

One of the most interesting events listed is the 180-yard low hurdles, which has now been built into the 300-yard hurdles. David Childress holds the record with 19.5 seconds at the 1965 state meet in Austin.

'We have one of the most outstanding small school track programs," Duncan said. "This is something the kids and the community should be proud of."

Duncan's research took many hours spent looking through old newspapers at The Ozona Stockman and various libraries in Midland, Odessa, at Texas Tech University and Angelo State University. His grand total resulted in 425 meet results.

"There are a few I still have to verify," he said. "The problem is that in the articles, some never gave specific times and distances. It was a major stumbling block."

Throughout the years, Duncan said he saw the times and distances being made in a lot of different venues, including Stephenville, Brownwood, Lubbock, Big Spring, Kermit and Junction.

He also saw that modern technology didn't necessarily lead to faster and better times.

"The kids got realized they had the potential to do better," he said. "There was better equipment at one time or another, but it was January 13, 2005 up to the kids."



**COMPLAINT and GRIEVANCES PROCEDURES** 

Crockett County has adopted complaint and grievances procedures regarding its Texas Community Development Programs. These procedures outline the steps for a citizen to follow if he wishes to file a written complaint about proposed TCDP activities or implementation of past TCDP assisted activities. The County will make every effort to respond fully to such written complaints within 15 working days. Citizens may obtain a copy of these written procedures at the County Courthouse between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Citizens may also request the procedures be mailed to them by calling Kala Longoria, Administrative Assistant, at (325) 392-2965.

POLICY OF NONDISCRIMINATION ON THE BASIS OF DISABILITY STATUS

Crockett County does not discriminate on the basis of disability status in the admission or access to, or treatment or employment in, its federally assisted programs or activities. Crockett County has adopted a Grievance Procedure which affirmatively supports federal objectives related to Section 504.

The following individual has been designated to coordinate compliance with the nondiscrimination requirements contained in the Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) regulation implementing Section 504 (24 C.F.R. Part 8, dated June 2, 1988): Kala Longoria, Administrative Assistant, Crockett County.

Any individuals with disabilities or other interested persons or organizations desiring to participate in programs, policies or activities of the County, funded in whole or in part by federal funds, are encouraged to contact the County staff person listed above.

SECTION 504 GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

Crockett County has adopted an internal grievance procedure providing for prompt and equitable resolution of complaints alleging any action prohibited by Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (24 C.F.R. Part 8). Section 504 states, in part, that "no otherwise qualified handicapped individual . . . shall, solely by reason of his handicap, be excluded from the participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance . .

The County has designated a Coordinator for Section 504

compliance efforts. Complaints should be addressed to: Kala Longoria, Administrative Assistant

1. A complaint should be filed in writing or verbally, contain the name and address of the person filling it, and briefly describe the alleged violation of the regulations.

2. A complaint should be filed within ten (10) working days after the complainant becomes aware of the alleged violation. (Processing of allegations of discrimination occurring before this grievance procedure was in place will be considered on a case-bycase basis.)

3. An investigation, as may be appropriate, shall follow a filing of a complaint. The investigation will be conducted by Kala Longoria. These rules contemplate informal but thorough investigations, affording all interested persons and their representatives, if any, an opportunity to submit evidence relevant to a complaint.

4. A written determination as to the validity of the complaint and description of resolution, if any, shall be issued by the Coordinator and a copy forwarded to the complainant no later than ten (10) days

5. The Section 504 Coordinator shall maintain the files and records of Crockett County relating to the complaints filed.

6. The complainant can request a reconsideration of the case in instances where he or she is dissatisfied with the resolution. The request for reconsideration should be made within ten (10) working days to John R Jones, County Judge.

7. The right of a person to a prompt and equitable resolution of the complaint filed hereunder shall not be impaired by the person's pursuit of other remedies such as the filing of a Section 504 complaint with the office of Revenue Sharing, U.S. Department of the Treasury. Utilization of this grievance procedure is not a prerequisite to the pursuit of other remedies.

8. These rules shall be construed to protect the substantive rights of interested persons, to meet appropriate due process standards and to assure that Crockett County complies with Section 504 and ORA regulations.


