

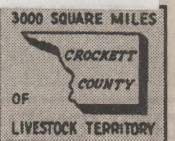

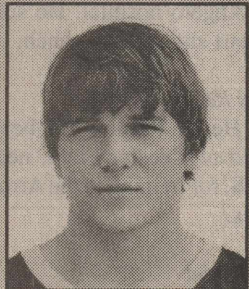
Named to the all district second team were: Arron Garza, quarterback; Vince Castro, running back; Ryan Pearl, wide receiver; Clay

Hale, safety and Kris Gray, corner back.

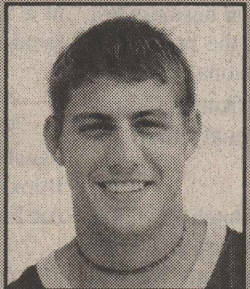

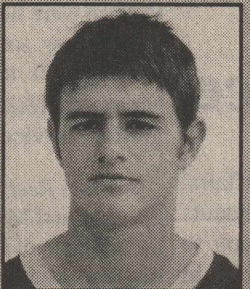

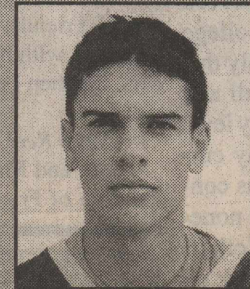

English announces bid for District Attorney

First Assistant District Attorney, Laurie English, announces her candidacy for District Attorney of the 112th Judicial District. English graduated Fort Stockton High School in 1981 and attained a Bachelor of Arts degree from Angelo State University in 1997 with a double major in English and Government. She graduated Texas Tech School of Law in 1999. Prior to law school, English worked as a legal secretary from 1992 through 1997. During law school and while awaiting her bar examination results, English worked as a litigation law clerk for the Lubbock City Attorney's Office.

English returned to Ozona in 2000 and opened her civil law office. She is a member of the State Bar of Texas, College of the State Bar, and the Texas District and County Attorneys Association.

English began prosecuting for the 112th District Attorney's Office in January 2001 and is responsible for three of the District's five counties. English actively participated in the preparation and litigation of eight jury trials, including first degree felony offenses of murder, aggravated sexual assault of a child, and possession of controlled substance with intent to deliver, as well as felony offenses of intoxication manslaughter, credit card abuse, and forgery. English also assisted in writing the State's response brief to Melvin White's capital murder writ of habeas

corpus.

English researched and authored four appellate response briefs and presented oral arguments in two cases before the 8th Court of Appeals (El Paso). English routinely works with law enforcement to prepare and present cases for grand jury consideration. English is the driving force in prosecuting the numerous felony cases in Crockett, Reagan and Sutton counties.

"The District Attorney's Office is an integral part of the justice system," says English. "The duty of the District Attorney is to do justice and not just to convict the accused. Justice demands that every case is evaluated on its own merits and that the District Attorney proceed accordingly."

"Wrongdoers must be held

accountable for their crimes and to the victims they create," continues English. "I am committed to accessibility and accountability in my role as a prosecutor. I intend to continue working closely with our outstanding law enforcement officers and the citizens of this District to increase accessibility and accountability if elected District Attorney."

A fourth generation Texan, English lived in McCamey as a young child and in Fort Stockton from 1968 through 1981. English has lived in Ozona since 1989. She is the daughter of Larry and Nancy Lay. English and her husband, Lyndon, have been married for 21 years and have two sons. Layne is completing his senior year at Ozona High School. Logan, a 2003 honor graduate of Ozona High School, is entering the Air Force in 2004.

English and her family are actively involved in the Ozona First Baptist Church, where she serves on the Personnel Committee. She is a member of the Ozona Women's League and the Baccalaureate Band. English also serves on the Crockett County Library Board and the Crockett National Bank Development Board.

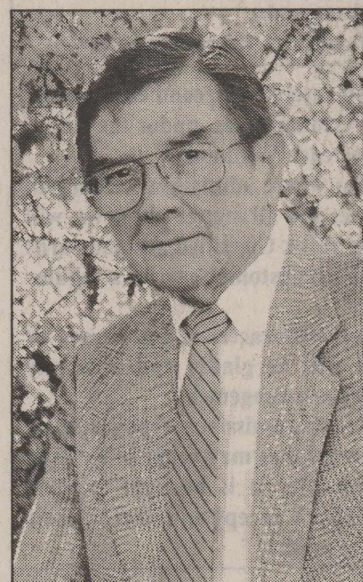
Bill Mason announces for re-election

Bill Mason announces his candidacy for a third term as County Attorney of Crockett County.

