Filing period ends Friday

Persons planning to file for a place on the March Democratic Primary ballot have until 6:00 p.m. Jan. 2 to make their intentions known. Democratic Party chairman A. O. Fields said that candidates may file with him or with Debbi Puckett, the county and district clerk.

Those who had filed as of mid-morning Monday included incumbent county attorney Bill Mason and challenger Steve Taliaferro.

The only other race at that point was for the Precinct 3 Commissioner post with incumbent Freddie Nicks and Randy Branch filing.

Sheriff Shane Fenton and Constable Raymond Borrego have also filed for their respective posts. Roy Glenn Sutton has announced for sheriff with plans to run as an independent in the general election.

Others county officials whose terms expire but have not filed for a place on the primary ballot are Tax Assessor Collector Tommy Stokes and Pct. 1 Commissioner Frank Tambunga.

Lions selected for All State team





Lions Jarryd Taylor, Brad Mayfield and Aaron Espino were selected to represent Ozona High School on the 2003 All State Football Team.

Players are voted on by the sports departments of Associated Press member newspapers. Papers are assigned a number of votes according to their size.

"It's hard to make All State here with only one newspaper (San Angelo Standard Times) covering us," said Coach Steve Taylor. "Some of these other kids have anywhere from three to five papers covering them and voting for them. For these guys to get mentioned at all is a big deal. They all deserve that and more."

Jarryd Taylor, a 5'10", 185 lb. senior, was Honorable Mention All State Runningback. He had 213 carries for 1,379 yards and 23 touchdowns. As Honor-

able Mention All State Linebacker, he totaled 167 tackles, 79 unassisted and five quarterback sacks. He was the unanimous choice for All District Linebacker and was also selected District Offensive Most Valuable Player.

'Jarryd had a great career for the Lions, has been on the varsity all four years of high school, been in the playoffs all four years and been on the all district team all four years," said Coach Taylor. "He works and plays as hard as anybody we've ever had."

At 6' 2" and 180 pounds, senior Brad Mayfield was chosen Honorable Mention All State Defensive End. He made 90 tackles and 13 quarterback sacks. Brad was District Defensive Most Valuable Player, All District Runningback.

"Brad had a great year this year and made a lot of big



Cornyn applauds anti-spam legislation

WASHINGTON - President. George Bush has signed legislation to combat unsolicited commercial e-mail, known as spam. The Controlling the Assault of Non-Solicited Pornography and Marketing Act of 2003 (CAN-SPAM Act) establishes a framework of administrative, civil and criminal tools to help America's consumers, businesses, and families crack down on spam. The bill passed unanimously in the Senate earlier this month.

"Email is an important and effective means of communication for millions of people, but spam threatens that," said Sen. John Cornyn. "This law will help guard families and children from sexually-explicit or pornographic email, and will also protect consumers from unwanted emails. I applaud the Congress for passing this legislation, and I'm pleased to see the President sign it."

The new law establishes imagencies, state attorneys general to fines or imprisonment. and Internet Service Providers to help curb spam. It also creates civil and criminal prohibitions to new criminal penalties to assist in deter spammers from using false deterring the most offensive forms or misleading identification, and of spam, including unmarked imposes penalties against sexually-oriented messages and e- spammers for these violations.

*The law caps statutory damages for civil violations in most cases. The law also provides greater certainty in interstate commerce for businesses that would otherwise face a wide diversity of state laws on spam.

*Under the law, consumers are provided with a choice not to receive any further unsolicited messages from a sender. Senders that do no honor a consumer's request are subject to civil penalties.

*The law makes spam containing unmarked sexually-oriented material a criminal offense. The labeling requirement gives parents a tool to protect their children from such emssages. Under the law, senders of e-mail are required to place warning labels on messages containing sexually-oriportant "rules of the road" for civil, ented or pornographic material. 

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
