Summer food safety: a checklist

The temperature is quickly approaching 100 degrees. Lawn chairs, visors and beach towels are in high demand at the local grocery store and the neighborhood kids are out of school. All these things could mean just one thing: Summer is here!

Many of you have already fired up the grill. And others of you are in the process of digging through the garage, trying to find the picnic basket. I will admit that I spent some time this weekend looking for my favorite barbecue recipe. If there's one thing I love about summer, it's the joy of outdoor eating. Barbecue just somehow tastes better in the heat of June.

But as you're making that grocery list for the picnic or scheduling some activities for ball field, I hope you'll add food safety to your checklist. Just because the eating has moved outdoors doesn't mean that we can skip food safety.

Many of us forget that food-borne illnesses increase in the summer months. Bacteria are always present in our environment. They're in our soil, air, water, and the bodies of people and animals. But these micro-organisms grow faster in the warm summer months. Given the right circumstances, harmful bacteria can quickly multiply to large numbers. When this happens, someone eating the food can get sick. That's exactly why we need to take extra precautions this time of year.

As Chairman of the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee, I work closely with the Food and Drug Administration. Each summer, the FDA provides the nation with food safety tips. We use these tips everyday in our house. They're as simple as only packing what you intend to eat.

These tips are easy and will become second nature before you know it. I encourage each of you to clip out this column, stick it on the refrigerator and use it as a reference. Summer's about having fun and enjoying the outdoors. By following these simple tips, we can keep it that way.

KEEP YOUR HANDS CLEAN: Wash your hands with hot, soapy water before handling food and after changing diapers and handling pets.

PLAN AHEAD: When eating away from home, find out if there's a source of clean water. If not, bring water for preparation and cleaning. Or pack clean, wet, disposable cloths or moist towels and paper towels for cleaning hands and surfaces.

MARINATE AND REFRIGERATE: Always marinate

food in the refrigerator, not on the counter. If some of the marinade is used as a sauce on the cooked food, reserve a portion of the marinade. Don't reuse the marinade used on raw meat or poultry unless it's boiled first to destroy any bacteria.

DON'T CROSS-CONTAMINATE: When packing a cooler for an outing, wrap raw meat and poultry securely to prevent juices from coming into contact with ready to eat food. Wash plates, utensils and cutting boards that held the raw meat or poultry before using again for cooked food. Carry a clean plate out to the grill to hold the safely cooked food.

KEEP COLD FOOD COLD: Cold perishable food like luncheon meats, cooked meats, chicken and potato or pasta salads should be kept in an insulated cooler packed with several inches of ice, frozen gel packs or containers of frozen water.

WATCH THE TEMPERATURE: When cooking outside, take your thermometer along. Meat and poultry cooked on a grill often browns very fast on the outside, so be sure that they are cooked thoroughly. Check them with a food thermometer.

COOK IT COMPLETELY: Cook hamburger and other ground meats (veal, lamb and pork) to an internal temperature of 160-degrees and ground poultry to 165-degrees. Beef, veal and lamb steaks, and roasts may be cooked to 145-degrees for medium rare. Whole poultry should be cooked to 180-degrees as measured in the thigh; breast meat to 170-degrees. All cuts of pork should reach 160-degrees.

TRAVEL WISELY: When taking food with you on an outing, keep the cooler in the coolest part of the car. Place it in the shade or shelter and out of the sun whenever possible. Chill cold drinks in a separate cooler to avoid constantly opening the one containing perishable foods. Preserve the cold temperature of the cooler by replenishing the ice as soon as it starts melting.

FOLLOW-THROUGH: After your outing, move food immediately into refrigeration. Bacteria multiply rapidly between 40 and 140 degrees. Never leave food in this "danger zone" more than two hours.

I hope these tips prove handy this summer.

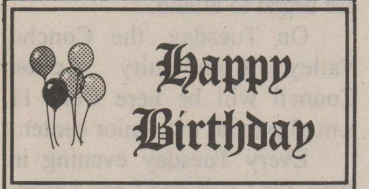

Wool houses report 'clean and pretty' product for latest sale

Both Ozona wool houses hosted a wool sale on May 20.

Donnie Laughlin, manager of Wool Growers, said this year's wool was some of the "cleanest and prettiest" Crockett County has ever had.

"The rain and green conditions really brought out some of the whitest and brightest wool

we've ever seen," Laughlin said.

Despite the quality, most of the wool prices were less than last year due to a lower demand in the wool market this year, Laughlin said.

Wool Growers offered 400,000 pounds. They had 300,000 pounds of 12-month fine wool bringing \$.52-\$1.46 1/2.

Short wool brought in \$.80-\$1.05.

