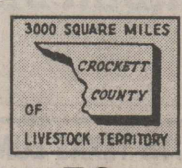

## Let us all be thankful

Rev. Charles Huffman, pastor of Faith Lutheran Church, reaches many outside his congregation with messages on a signboard at the family business on Avenue E. For approximately 20 years he has brought scripture and thought-provoking words to the community and to passersby traveling through Ozona.

Last Wednesday morning he was out putting up his favorite Thanksgiving message, "Only turkeys don't give thanks".

The sign ministry came into being when son Vince bought a message board to put outside Crockett Automotive. "Vince bought it, and I put it to use," said Rev. Huffman.

His messages usually apply to something going on in society or the season. "Some come to my head, some I see somewhere, then think of scriptures that go with the message. I try to keep it short. People might have a wreck trying to see it," he said with a laugh.

Charles and Betty Huffman, and infant son Vince came to Ozona in 1958, and he went to work at the Ford place. After six years, they returned to Fort Worth where he worked for a "big oil company with great promise" for a year.

"But the Lord wanted me here," he said.

Charles Huffman never had any idea of becoming a minister. "I didn't choose it. He opened things up and hit me with a 2x4," said the minister. "I questioned what He wanted me to do."

Five years of self-study and a year and a half of hard praying later, he went to Concordia College in Milwaukee, WI, and attended their lay ministry pro-

gram, graduating in 1983. During his months away, Betty and the boys, Vince and Bubs, kept the auto parts store

After a time, burn-out set in, and he gave his resignation to both churches. Someone else took over Sonora, and "the Lord sent someone to get me," said Rev. Huffman. For 15 months he pastored the Ozona, Fort Stockton and Alpine Lutheran churches.

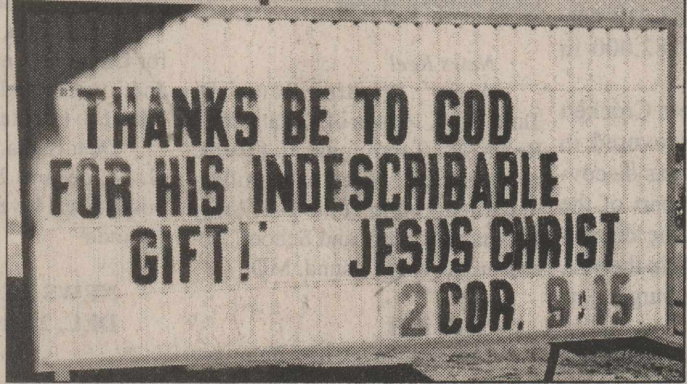
"It was almost as though the Lord was saying 'you just thought you were burned out,'" said the pastor.

"My sweet wife went with me all but two times during those 15 months."

Perhaps it was about the time she told him "you're beginning to look like a car seat," that the Alpine and Fort Stockton churches found pastors.

As the pastor's wife, Betty is supportive of her husband's role and the needs of the church.

The Huffmans also stay busy keeping up with the basketball and cheerleading activities of Karen and Vince's daughter, Hilary, a junior at OHS.



