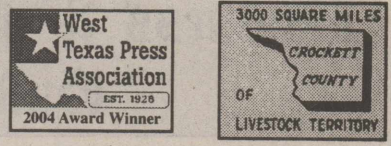


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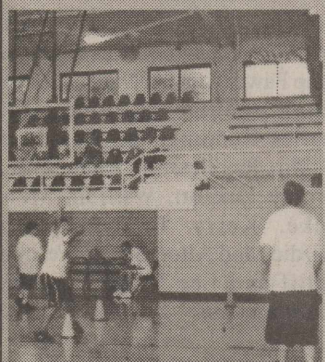

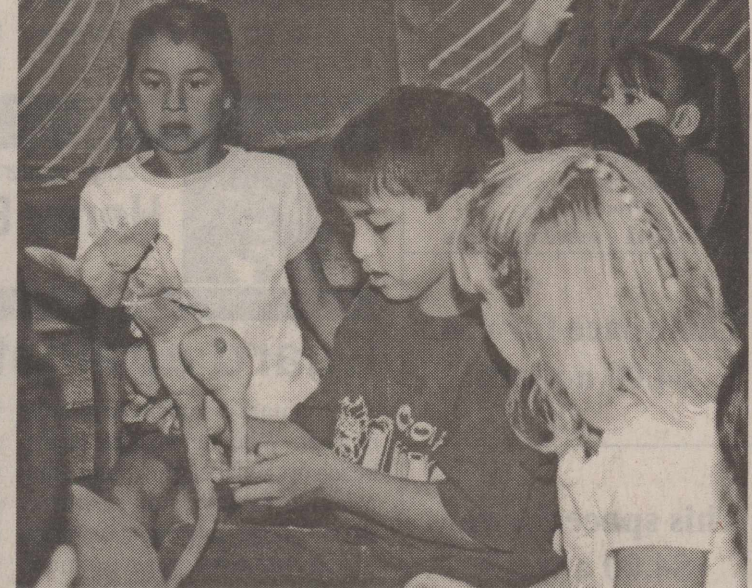
The regular monthly board meeting is set for 6:30 p.m. Thursday at the Administration Building on 797 Avenue D.

Items on the agenda include discussion and approval of proposals for fuel and athletic supplies; discussion of presentation of graduation scholarships at a time other than graduation night; discussion and approval of school board members and administrators to attend the 45th annual Texas Association of School Boards and Texas Association of School Administrators joint annual convention in September in Corpus Christi; nominate or endorse a representative on the TASB Board of Directors from TASB Region 15 and consideration and approval of the 2005-2006 Southwest Drug Education and Deterrent Services contract for contraband inspections.

There are also two executive sessions scheduled on the agenda. The first is over considering discipline of a public school child and involves a Level III appeal of expulsion hearing conducted May 16. The other executive session is about personnel resignations, hires and employees.

Living in the land of dolls



San Angelo maker shows off her unique creations

When Sandy Whitley was growing up, she didn't play with dolls.

Instead, Whitley said she could be found down at the creek or somewhere outside playing.

It wasn't until she had her eight children and then gained 16 grandchildren that she discovered how much fun playing with dolls can be.

During a June 9 program at the Crockett County Library, Whitley shared her love of making dolls with children and women from Ozona. The program was part of the library's "Go Wild...Read!" summer reading program.

"Your imagination just goes nuts," Whitley said. "You have to be a little nuts to start."

Her dolls range from the common type "flat doll" that are often used a baby dolls, to the more glamorous stand-up three-dimensional types. All of the dolls, however, are made from fabric.

"These are not your grandmother's dolls," she said. Each doll has its own person-

ality. From "the Avon Lady" doll, whose face is made up, has her Avon book, purse and is ready to knock at your door.

Another doll, the "Senior Citizen Angel" has the face of a sweet, old grandmother as her arms and wings are ready to give anyone a hug.

