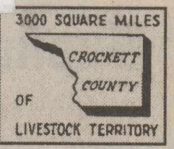

## Commissioners agree to Shannon contract

After months of studying, figuring out numbers and seeking answers to complicated questions, the Crockett County Care Center, Health and Emergency Services Board of Directors recommended to the Crockett County Commissioners to go with a five-year contract with Shannon Medical Center.

The contract, however, comes with a price tag of \$673,475 additional funds in order to keep all areas of the Family Health Center of Ozona open.

The commissioners unanimously approved the contract at their monthly meeting Monday.

"Our goal in going through all this was to see if Shannon was giving us the right information," said Health Board President Jim Skehan. "The number they (Shannon) were originally asking for was in line."

For the next five years, the county will subsidize the clinic with Shannon with an interest rate between 3-5 percent, not to exceed five, said Linda Knightstep R.N. and director for outreach services for Shannon.

Without the additional subsidy, Shannon said it would pay enough to maintain the clinic as

a doctor's office, meaning there would be less staff, no x-ray, lab or anything after hours including an emergency room.

"We need an after hours clinic. We do we do if we don't have it? We don't want to find out," said Health Board Member Concha Zapata.

The health board has been researching the facts and figures about keeping the after hours clinic for several months. The board hired consultants to look at the finances of the clinic, in which the consultants found ways the clinic could increase revenue.

"We wouldn't be doing our job if we didn't do our homework," said board member John L. Henderson. "I'm out for the taxpayer, our community, my community and that's the bottom line. I know how our community feels about our doctor, and we're going to support him 100 percent."

Dan Stultz, CEO of Shannon, said that if the board implements these new methods and the revenue increases then the amount of the county subsidy could decrease.

If there is a profit made, Shannon will keep 30 percent and the county will receive 70 percent.

Knightstep said that the current fee schedules at the clinic have been increased.

"This is an opportunity, not a

loss," Stultz said. "We're assuming that things are not going to improve financially."

The contract will go into affect immediately. After 30 days if the county is not satisfied with the contract, then they can revisit the agreement.

The commissioners also did not approve the request of a water station on county property from the Crockett County Water District #1.

Also during the commissioners meeting, seventh-grader Taylor Newton spoke about a cellular phone recycling fund-raiser project the Crockett County 4-H Club is working on. Used phones can be dropped off at the Crockett County Extension Office. Money from the project will go toward community service projects such as the annual "Angel Tree."

The commissioners also approved:

- A request from the Iraan Economic Development Corporation to develop the Camp Melvin site in Crockett County.

- A resolution regarding unfunded mandates for the Texas Association of Counties.

- A plat amendment for High Lonesome Ranch.

- Doing away with the Accredited Review Board.

- Dec. 9 for the employee appreciation luncheon.

## Fort Lancaster Living History Event Saturday

Fort Lancaster will host its annual Living History Event this weekend at the fort located eight miles east of Sheffield on U.S. Highway 290.

Those traveling by Interstate-10 can take exit 343 and follow U.S. 290 to the park.

The event will be from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Saturday and will include history reenactors, infantry, cavalry, artillery, Texas Buffalo Soldiers, Texas Camel Corps and frontier ladies portraying frontier life.

The fort was originally established as Camp Lancaster on Aug.

20, 1855, and it was strategically located on the military road between San Antonio and El Paso, near an important river crossing which an early surveyor called Indian Ford. Fort Lancaster was one of four posts established to protect the route.

The post was garrisoned by Companies H and K of the 1st Infantry, under the commands of Capt. Stephen D. Carpenter and Capt. Robert S. Granger. In 1859, Carpenter and Company H left to establish Fort Stockton. At the height of its development, Fort Lancaster held 25 permanent

buildings, with an average of 72 men and four officers.

The fort disbanded during the Civil War on March 19, 1861 when Texas joined the Confederacy. The garrison marched to San Antonio to surrender.

The 82-acre park is preserved through the Texas Parks and Wildlife. It was originally donated to the county by the Meadows and Benckenstein families.

The fort is always looking for members to join its garrison.

The luck of the draw left the Ozona Lions standing in the rain with a second district loss and the Sonora Broncos with another victory Friday night.

The 7-14 win was one that didn't come easy as both teams suffered penalties and turnovers throughout the night.

"We played our guts out in this game," said Coach Jeff Streun. "We really were proud of their efforts. We had our chances and this time we didn't convert on some critical plays near their goal line. We had some questionable calls go against us and that really took some of our momentum away from our kids. Our kids were ready to play and come up a little bit short on the scoreboard."

Ozona's bad luck would start early in the game after Toby Pagan ran for a 60-yard touchdown two minutes in. A clipping penalty on the Lions would force it back, giving the Lions another chance to score from the Sonora 10-yard line.

So far this year, West Texas weather has been a bit of a puzzle.

