English is running for District Attorney for the 112th Judicial District. Her opponent is Frank Lacy from Fort Stockton.

The race will be decided in the March 9 primary.





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

For the B-Team it was a tied ball-game at 2-2. The two points on Ozona's side came from Latham Decote.


The A-team game was an exciting one. The Lions and Broncos took turns in the lead.





Vino Larry Oaks, Executive Director of the Texas Historical Commission, presented the Award of Merit to staff members of the Land Office Archives and! Records Division for their efforts to scan documents and post them on the Internet.

Jerry Patterson, Commissioner of the Texas General Land Office, also attended the event in Austin.

A demonstration of the careful work involved in getting these documents online took place after the award presentation.

One example of the 45,000 plus maps and documents now online is a map of Texas published in 1849 by Jacob De Cordova. Compiled by Robert Creuzbaur and engraved by J.M. Atwood.

It shows roads, cities, counties, geographical features and notes about flora and fauna in the young state.

An inset on the map shows Texas' 1849 boundaries, which included parts of New Mexico, Colorado, Oklahoma and Wyoming.

The Land Office is constitutionally charged with taking care of more than 35 million documents containing information about Texas land grants and land transactions dating back to the 18th century.