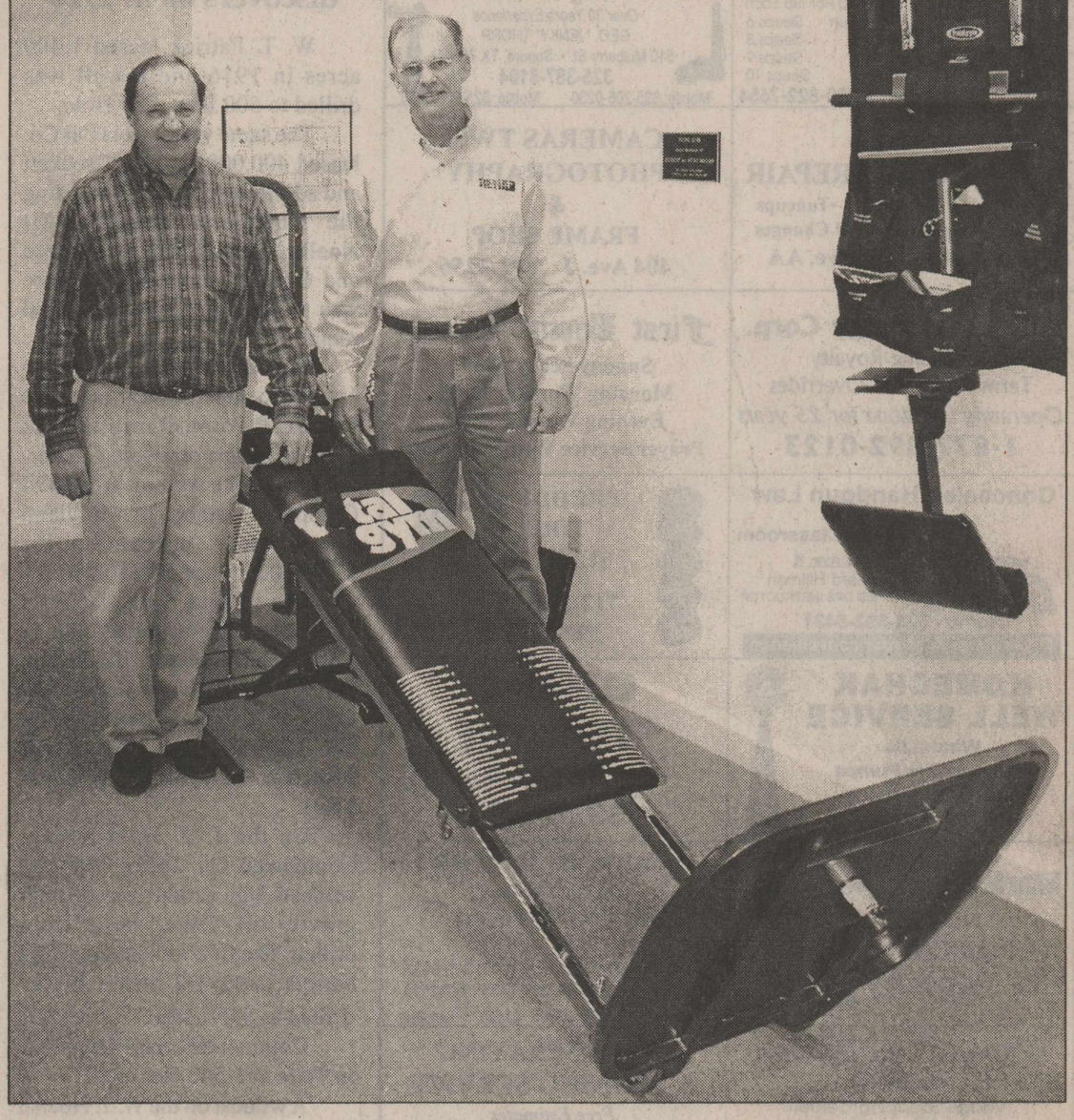

## 'Neighbor helping neighbor...' Rehab open house celebrates expansion

An open house Nov. 24 to celebrate the expansion of West Texas Rehab of Ozona drew guests from Abilene, San Angelo and Ozona.

The expansion doubles the floor space of the facility, which is located in a county-owned

building at 908 First Street.

Among those on hand to tour the enlarged Rehab quarters was Tom Early, president of San Angelo Health Foundation. A SAHF grant paid for \$104,445.00 of the \$130,000.00 project through the Williams Harden Wil-

liams and Mary Eveline Holmes Williams fund established by the late Myrtle Williams. The balance of the cost was paid for through individual gifts.

WTRC president and CEO Woody Williland commended the Rehab board and Crockett County for their support of the Ozona facility and emphasized Rehab's philosophy of "neighbor helping neighbor".

The remodeling project allowed Rehab to add much-needed space and equipment in the physical therapy program, install an occupational therapy department, complete with activity gym and kitchen for adults and a specially equipped area for pediatrics programs, initiate audiological services, including a hearing testing booth, tympanometer and audioscan.

Pointing out the many changes and additions to open house guests were local Rehab board members Jo Davidson and Carmen Sutton.

## New fitness equipment at schools

In their regular monthly meeting that took place on Tuesday, Nov. 18, members of the Ozona School Board approved the construction in the Ozona Middle School Cafeteria of a small office to be used for storage of a computer and other recordkeeping items for the newly-acquired National School Fitness Foundation physical fitness equipment. The physical fitness equipment will be located in the gyms at Ozona primary School and Ozona Intermediate School, at the south end of the cafeteria at Ozona Middle School and at the physical fitness main facility across from the Ozona High School Band Building. Public access to the equipment will be available at the main facility as soon as inservice regarding how to use the equipment has been completed.

During the short, two-hour meeting, the trustees also approved a one-year extension of a contribution schedule from Cielo Windpower, and they also approved going out for bids for the replacement of several air conditioning and heating units at Ozona Primary School. The board also considered the viability of school crossing guards at school walkways across Ave. E at Ozona High School, but no action was taken on this agenda item.

The meeting was adjourned following an affirmative vote to set the date and time for the board's regular December meeting on Dec. 15 at 6:30 p.m.

Members approved a proposal to offer a Section 457 Financial Plan for district employees. A 457 plan is a deferred compensation plan similar to 401 (k) or 401(b) plans and allows participants to contribute pretax income and pay no tax on their contributions until they withdraw money from the plan. Participants choose the way their contributions are allocated, and members have to start making minimum withdrawals when they turn 70 1/2.

The meeting was adjourned following an affirmative vote to set the date and time for the board's regular December meeting on Dec. 15 at 6:30 p.m.

## Lipsett new Ozona postmaster

Dale Lipsett started his duties as postmaster of Ozona office last week. Mr. Lipsett began work with the U. S. Postal Service in 1985 as a clerk in the San Angelo Post Office. He spent 10 plus years there, moving up to a supervisor position before becoming postmaster in Sonora.

