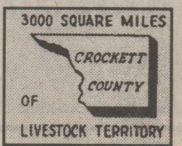

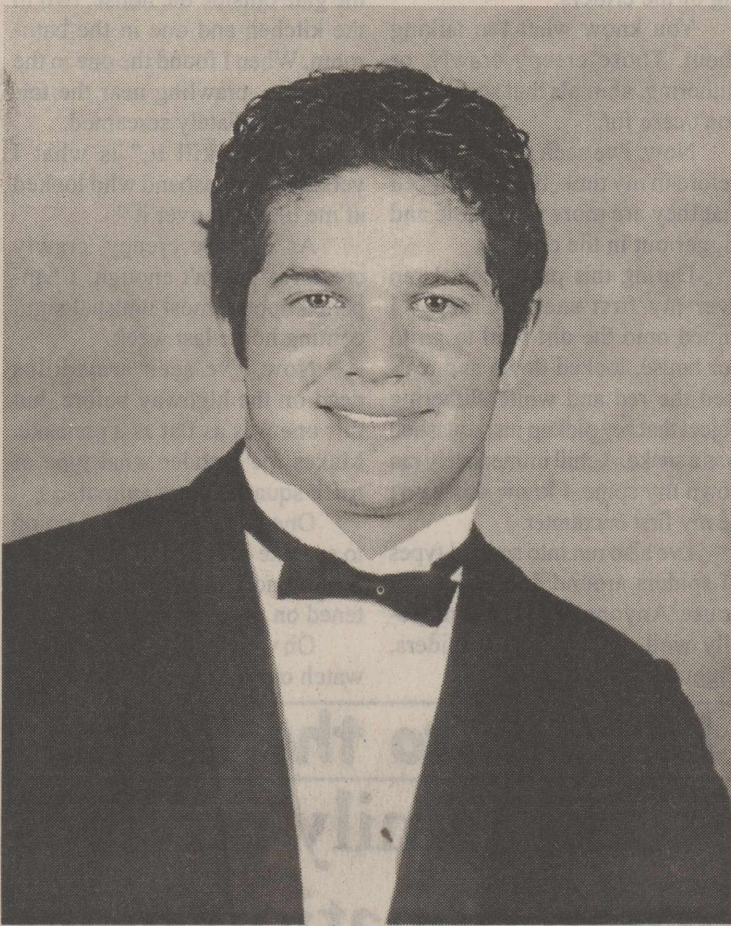

Bangeman is the daughter of Debra and Bobby Bangeman. She plans on attending the University of Texas at Austin and majoring in finance.

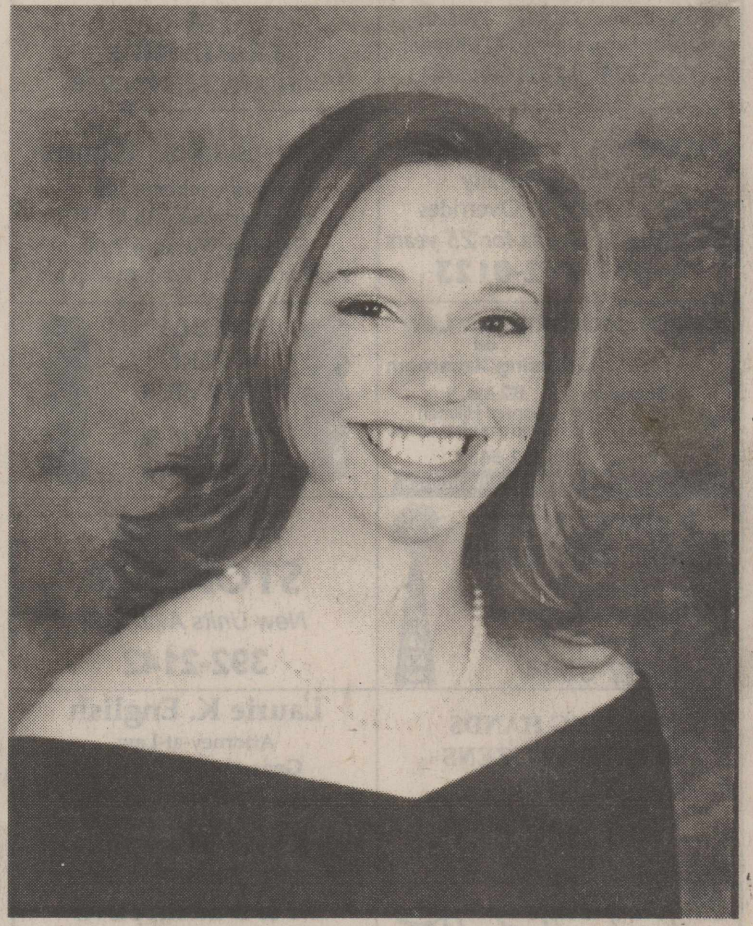
During her high school career, Bangeman participated in UIL Journalism writing, accounting and informative speaking.