Mason graduated from the University of Texas School of Law in 1962 and upon graduation, worked as a land title examiner for the Veteran's Land Board of the General Land Office in Austin.

He and his family later moved to Richardson, Texas where he worked for Collins Radio Company. Upon leaving Collins, he was appointed as an Assistant District Attorney for Dallas County, becoming Chief Prosecutor in the Court to which he was assigned, later transferring into the Appellate Section where he wrote briefs and argued before the Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin.

While in Richardson he and his wife, Mary Jo, served in various community volunteer posi-

The Historical Society and Museum

The Crockett County Historical Society, with Houston Smith acting chairman, was organized April 21, 1939. The first nominating committee was composed of C. C. Montgomery, W. R. Baggett and Mrs. A. C. Hoover. Houston Smith was president, C. S. Denham vice president, Wanda Watson secretary-treasurer, with additional members Evart White, A. C. Hoover, Joe Davidson and Mrs. B. B. Ingham. In 1954 the society appointed a museum committee. The beginning of the museum must be credited to C. S. Denham, superintendent of schools. He let the museum have a room on the third floor of the high school. The museum committee, headed by Mrs. Lee Childress, wanted a more suitable place. Commissioners court agreed to let

the museum use the ground floor of the courthouse annex. On July 15, a group of men moved the museum from the high school to the ground floor of the courthouse annex.

After the county got a new courthouse annex they gave the old building to the museum, which has grown to fill the two upper floors with a large collection of antiques. Some of the rooms duplicate the early days of the frontier in Crockett County.

You would have to go see the present museum in order to get a full picture of what the ladies and men have done in years past. Mrs. Pleas Childress and the late Mrs. Alvin Harrell are some of the persons who contributed a lot of time to the present museum.

Tribute to Dorothy Price

Dorothy Price, former co-director of Ozona Community Center until 1973, died in Sweetwater, TN, on Monday, Nov. 24, 2003. Many in Ozona, especially those associated with the Ozona Community Center, were saddened over this news as Dorothy and her co-worker, the late Ms. Ethel Wolfe, worked in Ozona for over 15 years, finally retiring to Sweetwater in 1973. Under the leadership of Dorothy Price and Ethel Wolfe were two large pre-school groups, including Boy and Girl Scout activities, 4-H and Home Demonstration programs and supervision of study halls.

Far beyond these activities there were numerous classes in music and especially piano instruction, cooking and individual tutoring. The doors of Ozona Community Center were open to any and all who wanted to use its activities. Dorothy Price, being a skilled musician, taught many generations of students from through Ozona to love music and become capable performers. Children from kindergarten and beyond, together with adults, were nurtured, tutored and helped in the studies at all levels.

I first met Dorothy following her arrival in Ozona in the mid-fifties. Her boundless energy, starting from early morning until late at night, made a lasting impact to huge numbers of children and their parents. She took a group of Scouts camping year after year to Scout camps such as Sol Meyer and Camp Fawcett, seeing to it that all earned merit badges and advanced. She just recently received a service award for having been with the Scouting program for 60 years, itself a rarity among adults.

Dorothy's constant interest in and commitment to pupils needing help, some long after they had graduated from Ozona Schools, was in itself an inspiration. In addition, her organizing ability was used beneficially so often.

When Dorothy and Ethel retired and returned to Sweetwater, few people at many of the farewell parties in Ozona were certain that Dorothy would slow down and lead the life of a retiree. After all, they reasoned, Dorothy would certainly be more than occupied taking care of her aged parents. In point of fact, hardly had they arrived in Sweetwater, than Dorothy's father died, but her mother lived for many years. However, Ethel was diagnosed with terminal cancer and very shortly afterward succumbed.

During all these events, Dorothy only increased her involve-

ment in church and civic affairs. Her involvement with the Scouts also increased, sending many to national jamborees. She once told me during one of my visits "we do not live in an armchair generation."

