

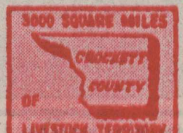

Lions run over Broncos 39-19

to Clay Guynes fell short, leaving the score Ozona 6, Sonora 0 with 11 minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The Lions have played many games against opponents who have all sorts of gimmicks (blowup helmets, tunnels, etc.) that are supposed to coax their teams to victory. Sonora's (although slightly annoying to the other side) train imitation has always been the coolest, but no gimmick could have helped the Broncos last Friday.

The Broncos may have been able to toot their horn, but the Ozona Lions rang their bell in a 39-19 victory to clench a playoff seat.

The game started with the Lions receiving. Arron Garza made a nice run to the 40-yard line but was dropped behind the line for a loss of six yards on the first play from scrimmage.

Garza struck back, and on the next play hit Trey Collis on a slant. Collis out ran the Sonora defense 66 yards for the touchdown. In the PAT attempt, Tyson Vordick's pass

The Broncos received the kickoff on their own 22-yard line and returned it to the Ozona 45 before a combined effort of Vordick and Vince Castro made the stop. The Broncos were able to move the ball with short passes and off-tackle counters to the Lion 24-yard line before Brad Mayfield hit the quarterback behind the line, forcing an incomplete pass.

An off-sides penalty on the Lions moved the ball to their own 20-yard line where Ozona's secondary, consisting of Garza, Clay Hale, Ryan Pearl, Kris Gray and Collis, held the Broncos by breaking up two consecutive passes. The Broncos threw a middle screen pass that allowed the receiver to sneak past the Lions from 20 yards out for the touchdown. The PAT was no good, leaving the score tied at 6-6 with

Travelers inquire about Ozona

Ozona Chamber of Commerce has received a terrific response to two different advertising pieces used to promote the community of Ozona. A vivid, full color newspaper insert, "See Texas First", ran Sunday, Sept. 7, putting the Ozona brochure in front of more than one million targeted potential travelers. It was distributed to 16 major newspapers throughout and surrounding Texas, with a bonus distribution to AAA offices and various travel fairs and trade shows nationwide.

"A picture of the Ozona brochure is located on the back page of the insert with a paragraph about our town," said Shanon Biggerstaff, chamber executive director. "The insert tells readers that they can order a free brochure on Ozona, or other Texas cities, by returning the brochure request coupon or visiting a web site."

Preprint Publishing Company publishes the "See Texas First" vacation guide. For more than 26 years, Preprint Publishing has provided a wide variety of vacation planners, getaway guides and freestanding newspaper inserts, showcasing destinations and attractions. Through its membership with the Texas Travel Industry Association (TTIA), the chamber was able to take advantage of this advertising program, available only to TTIA members.

Preprint Publishing provides all advertisers with mailing labels of reader responses and free computer analyses of those responses by market. To date, the chamber office has received 2,093 requests for a brochure on Ozona. Readers will be able to request information through January. "This insert is a strong advertising vehicle that will allow us to inform travelers that Ozona is, in fact, a great place to stop en route to their destination," said Biggerstaff. "There were 1,204 in state, 136 out-of-state, 53 requests from AAA offices and 700 miscellaneous e-mail request direct to Preprint Publishing for a brochure on Ozona."

The chamber also participated in the TTIA 2003 File Folder Program. This program targets more than 7,000 travel agents, tour operators, AAA offices, travel writers and beginning this year, the general public. New for 2003, the Ozona brochure and description was included on an online version of the File Folders, making it accessible to anyone. Again, the chamber receives from TTIA a computer analysis of requests. To date, there were 220 in state, 148 out-of-state and six requests from foreign countries for a total of 374 requests for information about Ozona.