Special session bell rings without solution

AUSTIN - Texas public schools will hold classes for most of this week, but the final bell for the Legislature's special session on school finance rings May 19.

But the report cards came out earlier, and the grades weren't good. In fact, Gov. Rick Perry almost surely will be calling lawmakers back for summer school, though he has not yet set a start date.

The 30-day session cost taxpayers \$1.7 million, but the House and Senate could not agree on how to improve education in Texas and still lower taxes. Options ranging from property tax cuts to approval of slot machines as revenue-generating devices were cussed and discussed, but nothing had enough consensus behind it to make it into law.

Some of the lawmakers do deserve some extra credit for good quotes, however.

As one House member put it, "Right now, I doubt if we could get 100 votes for Santa Claus."

On the Senate side, Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, said, "Robin Hood is here until King Richard comes back on. Then we'll decide whether we want to do away with Robin Hood."

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst said last Friday that he believes legislators made progress during the session. Declaring that much remains to be done, he continued, "We need some more time ... to do a good job. The children of Texas deserve no less."

Negative numbers for state workers...

The Employee Retirement System's board has approved a 5.13 percent increase in the cost of the health insurance used by 90 percent of state employees and retirees.

The state will cover all of that hike for its 200,000 or so workers, but since only half of the cost of dependent insurance is paid by the state, workers whose spouses or children are on the state plan will see more money taken from their paychecks.

For the 10 percent of state workers covered by HMOs, premium increases will average 8.9 percent.

Learning safe hunting skills...

Math, science and language arts are not the only forms of instruction young Texans need, at least if they come from a family where hunting is a tradition.

State law requires that anyone born after Sept. 2, 1971 who is at least 17 years old must complete a 10-hour hunter safety course to get a hunting license. Those 12 to 16 years old must pass the course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter. Budding hunters younger than 12 can take the course, but they cannot be certified.

More than 4,400 providers offer the course across the state, and it's available in all 254 counties. Last year, about 33,000 students took the course.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, which oversees the training program, believes it has saved lives. Though the state has more than a million licensed hunters, last year only 44 hunting-related accidents were reported.

New TCEQ commissioner

The Texas Senate unanimously confirmed Larry R. Soward of Austin for a six-year term as commissioner to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ).

Commissioner Soward has been serving in that capacity since his appointment by Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 17, 2003. His term will expire on Aug. 31, 2009.

At one point in time a teacher will need to ask for input from a colleague when a problem arises with a student, a group of students or implementing a particular teaching concept. When this teacher asks for input do we want our educators to question whether

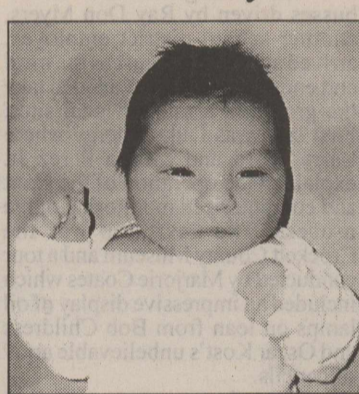

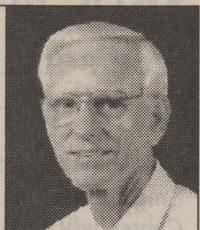

Area water employees receive high-tech, low-cost training

The goal was purple water. In order to fulfill this, it took many attempts.

That is what some members of area water supplies and water districts experienced this past week as they took part in the Texas Engineering Extension Service's "Engineering, Utilities and Public Works Training Institute" held at the Crockett County Civic Center.

The hands-on training seminar featured members of public water systems from Crockett, Irion, Reagan, Schleicher, Sutton, Terrell, Upton and Val Verde counties.

