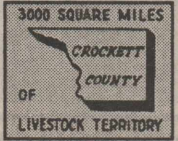

## Litter Abatement Act . . . . Cleanup begins

Cleanup made possible under the Texas Litter Abatement Act and the Texas Health and Safety Code became visible to the eye in Ozona last week when county employees tackled a lot on Avenue O. This is the first to be cleaned from a list of 31 targeted properties according to Eddie Moore, county roads and parks superintendent.

Under the litter abatement act and health and safety code, property owners are given a 30-day written notice to remove garbage, litter, junk and other solid waste from their property. If there is no response to the request, sent out

in the form of a letter from the office of County Attorney Bill Mason, the county can remove and dispose of the refuse with related expensed charged to the landowner. If these charges are not paid, a lien can be imposed on the property for the cost of the cleanup.

Start of the project has been a long time coming. The county road department has many duties throughout the year, but "we're really going to do this," said Moore.

"People all over town want their neighborhoods cleaned up," said Mason, who indicated that

while there currently are 31 targeted properties, "there are more to come."

Fire Marshal Steve Kenley is in the process of inspecting structures that appear to be a hazard to other structures and the neighborhood. When such structures are identified, they will be condemned and removed following the notification and billing policy.

Part of the cleanup focuses on old vehicles which are not being driven. If these are not removed by the owners, the county will do so, Mason said. Cost of storage for these vehicles can be charged to the owners.

## Lions overwhelm Eagles 54-20

The Lions came to Lions Stadium ready to fight Nov. 7 in this senior football game against the Eldorado Eagles.

Bryan Skehan's game-starting kick was taken by the Eagles at the 10-yard line, but they were no match for the Lions, who took over on downs at the 50.

Vince Castro started the offense with a 45-yard run, and after runs by Jarryd Taylor, Brad Mayfield and Arron Garza, Garza connected with Trey Collis for a 10-yard touchdown. Toby Pagan's PAT kick was good, and Ozona took the lead 7-0 with 4:51 left in the first quarter.

Eldorado carried the kick to the 30-yard line, and after two runs to the 45, the quarterback was forced to throw the ball a little sooner than he liked. Tyson Vordick stepped up his senior night and intercepted the Eagles' pass and ran the ball 56 yards back for the Ozona touchdown. Again, Pagan's kick was good, and the Lions were up 14-0 with 2:48 left

in the first quarter.

Ozona scored again in the first quarter when Jarryd Taylor swept around the end four yards to paydirt. The PAT was good and the score was 21-0 at the end of the first quarter.

The Eagles took over and moved the ball well. A major penalty on the Lions' part gave the Eagles the ball at the 7-yard line. The next play the Eagle quarterback found an open running back who carried the ball up the middle for the 7-yard score. Bryan Skehan blocked the Eagles' field goal attempt, and the score was 21-7 in favor of the Lions with 11:05 left in the second quarter.

Ozona received the kick at their own 2-yard line where Garza returned it to the 30. Taylor took it up the middle for a 7-yard gain but was stopped with the Lions facing fourth and inches. Here, Brad Mayfield (behind awesome blocking by the offensive line) took the handoff, running around left end untouched 60 yards for a touchdown. Pagan's kick was good, bringing the score to Ozona 28, Eldorado 6.

The offensive line continued to improve and paved the way for the backs to rush for 424 yards, Coach Steve Taylor brags. Outstanding Ozona linemen are Chris Martinez, Daniel Rubio, Jimmy Tebbetts, Matt McGuire and Aaron Espino.

Skehan's kickoff was returned to the Eagles' 35-yard line. The next play by Eldorado was a screen pass to the 50-yard line. Then, a pass interference penalty moved the ball to the Ozona 35-yard line. Ozona's defense came back and stuffed the Eagles for a 5-yard loss and then held the Eagles to take the ball over on downs on their own 40-yard line.

## Aviation benefits state, county

Statistics contained in a Texas Department of Transportation publication on the economic impact of aviation in the state are eye opening. The following information is taken from brochures provided to Crockett County by TxDOT.

When all benefits from both commercial service and general aviation are combined, the economic benefit stemming from the State's system of airports is truly Texas-sized. With nearly 300 airports, the benefits of aviation are evident from the largest metropolitan areas to remote, rural settings.

