

Crockett County History

"This is the way it was"

Crockett County discovers oil in 1925

W. T. Patrick leased 1,400 acres in 1916 and a well was drilled to 500 feet.. Dry Hole.

The same year, Ozela Oil Co. leased 400,000 acres in Crockett and adjoining counties, including the Hudspeth, Friend, Will Noelke, Couch, Massie, Pierce and Cannon ranches. The lease was to receive 10 cents annual rental.

In 1925 the first oil discovery in Crockett County was made on the L. P. Powell Ranch 25 miles north of Ozona producing 25 barrels a day. The well by World Oil Company Humble of Maryland immediately purchased for \$1,400,000.00 cash \$350,000.00.

The second pool of consequence was discovered in 1938 by Choate and Hogan of Midland on University land in northwest Crockett County. Gilcrease Oil Co. bought the well for \$106,000.00. It made 104 barrels

On the J. S. Todd Ranch, Continental Oil Co. in 1940 developed high production of high gravity oil. Other wells were drilled. The first well pumped 840 barrels in 12 1/2 hours. It was drilled to 5,091 feet.

Continental found a light pay in Todd at 1,540 feet in 1933. A wildcat on the W. T. Noelke

Ranch in extreme western Crockett County blew in. The oil from Todd Field was trucked 18 miles to a pipeline.

The oil discovery in 1925 was a turning point in Crockett

history. Gas was discovered south of Ozona. The oil companies began installing pipe lines to carry the oil and gas from the wells to their plants.


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
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

Now perhaps following your horoscope and children pretending they are wizards seem innocent enough. But they are only a step away from deeper involvement in the occult. More than one person has attempted to communicate with the dead. Bereaved parents and lonely widows are particularly vulnerable to such practices. But the Bible warns against these things. "There shall not be found among you anyone who makes his son or his daughter pass through the fire, one who used divination, one who practices witchcraft, or one who interprets omens, or a sorcerer, or one who casts a spell, or a medium or a spiritist, or one who calls up the dead" (Deuteronomy 18:10-11). 




Ranked third or fourth in her class, her favorite subject is pre-calculus. Jenna is active in UIL academics and plays basketball and tennis.
