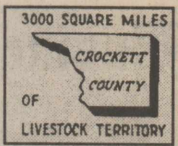

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Crockett County Sheriff's Report

Track coach's curiosity turns into statistical obsession

What started out as simple quest, quickly turned into an all out obsession for Ozona High School Track Coach Tom Duncan.

Two years ago, Duncan wanted to verify some Ozona Relay and high school boys track records. From there, his addiction grew leading to his discovery and recording of records for Ozona boys track during the last 55 years.

"It got to where I couldn't stay away from it," he said. "It became a real addiction."

The results of Duncan's work can now be seen on display in the field house at Lion Stadium.

Hanging on the wall is a golden lion with stars on it representing the 21 district championships, since 1959, for the boys track team. Above that are five purple flying feet for the 1961, 1965, 1967, 1972 and 1982 regional championships.

Besides those items are three rows contained track records for 18 events.

The earliest record belongs to Ray Coates, from 1941 who jumped 21-feet in the long jump at the district meet in Fort Stockton.

The records also contain times and distances of recent Ozona athletes including Jarryd Taylor.

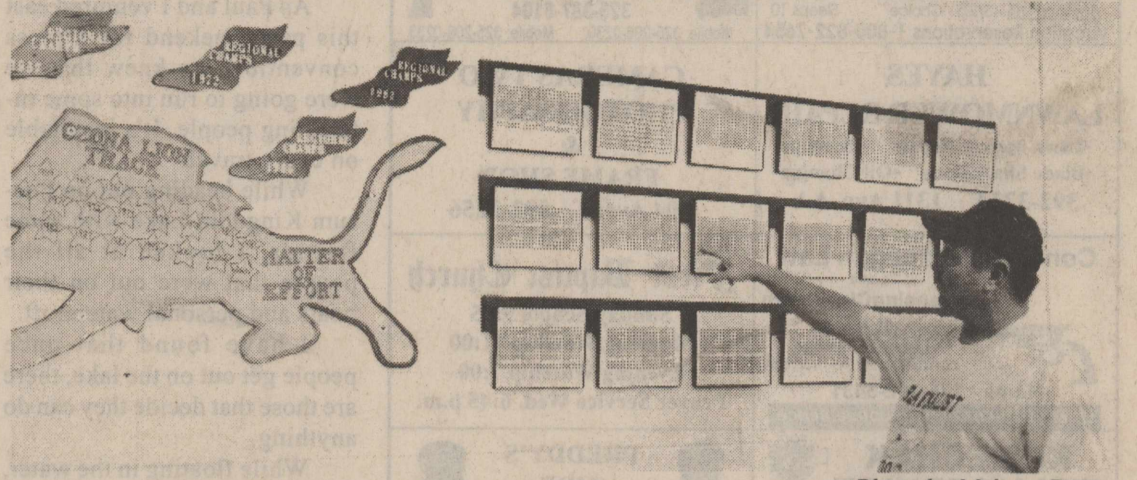
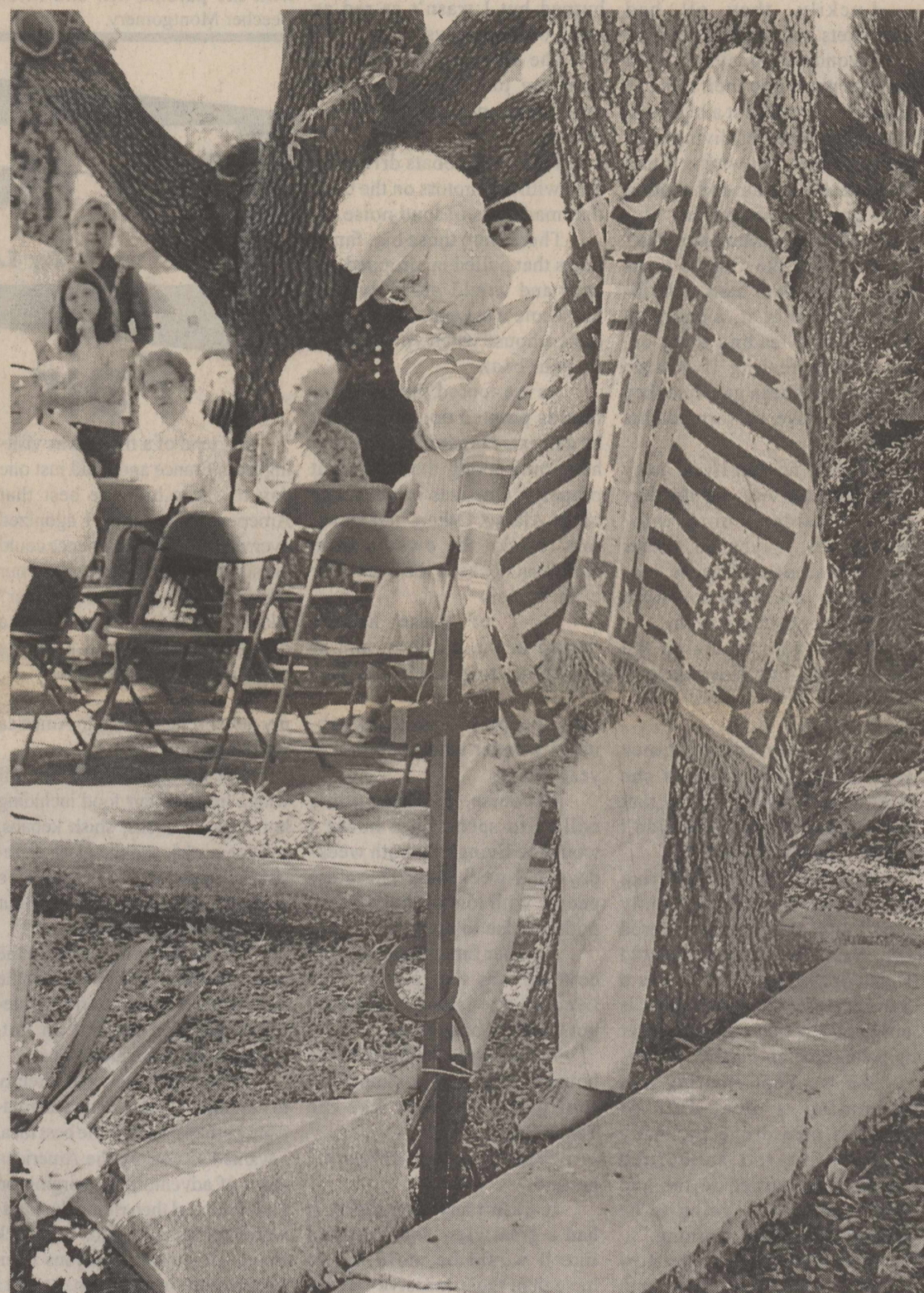

