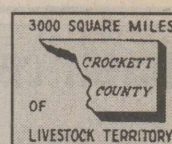

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Summertime hits with scorching heat

Temperatures soared above 100 degrees last week as summer weather arrived.

In order to keep cool, the American Cancer Society and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention offer these tips:

- When possible, avoid outdoor activities during the hours between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., when the sun's rays are the strongest.
- Always wear a broad-spectrum (protection against both UVA and UVB) sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of 15 or higher.
- Drink more fluids (nonalcoholic), regardless of your activity level.
- Don't wait until your thirsty to drink. If your doctor generally limits the amount of fluid you drink or has you on water pills, ask him how much you should drink while the weather is hot.
- Don't drink liquids that contain caffeine, alcohol or large amounts of sugar; these actually cause you to lose more body fluid. Also, avoid very cold drinks, because they can cause stomach cramps.
- Be sure to reapply sunscreen

frequently, especially after swimming, perspiring heavily or drying off with a towel.

- Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle.
- Electric fans may provide comfort, but when the temperature is in the high 90s, fans will not prevent heat-related illness. Taking a cool shower or bath, or moving to an air-conditioned place is a much better way to cool off.
- Wear a hat with a 4-inch brim all around because it protects areas often exposed to the sun, such as the neck, ears, eyes, forehead, nose and scalp.
- Wear clothing to protect as much skin as possible. Long-sleeved shirts, long pants, or long skirts are the most protective. Dark colors provide more protection than light colors by preventing more UV rays from reaching your skin. A tightly woven fabric provides greater protection than loosely woven fabric.
- To protect your eyes from sun damage, wear sunglasses that block 99 to 100 percent of UVA and UVB radiation.
- Consider wearing cosmetics and lip protectors with an SPF of at least 15 to protect

your skin year-round.
• Swimmers should remember to regularly reapply sunscreen. UV rays reflect off water and sand, increasing the intensity of UV radiation and making sun protection es-

pecially important.
• Some medications, such as antibiotics, can increase your skin's sensitivity to the sun. Ask your doctor or pharmacist about the medicines you take and learn more about

extra precautions.
• Children need extra protection from the sun. Encourage children to play in the shade, wear protective clothing and apply sunscreen regularly.

Tips to save energy

With the onset of warmer weather in West Texas, WTU Retail Energy L.P. offers energy conservation tips for residential consumers.

Free and Easy Savings

- Turn up the thermostat to 80 degrees or higher throughout the day, turning the air-conditioner off when you are not at home. Typically, raising the temperature just five degrees will reduce cooling costs by 15 to 25 percent.
- Close the blinds, shades or draperies during the hottest part of the day.
- Use ceiling or other fans to keep comfortable when the thermostat is set to higher temperatures. Remember to turn fans off when you leave a room.
- Plan your dishwashing, laundry and bathing for early morning or at night when it is cooler this will help the air conditioner more effectively remove humidity from the air.
- Run your dishwasher only fully loaded and on the air-dry cycle.
- Set the water temperature to

warm or cold on your washing machine, using only cold water for the rinse cycle. Line dry clothes when possible. Only run full loads in the dryer and clean the lint trap after each use.

- Use kitchen and bathroom exhaust fans to remove excess heat and moisture.
- Set the water heater temperature to a moderate level of 140 degrees.
- Use a microwave instead of an oven range whenever possible.
- Cook more than one item at a time in the oven. Preheat the oven only five to eight minutes when baking; do not preheat for broiling or roasting.
- Use small cooking appliances such as electric fry pans and toaster ovens whenever possible.
- Keep your refrigerator temperature at 38 degrees Fahrenheit and your freezer at 10 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Defrost your freezer when ice or frost buildup is 1/4-inch or thicker.
- Vacuum or brush the cool.

At Wool Growers, 316,000 pounds of 12-month lamb wool was offered, and 90,000 pounds of short wool, 8-month paint free was offered.