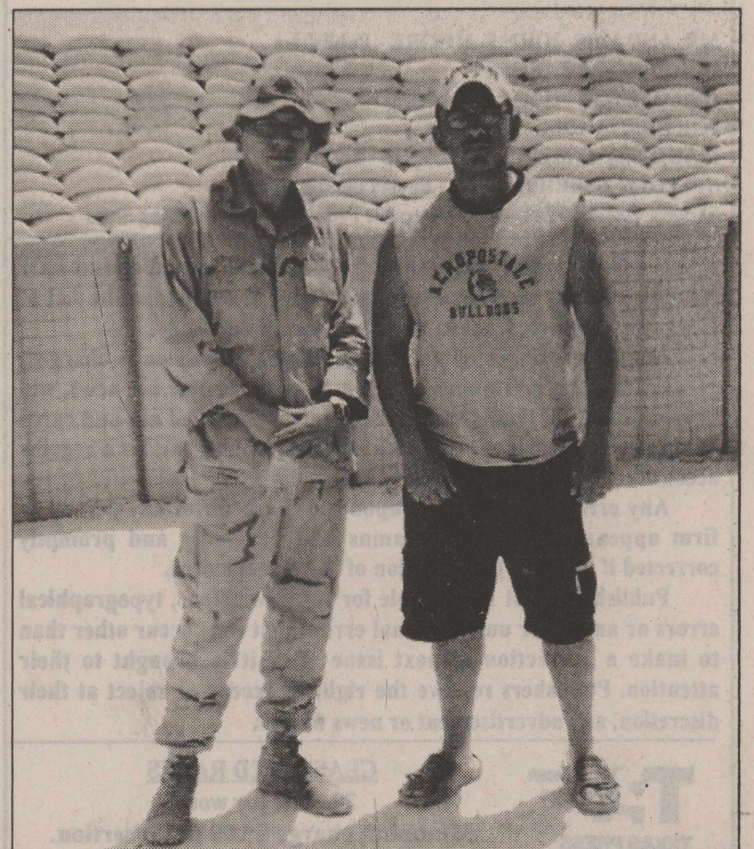
Daniel's group had about a two hour break there, and he used the time to call his grandmother, Maria Hernandez, in Ozona to confirm Ernie's location.

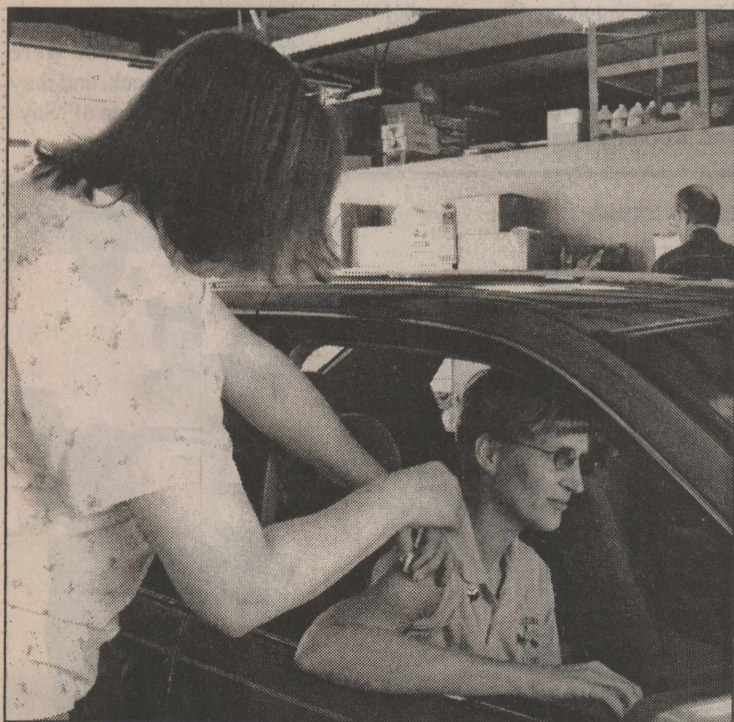

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Crockett County History
 "This is the way it was"
 By Oscar Kost



Templo Bautista Jerusalem
 Templo Bautista Jerusalem was established and organized in Ozona on June 19, 1903, by Rev. Marcos D. Castillo and Rev. D. M. West. At that time it was known as First Baptist Mexican Church, and they met in a small building located on Santa Rosa Street.
 The first pastor was Rev. Marcos D. Castillo until 1910 when Rev. Silvestre Rios was called to be the pastor.
 In 1954, a new building was erected on the corner of Santa Rosa and Blas Streets, and the name was changed from First Baptist Mexican Church to Templo Bautista Jerusalem.

Among the pastors for the church are: Rev. Estevan Flores, 1946-48; Rev. Leonardo Flores, 1947-48; Rev. Elias Rodriguez, 1-1950 - 12-1950; Rev. Nieves Mendez, 1950-52; Rev. Edwardo Gonzales, 1953-1956; Rev. Raul Falcon, 1956-1957; Rev. Fene Flien, 1957-1958; Rev. Benjamin Diaz, 1958-1960; Rev. Raul Soliz, 1961-1965; Rev. Henry Medina, 1966-67; Rev. Pedro Estrada, 1976-84; Rev. Carlos Venegas, 1986-1989; Rev. Fernando Charles, 1990-?; Rev. Miguel Arjon, 1994-98; Rev. Esequiel Cervantes, 1998 - Present.
 There is a gap in the record of ministers in the 1930's. Known to have pastored there are Rev. John Abbott who baptized several, Rev. Graciano Orozco, Rev. Juan Longoria and Rev. Felipe Godines.

Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church
 A history of the southwest would mention the Franciscan Fathers who came from Spain with explorers. Around the turn of the century, the Franciscan Fathers first brought Christianity to Ozona. They came from San Angelo when necessary.
 Ozona's first Catholic church was built in 1925-26. Earlier mass was celebrated in private homes. In later years, a social hall was constructed. The present church and rectory were built in 1953. In 1968, the parish hall-religious in-

Folktales of Crockett County

Have you ever wondered why few places can compete with the quality of Crockett County sheep? An answer to that question might be found in a favorite story from the son of one of the pioneers of Ozona. His story centers on his grandmother hearing about hunger in Israel. She knew her Bible, and knew that a shepherd with the right flock in the Middle East could raise a herd that would feed people for generations. If the shepherds there were as good as the shepherds of Crockett County, the wool and meat produced from breeding and tending those sheep could end hunger for many people.
 She rented the biggest plane available at the time and had it refitted as a flying sheep pen. Using her own money, that plane flew to Israel with over 750 of the best breeding ewes and bucks that Ozona had to offer. A short time after the plane delivered her breeding stock, she received the call that through a mix-up in translations, after the plane landed, all of the Ozona breeding lambs were shipped to a processing plant and eaten.
 It's hard to imagine how much a pound that mutton was worth! If there had been a translator at the right time and place, people in other countries might have made a tradition of breeding Ozona lambs instead of eating them!

Stephen (Schultz) Perner
 According to stories, Stephen was a very chubby little boy. In school, everyone would tease him about being so fat. At that time, there was a drummer, Mr. Schultz;

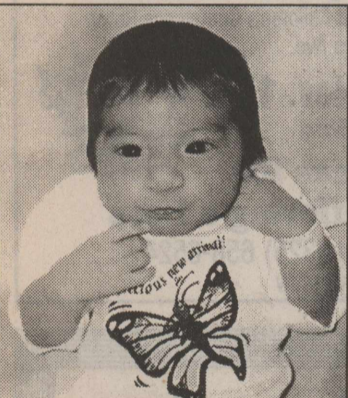

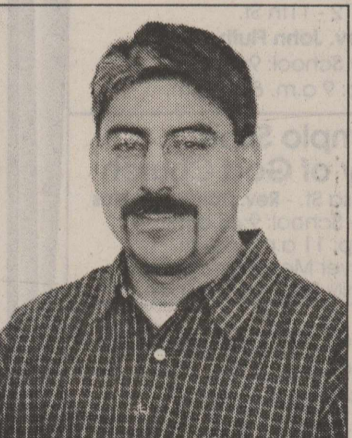

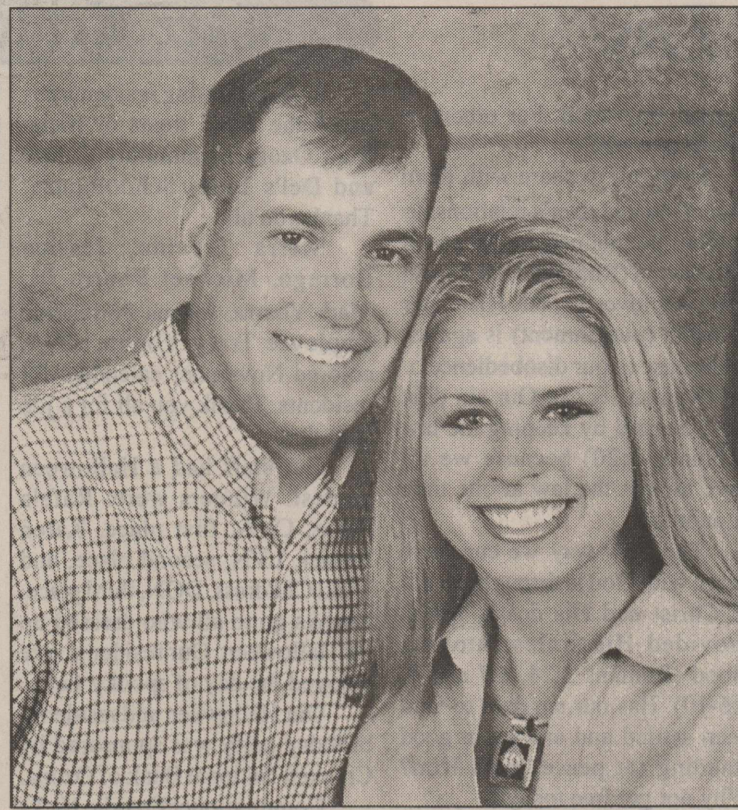
Jesse Flores new at WTX Rehab

God loves us, but His anger or wrath (punishment) is against us because of our disobedience or sin (Romans 6:23). Our sin debt can't be paid by keeping the law (Romans 3:20) because we all have broken the law at one time or another.