In total, general aviation is responsible for nearly \$5.9 billion in economic benefit annually. Nearly 56,600 Texans can attribute their jobs, either directly or indirectly, to general aviation. When the impacts stemming from commercial service activity, including airlines, visitors and the associated multiplier effects is accounted for, the economic impact skyrockets. Commercial service activity, including visitor impacts, creates nearly \$34.9 bil-

## County begins additional pre-employment testing

A proposal by West Texas Rehabilitation to implement a new pre-employment and post-accident testing for Crockett County was authorized Monday by commissioners. The Work Steps program presented by physical therapist Jimmy Villers of San Angelo will involve testing of prospective new hires and of employees preparing to return to work following an accident.

Part of the program involves an analysis of tasks required and tests to determine if the prospective employee can safely do the job. The program, which has gone to a national level, was developed by a physical therapist in Odessa, Villers said.

The first step will be a countywide job analysis. Clay Gentry, head of West Texas Rehab of Ozona, will undergo special training to enable him to conduct the screenings. The program will be implemented as soon as "everything is in place".

In other health related items, court members voted to execute a resolution to approve an amended cafeteria plan for insurance in 2004 and to reauthorize the continuation of dental and vision plans.

A petition was accepted from eight landowners in Precinct 3 who requested the closing of a section of County Road 307. The request was approved effective with the end of the required notification period. The court also approved the closing of Antonio Street, also at the end of the notification period.

After discussing road policies and classifications, commissioners agreed that they need to review a list of roads and their classifications. The court members voted to establish a policy that prohibits having a bumpgate and cattleguard at the same location. The county will provide cattleguards. In addition, the policy prohibits placement of gates across any county road without permission from the court.

Bids for paving aggregate were opened with Capital Aggregates being awarded the bid for B Grade 3 and B Grade 4 materials and CSA Materials Inc. of San Angelo received the bid award for pre-coated rock. The county will haul the materials from San Angelo and from near Balmorhea.

The resignation of County Extension Agent Roy Walston was accepted and the Extension Service authorized to advertise for employment of a new agent. The salary will remain the same.

Commissioners approved the final plat for the Hersey Subdivision as presented by Renee Howes of Texas Land and Ranches. In an unrelated agenda item, also approved was the cancellation of the

Hudspeth Subdivision Plat #1. Judge Johnny Jones abstained from voting on the Hudspeth Subdivision motion.

A vote was taken to approve an adjustment to correct an error in retirement eligibility records for County and District Clerk Debbi Puckett. This motion allows correction of any other retirement eligibility records if errors are discovered.

Commissioners voted to in-

sure the new firetruck chassis as requested by Fire Chief Bob Falkner. The chassis, made possible by a grant from the Texas Forestry Service, must be insured for the grant to be awarded.

Appointment of Jeanette Campbell to the civic center board and John Fluth to the Crockett County Historical Commission also were approved by the court.

## Treto heads for state meet

The Ozona boys took their district cross country team to Lubbock Nov. 8 to compete in the regional meet. The team had the misfortune of being in the toughest region in the state as four of the five teams in the state according to rankings were in Region I. With 150 runners and more than 20 of the best teams Region I has to offer, the Ozona boys more than held their own in the stiff competition. They finished fifth place overall, trailing only to the top ranked teams from Eula, Holliday, Boys Ranch and Wall.

Leading the Lions in the competition was junior Eliseo Treto who finished ninth overall in a fantastic three mile time of 16:49. The ninth place finish earned Eliseo his second consecutive trip to Round Rock to com-

