Ozona National Bank officially turns 100

Business was first organized in the rear of a drugstore building

The year was 1905. In Ozona, Texas there existed a meat market, two weekly newspapers, two blacksmiths, two barbers, three churches, two lawyers and one pool hall.

In the back of Smith Drugstore, a group of ranch and businessmen decided that it was time Ozona added a bank to the line of businesses in the growing West Texas town.

On June 1, 1905, Ozona National Bank opened for business in the rear of that drugstore taking in \$12,847.85 in the first days' business.

Today, that number had grown to more than \$124,000,000.

In its 100 years of business, the bank has seen many changes in technology and expansion into three additional branches.

A year after the bank was formed, a new structure by architect Oscar Ruffini was erected.

The building was recorded as a Texas Historic Landmark in 1966. It still stands today next door to Westerman Drug and

houses accountants Sandy Stokes, Burl Myers and their employees.

The ONB that many have come to know was completed in January of 1968.

Throughout its history, ONB has seen its share of tragedies.

When the rains came on June 28, 1954, the entire town of Ozona found itself under water.

At least 15 people were killed in the flood and more than 300 homes, 43 businesses and numerous cars and trucks were destroyed.

Like so many other organizations, ONB was there to help the people of Ozona.

However, months prior to the flood, the bank experience its most noted piece of history.

On March 16, 1954, two Junction men robbed ONB at gunpoint.

One of the robbers announced "This is a stick-up," according to a March 28, 1990 article written by Charles Wood in The Ozona Stockman.

As one man kept the gun pointed on the employees and customers, the other grabbed \$10,800 for the tellers' windows.

In the past three fund-raisers, the center has raised \$14,000, Gibbs said. Money from those events have gone to helping residents with medical bills and clothing that needed it.

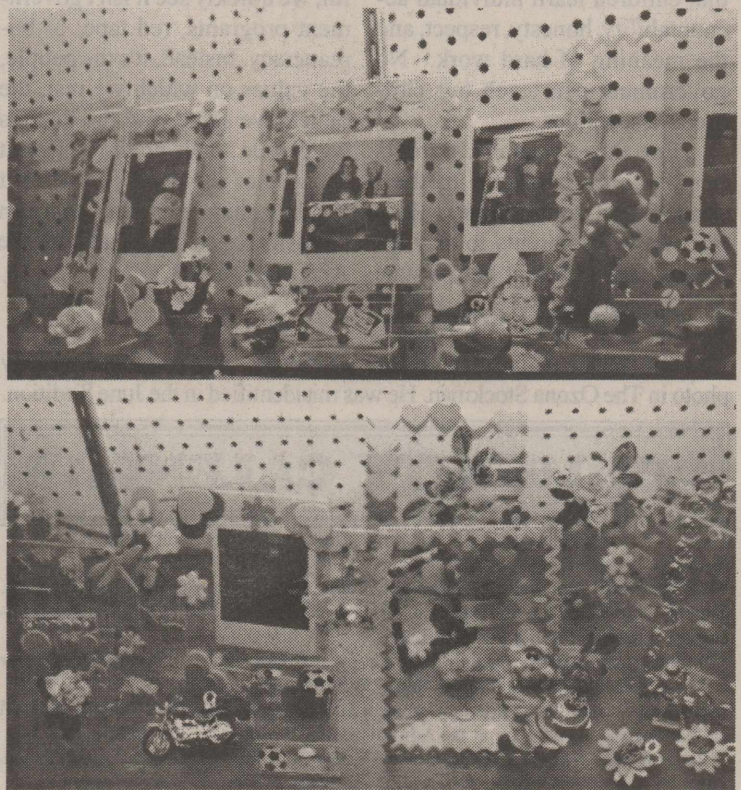
This year, the goal is to renovate the main lobby and patio area.

For My Part

I read that if you paid \$25,000 for a new car, totaled it and wanted to rebuild the car with all new parts ordered from the dealer, the bill would come to \$125,000.

I'm pretty sure that figure doesn't include UPS charges either.

Any farm or ranch wife who has ever been sent to town to be defrauded by a de parts department will sympathize with my plight. I went to buy a new battery for my watch and the battery cost more than I paid for the watch. I also felt part-ly fleeced by a catalog con man who informed me that to get the four bushings I needed for my sheep shearing rig I would have to buy two packages of three each and pay for two bushings I didn't want.

