars - carbohydrates - you eat, the harder it is to control blood glu-

Research has shown the amount of carbohydrates in foods is more important than what kinds of carbohydrates are eaten. That means people with diabetes can occasionally eat sweets, as long as they count the carbohydrates in those sweets. But remember: Sweets usually also have a high fat content, and so are more likely to provide more "empty calories" with less nutrition than other

Carbohydrates - starches and sugars such as those found in pasta, beans, cereal, fruits, rice, bread, vegetables, juices, milk and other dairy products, and anything made with added sugar such as cakes, candy and pie - are an important part of nutrition. Counting carbohydrates can allow for variation in foods eaten every day by providing a variety of choices. It can also be used to match and adjust insulin to food intake.

In order to count carbohycrates, you must know:

-How many grams of carbohydrates your body needs each day;

-How many grams of carbohydrates are in different foods; and

-How to use this process in planning meals.

As a broad rule of thumb, about half of the daily calories should come from carbohydrates. But because everybody is different, individual carbohydrate needs will vary from person to person. To find out how many grams of carbohydrates you should eat each day, work with your health care professional, such as a dietitian or certified diabetes educator.

A gram is a unit of weight -28 grams equal one ounce. Because they are so small, they can be used to measure carbohydrates accurately.

Once you know how many grams of carbohydrate you need each day - and when they should be eaten, you can plan your meals and snacks accordingly.

To determine how many grams of carbohydrate are in specific foods, you can use several methods. Read labels, if the food has one, or read books and other publications, visit websites of diabetes organizations and/or measure the foods on a scale.

For an accurate carbohydrate count, make sure portion sizes are correct. To guesstimate portion sizes - especially when eating away from home - let your hand guide you. For instance, your fist is about the same size as a onecup portion; and handful is about one to two ounces; a palm is about three ounces; a thumb is about one ounce; and a thumb-tip is about a teaspoon.



Nip bullying in the bud

Parents instinctively want to protect their children from bullies. But what if your own child is the bully?

Don't let that behavior slide, said Dr. John Sargent, a professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"The problem with bullying is that if you wait until middle school to try to eliminate it, you've probably waited too long," Sargent said. "When parents do not teach children proper behavior at home, the problems are brought to the classroom."

Parents turn a blind eye to their child's intimidating behavior for a variety of reasons. They may think bullying is just "kids being kids". Some parents may have been picked on themselves, and are happy to see their child is not the victim.

Communication is crucial to putting an end to bullying. Support groups or social skills training are possible treatments that can help parents whose children hurt others.

Sheriff Shane Fenton shares firearm safety rules

It is a special right that we as Americans have to be gun owners. It is a right that we should take seriously so that we may continue to enjoy the activities that gun ownership affords us. Part of beng a gun owner is the responsibility of using and maintaining our guns in a safe manner. It has become all too common for the antigun groups in this country to use any report of an accident involving a firearm in a negative manner. It is for this reason that we, as gun owners, must do ever thing in our power to avoid fueling their cause. I would like to share with you some of the basic safety rules related to gun handling, your target, your firearm, ammunition and storage of your firearm.

The three basic general rules of safe gun handling

1. Always point the muzzle in a safe direction; never point a firearm at anyone or anything you don't want shoot.

2. Keep your finger off the trigger and outside the trigger guard until you are ready to shoot. 3. Keep the action open and the gun unloaded until you are ready to use it.

Safety rules related to the shooter and his/her behavior

1. Treat every gun as if it were loaded.

2. Never pass a firearm to another person, or accept a firearm from another person, until the cylinder or action is open.

3. Never rely on any mechanical device for safety

4. Think before shooting; once you pull the trigger you can't take back the shot. 5. Never joke around or engage in horseplay while han-

dling a firearm. 6. Safeguard your sight, hearing and health. Always wear

eye and hearing protection. 7. Receive competent instruction from a qualified person before beginning to shoot.

Safety rules related to your

1. Positively identify your target and the threat it poses be-

fore firing at it. What's behind your target? Always make sure that a stray shot or a bullet which penetrates its intended target through and through, will be safety stopped.

3. Never shoot at a hard surface or water. 4. Never shoot a rifle or handgun directly upwards or at a

high angle of elevation. 5. Never shoot across a highway or other roadway.


