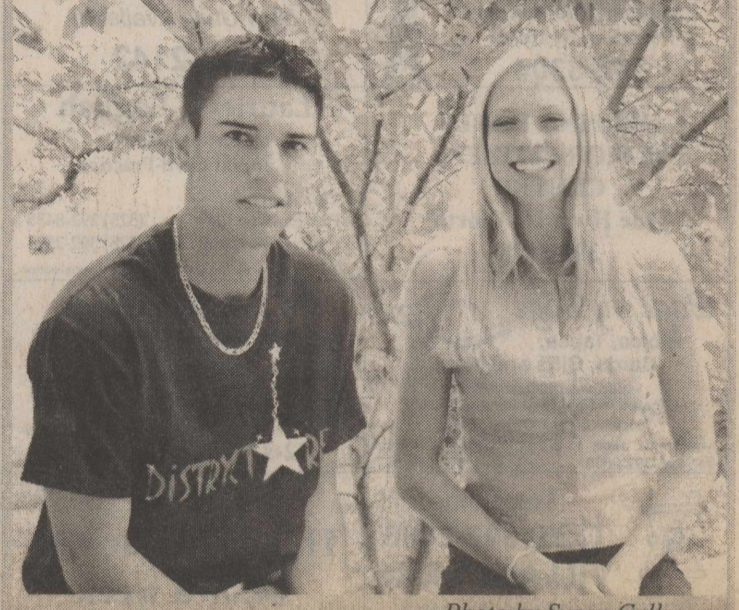

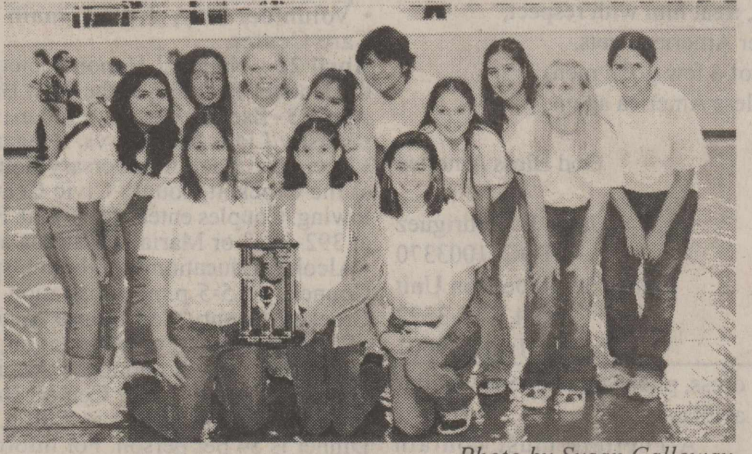

### Legislative special session tackles school finance

AUSTIN - Here's a clip and save version of what the Legislature will be trying to do during the special session on school finance: Figure a way to lower property taxes while providing more money for Texas schools.

Reduced to those 14 words, it seems simple enough. But it's likely to prove more daunting than finishing the science fair project the night before it's due.

To make it more interesting, the state's Big Three - Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick - all seem to have their own ideas about what's best for Texas on this issue.

In addition to a property tax cut, Perry wants to increase the cigarette tax, video lottery terminals at racetracks and Indian reservations and a \$5 tax on admission to adult entertainment spots. Dewhurst, on the other hand, says the Senate has been thinking about a deeper property tax cut than suggested by Perry, plus an expansion in what's covered by the sales tax.

Craddick has said less on the issue than the governor or lieutenant governor, but has indicated he favors a property tax cut. The House has filed bills providing for the various components of Perry's plan.

The stereotypical image of a Texan with a big belt buckle may need an update: There's a lot of belly under that buckle.

One of the facts brought out in the coverage of last week's Texas Roundup, a 10K walk/run and health fair adjacent to the Capitol grounds, is that of the nation's 10 cities with the highest number of overweight residents Texas has half of them.

And a new report predicts the problem is only going to get worse: The medical cost for obesity in Texas could increase from the current \$10.5 billion a year to \$40 billion a year by 2040.