To those of us who have lived in West Texas most of our lives, we know the basic seasons are usually freezing cold and scorching hot with a little bit of moisture mixed in.

This year, however, our winter was cold but not always freezing. During the summer, we missed those long, consecutive days of 100-degree days or more. I take that back, we didn't miss that we just enjoyed the mild summer weather.

## Bad drivers to pay more for violations

**AUSTIN** — Bad drivers are in for their own form of October surprise.

The law's been on the books for more than a year, but Texas drivers with certain violations on their driving record are beginning to find that their actions were more expensive than they thought.

Under the driver responsibility program administered by the Department of Public Safety, motorists convicted of speeding or more serious charges such as driving while intoxicated, are going to have to pay the state fees or surcharges. If they don't pay, their driver licenses will be revoked.

The DPS had to hire an outside vendor to handle the program, but during October and November, roughly 5,000 bad news letters a day will be mailed to drivers with moving violations or DWI offenses on their record.

The costs range from \$100 for someone who accumulates six points for misdemeanor traffic violations during a three-year period to \$1,500 a year for three years (or \$4,500 total) for a second offense DWI conviction.

The only good news from the violator's standpoint is that the vendor, Municipal Service Bureau, will be able to arrange monthly payments. The money will go to fund hospital trauma centers, emergency medical centers and the Texas Mobility Fund.

**Early voting starts Oct. 18...**  
Texas' election law says early voting begins on the 17th day before an election and must end on the fourth day before. With the general election Nov. 2, early voting begins Oct. 18 and continues through Oct. 29.

You don't have to offer any excuse to vote early, just go to

wherever local election officials have set up as the place for early voting.

Check your county clerk's office for locations.

To vote by mail, a registered voter still must declare a reason why he or she can't cast a ballot the traditional way on election day.

### Dove hunter numbers...

Dove season continues for another couple of weeks (to Nov. 10 in the South Zone), though sunset is coming earlier each evening as fall gets into stride.

South Texas game warden Mike Bradshaw of Carrizo Springs says the season in his part of the state, which began in mid-September, has been OK though birds don't seem to stay in one particular area very long.

There are still more dove than hunters with some 392,000 seasonal shotguns having reported to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department that they bagged dove last year.

Speaking of numbers, Bradshaw says some conservationists are pondering what effect returning to half-day hunts would have. (Once upon a time, dove hunting did not start until noon each day.)

Despite the best efforts of Bradshaw and other game wardens, some hunters use a full day of hunting to illegally take one limit in a morning hunt and another in an afternoon hunt. But the limit per day is only 12 birds (15 in the North Zone), not 24.

### Check smoke detectors...

October is Fire Prevention Month and fire safety experts are urging homeowners to make sure their smoke detectors are working.

Officials recommend testing smoke detectors once a month and replacing batteries at least once a year.