The "Over the Hill Ballerina" has a wild hairdo, is a little heavy in the stomach and backside and is heavily made up as she gives it her all in her last performance.

Her "Roaring 20s" doll won first place at a competition for its authentic look and outfit, she said.

There's also "Clara the Clutter Fairy" who is the "blame for all the clutter found in the house."

"This is a great example of a doll maker's stuff," Whitley said about Clara. "Doll makers have stuff."

Beads, ribbon, feathers, wild fabrics and other knickknacks can be found in her treasure chest.

"How could I resist this," she said as she held up a pink feather fan. Some of the dolls in Whitley's collection tell stories.

There's the "Blue Kangaroo," who goes with two children's books about his adventures.

There's also "Mr. Mole" from

"The Wind and the Willows" and a "Lion Woman" who tells the story of a South African fairy tale.

Whitley's collection, a combination of her dolls and dolls she has swapped with other doll makers, also has dragons, sea serpents and a troll from Belgium.

There's also a "Surfing Santa Claus" from Australia.

The little doll "Happy Harry Have a Heart" has green hair and no legs, but a big heart charm and a grin on his face.

"Some dolls need legs, but he just sits there and radiates love,"

Eagle Scout Project discussed at commissioner's meeting

The timeline of the Eagle Scout Project at the new Visitor's Center was discussed at the monthly meeting of the Crockett County Commissioners Court Monday.

Project coordinator Travis Zuberbueler said he wanted to move up the deadline on his monument project due to the availability of personnel and school starting for him August 1.

Ozona Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Shanon Biggerstaff said that the chamber is still working on plans for the monument to be placed in the interpretive trail. Plans for the trail are expected to be finished Monday and presented to the chamber board at their meeting.

"Travis has done an excellent job collecting the money and organizing. As we've explained, we have a \$1 million project in the process and that has to come first. We need to coordinate our efforts," Biggerstaff said. "We feel (the monument) is best suited at the trail and will get the most visibility."

It's the Pitts

Field Guide to Auctioneers

With the proliferation of auctioneers lately it is becoming increasingly difficult to tell one species from another. By utilizing this Field Guide to Auctioneers of North America you should be able to tell a Silver Throated Large Headed Purebred Auctioneer from a Double Breasted Red Faced Wine Auctioneer.

Here's a sampling:

The Pot Bellied Tough Hided Sale Barn Auctioneer- You can spot this bird every week perched on a stool at your local livestock auction. The species is common in rural areas, thrives in a competitive environment and the more dominant males can often be heard chirping three days a week.

Females of this species are very rare but the males are gregarious and roam over a large area. The vocal pattern of the pot bellied sale barn auctioneer is similar to the rat-tat-tat of a woodpecker but his head is much harder than the woodpecker's. He feeds on ring men, order buyers, bird-brains and throat lozenges. His enemies are bad markets, polyps on the vocal chords and Highway Patrolmen.

The vocalization of this species varies from coast to coast and can be rhythmic or bone jarring.

Cow buyers find their pattering particularly annoying and often set traps for them. Although there have been several attempts to eradicate this hardy creature by members of the big three meat packing cartel, who find their role in price discovery particularly annoying, those attempts have largely failed.

This species has a subspecies that tends to be more colorful and much louder and is known as... The Silver Throated Large Headed Purebred Auctioneer- You can spot this creature by his bright plumage, warble throat and big belt buckle.

His large head supports an expensive hat. The fastest of all auctioneers, this subspecies has been known to run a-fowl of cigarettes, whiskey, fast women and faster rental cars.

He dines on steak and sale day barbecues and feathers his nest with fat commission checks.

He leads a seasonal, sedentary lifestyle, returns to the same nest every year and is most often seen on Saturdays. He is challenged often by peach faced younger birds who want to claim his territory.

