The game started with the Lions receiving. Arron Garza made a nice run to the 40-yard line but was dropped behind the line for a loss of six yards on the first play from scrimmage.

Garza struck back, and on the next play hit Trey Collis on a slant. Collis out ran the Sonora defense 66 yards for the touchdown. In the PAT attempt, Tyson Vordick's pass

to Clay Guynes fell short, leaving the score Ozona 6, Sonora 0 with 11 minutes remaining in the first

The Broncos received the kickoff on their own 22-yard line and returned it to the Ozona 45 before a combined effort of Vordick and Vince Castro made the stop. The Broncos were able to move the ball with short passes and off-tackle counters to the Lion 24-yard line before Brad Mayfield hit the quarterback behind the line, forcing an incomplete pass.

An off-sides penalty on the Lions moved the ball to their own 20-yard line where Ozona's secondary, consisting of Garza, Clay Hale, Ryan Pearl, Kris Gray and Collis, held the Broncos by breaking up two consecutive passes. The Broncos threw a middle screen pass that allowed the receiver to sneak past the Lions from 20 yards out for the touchdown. The PAT was no good, leaving the score tied at 6-6 with




Daniel's group had about a two hour break there, and he used the time to call his grandmother, Maria Hernandez, in Ozona to confirm Ernie's location.

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Folktales of Crockett County Have you ever wondered - a traveling salesman - that would

why few places can compete with the quality of Crockett County sheep? An answer to that question might be found in a favorite story from the son of one of the pioneers of Ozona. His story centers on his grandmother hearing about hunger in Israel. She knew her Bible. and knew that a shepherd with the right flock in the Middle East could raise a herd that would feed people for generations. If the shepherds there were as good as the shepherds of Crockett County, the wool and meat produced from breeding and tending those sheep could end hunger for many people.

She rented the biggest plane available at the time and had it refitted as a flying sheep pen. Using her own money, that plane flew to Israel with over 750 of the best breeding ewes and bucks that Ozona had to offer. A short time after the plane delivered her breeding stock, she received the call that through a mix-up in translations, after the plane landed, all of the Ozona breeding lambs were shipped to a processing plant and

It's hard to imagine how much a pound that mutton was worth! If there had been a translator at the right time and place, people in other countries might have made a tradition of breeding Ozona lambs instead of eating them!





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
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Jungle Jim brings bugs to town