For the past five and one-half years, Mr. Lipsett has been postmaster at Snyder, working there during the week and coming home to wife Linda in Eldorado on the weekends.

Mr. Lipsett is originally from Minersville, PA, but "I got here as quick as I could," he said. Texas became part of his life in 1958 when he came to San Antonio for basic training with the U. S. Air

Force. After his military service, Mr. Lipsett worked in agriculture before joining the postal service.

He is active in the Agape Assembly of God Church in Eldorado where he teaches Sunday School and sometimes preaches.

He and Linda are raising their granddaughter, Alexia Jade, who is three.

"We will provide the same good service you've come to expect," he said of the U. S. Postal Service in Ozona. Mr. Lipsett explained that there have been numerous changes in the postal service relating to security and identity theft since 9-11. "We deliver professionally and securely and our customers have a right to expect that."

## Lions finish season 8-4

The Ozona Lions played their last game this season in a 21-20 loss to the Coahoma Bulldogs. Earlier in the season, the Lions lost to the Bulldogs by one, and when the two teams met in Midland, the Lions were ready. A few mistakes and bad decisions, however, left the Lions one behind as time ran out.



Two plays into the game, Coahoma scored on a 4-yard pass. Brian Skehan blocked the PAT to keep the score 0-6. The Lions got the ball on the 20, but couldn't get anywhere with it and were forced to punt.

The Bulldogs took the ball on the 30, then Jarryd Taylor forced a fumble that was picked up by Kris Gray for 15 yards in Ozona's favor. Again, the Lions had a hard time getting past the Bulldogs' defense and were forced to punt. Romeo Perez punked the Bulldog who returned the kick on the 35 yard line. The Lions then forced the Bulldogs to punt, and it was out of the end zone so the Lions got the ball on the 20.

Good running by Taylor and Brad Mayfield helped the Lions score their first touchdown on a 45 yard run by Taylor. Toby Pagan's PAT kick was good, and the Lions were up 7-6 with 11:23 left in the second quarter. Ozona

scored again on the next possession, this time on a 10 yard run by Jarryd Taylor. Toby was good again, and the score was 14-6.

The Bulldogs got the ball on the 30, and Trey Collis broke up the quarterback's pass. The Bulldogs drove hard, scored on a 6-yard run, and ran in the 2-point conversion to tie the ballgame.

All night Brian Skehan and Brad Mayfield sacked the quarterback and forced Coahoma to punt yet again. The Bulldogs began plowing toward the touchdown, and even after Clay Hale broke up the quarterback's pass, the Bulldogs were able to score. The PAT

**Crockett County History**  
 "This is the way it was"  
 By Oscar Kost



**Crockett County discovers oil in 1925**  
 W. T. Patrick leased 1,400 acres in 1916 and a well was drilled to 500 feet.. Dry Hole.  
 The same year, Ozela Oil Co. leased 400,000 acres in Crockett and adjoining counties, including the Hudspeth, Friend, Will Noelke, Couch, Massie, Pierce and Cannon ranches. The lease was to receive 10 cents annual rental.  
 In 1925 the first oil discovery in Crockett County was made on the L. P. Powell Ranch 25 miles north of Ozona producing 25 barrels a day. The well by World Oil Company Humble of Maryland immediately purchased for \$1,400,000.00 cash \$350,000.00.  
 The second pool of consequence was discovered in 1938 by Choate and Hogan of Midland on University land in northwest Crockett County. Gilcrease Oil Co. bought the well for \$106,000.00. It made 104 barrels a day.  
 On the J. S. Todd Ranch, Continental Oil Co. in 1940 developed high production of high gravity oil. Other wells were drilled. The first well pumped 840 barrels in 12 1/2 hours. It was drilled to 5,091 feet.  
 Continental found a light pay in Todd at 1,540 feet in 1933.  
 A wildcat on the W. T. Noelke Ranch in extreme western Crockett County blew in. The oil from Todd Field was trucked 18 miles to a pipeline.  
 The oil discovery in 1925 was a turning point in Crockett history. Gas was discovered south of Ozona. The oil companies began installing pipe lines to carry the oil and gas from the wells to their plants.  
 From the Noelke wells in western Crockett County they moved to the Arthur Hoover Live Oak Ranch and other ranches.  
 The Shannon Ranch began producing oil. The production of oil in the county 7,283,418 barrels in 1941 to 151,182,000 in 1961.  
 In 1967 in southern Crockett County, gas was discovered in large quantities. Gas was discovered in the southeast part of the county in 1962 with the discovery of gas and distillate in the #1A Friend from the Ellenburger formation.  
 In 1961 south of Ozona gas was discovered on the Early Baggett Ranch. It was later designated the Hunt-Baggett Field.  
 In 1965 Shell built a plant north of Ozona where gas was being produced in large amounts.  
 Some of the larger oil fields are Tippet, Midway Lane, Olson, World, Shannon, San Andres and Crossett. The large gas fields include Brown-Baggett-Ellenburger, Davidson Ranch 7890, Hunt-Baggett-Strawn, J. M.-Ellenburger (said to be one of the largest in the world), Miller-Ellenburger, Ozona-Canyon Sand, Adams-Baggett-Canyon and the Tippet West.  
 These stories complete to 1991. In later years, there were several plants constructed and new wells drilled each year.