The Double Breasted Red Faced Wine Auctioneer- These birds tend to tweet at a much slower rate because the "bid watchers" have been tasting wine all evening and are not at their peak comprehension levels. At first appearance they could be confused with penguins with their black and white tuxedos but they use much larger words. They tend to be bare headed and red faced, hence their name. They feed on expensive Merlots, Pinot Noirs, finger food and rich people. They also spit a lot. They can often be spotted in expensive hotel ballrooms, vineyards and Napa and Sonoma. They are extremely rare and their enemies are Gallo and Budweiser.

The Auto Auction Trumpeter- These birds are intelligent, far flying birds who feed on fumes of carbon monoxide. They are migratory and nest near airports where they fly out of on a weekly basis to places like Salt Lake City, Boise and Dallas. They've been brought back from near extinction by Hertz, GM and the high price of new cars.

The Rounded Rumped Golden Eyed Common Farm Auctioneer- This is the hardest working and most active of all species of auctioneers. They can be identified by the matching jacket and cap they wear with the name of their firm on it. The chant of the female members of the species is higher pitched. The females are usually more attractive and live longer than the males too.

Although these birds can be found anywhere they are most often spotted in the midwest. They cannot fly, are rarely spotted indoors, can walk and talk at the same time and are often seen prowling around old barns. They often interbreed with other species to produce a hybrid strain of auctioneer who can sell anything. They are seasonal birds who tend to congregate in small coveys wherever people die, estates are settled and farmers go bankrupt.

