Election Law Opinion DAD-56 Re: Whether variations in the manner of writing in a candidate's name or a misspelling of either a given name or surname determine whether a write-in vote is counted.

There are no provisions in the Election Code expressly prohibiting the counting of a vote cast for a qualified write-in candidate because the voter misspells or writes in a variation of the candidate's name. Therefore, a write-in vote must be counted if the voter's intent can be determined. Variations in the manner of writing the candidate's given name or initials, or a misspelling of either a given name or surname, does not invalidate the ballot where it is evident that the voter intended to vote for a particular candidate. However, if the variation is so great that any reasonable doubt of identity might arise, the vote should not be counted. SUMMARY

It is not necessary that a write-in vote be written in on the ballot exactly as it appears on the list of qualified write-in candidates.

A vote for a write-in candidate must be counted if it is clear that the voter intended to vote for theat candidate.