A new clamp ring for my garbage disposal will cost more than a forty pound Duroc and the hog, I'm sure, would do a much better job of getting rid of the garbage. A water pump stopped working so I called the Parts and Service department where I trade and they said a rep would drop by, take a look and order the parts I needed. They charged me \$250 for a service call to tell me the parts I needed were out of stock. I could have used less service and more parts.

Recently I called a firm to order a toner cartridge for my laser printer. "That will be \$105," said the order taker.

"You don't understand, I said, "I don't want a new printer, just the toner."

She replied, "It would actually be cheaper for you to buy a new printer, complete with a new toner cartridge, than it would be to buy a new recycled cartridge."

The same thing happened when I went to get my boots re-soled. I love Justin Ropers and have worn them for decades. The same pair actually. Because my wheels are out of balance and I run on my rims, I always wear down one side of my soles and heels. So I took them to the boot shop to get them fixed. "We can resole your boots and put new heels on them," said the salesman, "but for three dollars less you can buy a NEW pair."

They don't make cars like

they "auto" any more either. The cupholder in my truck didn't work because she said she was tired of holding my ice tea, so I went to an auto parts store to buy one and while I was there I ordered a windshield washer pump. "What can we do you out of," said the spark plug of a clerk who greeted me.

"I need a windshield washer pump for a 1985 Chevy truck," I said.

He played with his computer and said, "Out of stock but we can order you one."

A month later I got a "certified pre-owned" pump that cost more than the blue book on my truck. And the "new" used one wasn't any better than my old used one.

I had to pay a "disposal fee" to get rid of my old computer and then paid \$125 for a part so that my new computer would do the same things that my old one did. I'm sure they "recycled" the "new" part from my old computer that I paid them to recycle.

Tired of pushing my supposedly "self-propelled" lawn mower, I went to the parts department of a chain store I won't embarrass by naming. The Sears clerk, with not nearly the IQ of the part I needed, told me the little doohickey that would make my mower go on its own cost \$27 plus shipping!

Fully expecting to walk out the front door with the money, then Deputy Billy Mills met them outside with a sub-machine gun. The robbers dropped the money bag and fled on foot.

Byron Williams and Dick Henderson caught the suspects in the draw, behind the D.C. Ratliff home, Wood's article states.

Billy Bruce and Henry L. Smith, both 21, were tried in Rankin and each sentenced to five years.

"They realized they'd flubbed up," Mills stated in Wood's article. "They had just been riding around in Junction drinking a few beers, and got to talking about how they'd heard there was a lot of money in Ozona and how there ought to be quite a bit of money in the bank."

After the two men were released from prison, they called Mills and asked him to breakfast, Wood's article stated. The three of them went out and drank a cup of coffee together.

In 1990, ONB decided to expand its business by purchasing a branch in Wimberley. The San Marcos branch was added in 1999 and the San Antonio LPO opened in 2001.

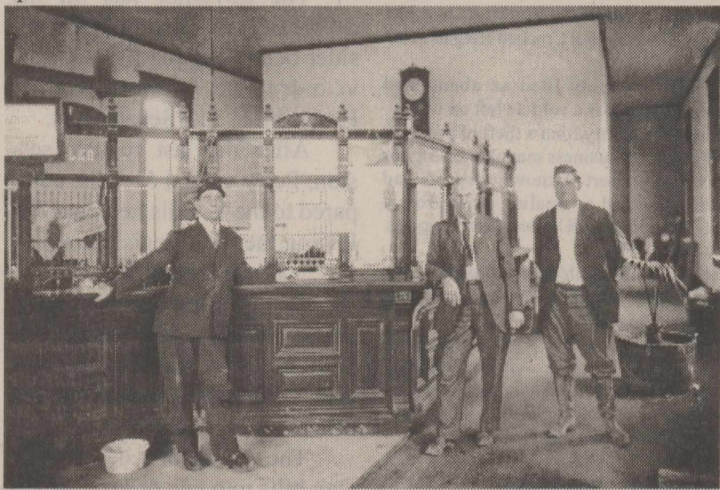

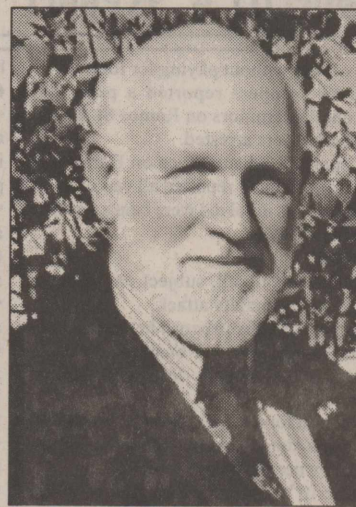

Bandera man announces candidacy for state senate

Vowing to give the voters a choice in 2006, Darrel Brown of Bandera County launched his campaign for Texas Senate, District 19, at the Fool Moon Café in Bandera on June 1.

