

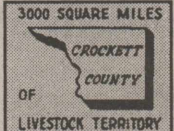

## DeerFest draws big crowd

The 16th Annual Crockett County DeerFest was held on Saturday, Dec. 6, at the Fair Park Convention Center, and by all accounts was another successful event. A total of 1,100 people were served a great dinner in just under one hour.

Attendance at the drawing is estimated at 1,400 people; about 1,500 people attended last year's event. Ticket sales for the 2003 DeerFest came in at 50,835; in comparison, tickets sold for 2002 were 52,381 and 2001 at 58,762.

Many local organizations took on different responsibilities

this year to help make the event successful. They included: The Knights of Columbus, Ozona Chamber of Commerce, Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Project Graduation, Beta Sigma Phi Sororities, Ozona Community Center and the Ozona Future Farmers of America. A donation will be made to each of these organizations for their hard work, and in turn, these organizations will use the money for their services back to the community. Hopefully, this will spread help to more people in our community.

Since its beginning, DeerFest has returned \$750,000.00 to the community.

The DeerFest Association would also like to thank all the people who come every year to cook and serve the food, all our

donors and ticket buyers. Thanks for making the DeerFest what it is and supporting your community.

## Roads and water big topics for commissioners

Commissioners wrestled with the classifications of county roads when they met Monday. A new statute in the Texas Transportation Code outlines steps entities take to establish their claims to roads. Although no action was taken on the subject, commissioners agreed that 60-foot right-of-way should be established, whether this width is ever used or not. Road classification will be on the January agenda.

The court approved a resolution supporting Emerald Underground Water District and other such districts across the state in

their efforts and abilities to regulate groundwater.

The resolution was prompted after EUWD manager Dennis Clark attended a meeting in Alpine. Some 500 people were at the hearing regarding a plan by Midland-based Rio Nuevo Ltd., to mine water for sale elsewhere.

Land Office Commissioner Jerry Patterson, who conducted the hearing, soon learned that those in attendance were against the proposed lease agreement for water development on state lands.

The proposal, if approved,

would allow Rio Nuevo to search for water in the Trans-Pecos region of Texas. Lease payments to the state for this water would be designated for the Permanent School Fund.

Commissioners approved the preliminary plat for the Dog Canyon Ranch Subdivision. The subdivision includes 5,051 acres in Crockett County (27 tracts) and 1,400 acres in Val Verde. Owner/developer is Richard Holcomb. Dog Canyon Ranch is known as the old Blakney Ranch and was purchased by Holcomb from Mark White.

During regular monthly reports Benny Gibbs, care center administrator, told the court the annual state inspection took place at the center last week. "The whole nursing staff did real well," he said. "I'm real proud of them."

There were 50 residents in the center at the time of his report.

A request for a tax refund due to an error on the length of a Petro Source pipeline was approved.

Court members approved the appointment of Frank Tambunga and Johnny Jones to the appraisal board, okayed extension of a

rental agreement with West Texas Rehab and the renewal of the drug/alcohol testing contract with Rehab.

Regular court meeting dates were set for the second Monday of each month for 2004 and county holidays will be Jan. 1, April 9, May 31, July 5, Sept. 6, Nov. 11, Nov. 25-26 and Dec. 24 and 27.

## Branch announces for commissioner

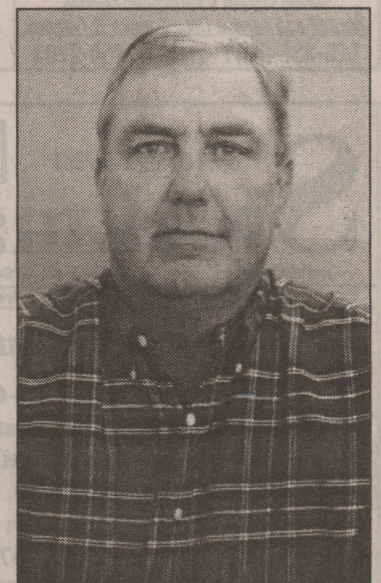
Randy Branch announces his candidacy for Crockett County Commissioner, Precinct 3.

