• Texas will be connected by a 4,000-mile multi-use corridor up to 1,200 feet wide.

• It will have separate lanes for passenger vehicles (three in each direction) and trucks (two in each direction).

• The corridor will include six rail lines (three in each direction), one for high-speed passenger rail between cities, one for high-speed freight and one for conventional commuter and freight.

• The third component of the corridor will be a 200-foot-wide dedicated utility zone carrying electricity, data, water, oil and natural gas.

"This is the main thing we are after," said John DeWitt, TxDOT's director of transportation, planning and development for the San Angelo district. "We're looking for the connection that you feel is most important."

The \$145.2 billion to \$183.5 billion project was formulated through House Bill 3588, which Governor Rick Perry.

"This is a good idea, just like Interstate-10 was in the 1950s,"
