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

"This is the way it was"

This Rugged Land

The Hills and Valleys of Crockett County

"The land shaped itself, down the bare-boned ages, out of the enduring Edwards limestone. Once it had all been an inland sea, but like everything else in West Texas, this ran dry, leaving all manner of shelled and crawling creatures prisoned forever in the hardening rocks. Slow-sculpturing winds and rains of a million years carved deep valleys and draws, and left rimrocks and flat mesas standing at the same level while the earth alternately blew away and washed away at their feet. Finally, there was vegetation to hold the soil, but in West Texas there has never been very much

It was a high land, lifting open and wide and free: a country of cedar-dotted hills, and tenmile divides as level and green as billiard tables, breaking unaccountably into wild and rugged canyons. Between the hills were flats where in good years the grass was lush, and white-rock draws always winding southward to seek the Rio Grande.

The Creator was in a mood both expansive and capricious. He decreed room here on a magnificent scale, with horizons running into tomorrow and skies unfathomably deep and blue. He fashioned a country of infinite distances, lovely to look at in season. But then He gave it more of weather than climate, and whether in divine wisdom or a moment of whimsy, He failed to provide dependable rain.

times comes with an incredible violence, and flash floods have helped shape the topography: gentle here, abruptly broken there. But the long periods of thirst, ioned the landscape, the economy, the growth, and even the physical forms of plants and animal life. Many creatures - including early man and some men not so early were unable to endure thirst. They either moved on, or perished.

The country was part of a high plateau, with altitudes ranging from 1,500 to 2,500 feet above sea level. It was a dry and healthful place, free of fevers. It was drained by the Pecos River - a the-Kid type of cowboy legend. last week. The Pecos, rising in the far mountains of northern New Mexico, comes down to mark the western as it approaches the Rio Grande, the Pecos has carved a wide canyon of fantastic colors and designs which is remarkably like portions of Canyon de Chelly, in Arizona. Archaeologists say that the Canyon de Chelly was a refuge for the Ancient Ones - as late as A.D. 350. These were Basketmakers, supposedly the ancestors of the highly civilized Pueblo tribes.