Former Texas Ranger honored with dedication

Friends and family members gathered this weekend to honor a man who once protected early settlers from Indian raids.

A Texas Ranger Cross was dedicated on the grave site of Capt. Joseph Warren Friend Saturday at Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Friend, who was born Sept. 13, 1840, in Claiborne Parish, La., first lived in Smith County, Texas and then to Coryell County in 1854 where the family lived for several years.

During this time, Samuel Friend was the captain of a Frontier Ranger Group and J.W. Friend served under him. Their role during the Civil War was to protect the frontier settlers from Indian raids.

In 1866, Friend married Martha Paloma Coates and the couple had seven children: Samuel William Friend who married Athelia Simpson; Wesley Edgar Friend, who married Minnie Wilson; Dixie Rebecca Friend, who married Charles Edward Davidson; Frank Ford Friend, who married Sarah Ollivia Byrd; Harry Joseph Friend, who married Willie Ida Young; Maggie Burns Friend, who married William Ponder Seahorn; Sheppard Annis "Doc" Friend, who married first Kathryn Goode and second Teresa Bridge Stokes.

In 1876, Friend moved his family to Jim Ned Creek in Taylor County. It was here that he registered his brands, the Spanish Gourd and the S7.

Martha died in 1885 in Taylor County.

He then moved his family to Crockett County in 1889 about

100 sections along the Taylor Box Draw where most of the ranches are still in the family today.

Nancy Friend Wendland, great-granddaughter of Friend, welcomed everyone to the ceremony.

Invocation was given by Chaplin George Fraiser of the Former Texas Ranger Association followed by a historical sketch by great-grandson William Ponder Seahorn III.

Great-grandson Clayton Friend read the life of J.W. Friend and great-granddaughter Mary Bernice Fitzgerald unveiled the cross.

Joe Davis, past president of the FTRA, welcomed all rangers present and Fraiser led everyone in the Ranger Prayer.

Travis Zuberbueler performed "Taps" and special music was provided by the "West Texas Wild Bunch."

FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

In 2004, the County Extension office has received several phone calls about problems with bees.

Bees can take over attics, barns or even water wells. Remember that you should always contact your local fire department or pest control before dealing with bees on your own.

Honeybees are susceptible to a wide variety of insecticides, and can be killed with any of the commercial products labeled for this use. However, when a swarm of bees in an exposed location, soapy water can control them very effectively with less likelihood of disturbing the bees and triggering the defensive response. A mixture of one cup liquid soap or detergent in a gallon of water will kill bees if they are completely soaked with the solution. The soap spreads the water over the bees and causes them to drown. If the bees are in a protected area and cannot be thoroughly covered, soapy water should not be used. Do not spray a swarm or hive during the day because many of the bees will be foraging or more easily agitated. The best time to spray is early in the morning or at dusk when most of the bees will be in the hive and the cooler temperatures keep the bees less active. Finally, a swarm may indicate that a colony is nearby. Sometimes a swarm will gather near the colony it left shortly after it emerges. The area should be carefully searched while wearing protective clothing to locate the colony so that it, too,

can be eliminated.

Honeybees that have moved into a building should be removed as soon as possible, before they begin to build comb in which to rear young bees and stem honey. Only when the bees first enter can they be killed without having to open the wall and remove large quantities of dead bees, wax and honey. If the colony has been in place for 3 weeks or longer, brood or food stores will be present in the colony and the bees are more likely to be defensive.