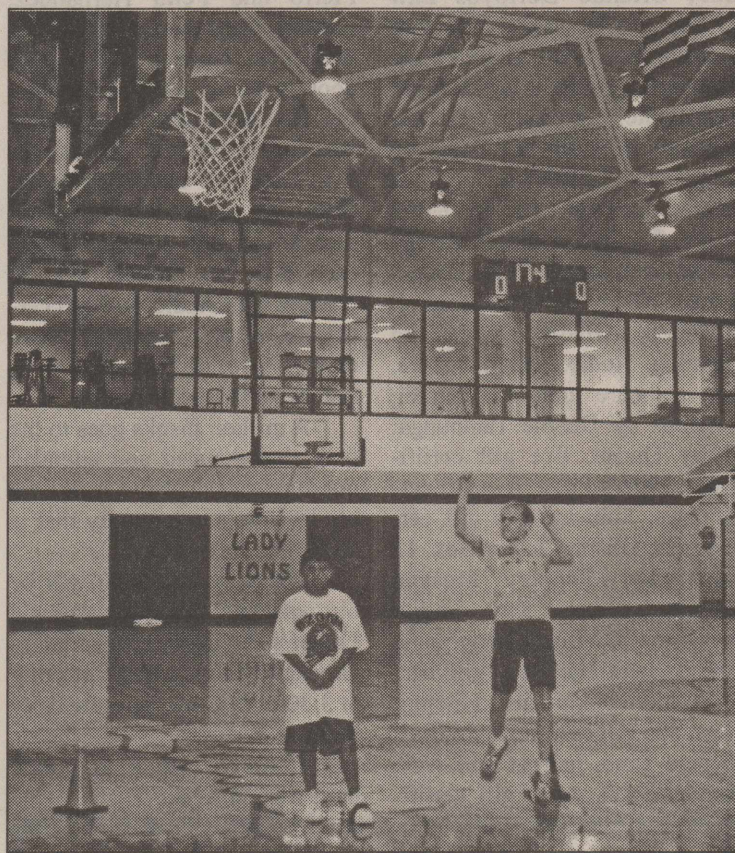
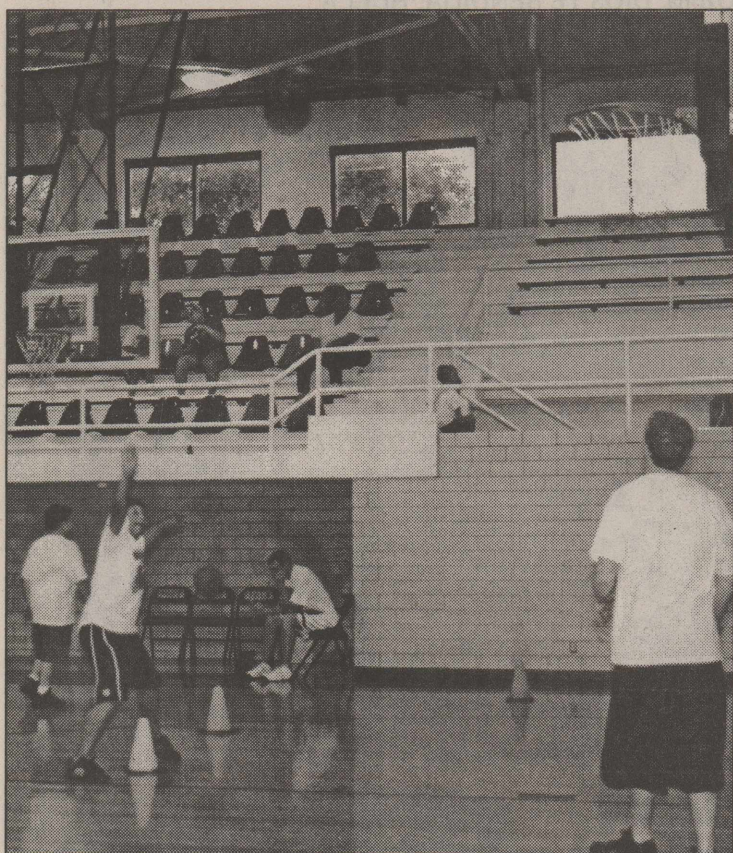
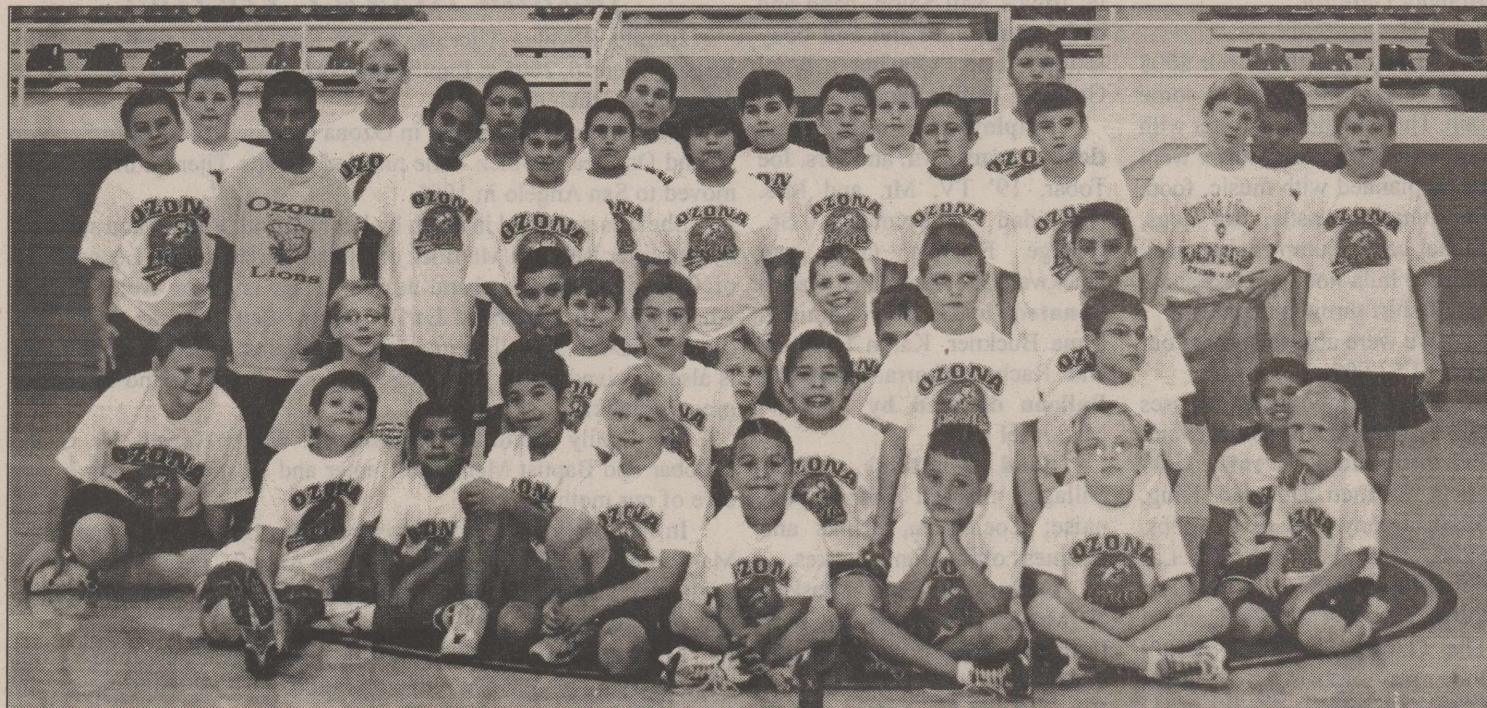

