
The students did a great job according to the district's board of







Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Texas announced that farmers and ranchers wishing to be considered for 2005 funding in the **Environmental Quality Incentives** Program (EQIP) should make sure they sign up by the close of business Friday, March 18.

EQIP was reauthorized in the 2002 Farm Bill to provide a voluntary conservation program for farmers and ranchers that promotes agricultural production and environmental quality as compatible national goals.

EQIP offers financial and technical help to assist eligible participants install or implement structural and/or management practices on eligible agricultural

In 2005 Texas will receive about \$64 million in EQIP financial assistance funds and approximately \$5.5 million in Ground and Surface Water EQIP funds.

"The funds will help farm-

TEMPLE - The USDA- ers and ranchers improve the natural resources on private working lands in Texas," said Dr. Larry Butler, Texas NRCS State Conservationist. "They will be used to solve locally identified resource problems in each county and will also fund special statewide concerns recommended by the Texas State Technical Committee such as water quantity, water and air quality, wildlife habitat, and treatment of invasive species. This program offers cost share and incentives payments to producers applying approved con-

> servation measures. "Using national and state EQIP priorities, counties working through a Local Work Group chaired by the local Soil and Water Conservation District recommended local resource concerns to be addressed, eligible practices, and cost-share rates and/or incentive payments. This group also recommended costshare rates for beginning farmers," Butler said. "In 2005, pro-





Following the last session, the State Library had to cancel various periodical subscriptions and make other cutbacks. The budget the library has submitted for the next two fiscal years reflects the Legislative Budget Board's request that agencies base their budgets on 95 percent of their current appropriation.

The TLA will be pushing of the library's budget requests, plus "exceptional items" above the base amount. That would include funding to remodel the 1961 Lorenzo de Zavala Building that houses the library.

Kay Bailey Hutchison if she takes on Gov. Rick Perry, Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn and possibly the Kinkster.

#### Hazardous outlook for TV weather people...

Is the person on TV telling you whether it will rain tomorrow really a meteorologist?

Or are they just dramatizing the National Weather Service's forecast?

Rep. Vicki Truitt (R-Keller) wants you to know for sure. Along with her umbrella, she's carrying House Bill 577, a measure that would make it a Class C misdemeanor for a broadcast personality to represent himself as a meteorologist without having a meteorology degree.

Turns out that being a member of the American Meteorological Society, the current national standard that is frequently seen hyped on TV weather casts, does not necessarily mean a person is a real meteorologist. The membership does mean the person has had special training, but not always a four-year degree in meteorology.

Rep. Truitt fears that inadequate training could result in inaccurate forecasts, creating a downpour of public safety

The bill has already spawned a storm of protest among TV types who may have degrees in other disciplines, but not in meteorology.






all parents should know about the correct way to use child restraints. TAKE A BACK SEAT - It's the safest place in a crash, and if

your car has a passenger air bag, it is essential that children

under 12 ride in the back **DO AN ABOUT FACE** - Babies up to one year (up to 20 lbs) should ride in a car seat facing the rear, in the back seat. Children

over one year of age may ride facing forwards. KEEP A TIGHT REIN - When installing a car seat, make sure your car's safety belt stays tight around the safety seat. Harness straps go over the child's shoulder and should be adjusted so that you

can slip only one finger underneath the straps at your child's chest. **DON'T SLOUCH ON SAFETY** - Generally, children up to 40 lbs. should remain in a car seat, longer if possible. After that, a booster seat may be used along with the car's safety restraint system. The lap belt should fit tight across the upper thighs, the shoulder belt over the shoulder and across the chest.