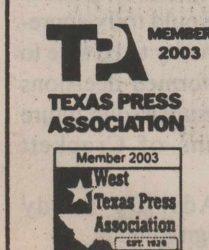

## Crockett County History

"This is the way it was"  
 By Oscar Kost



The following information comes from "Ozona Country" by Allan R. Bosworth as it is printed in the "History of Crockett County".

### This Rugged Land

The Hills and Valleys of Crockett County

"The land shaped itself, down the bare-boned ages, out of the enduring Edwards limestone. Once it had all been an inland sea, but like everything else in West Texas, this ran dry, leaving all manner of shelled and crawling creatures prisoned forever in the hardening rocks. Slow-sculpturing winds and rains of a million years carved deep valleys and draws, and left rimrocks and flat mesas standing at the same level while the earth alternately blew away and washed away at their feet. Finally, there was vegetation to hold the soil, but in West Texas there has never been very much of either.

It was a high land, lifting open and wide and free: a country of cedar-dotted hills, and ten-mile divides as level and green as billiard tables, breaking unaccountably into wild and rugged canyons. Between the hills were flats where in good years the grass was lush, and white-rock draws always winding southward to seek the Rio Grande.

The Creator was in a mood both expansive and capricious. He decreed room here on a magnificent scale, with horizons running into tomorrow and skies unfathomably deep and blue. He fashioned a country of infinite distances, lovely to look at in season. But then He gave it more of weather than climate, and whether in divine wisdom or a moment of whimsy, He failed to provide dependable rain.

Ozona country is a land of

thirst. When rain comes, it sometimes comes with an incredible violence, and flash floods have helped shape the topography: gentle here, abruptly broken there. But the long periods of thirst, more than anything else, fashioned the landscape, the economy, the growth, and even the physical forms of plants and animal life. Many creatures - including early man and some men not so early - were unable to endure thirst. They either moved on, or perished.

The country was part of a high plateau, with altitudes ranging from 1,500 to 2,500 feet above sea level. It was a dry and healthful place, free of fevers. It was drained by the Pecos River - a salty stream both in its chemical content and in its wealth of Billy-the-Kid type of cowboy legend. The Pecos, rising in the far mountains of northern New Mexico, comes down to mark the western boundary of Crockett County, sixth biggest county in the State of Texas. Along its lower reaches, as it approaches the Rio Grande, the Pecos has carved a wide canyon of fantastic colors and designs which is remarkably like portions of Canyon de Chelly, in Arizona. Archaeologists say that the Canyon de Chelly was a refuge for the Ancient Ones - as late as A.D. 350. These were Basketmakers, supposedly the ancestors of the highly civilized Pueblo tribes.

*This then, is our country seen through the eyes and heart of one who also loved Ozona, Crockett County, Texas.*

