Then there is the Bank room it is entirely furnished with old bank furniture from the first bank


It is wonderful; it has the feel of a real bank.



January is **School Board** Recognition Month









Parents/adult guardians are primarily responsible and should be aware of the dangers of allowing a juvenile to operate a scooter, moped, miniature cycle in areas or under conditions where a larger motor vehicle operator will not be able to see.