Intermediate Water Lab was the topic for this session, as trainees sat through a 30-minute classroom lecture and then moved into a high-tech mobile lab to conduct an analysis of potable water using the latest requirements approved by the Environmental Protection Agency and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

"It's like a college chemistry course," said Keith McLeroy, TEEEX instructor. "The challenge is giving the students unknown samples, and then they have to take their analyzing skills and use them."

The 32-hour course is part of TEEEX's effort to bring this type of training to rural areas through money received last year from the state's general revenue fund.

With that money, the cost for each trainee is \$25, which breaks down to \$.78 per hour for this course, said Richard Harbuck, program supervisor. The other two courses offered in the program are

valve and hydrant maintenance and pump and motor maintenance which are 20-hour courses.

Often people in rural areas aren't able to afford to attend training like this due to travel and seminar costs, McLeroy said.

"Normally, in order for us to be able to travel out here we would have to have a high student enrollment, but with the general fund money we're able to go areas we don't typically travel to," Harbuck said. "We're using state money to give directly back to the people."

Allan Lange, general manager of the Lipan-Kickapoo Water Conservation District, said he has received a refresher course on training he took 15 years ago.

"It's the same equipment,

but really advanced," he said. "We do this type of work everyday and it's neat learning all the updated technology."

Cindy Weatherby of the Santa Rita Underground Water Conservation in Big Lake said it was challenging and enjoyable.

"You have to keep doing it over and over. Practice makes perfect," she said.

Harbuck said the center is hoping to receive some money for next year in order to bring more courses out into rural communities.

Ozona will host the valve and hydrant maintenance course July 20-22.

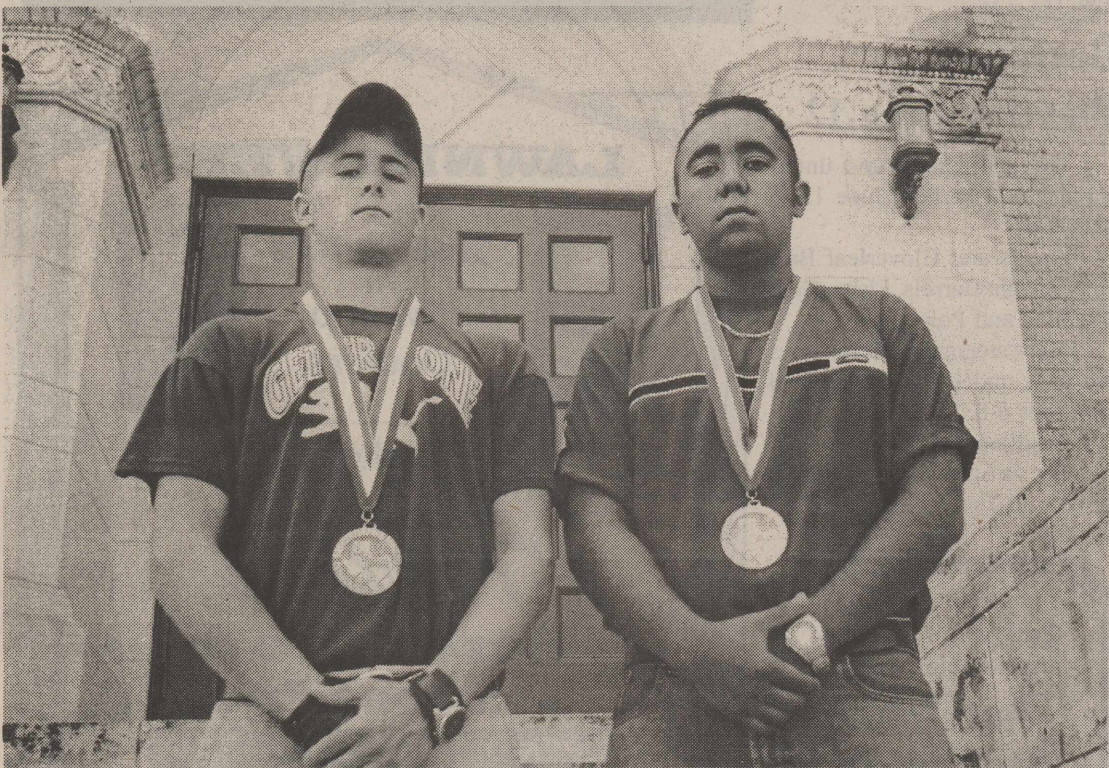

In their quarterfinal round match, Gray and Galindo defeated Travis Sims and Robert Henson of Franklin 7-5, 6-4.

