Dan Pullen spoke to the board about the budget. He said the board should look at all expenditures and ask what the educational benefit is.

"We have an extremely expensive school system to maintain in Ozona," Pullen said. "It's your (the board's) responsibility to keep some of these things in check.

Some of the issues Pullen addressed included cutting back on travel expenses, rescinding former administrator's salary stipends and having teachers teach a minimum of four periods a day.

During the review for the 2004-2005 CCCCSD Financial Budget, the board discussed doing away with the \$250 stipend teachers are paid if they don't use their local sick leave days.

There hasn't been much paid on the stipend, and when it was put in two years ago it wasn't as an incentive, said Tom Anderson, board president.

"If it would have worked, it would have worked the first year we did it." Anderson said.

"The more fat we leave in the budget, the more fat that is spent," added Trustee Dr. Marcus Sims.



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