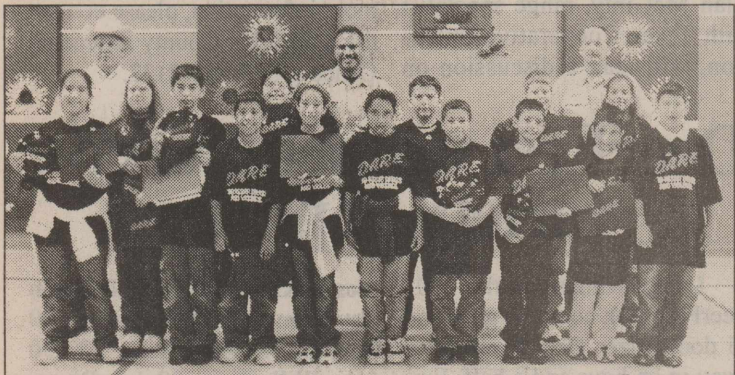

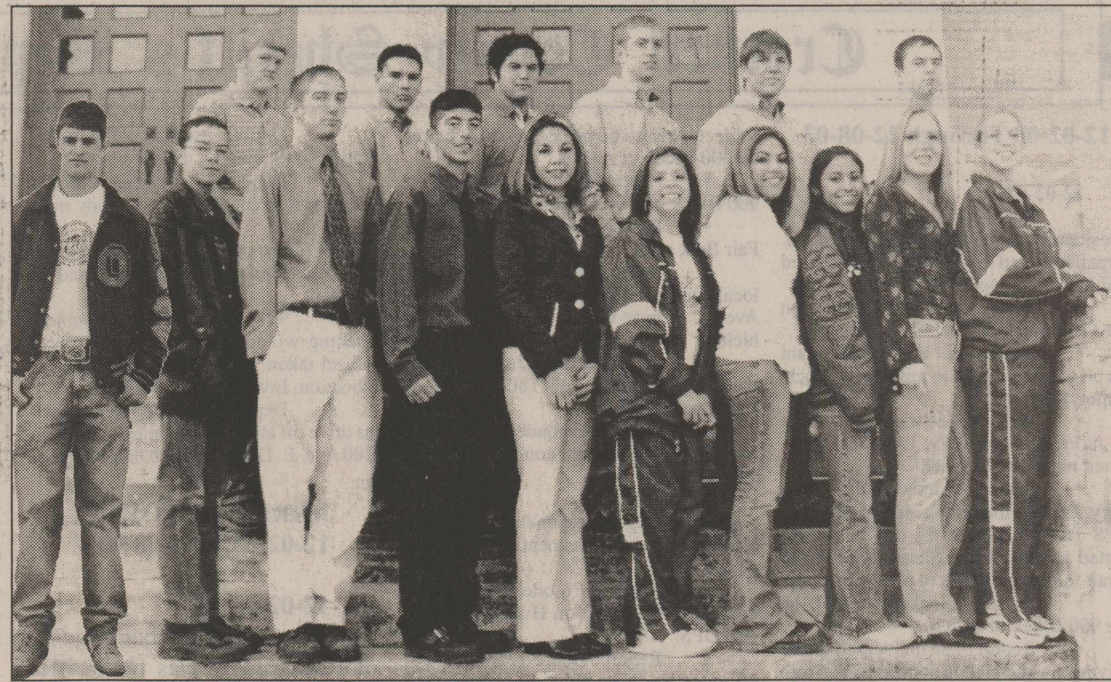
The Ozona Lions 7th grade "B" team put up a good fight against the Grape Creek Eagles, but couldn't quite get any buckets in their 10-0 loss.