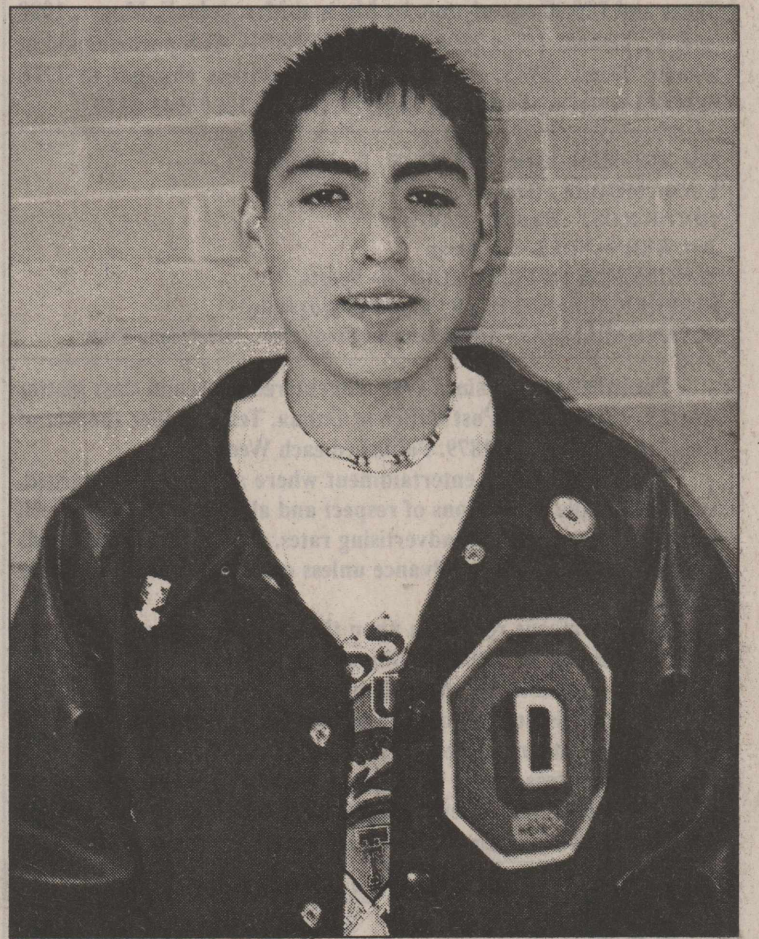
pete in the state championship meet Nov. 8.

Just missing out on a trip to state was junior Simon Garza who ran an outstanding time of 16:57 to finish 12th overall.

Two freshmen were the next Lions to cross the finish line as Tate Collis and Roman Tambunga placed 40th and 41st respectively. Their times were also very good as they ran at a clip of 18:12 and 18:14.

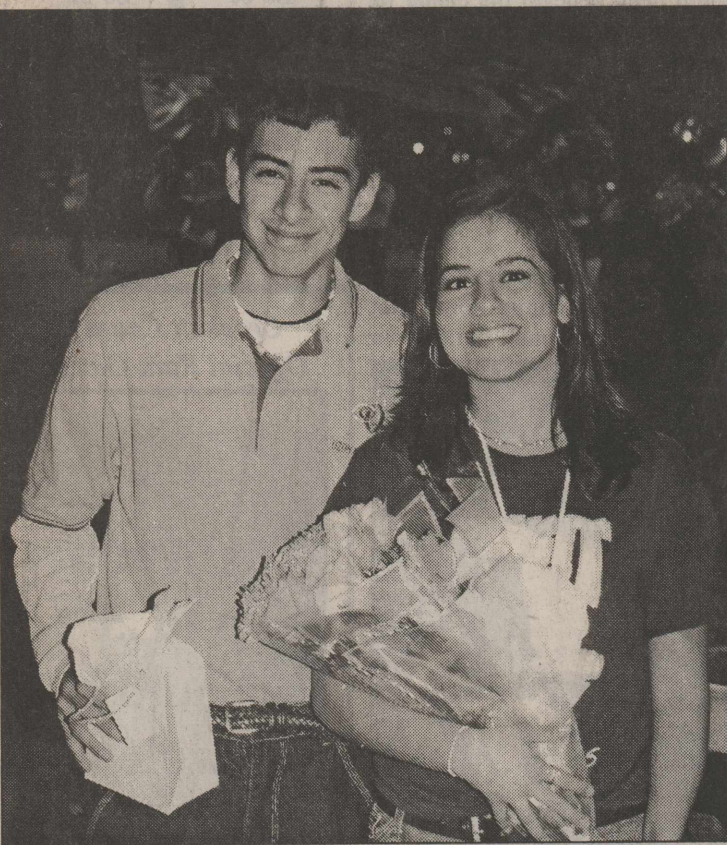

## Religion in Crockett County

**Templo Siloe Assembly of God Church**

In 1954, a group of seven people got together in their first reunion at a store owned by Luis Cardona at the corner of Laredo and Santa Ana Streets. As a result of these reunions, other believers began congregating with charter members Delfina Lara, Teodora Diaz, Elodia Perez, Refugio Martinez, Eva Morin, Maria Lara and Gloria Longoria.