The Crockett County Historical Commission met on June 6.

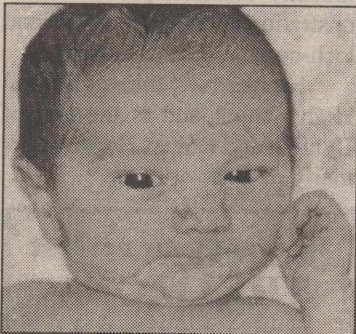

Military troops were station there from Fort Stockton to protect the station and bridge from Indian attacks.

on was the designation of the Cedar Hill and Lima Cemeterys as State Historical Landmarks and a historical markers for the early bridge crossing of the Pecos just west of Fort Lancaster.

The Commission will go before the Board of Supervisors next Monday for permission to locate a historic windmill next to the Emerald House at the Fair Grounds.

The next meeting of the Historical Commission will be July 11 at the Crockett County Museum. The public is invited to attend.

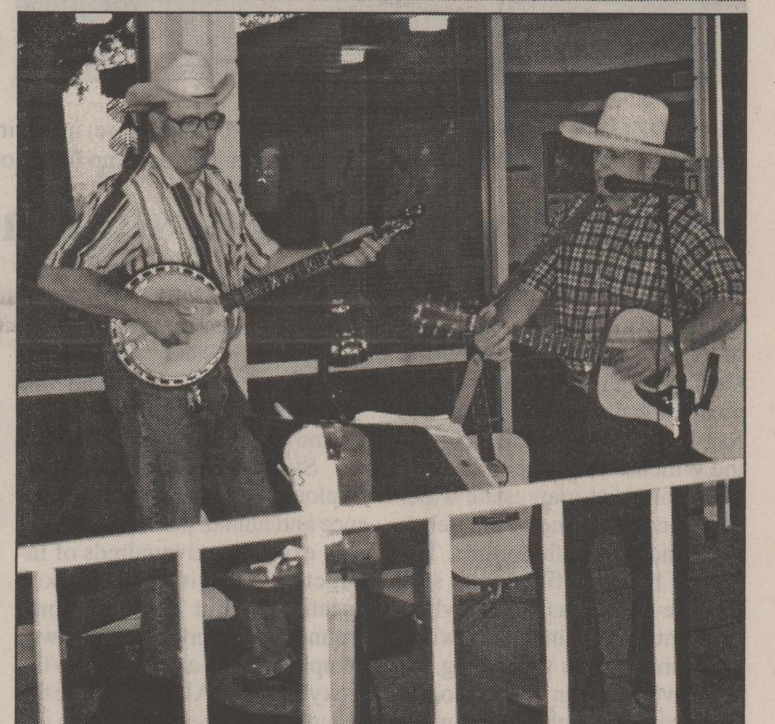

Autumn Sage - Salvia Greggii

Occasionally, the common name of a plant is a bit misleading. The name "Autumn Sage" conjures the image of a fall-flowering herb, yet Bailey Hortorum's Hortus Third describes this plant as a fall-flowering sub-shrub.