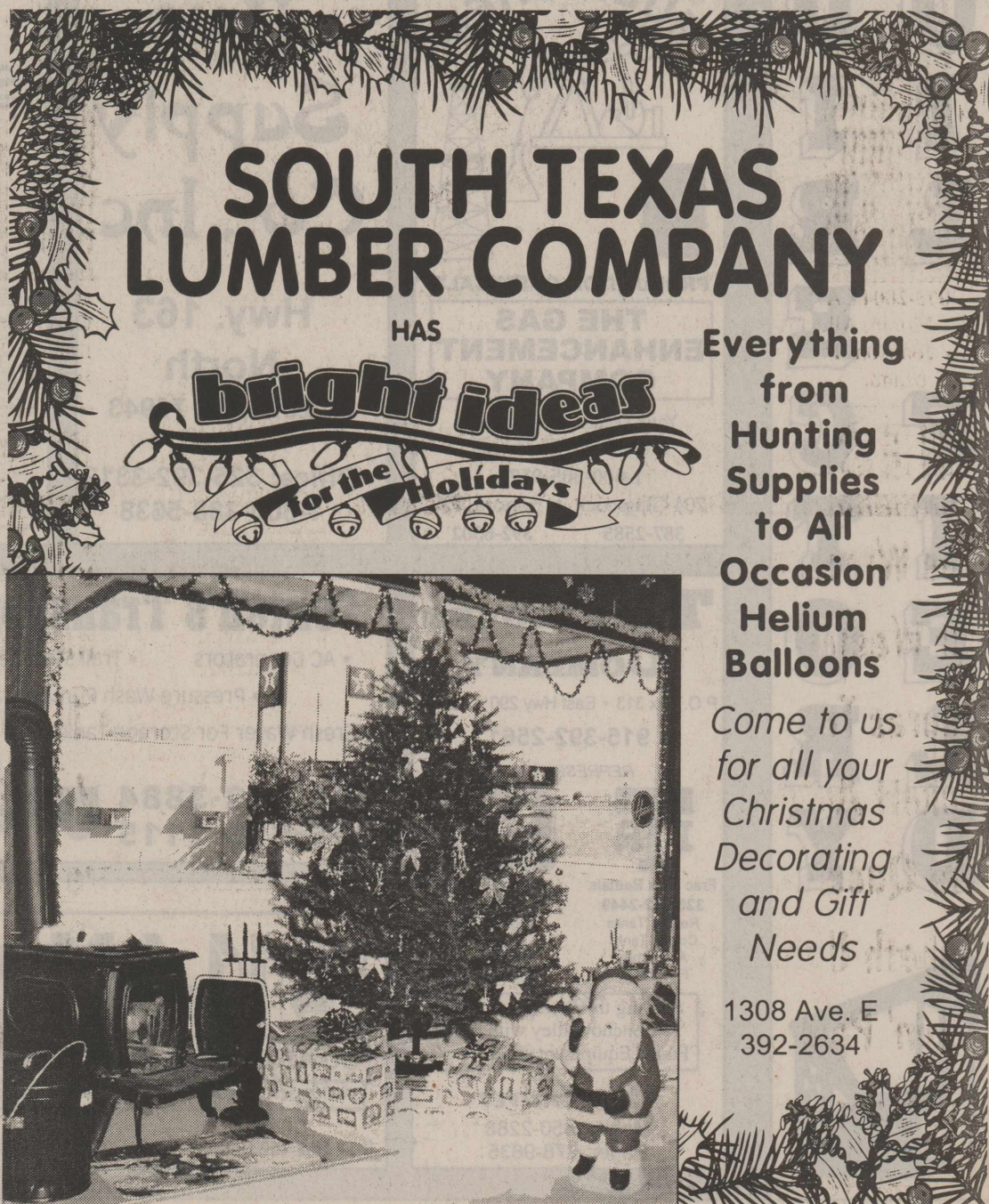

## CEUs offered for pesticide applicators

As part of the requirements for holding a pesticide applicators' license, individuals are required to obtain 15 hours of continuing education units every five years. Within the next couple of weeks, applicators will have several opportunities to obtain some of these CEUs. The minimum requirements are two hours of laws and regulations, two hours of integrated pest management and the remainder of the 15 may be in any category.

On Dec. 16, there will be a six CEU course in Eldorado at the Memorial Building beginning at 8:30 a.m. with registration. The program starts at 9:00 a.m. with a discussion of pesticide laws and regulations presented by Cain Cline with the Texas Department of Agriculture. At 10:00 a.m., Dr. Alan McGinty, range specialist with Texas Cooperative Extension, will lead a discussion on

range brush control strategies, and at 11:00 a.m., Dr. Chris, Extension entomologist, will give a presentation on fire ants and Africanized honey bee management.

Following a lunch break, Dr. Billy Warrick, Extension agronomist, will give a presentation on "Coverage vs. Drift: Environmental Factors Impacting Herbicide Performance." Next, Dr. Sansone will give a presentation on insect identification around the home, and he will be followed by Dr. Billy Warrick who will discuss winter weed identification and control. The final presentation will be made by Scott Edmonson, Schleicher County Extension Agent, who will discuss tools for more efficient applications.

There will be a \$10.00 charge to cover the cost of the meal. For more information, please contact with the Schleicher County Extension Office at 325-853-2132.