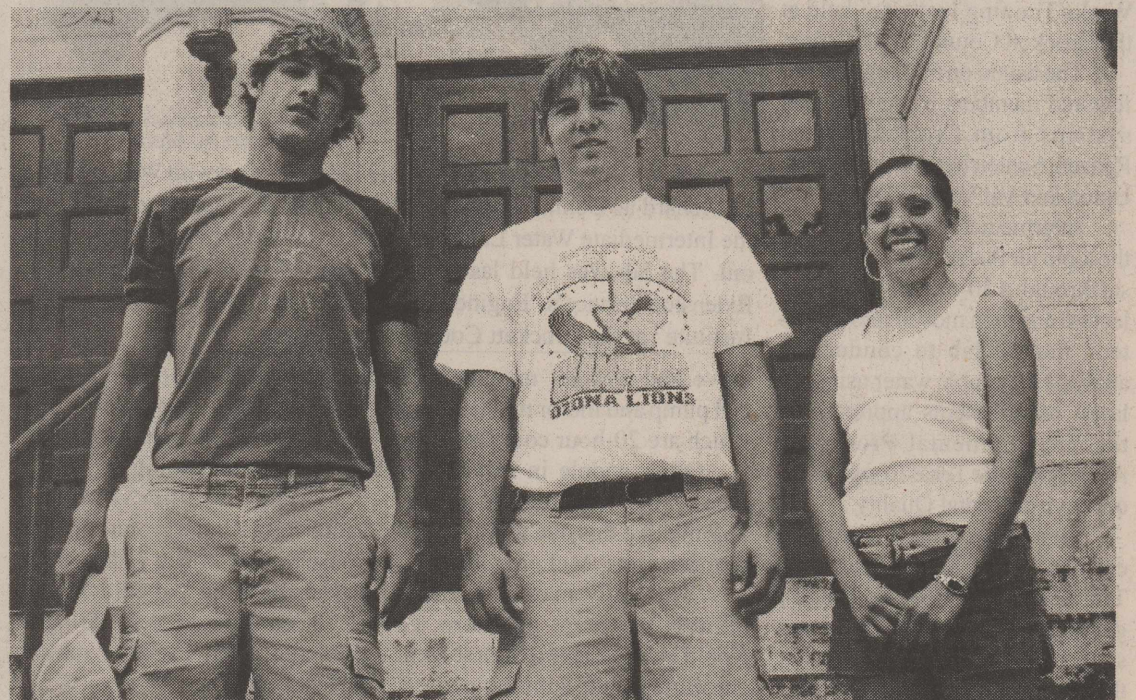

Roland, and I was elated that we came out on top in this one," said Coach Rick Bachman.