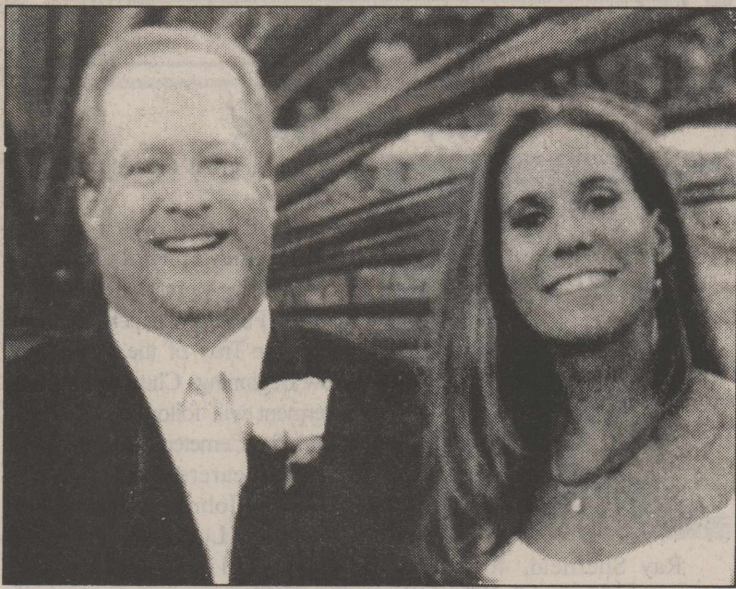

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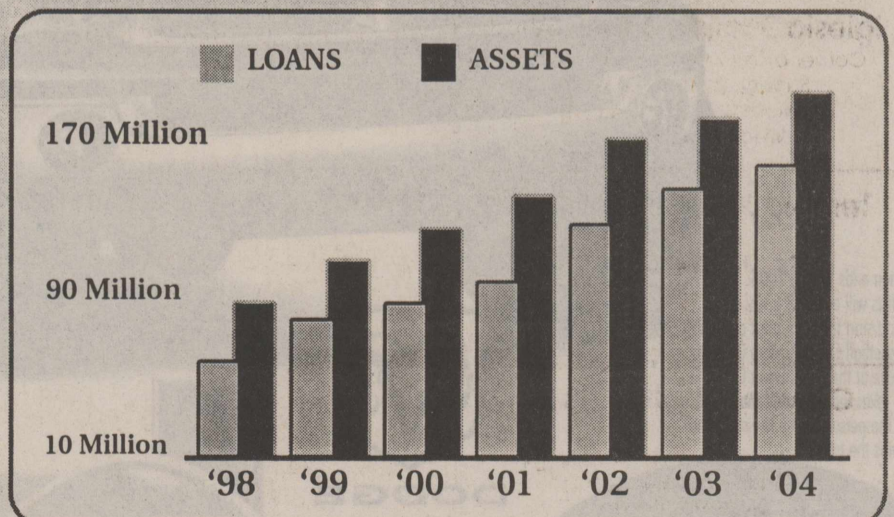

Election Law Opinion DAD-56  
Re: Whether variations in the manner of writing in a candidate's name or a misspelling of either a given name or surname determine whether a write-in vote is counted.  
There are no provisions in the Election Code expressly prohibiting the counting of a vote cast for a qualified write-in candidate because the voter misspells or writes in a variation of the candidate's name. Therefore, a write-in vote must be counted if the voter's intent can be determined. Variations in the manner of writing the candidate's given name or initials, or a misspelling of either a given name or surname, does not invalidate the ballot where it is evident that the voter intended to vote for a particular candidate. However, if the variation is so great that any reasonable doubt of identity might arise, the vote should not be counted.  
SUMMARY  
It is not necessary that a write-in vote be written in on the ballot exactly as it appears on the list of qualified write-in candidates.  
A vote for a write-in candidate must be counted if it is clear that the voter intended to vote for that candidate.

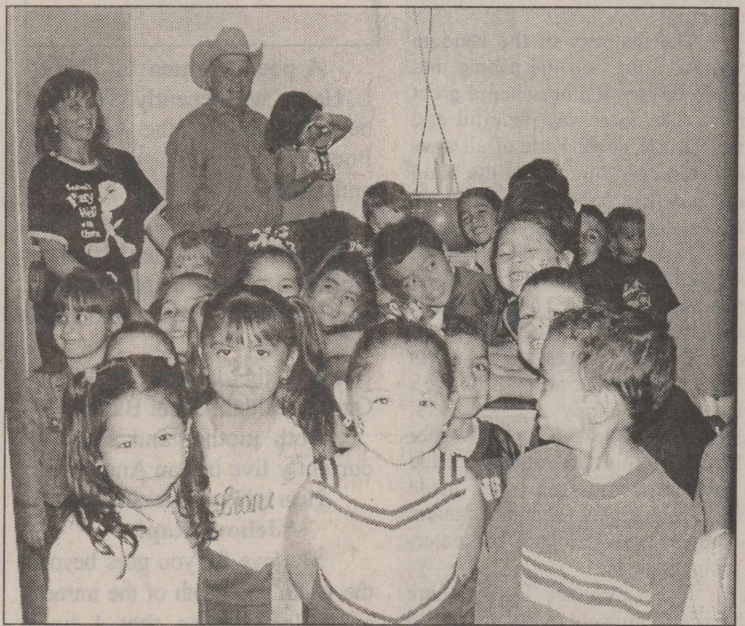

# JV Lions come from behind to defeat Sonora

The JV Lions handed the Sonora Broncos their first defeat of the season Thursday night with a 31-18 victory.

"This was an outstanding effort by these guys. Sonora was undefeated this year," said Coach Lynn Searsey. "Despite falling behind early in the game, our guys battled back and took control of the game."

Sonora would drive the ball 46 yards to the Ozona 29-yard line on their first possession during the first quarter, but the Lions defense would hold them from the goal line.

"There was some good blocking here by Jakob Moran and Derek Fierro," Searsey said.

The Broncos would roar back on their next possession in the second quarter. They would score on

a 35-yard run to increase their lead to 7-18.

Ozونا would be forced to punt on their next possession and Sonora would regain the ball.

The Broncos move the ball to the Ozona 30-yard line. Sonora's quarterback would pass to the end zone, but Maldonado would intercept the ball in the end zone.

"Our linemen did a good job blocking," Searsey said. "There was good blocking by Silva, Alex Ochoa and Stevie Vargas."

Sonora would score again on their next possession with 1:49 left in the game. The two-point conversion was good to put the Broncos up 0-14.

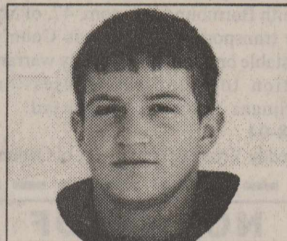