Brown announced to his friends and supporters his intention to seek the Republican Party nomination for the Texas Senate seat in 2006.

Senate District 19 is the largest district in Texas, extending from San Antonio to El Paso to Eagle Pass, including Crockett County.

Incumbent for District 19 is Senator Frank Madla, D-San Antonio.

A resident of Texas since 1971 and of Bandera County since 2001, Brown brings four decades of real world experience in solving problems to the constituents of the district, according to a press release from Brown's campaign officials.

Beholden to no special interests, he intends to fight for what is best for Texas and to represent the best interests of one of the most diverse senatorial districts in the state, the release stated.

"Senate District 19 is

plagued with high illiteracy rates, nearly one in four adults is functionally illiterate. We are also home to some of the most blatant poverty, both urban and rural, in the state. We have problems caused by unplanned growth, a stagnant economy in the oil patch, depressed farm prices and generations of illiteracy. But we still have hope," Brown said in the release. "It is time for a change. It is time to set an example for our children. It is time to give the voters of Senate District 19 a choice."

He previously ran for office in 1998 when he sought the GOP nomination for Hays County Judge.

Starting his career without a college degree, he advanced in the heavy and highway construction industry from a surveyor's helper to upper management. His resume includes four years with the Planning Division at Texas A&M University and three years as Director of the Hays County Road Department.

Brown has been self-employed as a management consultant since 1995. His business focuses on scheduling and cost management for several heavy construction companies throughout the state. He completed his BBA at UTSA in 1991 and his MBA at Texas State (SWT) in 2003 and is a certified management accountant.

Brown and his wife, Jody, have been married for 27 years. They have two grown sons and three grandchildren.

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Bonilla secures funding for sheep industry

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Congressman Henry Bonilla is using his role on the powerful Appropriations Committee to help his constituents back home.

Bonilla has announced that he has secured \$21.25 million in funding for the Texas sheep industry. Today's funding will directly affect ranchers throughout West Texas.

"Sheep ranching is a way of life in West Texas. The region relies heavily on the sheep and goat industry, which is why I'm proud to have helped secured this important funding for sheep and goat industry," Bonilla said.

Bonilla was able to secure \$19.3 million in funding for scrapie eradication. With today's funding, the U.S. hopes to be declared scrapie-free by 2017. Becoming scrapie-free will have a significant positive economic impact to the livestock, meat and feed industries.

Bonilla also secured \$500,000 in funding for the National Sheep Industry Improvement Center; \$150,000 in funding for dairy and meat goat research; and \$300,000 in funding for wool research. Bonilla hopes this funding for sheep research will increase the profitability of the sheep, goat and camelid industries in the United States and Texas.

Additionally, Bonilla has secured \$1 million in funding to correct degradation of rangelands. Rangelands cover 70 percent of the land surface in the southwestern United States. Today's funding will allow the Joe Skeen Institute for Rangeland Restoration to integrate new information technologies to meet the targeted, emerging and associated natural resources.

A senior member of the House Appropriations Committee, Bonilla is chairman of the

subcommittee that oversees all agriculture funding. This role enabled Bonilla to secure today's funding through the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee bill.

"I've always said that the Agriculture Subcommittee touches lives on a daily basis. This is living proof that what we do makes a difference for the people of Texas," Bonilla said.

Members of the Appropriations Committee oversee all of the nation's funding.

"I look out for one of the largest states in our nation - that's a lot of people, businesses and resources to take care of. I'm fortunate that my role on this committee gives me the opportunity to shepherd and secure funding for our great state of Texas," Bonilla said. "I'm proud my role on the committee helped secure this funding and look forward to the progress it will achieve."

Aikin of Paris had to order Department of Public Safety troopers, Texas Rangers and national guardsmen into Beaumont to suppress a riot that broke out when the top two officials happened to be gone.
