



### Commissioners approve fire equipment

The Crockett County Commissioners Court approved \$50,935 bid from Ferrera Fire Appliance for new protective equipment for the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department Monday at their monthly meeting.

Fire Chief Bob Falkner said the equipment includes personal protective equipment for the volunteer firefighters.

Freddie Nicks was presented a plaque for his 12 years of service as a commissioner. Randy Branch was elected in November as the new commissioner of Precinct 3 and he will be sworn-in in January.

Care Center Administrator Benny Gibbs said the new call light system has been installed and functioning properly.

To date, an in addition to the grant from Abell-Hanger, the Care Center has been able to raise 61 percent of the balanced owed toward the system, which is about \$13,500, Gibbs said. Total amount is \$21,995 for the system.

Gibbs said he is looking into other foundations for grants to help with the rest of the amount.

Librarian Louise Ledoux said the library will receive the Lone Star Libraries grant in January for \$2,108. This money will go towards updating three public and one staff computers.







Texas has signed reciprocal Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, agreements with Georgia and North Carolina, Oklahoma, Montana, allowing citizens with concealed handgun licenses issued by those states to legally carry concealed handguns in Texas, and vice versa.


Gov. Rick Perry signed the reciprocity agreements last week with Georgia and Montana, allowing licensees to visit Texas with their concealed handguns.

"These agreements allow licensed Texans to enjoy the same or similar privileges their licenses give them at home," said DPS Director Thomas Davis Jr.

With the addition of Georgia and Montana, Texas currently has reciprocity agreements with 14 states. (These agreements were made possible by 1997 and 2003 changes to the Texas concealed handgun law.) Texas also has recagreements with iprocity Arkansas, Arizona, Florida, Idaho,





But not a farmer depending on water for his livelihood. #### Audit assesses state workforce...

A report just released by the State Auditor's Office shows the average state worker earns \$32,681 a year. The report says state pay lags significantly behind the private sector and even other state governments.

Turnover rate is 15 percent, with workers younger than 30 leaving at a 30 percent rate.

Older employees tend to stay on because they are nearer retirement. In fact, the report said, employees approaching retirement age are the majority at most state agencies.

The good news for the 142,394 state workers across the state is that Sen. Todd Staples (R-Palestine) has filed a bill for an across-the-board pay raise.

Finance Committee chairman Sen. Steve Ogden (R-Bryan) also has said he supports more money for state employees, who have not had a pay hike since 2001.