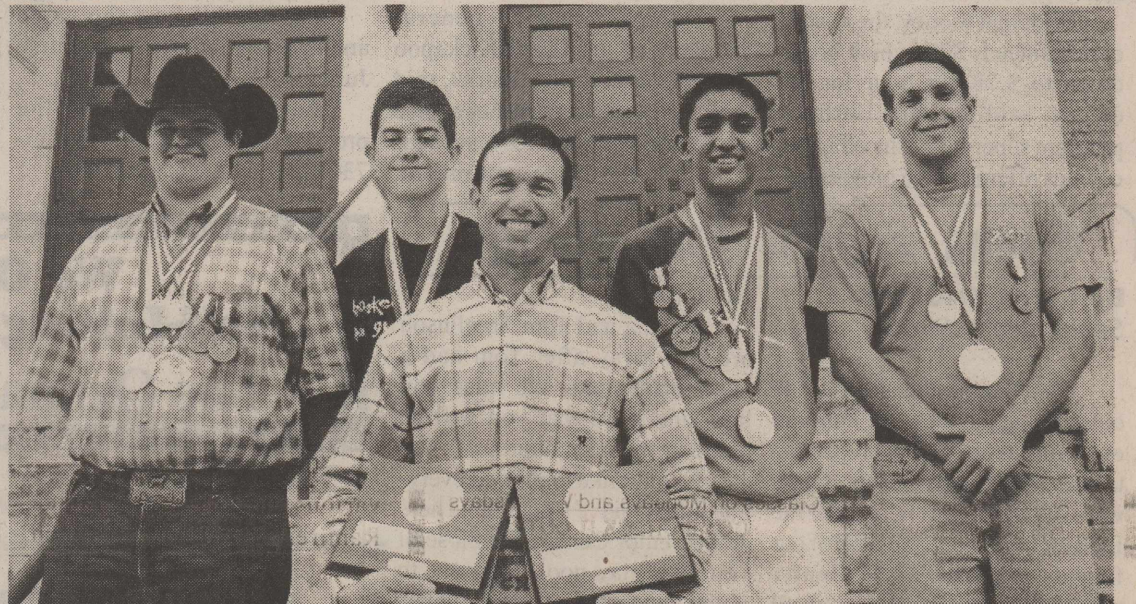

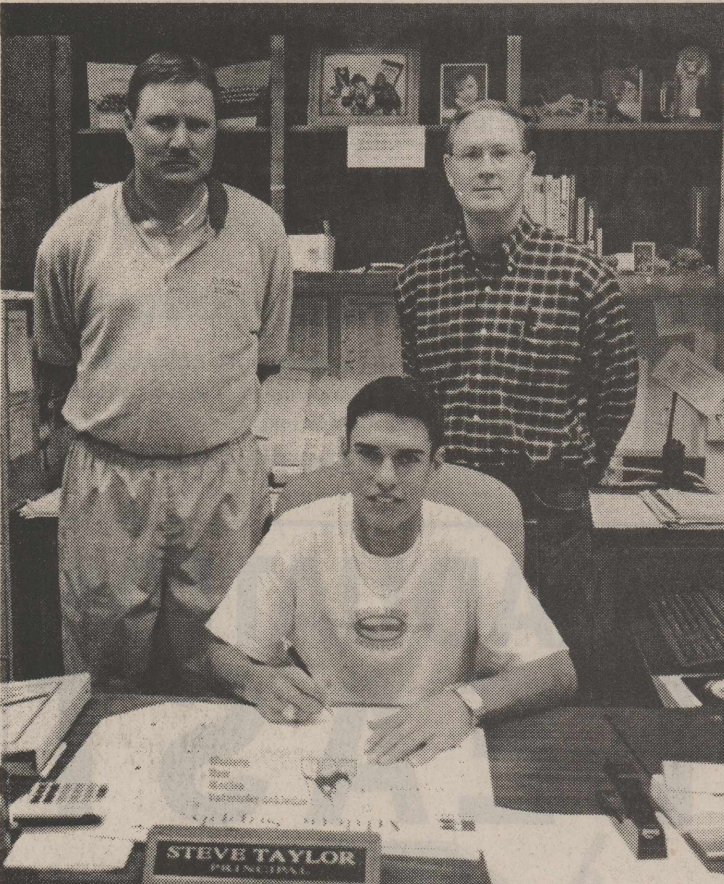

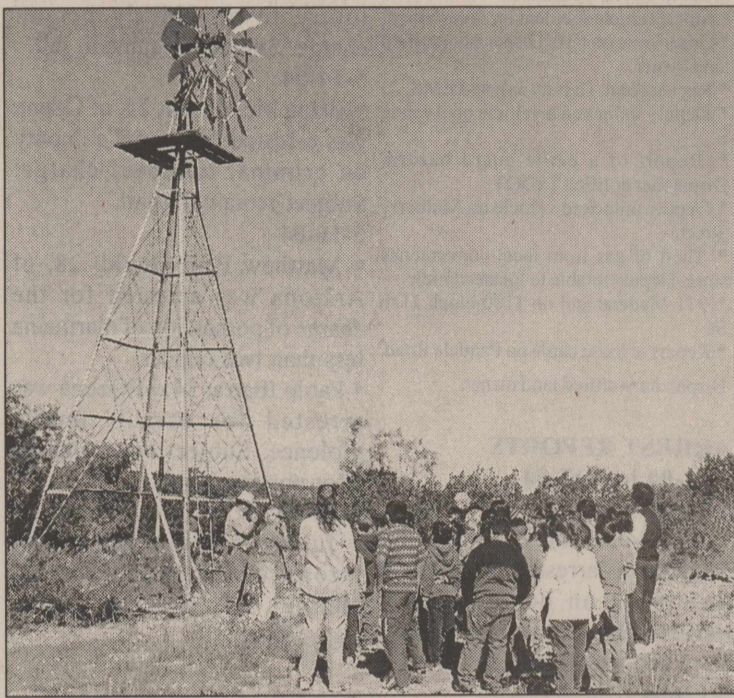