Most wool averaged \$.05-\$0.15 a pound, and the short wool was \$.10 a pound less than it was a year ago, Laughlin said.

At Ozona Wool and Mohair, Staple Wool was \$1.25-\$0.90 a pound.

Short wool was \$1.01-\$0.84. Clothing wool averaged \$.93 a pound.

"The sale went good and I thought it was successful," said manager Judy Churchill.

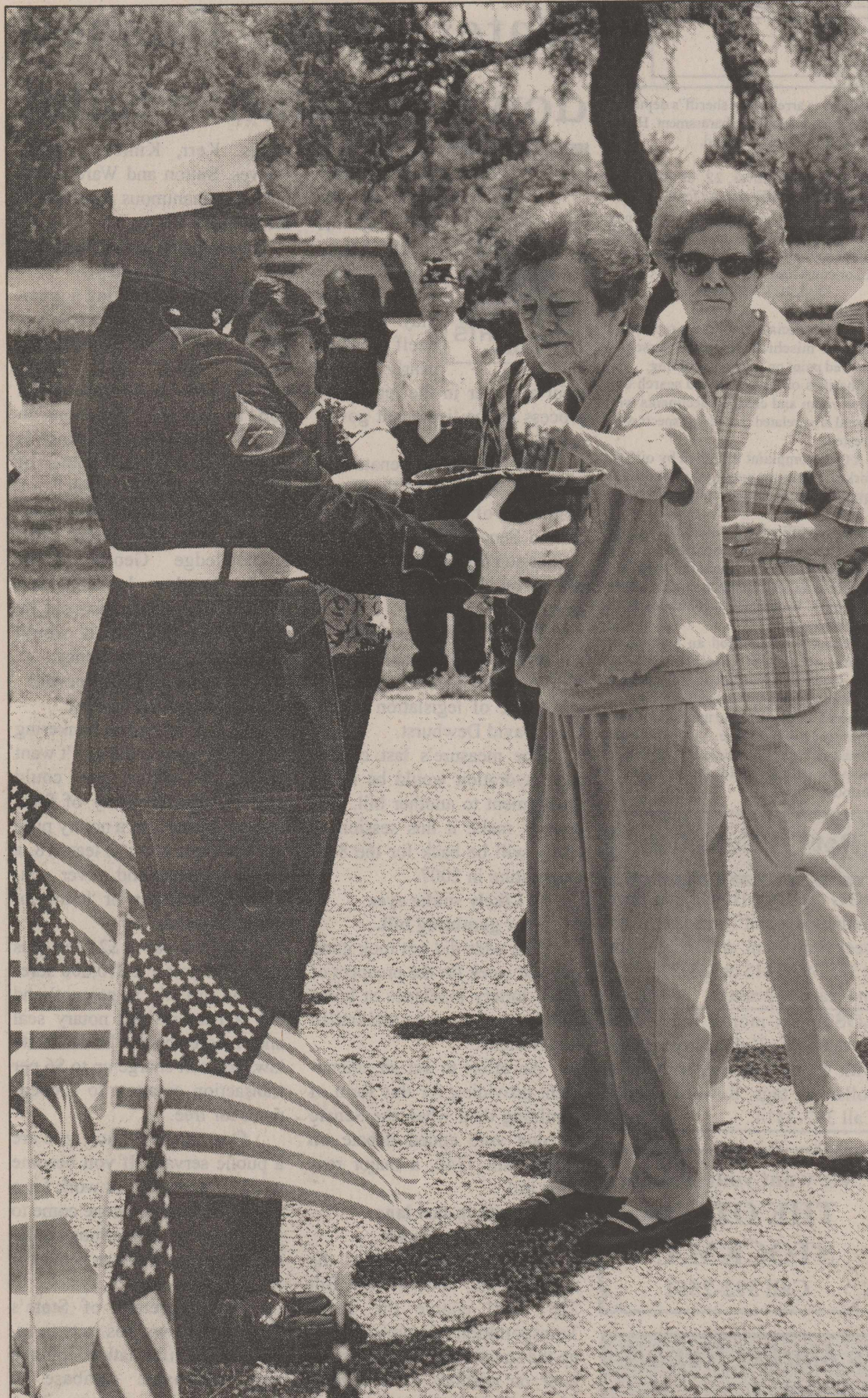

New study to focus on Pecos River

FORT STOCKTON - Texas Cooperative Extension wants your opinion of the Pecos River's current condition.

Will Hatler, Extension assistant and project coordinator at Fort Stockton, said an online survey at <http://pecosbasin.tamu.edu> being offered through July 1 will give people a chance to comment on watershed management issues, invasive species and the river's ecosystem.

"We invite anyone with an interest in the future of the Pecos River to participate," Hatler said. "The survey only takes a couple of minutes and is strictly confidential. The information will help us develop and evaluate an educational curriculum specifically tailored to the Pecos River Basin Assessment Program."