Established colonies of honeybees, especially Africanized honey bees, can react very vigorously to any disturbance and will attack any person or animal in their territory once they are disturbed. Africanized bees will defend a fairly large area, so it is best to keep unprotected people or animals at least 400 yards away. Wear protective clothing when working around such fierce bees.

Before you start any control measures, you should know the location of the colony in the wall in relation to the flight entrance. The nest can be located by tapping on the wall at night and listening for the area where the buzzing sounds are loudest.

Insecticides are the safest, quickest and most effective materials for killing bees in buildings. Do not use fumigants or flammable compounds in structures, Carbaryl (Sevin), pyrethrin, propoxue (Baygon), malathion, resmethrin or sumithrin are insecticides suggested for this use. The

pyrethroid insecticides are often used for their rapid knockdown of bees.

Either dust or spray formulations can be used within a wall or other cavity, but dusts generally disperse better. Apply the insecticide at night through the entrance hole if the colony is fairly close to the entrance or if the nest cannot be located. You can also drill a hole in the wall above the colony and apply the dust or spray through this opening (the hole should be small enough that bees cannot exit, and can be drilled from the inside wall to avoid bees around the hive entrance. After all sound and flight activity have ceased, or at least within two weeks, open the wall and remove all dead bees, combs and honey. These must be burned or buried because they are attractive to other bees and are toxic to both bees and people. Do not eat the honey or wax since they are contaminated with pesticide. Do not leave the honey and wax where other bees can reach it or you may damage valuable honeybee colonies nearby.

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Taylor, Tyson Vordick, Brad Mayfield and Simon Garza. One of the most interesting events listed is the 180-yard low hurdles, which has now been built into the 300-yard hurdles. David Childress holds the record with 19.5 seconds at the 1965 state meet in Austin. "We have one of the most outstanding small school track programs," Duncan said. "This is something the kids and the community should be proud of." Duncan's research took many hours spent looking through old newspapers at The Ozona Stockman and various libraries in Midland, Odessa, at Texas Tech University and Angelo State University. His grand total resulted in 425 meet results. "There are a few I still have to verify," he said. "The problem is that in the articles, some never gave specific times and distances. It was a major stumbling block." Throughout the years, Duncan said he saw the times and distances being made in a lot of different venues, including Stephenville, Brownwood, Lubbock, Big Spring, Kermit and Junction. He also saw that modern technology didn't necessarily lead to faster and better times. "The kids got realized they had the potential to do better," he said. 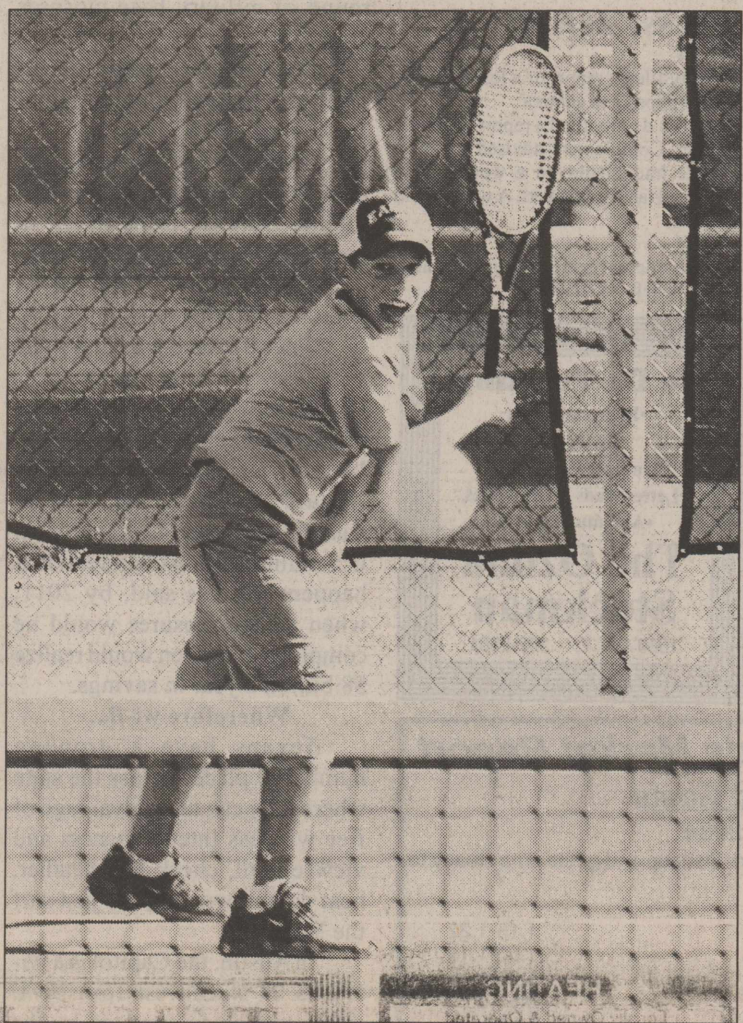