The only way we can have peace with God is through the life of Christ and His death, which provided His sinless atoning blood (Romans 3:24, 4:7 and 8, 5:6-10). Has our sin debt to God been settled and are we in good standing (at peace) with Him? Why not get free today?

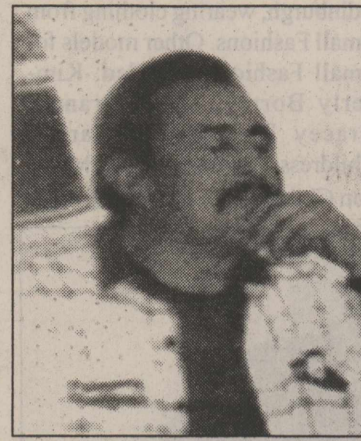

8:29 left in the first quarter.

The Lions weren't about to go into the second quarter with a tie, and after a few plays, a punt by the Lions and a fumble by the Broncos, the Lions took over on offense again.

Arron Garza threw one of his greatest games ever, and in the end, connected with Bryan Skehan over the middle for the touchdown. Time ran out in the first quarter with the Lions ahead 12 to 6.

The second quarter started with a Hale pitch to Jarryd Taylor who took it in for the touchdown. Hale's PAT pass to Bryan Skehan was short, leaving the score 18-6 with 10:15 left in the second quarter.

After another on-side kick by Skehan, the Broncos took over on their own 40-yard line. They weren't there for long because on the very next play, great defense by the Lions forced the Broncos' quarterback to throw quicker than he wanted, and Trey Collis intercepted the ball at the Ozona 30 yard line.

The Lions tried running the ball, but the Bronco defense forced them to punt. Ozona took over on their own 24-yard line. Taylor ran it to the 30 while Ryan Pearl's catch was good for 15 yards to the 45. Hale's pass to Tyson Vordick moved the Lions up 20 yards to the 35-yard line. Two plays later, Hale handed off to Taylor who swept around the end behind some awesome blocking of linemen, especially Aaron

Espino, to the Bronco 2-yard line. Mayfield finished the drive by leaping over the right side behind great blocking of the offensive line for the touchdown. Pagan's kick was good, bringing the score at the half to Ozona 25, Sonora 6.

Ozona received the punt at their own 26-yard line and hard running by Taylor and Mayfield to the 46-yard line before Bronco defense sacked Garza and a penalty moved the Lions back and forced them to punt. Unfortunately, the snap flew over Garza's head and he was unable to recover enough to get a good kick off. The Broncos took over on the Ozona 20-yard line, and a few plays later they were able to get just across the goal line for their second score of the night. The PAT was good, and the score was 25-13 Ozona with 2:42 left in the third quarter.

Arron Garza returned the kickoff to the 35-yard line, and the Lions were able to move to the 38 before Sonora tipped the ball and intercepted the pass to return the ball 38 yards for another score. This time, the PAT was no good, bringing the score to Ozona 25, Sonora 19 with 1:48 left in the third quarter.

The Lions fought back, however, and they received the kickoff, returning it to the 35-yard line. Garza hit Bryan Skehan on a crossing pattern good for 25 yards. The next play, Garza, on a roll, raced up the middle untouched for 47 yards and the touchdown. To finish things off, Garza then con-

nected with Taylor for the 2-point conversion, bringing the score to 33-19 Ozona with 30 seconds left in the third period.

The Broncos took it to the Ozona 40-yard line before Kris Gray intercepted the pass, giving the Lions the ball at their own 20. Sonora's defense held the Lions and forced a punt. The Lions held on and took over on downs after a great quarterback sack by Toby Pagan.

Runs by Mayfield, Garza and Castro took the Lions to the 32-yard line where Taylor busted through the left side, outrunning the defense to the end zone for the touchdown. The PAT was no good, bringing the score to 39-19 with 5:49 remaining in the game, and that is how it ended, giving Ozona a 6-3 overall record and 3-1 district record.

"That was a big win for us and got us into the playoffs for the fifth year in a row," Coach Steve Taylor explained. "The kids were really ready to play."