Key counties involved in the project are Crane, Crockett, Culberson, Loving, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward and Val Verde.

Hatler said the program's

focus is the Pecos River Basin from Red Bluff Lake to Lake Amistad where the Pecos and Rio Grande rivers meet.

"The Pecos River flows 418 winding miles through the hot, dry landscapes of far West Texas," Hatler said. "It is the largest river sub-basin flowing into the Rio Grande River in Texas. As such, its importance - historically, biologically, hydrologically and economically to the future of the entire Pecos River Basin and the Rio Grande is huge."

Hatler described the Pecos River Basin Assessment Program as having four objectives. The first is to make an assessment of the physical features of the river basin.

The second objective is to provide educational programming to landowners and other stakeholders. This will include meetings, a series of publications and the development of a Web site for the dissemination of program findings and accom-

plishments.

The third objective is the development of a monitoring program so water quality and quantity can be monitored into the future. This will help assess the effectiveness of the Watershed Management Plan being developed as the fourth objective. This watershed management plan will cover the entire Texas portion of the Pecos River Basin.

The Pecos River Basin Assessment Program is a collaborative effort of Extension, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the Texas Water Resource Institute and the U.S. International Boundary Water Commission Texas Clean Rivers Program. Funding for the project was provided by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board through the Environmental Protection Agency Clean Water Act Section 319 program.

Water bill flushed down legislative toilet



AUSTIN -- With every tick of the clock as the Legislature moved toward adjournment May 30, time itself became nearly as powerful a player in the legislative process as the lieutenant governor or speaker.

The fact that all Senate bills had to be voted out of the House by the end of the day on May 24 caused Senate Bill 3, Sen. Ken Armbrister's (D-Victoria) water bill to go down the legislative drain.

Though earlier "purified" of any user tax provision, the water bill had been deemed an important piece of legislation by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst.

The measure's last chance at re-hydration would be as an amendment to another bill. If it doesn't make it this session, it likely will be back for the 80th Legislature in 2007.

Likely snake eyes for gambling bill...

The odds did not look good late last week for the prospect of video lottery machines at horse and dog racing tracks and Indian reservations.

An effort to get an amendment providing for this form of gambling died when the Senate by one vote ended debate on House Bill 3540, a major revenue bill.

Life in fast lane for West Texas...

If the governor signs the measure into law, House Bill 2257 will enable the Texas Transportation Commission to up the speed limit to 80 miles an hour on portions of Interstates 10 and 20 in far West Texas.

The bill, which takes into account that there are more lonely miles than traffic in Crockett, Culberson, Hudspeth, Jeff

Lawmakers proud Texas is Bush country...

Another bill getting a green flag in the Senate last week was House Bill 137, a measure that would have the Texas Department of Transportation add to its 66 "Welcome to Texas" signs that Texas is "proud to be the home of President George W. Bush."

A House amendment mandating that the signs also acknowledge George H.W. Bush, Lyndon Johnson and Dwight Eisenhower was cut by the Senate because it would have cost a lot more money.

Want to be a public servant without the hassle?

If you've had a hankering for public service but don't want to run for office, you could apply to the Secretary of State for appointment as a notary public. You have to be at least 18, a Texas resident, and never convicted of a felony or "crime of moral turpitude."

Oh, and pay a \$21 fee plus the premium for a \$10,000 surety bond (usually 10 percent) and buy a personalized notary seal and record book. Under state law, you can charge up to \$6 per transaction or attest to a document for free.

One catch: By law, you are a public servant. If you become a notary because you work for a lawyer, should someone come to you needing something notarized, you can't refuse -- even if it's not work-related.

The Secretary of State's Web site, www.sos.state.tx.us, has more information, plus a new searchable database to determine if someone is a licensed notary and where they are located. (Travis County, for instance, already has 999 notary publics.)

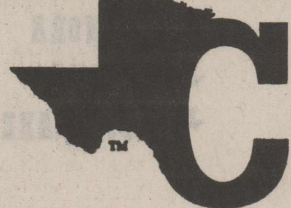

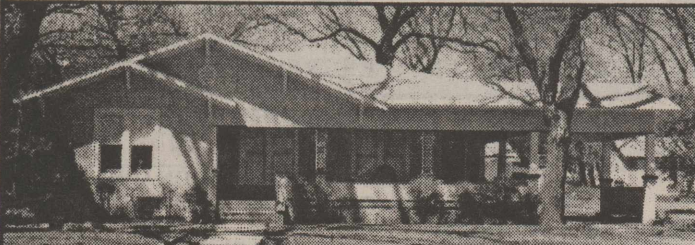