One day last week, after a Boy Scout meeting in the Caverns of Sonora, my wife met me at the door with a story that our cat came into the house, followed by a wild cat off the hill. The wild cat jumped headfirst over the top of the water heater and got stuck in the space where the water heater is pressed into the corner of the wall beside the washing machine. There was no way that cat could crawl back up again.  
 I drained the hot water heater, disconnected it from the gas line and water line, lifted it out of the way, threw a blanket over a cat that by now was wild enough to claw its way through that blanket, and got it outside, where it ran back up the hill.  
 The next day, the water heating plumbing went back all right, but the pilot light wouldn't light. A nice man from the gas company came over and got it going. I told him the story of the night before, and his response was, "Oh, yes", like that sort of thing happens every day.  
 Talking to folks, it turns out that that sort of thing DOES happen all the time in Ozona. Every body had one critter story after the other that topped that one - A neighbor was trying to shoot squirrels in his attic by holding a flashlight in his mouth and a gun in one hand. He fell through the ceiling, almost landing on his wife. There were other stories of a puppy stuck in a refrigerator coil, a deer stuck in a back seat of a car, and a fired-up pig going nuts in a show ring - but those are other stories of life in Ozona.

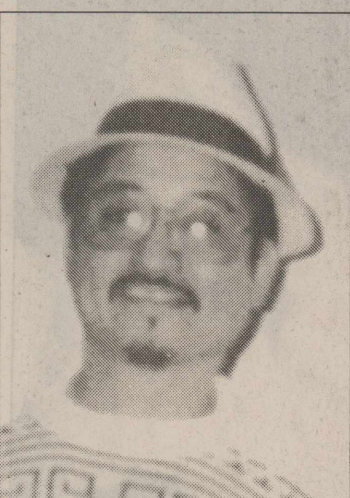

**The Christian and the Devil**

The occult is belief in mystic arts such as magic and astrology. The occult is all around us. Efforts are made to display the occult as innocent and friendly. Our children are encouraged to follow the lives of mystical characters that perform magic and cast spells. Astrology is a big business. Our daily newspapers always carry the horoscopes. Now perhaps following your horoscope and children pretending they are wizards seem innocent enough. But they are only a step away from deeper involvement in the occult. More than one person has attempted to communicate with the dead. Bereaved parents and lonely widows are particularly vulnerable to such practices. But the Bible warns against these things. "There shall not be found among you anyone who makes his son or his daughter pass through the fire, one who used divination, one who practices witchcraft, or one who interprets omens, or a sorcerer, or one who casts a spell, or a medium or a spiritist, or one who calls up the dead" (Deuteronomy 18:10-11). Why was God so emphatic? There is only one reason. The practices of the occult are a deception of God's enemy, the devil. The apostle Paul was very forthright with a magician who opposed him, "You who are full of all deceit and fraud, you son of the devil" (Acts 13:10). Don't follow the devil. It may seem like a game right now. But the followers of the devil will be excluded from God's heaven. That's just what the devil wants. He wants you. Turn to God through Jesus Christ. Christ came into the world "that He might destroy the works of the devil" (1 John 3:8).