"After the bad things that happened in the second quarter, for the kids to come back the way they did, not to panic and keep their focus was really good."

Coach Taylor added that "Both quarterbacks threw the ball well, and the receivers (Bryan Skehan, Trey Collis, Tyson Vordick and Ryan Pearl) caught the ball and made things happen after the catch."

Leading tacklers for the game were Jarryd Taylor with 13, Toby Pagan, Brad Mayfield and Bryan Skehan with seven.

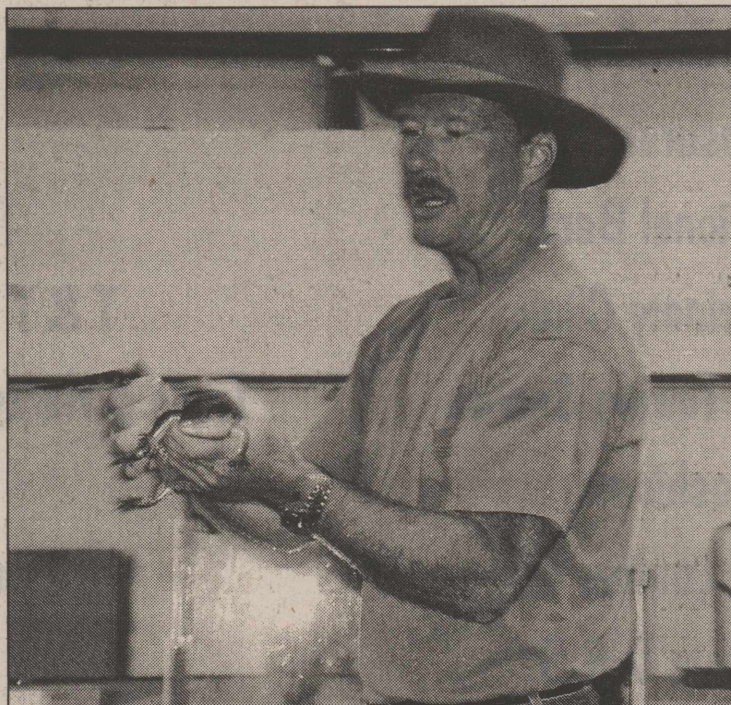

In addition to the live critters who live and travel with him, Jungle Jim has exhibit cases holding hundreds of dry mounted bugs from around the world. In the second quarter, the Lions struck back. After the Lion defense forced a Bronco punt, Long hooked up with wide receiver Levi Vargas on a 64-yard scoring strike that tied the score. The Lions took the lead on the extra point as Long hooked up with Vargas again on a pass and catch that brought the score to 8 to 6. The Broncos roared right back as they scored on a 40-yard touchdown pass and added the 2-point conversion to make the score 14 to 8 at halftime.

The Lions took over in the third period and began to march down the field. Ochoa and Gray traded nice runs while Long made key completions to Simmons and Ochoa to move the Lions across mid-field. Long then hooked up with tight end Tate Collis, and with a great block from John Tom Tijerina, Collis streaked into the end zone from 40 yards out to knot the score at 14 to 14.

The Lions' momentum didn't last long, as the Broncos raced right back down the field on a drive that took the score to 22-14 in favor of the Broncos.

The battle waged on as the Lions swiftly answered back. Led by Long, the Lions methodically went on an 80-yard scoring drive. Long used his legs on a pair of key runs for first downs, but he also completed 3 out of 3 passes to Simmons, Collis and Gray on the drive that moved them to the Bronco 6-yard line. From there, Gray powered his way into the

end zone to bring the Lions within two points. Long changed that deficit quickly as he scrambled his way into the end zone on the 2-point conversion to tie the score at 22.

The Lions used their momentum to get the ball right back as Jose Galvan perfectly executed an onside kick that was recovered by the Lions' Stevie Vargas. On the next play, Long rifled a pass to Vargas that he hauled in and took to the end zone for an amazing 28 to 22 lead as the third quarter came to an end.

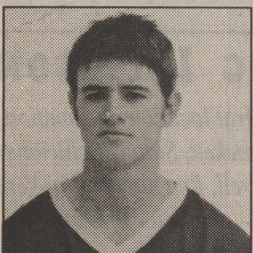

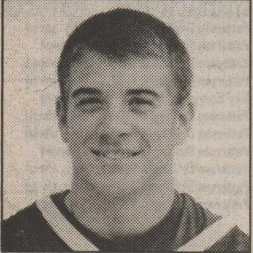