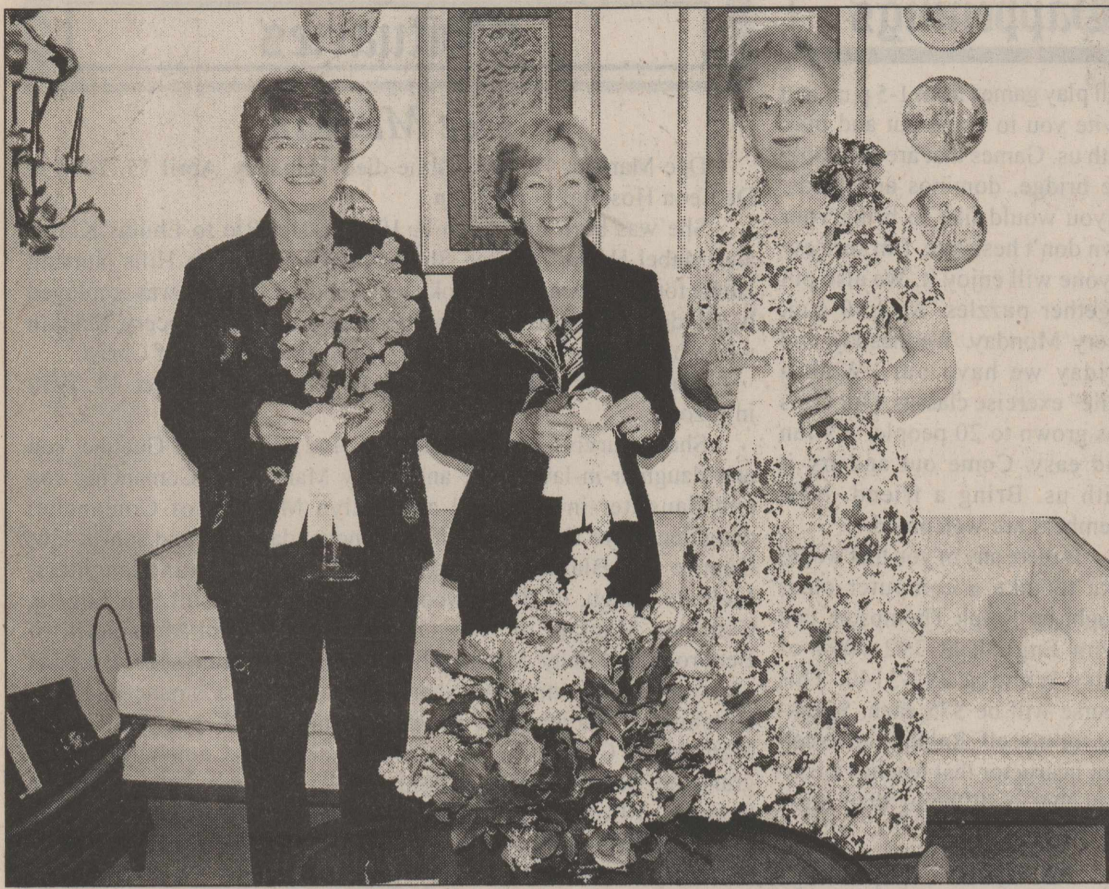

## Soil and Water Stewardship Week set for April 25-May 2

While most of us seldom come in daily contact with soil, we all depend on soil for our daily survival, according to organizers of the 2004 Soil and Water Stewardship Week observance, set for April 25-May 2.

"In generation after generation, it is important to bring attention back to the central theme the living soil sustains all life on earth," said Paul C. Perner III, chairperson of the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation. "Without the soil, nothing lives. Our conservation district works to protect healthy soils that in turn support a healthy environment, and healthy environments support healthy life."

Modern farmers and ranchers who practice soil conservation are doing their part to keep the living soil alive. Lessons from the past, such as the catastrophic "Dust Bowl" of the 1930s, have shown what can happen when the topsoil is not protected from wind and water erosion. Today, private land managers employ a host of conservation practices, such as minimum tillage, to protect the topsoil that feeds the nation.

Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District is a sponsor of the Range and Grass Judging

Contest, the sixth-grade Poster and Essay Contest and the sixth-grade Conservation Education Field Day. They are a sponsor for the maintenance and upkeep of the flood control structures around Ozona.

Soil health becomes more important when you learn that millions of beneficial organisms are going through their daily routine of eating, breathing, living and dying in the soil. One cup of fertile soil may contain as many bacteria as there are people on Earth. In one acre—an area about the size of a football field—there may be a ton or more of microscopic bacteria. That's equal to the weight of two full-grown cows.

We eat the food, drink the water, breath the air and enjoy the views, but only a few of us walk the fields and forests on a regular basis and understand what those lands need from us in order to sustain the living soil. However, the local district has suggested three things each of us can do in our own backyards to be better stewards of our soil resources:

- Protect the soil from wind or water erosion by keeping healthy plants growing on the surface.
- Restore and maintain organic matter in the soil, such as grass clippings or tree leaves (compost).
- Protect soil life by using the least amounts and least toxic materials to control pest problems.