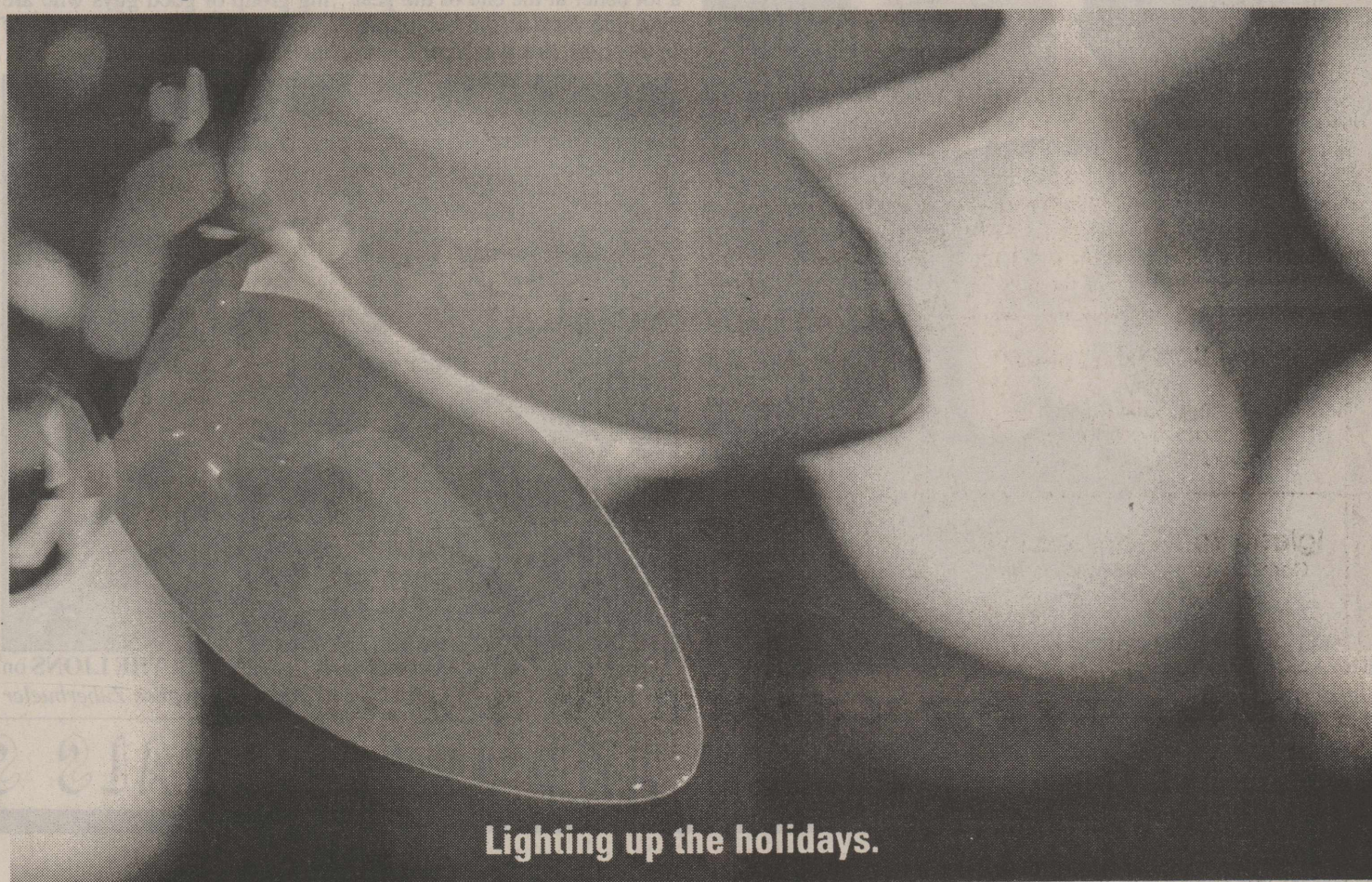

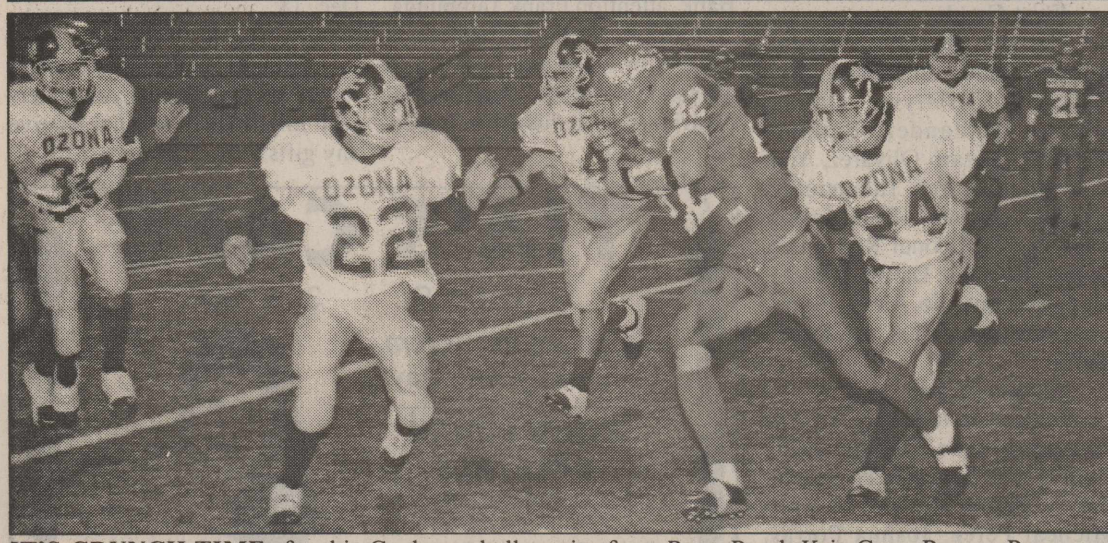

The Lions then got the ball back on the 31-yard line, and after a pass from Clay Hale to Trey Collis, ran it in for a touchdown.