The following year the reunions were relocated to a building owned by Samuel Martinez. Prayer meetings and home services were held frequently around this time, resulting in the growth of the church. The congregation's first pastor was Rev. Willi Esparza.

In 1960, Rev. Ezequiel Faz started the construction which resulted in the completion of the church at 526 Santa Rosa and Hwy. 163 South. Fund raisers and a lot of volunteer work by church members made it possible for the completion of the building.

Pastors serving Templo Siloe are: Rev. Willie Esparza, Rev. Ezequiel Faz, Rev. Demetrio Flores Jr., Rev. Dionicio Gonzales, Irma Rangel, Rev. Delfino Pozos, Rev. Eduvigen Diaz, Rev. Joe Menchaca, Rev. Matilde Orgtega, Rev. Sergio Arrelano and now Rev. Dan and Ann Rios.

**Faith Lutheran Church**  
 Beginning in March of 1965, Faith Lutheran Church held services in the old Maxine's Flower Shop until the church building was constructed. Leading this new Mission Church was Rev. Arno Melz who served until December of 1967. In August of 1968, the first services was held in the new church at 801 First Street.

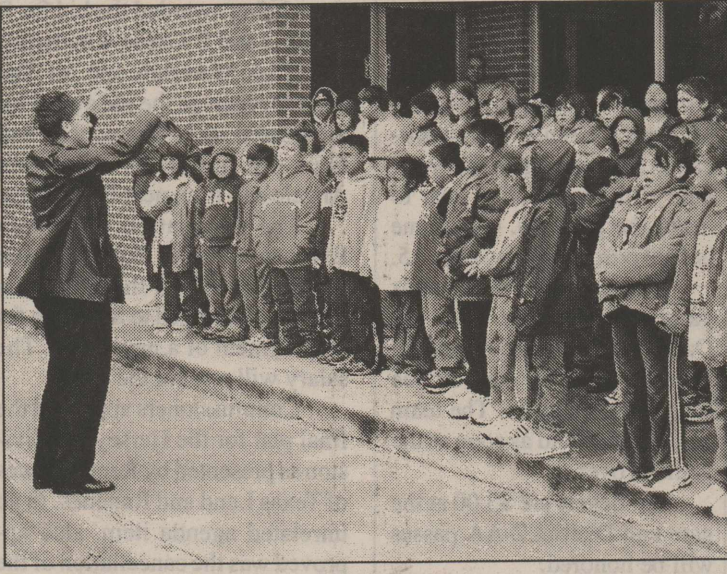
Other pastors serving the church are: Rev. Stuart Firnhaber 1968-70, Rev. A. B. Wagner 1971-75, Rev. John Hafermann 1976-78, Rev. R. J. Mueller 1978-80, Rev. Dennis McCain 1980-83 and Rev. Charles Huffman since 1983.

**Church of God of Prophecy**  
 A small church was started in Ozona first by Sister Linda Bellu in 1978. Rev. Kenneth Cooke was the first minister of Church of God of Prophecy, assisted by Enofre Rodriguez. Next came the Rev. Gilbert Castillo and Juan Hernandez, then Concha Marroquin.

During Rev. Marroquin's pastorate, a church was constructed in Chandlerdale West. Much of the material for the building came from a dismantled church in Paducah. The first service was held in the incomplete building Aug. 14, 1988. Prior to that time, services were held in the home of the pastor.

In 1990, Rev. Miguel Jimenez became minister at the church. He was followed by Rev. Martin Sanchez 1992-94, Rev. Onofre Rodriguez 1994-95, Rev. Lupe Domoniquez 1995-2003, and now Rev. Mario De La Mora is pastor.

## Tales from John Fluth

A month before September 11, 2001, while working for the federal government, I was given a tour of a building called the Pentagon. The Pentagon houses offices for the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard. I asked the Marine who led me around for interesting stories that I could use in a sermon. He told a story that used to be one of the greatest secrets in the world. Now, that story is declassified.

Here is his story: During the 1950's, Russia was worried that the United States would use atomic bombs to wipe out Russia. Russia trained spies with the goal of getting into the Pentagon. The Pentagon is almost shaped like a doughnut. There are several acres of open land in the center of the Pentagon.