She also became involved with the launching of a college near Sweetwater. It was only this past February when she fell and broke her leg that her activity level was of necessity in anyway curtailed. At that point she was confined to a wheelchair, but nonetheless still had pupils and others coming by her house to work on school work, Scout work, or learn about cooking and sewing.

Dorothy was well known for her constant and very consistent Christian witness. Her religious faith was a real and vital one. Many times her admirers would discuss with her some problem. Her solution was, after prayer, to advise taking a strong dose of warm milk and sleeping on the situation, convinced that the problem either would disappear or at least lessen. Her Biblical basis for this stance was found in Job 10:10 where tells the Lord "Did you not pour me out like milk and curdle me like cheese...but you gave me life itself and showed me kindness." Dorothy knew that she had to suffer many things in life, including the use of a crutch necessitated by her bout with polio, but like Job she could and would nonetheless cope with and surmount these problems.

Whenever Dorothy came into any room in any setting and in any place, her presence was an electrifying one. She never asked for respect but rather earned it. She was a servant and friend to all who ever knew her. The world is a better place for having had her in our midst, but at the same time it is a sadder place that she no longer is with us on this earth. She was close to her baby sister, Velma, who has had more than her share of medical problems. They both rightfully grieved over the loss of their brother earlier this year. But one can be sure that Dorothy in her heavenly throne is still directing and advising all of those whom she loved and served so effectively during her time amongst us.

Between You and God

By Dr. Dennis J. Prutow

You don't like your dirty linen hung out for everyone to see, do you? I don't either. To put it another way, we all have skeletons in our closets we'd prefer others knew nothing about. Interestingly enough, God looks at our sin in a similar fashion. He is not interested in humiliating us before our contemporaries. For example, when Judas Iscariot was plotting to betray Jesus, he sat at the table with Jesus. The other disciples were astonished when Jesus exclaimed, "The hand of the one betraying Me is with Me on the table" (Luke 22:21). "They began to discuss among themselves which one of them it might be who was going to do this thing" (Luke 22:23). Jesus did not expose Judas before his contemporaries. The sin of Judas in seeking the murder of Jesus was a sin kept between Judas and Jesus. Jesus, it seems, wanted that sin dealt with on this intimate level. This is an important lesson for you and me! You see, your rebellion against God is first of all sin against God. When David had committed adultery, that adultery was not so much a sin against Bathsheba's husband as it was hostility toward God. David told God, "Against Thee, Thee only have I sinned" (Psalm 51:4). Now can you say that you have never had feelings of guilt? Dirty linen, old skeletons and feelings of guilt indicate sin against God. Your sin is a matter between you and God. Like David, you need to go to God and seek His forgiveness. The Bible says, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). Let me tell you, forgiveness for sin, cleansing from guilt, is simply wonderful!

Newlyweds promote Old Spanish Trail

SANTA FE, NM - John Murphey, architectural historian for New Mexico's Historic Preservation Office, and his wife, Kristine, will travel the Old Spanish Trail (OST) from St. Augustine, FL, to San Diego, CA, in an attempt to raise interest in the historic highway. The couple will be conducting research on the 1929 mainline route of the OST, following old highways 1, 90, 290 and 80 through the stages of Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California. They documented the route during October and part of November.

Launched in Mobile, AL, in 1915, by the Old Spanish Trail Association, the highway was named for the many picturesque Spanish settlements and fortress-missions along its route, though it never followed a historic Spanish-era trail. Begun with great enthusiasm, progress on the highway was stalled due to the expense of building bridges across the many waterways along the Gulf of Mexico, and the unwillingness of states and local governments to pay for its construction. In 1919 the OST Association moved its headquarters to the Gunter Hotel in San Antonio. After several years of near inactivity, the highway got its

big boost in 1922, when US 90 was declared a strategic military route, allowing access to millions of Federal dollars for highway construction. When officially opened in 1929, the OST was the most expensive and highly engineered of the transcontinental highways, costing some \$80,000,000.00 to build. The lure of the OST continued to captivate travelers until the early 1960s, when new interstates directed traffic off the old highways.