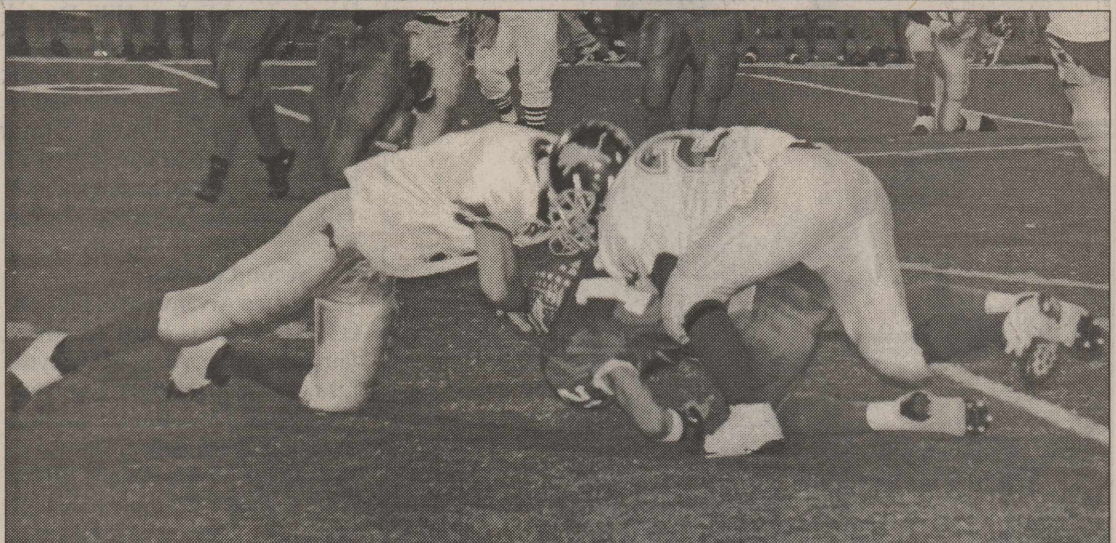

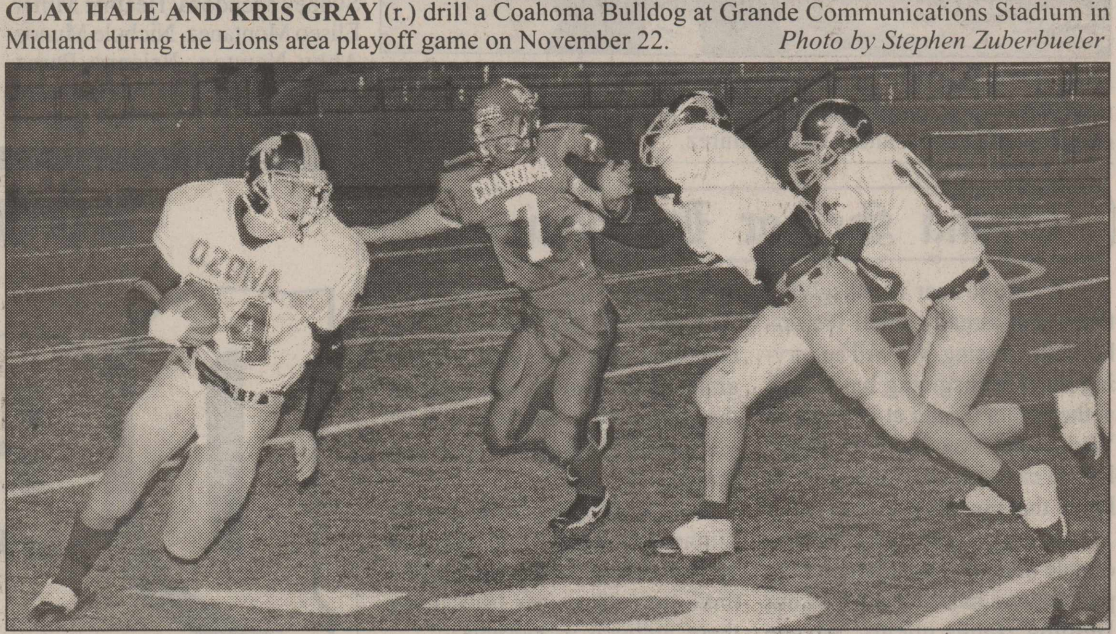

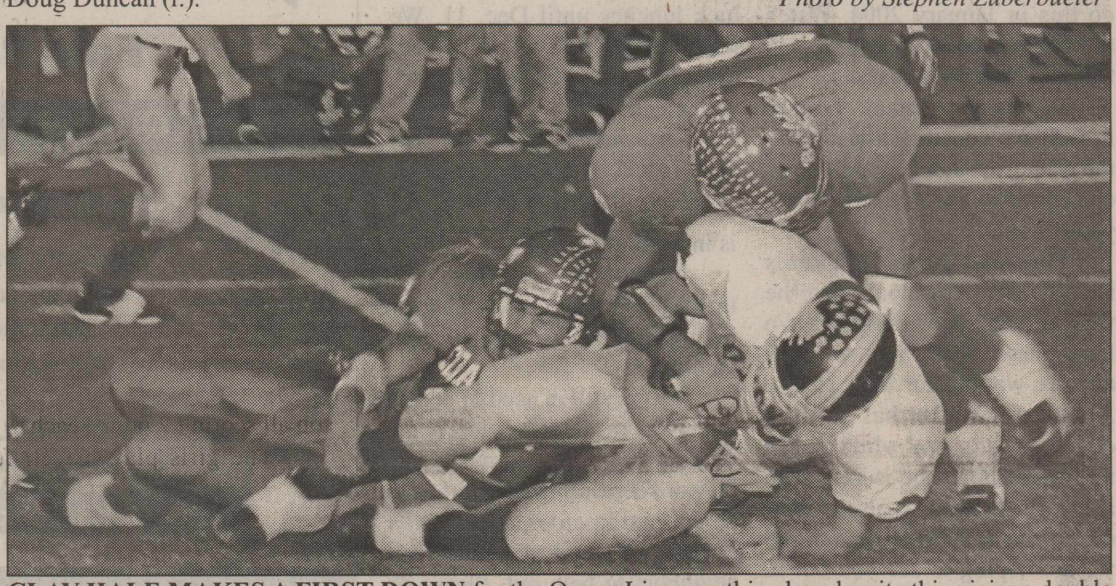