One day, a Soviet spy plane saw through clouds a dim picture of construction in the very center of the Pentagon. One spy plane after another tried to find out what was being constructed. No spy was able to get to the center the Pentagon, but from photographs taken through clouds by the spy planes, the Soviet military decided that a new war room had been built deep beneath the center of the Pentagon. The spy planes could see that at a certain time of day a large group of people rushed in and out of that new small building in the center of the Pentagon.

According to soviet experts, this meant a shift change of American military experts. The Russians developed a new type of atomic bomb that would hit that small building in

the center of the Pentagon, and drive itself deep into the ground before it would blow up.

Generations of Russian spies dedicated their lives to find the secret of that small building. The Marine showed me that building. It is the main Pentagon snack bar. Their pizza was greasy and made my stomach feel bad. People rushed in and out of that building to buy food. Russia had spent billions of dollars and wasted thousands of lives in an attempt to destroy a snack bar.

lion in benefits and 643,700 jobs. When all general aviation and commercial service economic benefits are summed, the total benefit is estimated at more than \$40.8 billion. Nearly 700,300 Texans are directly or indirectly employed as a result of aviation. These jobs generate approximately \$16.3 billion in payroll and benefits annually.

Ozona Municipal Airport, a public-use general aviation airport, occupies 110 acres of land located approximately one mile north of Ozona. The airport operates one asphalt runway, Runway 16/34, measuring 6,000 feet in length and 75 feet in width.

The airport supports the local economy in a variety of ways. The direct output from on-airport spending is estimated at nearly \$131,000. Additionally, more than 800 general aviation visitors arrive there each year, bringing \$51,000 in payroll and \$86,000 in direct economic output into the local economy.

When combined, on-airport spending and visitors using general aviation are responsible for \$378,000 in total economic output, six full-time jobs and \$133,000 in payroll.

First-round impact is figured to be \$217,000 according to the brochure. This includes direct and indirect impacts. Direct impacts are benefits associated with on-airport businesses and government spending that support general aviation. Indirect impacts generally take place off-airport and are usually attributable to the spending of visitors who arrive in a community by general aviation aircraft.

Secondary impact in the community is figured at \$161,000. This impact primarily consists of induced impacts, which are those benefits that result from the re-circulation of direct and indirect impacts within the economy. This re-circulation is commonly referred to as the "multiplier effect".

Total impacts, total employment, 6 jobs, total payroll \$133,000 and total economic activity (output) \$378,000, are the combination of all first-round and secondary impacts.

The primary aviation-related activities that take place at Ozona Municipal Airport on a regular basis include aircraft maintenance, corporate use, and recreational flying. Additionally, the airport provides several community-based services and programs to enhance the health, safety, welfare and quality of life of area citizens. The airport also serves as a gateway for visitors who use the facility to access local hunting sites.

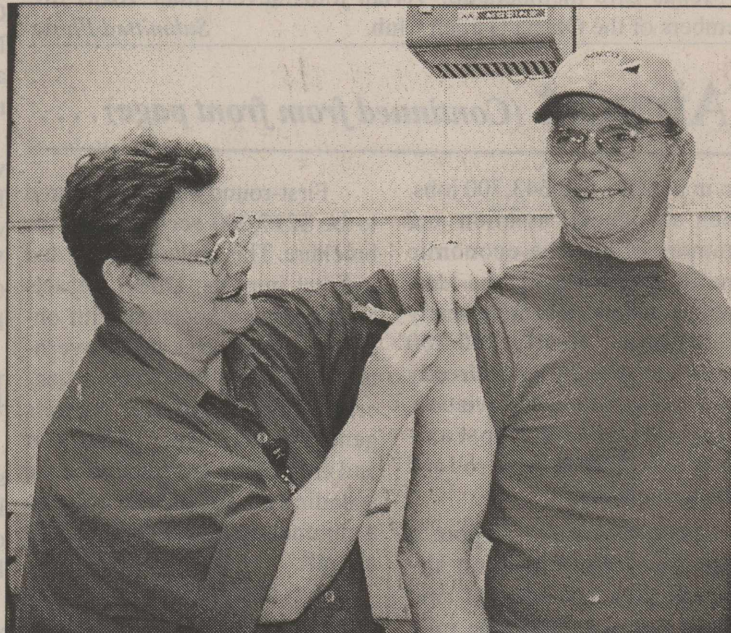

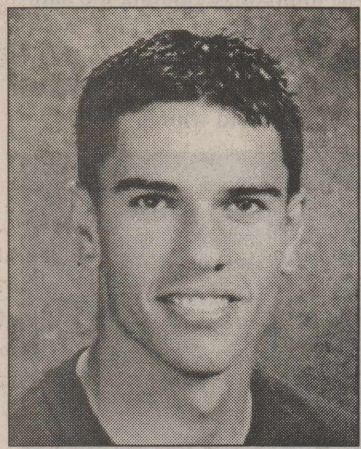
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## Garza receives national honor