Starting in St. Augustine on Oct. 14, the Murpheys reached San Antonio on Oct. 28 and embarked on the western portion of

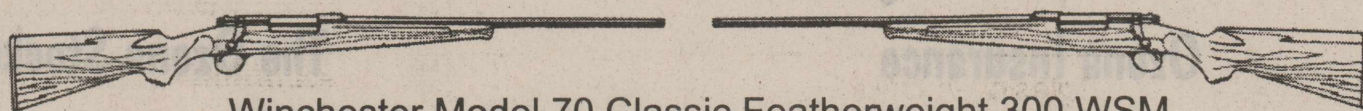

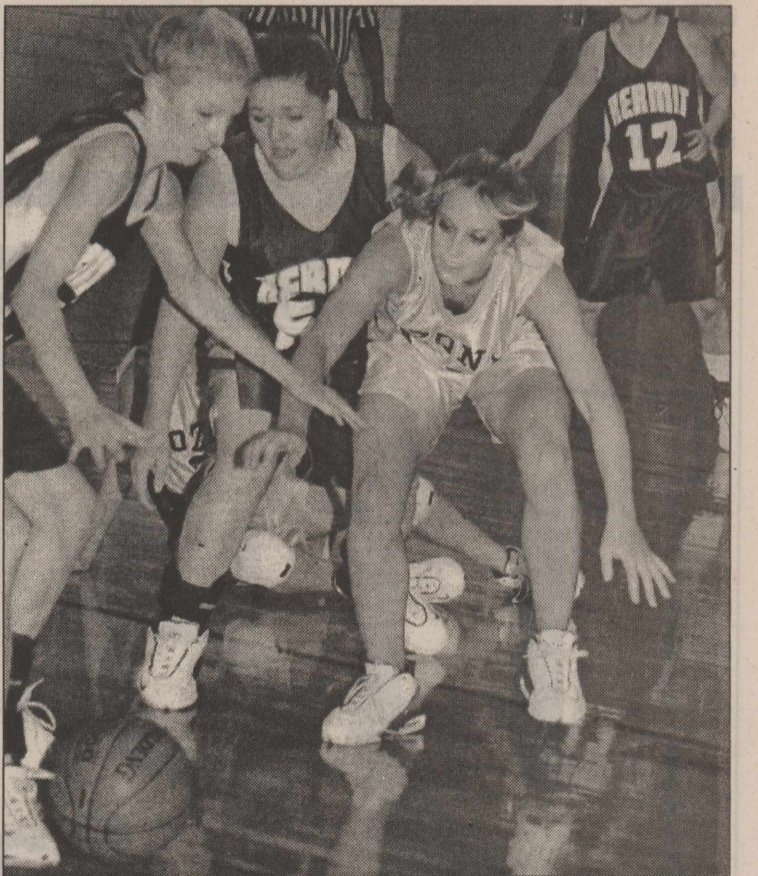

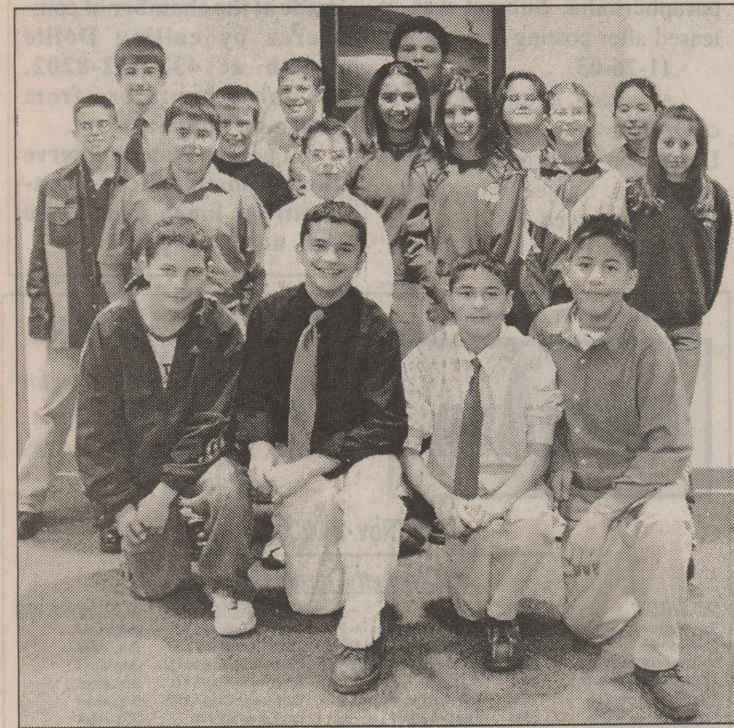