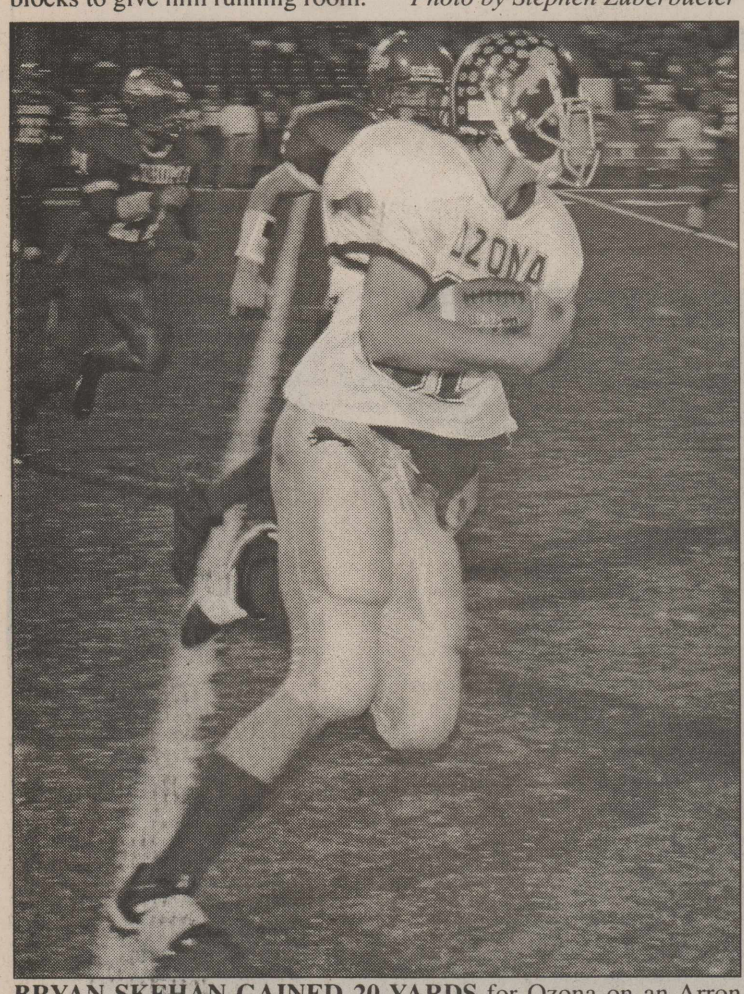

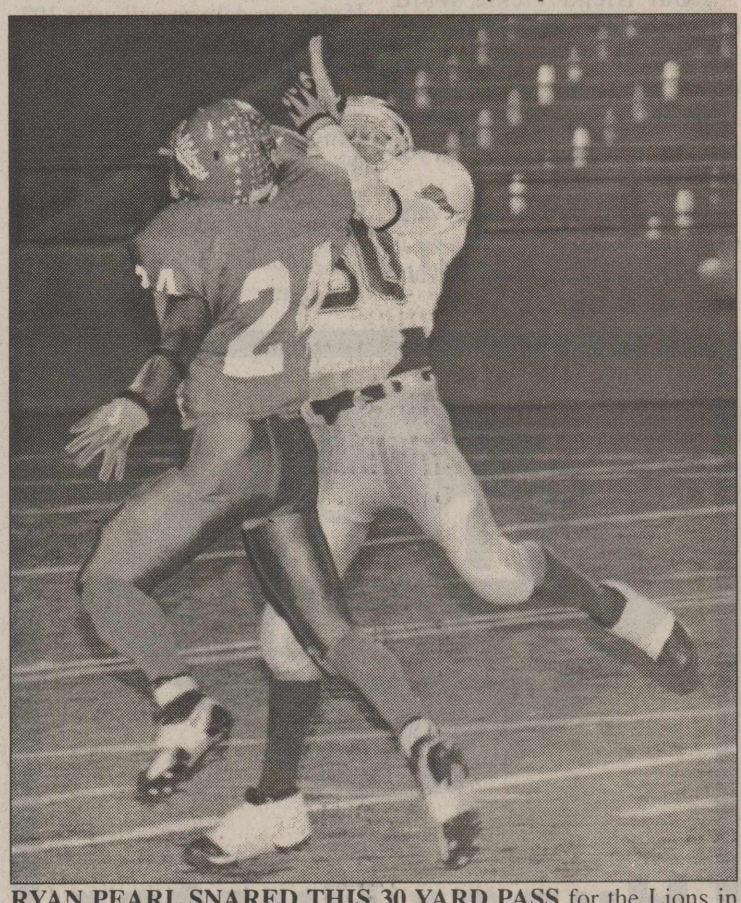

The 8th grade team lost 17-34.