The 12-month wool ranged from \$.79 to \$1.41 3/4. The 8-month paint free ranged from \$1 to \$1.14.2.

Crockett County 4-H Fair Board awards scholarships

Each scholarship is in the amount of \$4,000.

Applicants must have participated in the Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show for five years as a 4-H exhibitor. Two of those years must be the applicant's junior and senior year in Ozona High school.

Jake Edward Stewart has participated for 10 years in the Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show. He plans on attending Texas Tech University and major in mechanical engineering.

Jake said he chose this field of study because it excites him and will serve him better in the future.

Bryan J. Skehan has participated in the Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show for seven years. He plans on attending Texas A&M University and major in animal science with an interest in veterinary medicine.

He said that both education and animals have been two constants in his life, along with a lifetime involvement in agriculture and science.

"I have been on a horse, working in the pens, fixing fence and checking water for as long as I can remember," Bryan said.

Clay Hale has participated for

10 years in the Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show. He plans on attending Howard Junior College and majoring in business administration.

Clay said throughout his years of experience in 4-H projects, he realized that managing your projects is a major key in being successful.

"If you don't have a sound business knowledge, you cannot realize long term goals," he said.

Stephen L. Humphrey has participated in the Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show for nine years. He plans on attending the University of Texas at San Antonio and major in mechanical engineering.

He said he plans on working to help improve the efficiency of our agriculture industry so that it may one day become safer, better and more economical.

"I will keep a lot of the old ways because that is the way I have been taught, but with the help of this scholarship I will be able to obtain the knowledge to advance some of the agriculture programs that (my grandfather) has in place," Stephen said.

The recipients must maintain full-time student status of 12 semester hours and a minimum grade point average of 2.85 each semester in order to keep the scholarships.

Former president's speech still important to today's troops

President Ronald Reagan died on Saturday. Twenty years ago, President Reagan gave a talk to surviving members of the Normandy invasion.

His speech could still work in talking about the men and women of Ozona who are serving our country in Iraq.

Here is part of what he said on that day: "Why? Why did you do it? What inspired all the men of the armies that met here? We look at you, and somehow we know the answer. It was faith and belief; it was loyalty and love. They... had faith that what they were doing was right, faith that they fought for all humanity, faith that a just God would grant them mercy on this beachhead or on the next. It was the deep knowledge - and pray God we have not lost it - that there is a profound, moral difference between the use of force for liberation and the use of force for conquest. You were here to liberate, not to conquer, and so you and those others did not doubt your cause. And you were right not to doubt. You all knew that some things are worth dying for. One's country is worth dying for, and democracy is worth dying for, because it's the most deeply honorable form of government ever devised by man. All of you loved liberty. All of you were willing to fight tyranny, and you knew the people of your country were behind you."

Reagan presidency boosted two Texans to White House

AUSTIN - When the news came that former President Ronald Reagan had died, Texas Republicans were holding their annual convention in San Antonio. Party veterans recalled that nearly 20 years earlier, President Reagan had been in Dallas for another Republican event - the party's national convention. In Big D on Aug. 23, 1984, the nation's Big R accepted his party's nomination for a second term as president.

Reagan carried Texas and 48 other states in his landslide reelection, but a Web site called "Things Named in Honor of Ronald Reagan" shows only one Texas high school - in San Antonio - named after the late president.

Clearly, there is no correlation between the number of times a politician's name goes up on a public building and the impact that person has on a particular area. If that were the case, and assuming only Republicans got to name buildings, every other school in Texas would be named for Reagan.

From the standpoint of Texas history, Reagan was no Sam Houston, but his presidency helped put two Texans in the White House inside a decade.

By choosing George Herbert Walker Bush as his vice presidential running mate in 1980, Reagan paved the way for the Bush presidency in 1989.

That presidency, though it only lasted one term, made it feasible for son George W. Bush to seek the governorship. Becoming governor of the nation's second-most populated state, in turn, gave the younger Bush the successful shot he took at the White House.

