

Trail application nearing completion By SHANNON

A committee representing a twenty-two county area met in Ozona, at the Crockett National Bank, on Tuesday, March 22nd, to review the status of an application to be submitted to the Texas Historical Commission (THC) Texas Heritage Trails Program to activate the Texas Pecos Trail.

Various sections that require specific information divide the application. Each section represents a certain number of points.

For example, the application requires resolutions from each county showing support for its communities' efforts to activate the Texas Pecos Trail. The application must include 75 percent of the regions county resolutions. In addition, support letters from businesses and individuals within each county represent 80 points of the application.

who took the test also in February, 78 percent met the standard in passing and 26 percent received Commended Performance, Holmes said.

The state average released by TEA shows that 89 percent of the 267,009 third-grade students passed the test and 75 percent of the 273,003 fifth-graders passed.

The state average of thirdgraders receiving Commended Performance was 37 percent and 23 percent for fifth-graders.

Students who did not pass will have a chance to retake the test on April 20. Students in both grades must pass the test in order to be promoted to the next

"We have worked out stratgies as we come back and retest in April," Holmes said. "I think it's going to be successful and we are going to get more children successful in April."

Students who do not pass in April will attend summer school for another chance to pass in June, Holmes said.

Sheffield Boot Camp program undergoes analysis by Holland student

Sheffield Boot Camp had a very special visitor last week. Maartje van der Woude, a 24year-old student from the Leiden University, Leiden, Holland, came to examine the boot camp program for inclusion in her thesis for her master's degree in criminal law/criminal justice policies.

Van der Woude spent three days at Sheffield Boot Camp interviewing management personnel, staff and cadets.

Van der Woude is currently a student at the University of Texas at Austin, where she is studying for one semester.

"While I am here in America. I wanted to observe a boot camp, to be in a real boot camp environment. I wanted to see what the foundations of a boot camp are, so that I can bring suggestions and recommendations back to my country," said van der Woude.

Van der Woude was especially interested in the Resocialization Program used at all Texas Youth Commission Facilities. It's a nationally recognized treatment curriculum for youth adjudicated through the court system and assigned to TYC facilities including Sheffield Boot Camp.

"We have nothing like this back in Holland," van der Woude detention facilities, with programs for juveniles with special tailor their education to their needs. I am impressed with the

than my expectations; less harsh." In addition to viewing the workings of the Resocialization Program, van der Woude observed several of the education classes at Sheffield Boot Camp and attended a Sunday morning worship service conducted by some of the facility's volunteers.

Upon completion of her master's degree, van der Woude will begin working on her doctorate in criminal law. She aspires to become a judge, and will begin her internship upon completing her doctoral studies.

Van der Woude, who will be returning to Holland in June, takes back to her homeland a new and positive outlook for the possibilities of the criminal justice system there.





Senate unanimously passes \$139 billion state budget



AUSTIN -Senate has passed a \$139 billion state budget, but as the old saying goes, the devil is in the details.

With its unanimous approval on March 23, the Senate's bill goes to the House, where the numbers are not only different, the arithmetic has been called into question by Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn.

She says House Bill 3 - the tax bill - lacks billions of dollars to create a balanced budget.

House leaders dismissed her comments as political and continued to put together a state revenue and spending plan.

Anti-bullying bill moves quickly...

The day after the March 21 school shooting in Minnesota the Senate passed Senate Bill 152, a measure intended to make Texas schools safer by directing school districts to do more to prevent bullying. Sponsored by Sen. Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo), the bill got a 28-1 approval from lawmakers. The border senator said statistics show that 160,000 children skip school every day for fear of being bullied. Preventing bullying is

important because bullying has been shown to lead to more serious problems, she said.

She cited a study by the National Threat Assessment Center that found that of the 37 school shootings studied, more than two-thirds involved a perpetrator who felt he had been bullied or otherwise picked on or threatened at school.

Nine high...

A nine-high's not a bad lowball poker hand, and that seems to be the winning number among the dozen or more gambling bills filed this session.

House Bill 9, filed by Rep. Kino Flores (D-Palmview), recently gained some Republican coauthors, including Rep. Jim Pitts of Waxahachie, chairman of the

House Appropriations Committee. Even if the bill passes, voters will get the final say on whether to expand legalized gambling in Texas.

GLO's Scrap File digitized...

The General Land Office's 'Scrap File" doesn't sound particularly interesting, but the plain title belies its historic significance. The file, an early-day catch-all for land-related records, contains original surveys, survey field notes and various other land documents of high interest to a large but diverse group ranging from title companies to genealogists.

Some of the records go back to Spanish colonial times.

The documents in the Scrap File have now been scanned and made available on the Internet as part of the GLO's land grant database. To search the newly-digitized Scrap File, go to www.glo.state.tx.us/archives.html.

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Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson has said his goal is to get all of the archival material in the GLO's possession online. To date, the GLO has 45,000 maps and documents digitized.

Shrimply delicious...

The Texas Department of Agriculture is dragging its nets for the best shrimp recipe in the state. Texans have until May 1 to submit their most flavorful shrimp recipe, be it salad, soup, stir-fried or whatever. The only catch is that the recipe must have as its primary ingredient Texas-caught or Texasproduced shrimp.

According to TDA, Texas produces about a third of the annual Gulf shrimp catch and is the nation's top producer of farm-raised shrimp. For details on the contest visit the TDA Web site at www.agr.state.tx.us.