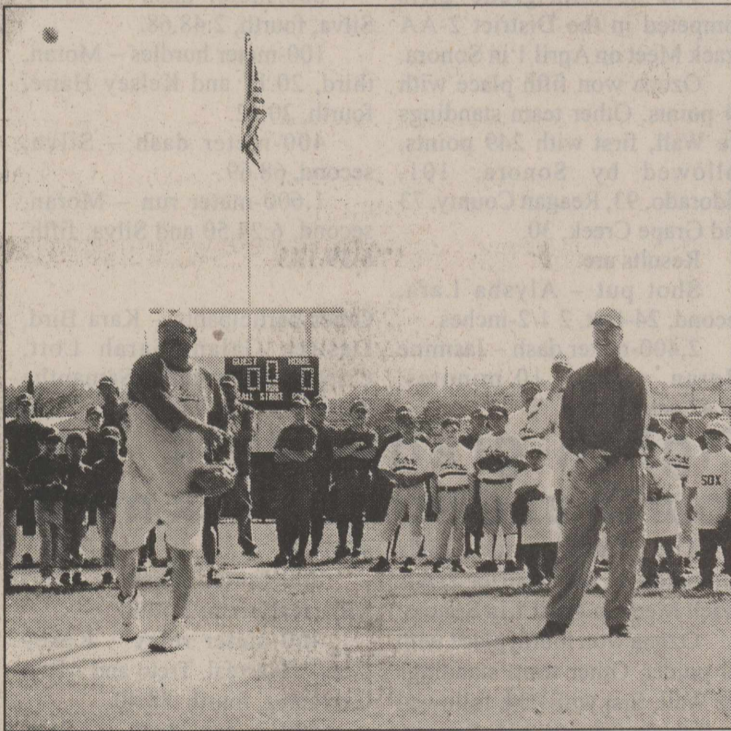

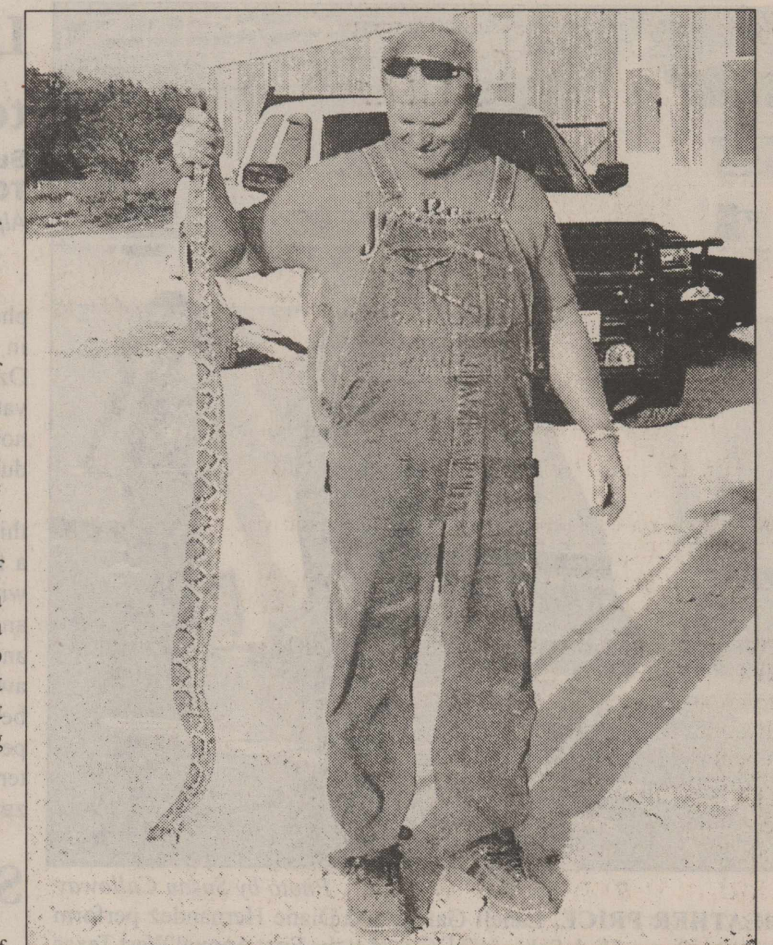
## ORCA schedules public hearings on community development programs, agency

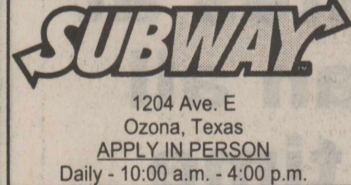

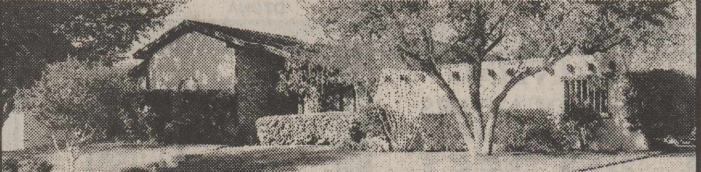