Both the 41st and the 43rd

president will be at Reagan's funeral, along with a lot of other Texans.

Gas up, auto insurance may go down...
 It's costing more to fill your vehicle with gasoline, but it's getting a little less expensive to drive around with the required level of auto insurance.

If the Texas Department of Insurance OKs it, State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Co. will decrease what it charges for collision coverage by an average of 2.2 percent in August.

Earlier this year, USAA cut its rates in Texas by 4.5 percent. Progressive Insurance followed suit in March, dropping its rates by 2 percent.

The Texas rate decreases buck the national trend. According to the Insurance Information Institute, auto insurance rates are expected to increase 3.5 percent this year. Estimated national average cost for auto insurance is \$871 a year.

Go figure...
 Nervous that someone will steal your brand new vehicle? According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, a 5-year-old car or truck has a better chance of being stolen than a new set of wheels fresh off the showroom floor.

In its annual listing of the most-stolen vehicles in Texas, the DPS said cars and trucks five years and older amount to roughly 70 percent of all vehicles stolen in the state (pickups claim three of the first four categories).

In the good news category, auto theft dropped 4.6 percent in Texas last year compared with the year before. Even so, nearly 100,000 vehicles were stolen, a loss of \$782 million.

The top vehicles most preferred by thieves include General Motors pickups, Ford pickups, Honda Accords, Dodge pickups, GM Suburbans, Honda Civics, Toyota Camry, Ford Taurus and Ford Mustang.

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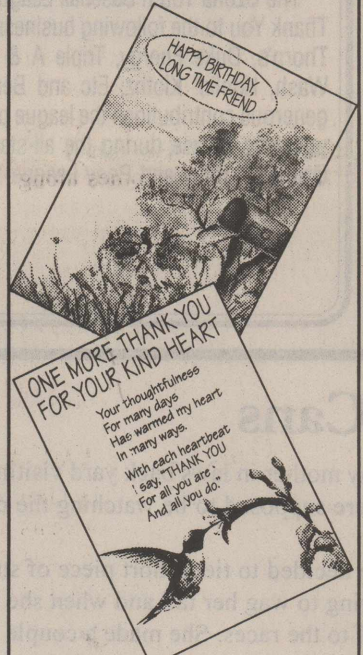

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
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Noted author and lecturer to speak this weekend

Vesicular Stomatitis confirmed in West Texas

The country's first case of Vesicular Stomatitis since 1998 was confirmed May 19, in a herd of nine horses on a premise near Balmorhea, in Reeves County. VS is a viral disease that occurs sporadically in the U.S., usually in southwestern states.

The disease can affect horses, cattle and pigs, and occasionally, sheep, goats and deer, causing blisters to form in the animal's mouth, on teats or along the hooves, resulting in excessive salivation, lameness or sloughing of tissue. The clinical signs of VS can cause concern because they mimic those of a highly contagious foreign animal—foot-and-mouth disease—which has been eradicated in the U.S. since 1929.

Laboratory tests must be run to differentiate between the two diseases, when cattle, pigs, sheep or other cloven-hooved animals develop signs of the disease. Unlike FMD, VS also can affect horses and other members of the equine family. Although the disease does not affect food safety, infected livestock are withheld from slaughter until they recover.

We always launch a disease investigation when blisters or sores are reported in livestock, to determine if foot-and-mouth disease has been introduced into the U.S., said Dr. Max Coats, deputy director for Animal Health Programs for the Texas Animal Health Commission, the states livestock and poultry health regulatory agency.

Because horses are not susceptible to FMD, we knew, in this case, that the animals did not have FMD, but could have VS, or possibly had come in contact with poison or a toxic plant. The National Veterinary Services Laboratory in Ames, Iowa, has confirmed that the three horses in Reeves County have VS.

