# County begins additional pre-employment testing

A proposal by West Texas Rehabilitation to implement a new pre-employment and post-accident testing for Crockett County was authorized Monday by commissioners. The Work Steps program presented by physical therapist Jimmy Villers of San Angelo will involve testing of prospective new hires and of employees preparing to return to work following an accident.

Part of the program involves an analysis of tasks required and tests to determine if the prospective employee can safely do the job. When all benefits from both commercial service and general aviation are combined, the economic benefit stemming from the State's system of airports is truly Texas-sized. With nearly 300 airports, the benefits of aviation are evident from the largest metropolitan areas to remote, rural set-

In total, general aviation is responsible for nearly \$5.9 billion in economic benefit annually. Nearly 56,600 Texans can attribute their jobs, either directly or indirectly, to general aviation. When the impacts stemming from commercial service activity, including airlines, visitors and the associated multiplier effects is accounted for, the economic impact skyrockets. Commercial service activity, including visitor impacts, creates nearly \$34.9 bil-





### **Religion in Crockett County**

**Templo Siloe Assembly of God Church** 

In 1954, a group of seven people got together in their first reunion at a store owned by Luis Cardona at the corner of Laredo and Santa Ana Streets. As a result of these reunions, other believers began congregating with charter members Delfina Lara, Teodora Diaz, Elodia Perez, Refugio Martinez, Eva Morin, Maria Lara and Gloria Longoria.

The following year the reunions were relocated to a building owned by Samuel Martinez. Prayer meetings and home services were held frequently around this time, resulting in the growth of the church. The congregation's first pastor was Rev. Willi Esparza.

In 1960, Rev. Ezequiel Faz started the construction which resulted in the completion of the church at 526 Santa Rosa and Hwy. 163 South. Fund raisers and a lot of volunteer work by church members made it possible for the completion of the building.

Pastors serving Templo Siloe are: Rev. Willie Esparza, Rev. Ezequiel Faz, Rev. Demetrio Flores Jr., Rev. Dionicio Gonzales, Irma Rangel, Rev. Delfino Pozos, Rev. Eduvigen Diaz, Rev. Joe Menchaca, Rev. Matilde Orgtega, Rev. Sergio Arrelano and now Rev. Dan and Ann Rios.

Faith Lutheran Church

Beginning in March of 1965, Faith Lutheran Church held services in the old Maxine's Flower Shop until the church building was constructed. Leading this new Mission Church was Rev. Arno Melz who served until December of 1967. In August of 1968, the first services was held in the new church at 801 First Street.

Other pastors serving the church are: Rev. Stuart Firnhaber 1968-70, Rev. A. B. Wagner 1971-75, Rev. John Hafermann 1976-78, Rev. R. J. Mueller 1978-80, Rev. Dennis McCain 1980-83 and Rev. Charles Huffman since 1983.

### **Church of God of Prophecy**

A small church was started in Ozona first by Sister Linda Bellu in 1978. Rev. Kenneth Cooke was the first minister of Church of God of Prophecy, assisted by Enofre Rodriquez. Next came the Rev. Gilbert Castillo and Juan Hernandez, then Concha Marroquin.

During Rev. Marroquin's pastorate, a church was constructed in Chandlerdale West. Much of the material for the building came from a dismantled church in Paducah. The first service was held in the incomplete building Aug. 14, 1988. Prior to that time, services were held in the home of the pastor.

In 1990, Rev. Miguel Jimenez became minister at the church. He was followed by Rev. Martin Sanchez 1992-94, Rev. Onofre Rodriquez 1994-95, Rev. Lupe Domoniquez 1995-2003, and now Rev. Mario De La Mora is pastor.

A month before September 11, 2001, while working for the federal government, I was given a tour of a building called the Pen- dedicated their lives to find the

ington, DC. The Pentagon houses offices for the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard. I asked the Marine who led me around for interesting stories that I could use in a sermon. He told a story that used to be one of the greatest secrets in the world. Now, that story is declassified.

Here is his story: During the 1950's, Russia was worried that the United States would use atomic bombs to wipe out Russia. Russia trained spies with the goal of getting into the Pentagon. The Pentagon is almost shaped like a doughnut. There are several acres of open land in the center of the Pentagon.

One day, a Soviet spy plane saw through clouds a dim picture of construction in the very center of the Pentagon. One spy plane after another tried to find out what was being constructed. No spy was able to get to the center the Pentagon, but from photographs taken through clouds by the spy planes, the Soviet military decided that a new war room had been built deep beneath the center of the Pentagon. The spy planes could see that at a certain time of day a large group of people rushed in and out of that new small building in the center of the Pentagon. According to soviet experts, this meant a shift change of American military experts.

The Russians developed a new type of atomic bomb that would hit that small building in

the center of the Pentagon, and drive itself deep into the ground before it would blow up.

lion in benefits and 643,700 jobs. When all general aviation and commercial service economic benefits are summed, the total benefit is estimated at more nearly \$40.8 billion. Nearly 700,300 Texans are directly or indirectly employed as a result of aviation. These jobs generate approximately \$16.3 billion in payroll and benefits annually.

Ozona Municipal Airport, a public-use general aviation airport, occupies 110 acres of land located approximately one mile north of Ozona. The airport operates one asphalt runway, Runway 16/34, measuring 6,000 feet in length and 75 feet in width.

The airport supports the local economy in a variety of ways The direct output from on-airport spending is estimated at nearly \$131,000. Additionally, more than 800 general aviation visitors arrive there each year, bringing \$51,000 in payroll and \$86,000 in direct economic output into the local economy.

When combined, on-airport spending and visitors using general aviation are responsible for \$378,000 in total economic output, six full-time jobs and \$133,000 in payroll.