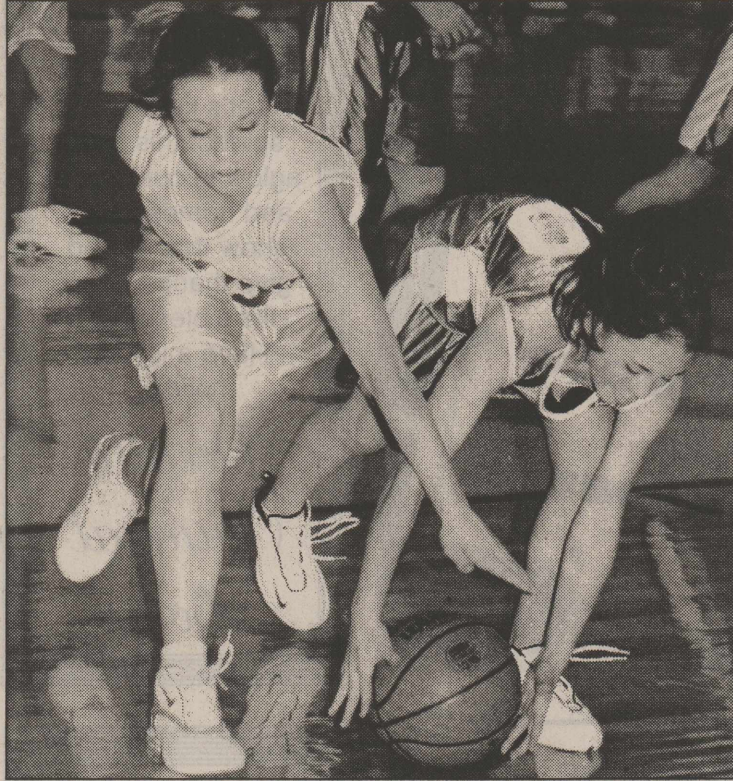

Austin Suddreth was third in listening skills.

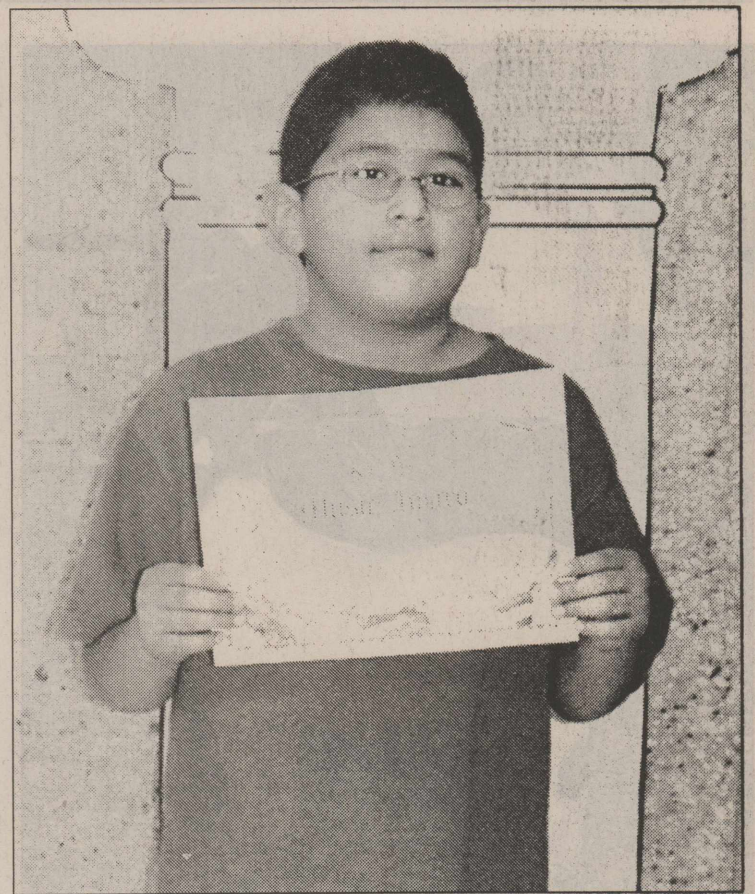