Following the production of ENCORE!, we went on a walking tour at the National Ranching Heritage Center museum on the Texas Tech campus. There are many examples of ranch houses, barns, corals, water sources and types of transportation used in early ranch life in and around Texas. There is even an old locomotive with wooden cattle cars used for transporting livestock to market.

The native wildlife and landscaping are surprising and interesting additions to the museum. Along with native grasses, trees and plants, there seem to be hundreds of tame, native jackrabbits and cottontails. Some students

wanted to bring a rabbit home for a souvenir, but we agreed it was best to leave them in Lubbock. There are already plenty around Ozona.

One of the most intriguing buildings is the Picket and Sotol House. It was a homestead moved to the museum from near Ozona in Crockett County. The walls are made of cedar posts, native sotol stalks and mud chinking. The roof is thatched with local grass. The Sotol and Picket house was constructed around 1904. Everyone posed for a picture in front of it before we left for home.

Four downs later, Eldorado took the ball on the Lions' 40. The Eagles' quarterback ran the ball up the middle to the Ozona 27-yard line for a nice gain. Eldorado's next play resulted in a penalty, which brought the ball back to the Ozona 40-yard line. Ozona's defense came through and stopped the Eagles on downs on the Lions' 35-yard line.

The ball was moved to the 50-yard line due to a pass interference penalty. The next play, Garza passed the ball over the middle to Ryan Pearl to the Eldorado 21-yard line. Behind great blocking, Jarryd Taylor ran around the right end to the Eagles' 9-yard line, setting up a first and goal. Garza then pitched to Brad Mayfield who scored untouched. The PAT kick was no good, leaving the score at 34-6 Ozona at the half.

At the start of the second half, Eldorado kicked to Garza who returned the ball to the 25-yard line. Two plays later, Taylor carried the ball 21 yards to the Eagle 36. After two more plays, Hale took the snap and ran the ball in for the first Ozona touchdown of

the second half. Once again Pagan's PAT was good, bringing the score to Ozona 41, Eldorado 6.

A few plays later, Pagan picked off an Eldorado pass and returned it to the Eldorado 10. Two plays later, Taylor again took the ball around the right end for a touchdown. The PAT was no good, and the score stood at 47-6 Lions.

About this time, the misting rain and fog started to cover the field. The Lions kicked off to the Eagles who went 3 and out. Ozona took the ball over after an Eagle punt. The Eagles stopped the Ozona offense, and for the first time of the night, the Lions were forced to punt. Once again the Lion defense held the Eagles, forcing them to punt. Clay Guines then smashed up the middle for 5 yards, and on the next play rambled 40 yards for the score. Yet again, Pagan's kick was good, and the score was 54-20 Ozona with 8:40 left in the game.

Bryan Skehan kicked off to Eldorado where they started on their 50-yard line. The Eagles were able to move the ball to the Ozona 33 before Vince Castro recovered a fumble and the Lions took over on their own 35.

Pagan carried the ball for the next two plays, reaching the Eagle 47. On the next play, Clay Guines almost broke another one, but was stopped after a 16-yard gain to the 31. "Mixing these kids in with our older guys is going to make the Ozona Lions tough to beat in the years to come," said Morrow.



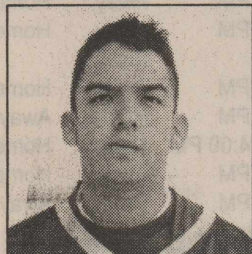

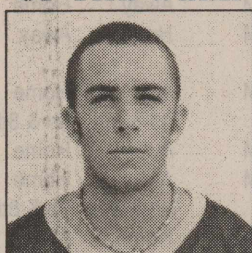