Coats said researchers have determined that VS outbreaks are started by a virus transmitted by arthropods, such as black flies

and sand flies. Following an incubation period of two to eight days, infected animals may develop clinical signs of disease. The outbreak then can be perpetuated by biting insects that carry the disease from infected to healthy livestock. VS-infected animals also can spread the virus if their saliva or the fluid from ruptured blisters contaminates equipment or feed shared by herd mates. Sick animals should be isolated until they heal, he said.

Coats said that all livestock on the affected ranch in Reeves County will remain quarantined for several weeks, until they heal and no longer pose a health threat to other livestock. Prior to quarantine release, the animals will be re-examined by a state or federal regulatory veterinarian, to prevent the spread of disease to other premises.

VS is rarely fatal, and infection usually runs its course in a couple of weeks, Coats said. Infected livestock may need supportive care to prevent secondary infections where blisters have ruptured. The affected animals also may lose condition, because they will avoid eating as long as their mouth is sore. Lesions can also occur along hooves, resulting in temporary lameness.

The only thing regular about VS is its irregularity, he said. Thirteen years passed between a 1982-83 outbreak of VS and one in 1995 that involved infection on more than 365 ranches in five states. These affected states were New Mexico, Colorado, Arizona, Utah and Texas, where infection was confined to only one premise.

Texas was spared in May 1997, when the disease was detected in Arizona in horses. By late fall, when the outbreak ended, infection had been detected on 380 ranches in four states; Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico and Utah, he continued. Prior to the today's case, VS was most recently confirmed in 1998, in Texas, Reeves County, in New

Mexico and in Colorado.

As a biosecurity measure, ranchers and veterinarians should wear rubber or latex gloves when handling potentially infected animals, and they should wash their hands thoroughly afterward. Humans reportedly may contract VS and develop flu-like symptoms that can last four to seven days, Coats said.

"If your livestock develops blisters, erosions or sores, don't pass it off as another case of VS," Coats said. "It is extremely important that we collect samples and have laboratory tests run to determine the cause of illness. Report these signs of disease to your private veterinary practitioner or the TAHC immediately."

The TAHC hotline number is operational 24 hours a day at 1-800-550-8242, and a TAHC or U.S. Department of Agriculture veterinarian always is on call to take reports and work with your private veterinarian at no charge.

In the meantime, livestock owners can take measures to reduce potential exposure to VS:

- Control biting flies.
- Keep equine animals stalled or under a roof at night to reduce exposure to flies.
- Keep stalls clean
- Feed and water stock from their individual buckets.
- Disinfect borrowed equipment or tools prior to using them on your premise.
- Don't visit a ranch that's under quarantine for VS. Wait until the animals have healed.

If anyone plans to ship horses or other livestock out of state, contact the state of destination prior to transporting the animals, Coats said.

Because VS has been confirmed in Texas, some states may require our shipments of livestock to undergo additional inspections or testing. Producers and veterinarians may contact the TAHC at 1-800-550-8242, if they need contact information for animal health officials in other states.

ing coils in the back of your refrigerator at least every six months.

Low Cost Tips

- Replace incandescent light bulbs with compact fluorescent lights, which use 75 percent less electricity.

- Clean or replace the filter in the air conditioner, whether it is a central or window unit, every month to save as much as two percent on your electric bills. Having trouble remembering? A good rule of thumb is to clean or change your filter each time you pay your electric bill.

- Shade an outdoor air-conditioning unit to conserve up to five percent of the energy it uses while being in the sun.

- Have your air-conditioner unit checked and cleaned every year to ensure maximum efficiency and long life. Have the coils cleaned if dirty, and check the refrigerant for charge and the belts for wear and adjustments.


- Install a programmable thermostat that automatically adjusts your home's temperature settings in line with your schedule and you could save up to 20 percent on your energy costs.

- Weather strip, seal and caulk leaky doors and windows, and install foam gaskets behind outlet covers.

- Replace the door gasket on your refrigerator/freezer if it is deteriorated.

- Install a glass fireplace screen to prevent cooled air from escaping up the chimney.