The Autumn Sage is almost constantly in flower from late spring until frost. Robert A. Vine's book, Trees, Shrubs and Woody Vines of the Southwest, contains a more accurate description of the flowering habit, indicating summer and fall flowering on the shrub up to 3 feet.

The species name "Greggii" honors Josiah Gregg (1806-1850), an early American explorer and botanist. S. Greggii is native southern and western Texas and New Mexico. It may also be found in the Mexican states of Coahuila, Sonora, and Durango.

Although generally ignored by most nurserymen and home gardeners in the century, S. Greggii was a frequently-found plant in the cottage gardens of early Texas. Once established, the plant usually thrives on existing rainfall. It does need at least tolerably good drainage, and thrives in full-sun or partial-shaded expositions.

In recent years, the discovery of a broad range of colors within the species has greatly increased their landscape value and appeal. Pure white, rich red, pink and salmon have now joined the more common purplish-red selections. Flowers appear in terminal racemes, are tube-shaped and two-lipped, and about one inch long. Leaves are opposite, narrowly oblong, with blade length 1-1/4 inches long. The foliage has a pleasant, spicy

scent. Propagation is usually from cuttings taken during the growing season.

Landscape uses Salvia Greggii are many. It is a natural for use in containers, masses, or borders for low maintenance landscape color. In landscape developments where a refined look is desired, the plants respond very well to periodic shearing to remove old flower stems during the summer. Occasional light applications of a balanced fertilizer and irrigation during unusually dry periods, will endure repeat flowering from May through November.

Salvia Greggii is a beautiful, practical source of landscape color in Kimble County. It is another example of "rediscovering" plants that were popular in the early gardens of Texas.

Travis's monument of Crockett County is planned to be the centerpiece of the interpretive trail.

Travis said that he was told that the work couldn't be done on the weekend and that Jim Smith of Templeton Construction would be gone in August, and he is needed to move the granite part of the monument.

Smith said that area that the trail will be in is currently being used for supplies right now by Templeton, and that an exact start date on the project can't be set until the trail plan is presented and Smith talk to Reece Albert Constructing about when the paving will be done.

"Once we get the trail and locations where the stones will be placed, I'll talk to Reece Albert and see how it will affect their grating plan," Smith said. "I'm free to help as need be. If we have to do it on a Saturday, I will make myself available."

Travis said that he wants to meet with the chamber board to pick out a plan and location and that if a location isn't agreed upon he wants to move the monument two feet off the construction site.

Biggerstaff said that the chamber board was opposed to that in that the monument needs stay where it is.

County Judge Johnny Jones said for Travis and the Chamber Board to look at the trail plans, work together with Templeton's

guidance and if the issue needs to be dealt with it can be placed on the agenda for the July commissioner's meeting.

"I think you all can work together on this," Jones said.

Chamber board member Debbie Long said all the board wanted to do is work with Travis and help him, but that he's got to compromise as well.

"A \$1 million project has to come first," Long said.

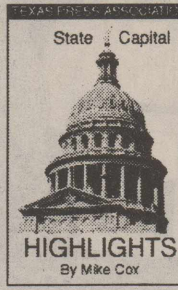

State officials to play musical chairs



AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry has until June 19 to sign or veto bills and still hasn't said whether he'll call a special session this summer to give lawmakers one more try at solving the state's school funding woes.

Meanwhile, with the '06 primaries only nine months off, Austin political junkies are talking.

With Republican Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs having declared for comptroller, Sen. Todd Staples (R-Palestine) having announced for her job and U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison rumored to be taking on Gov. Rick Perry in next March's Republican primary, where does that leave Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn?

One answer is that Strayhorn might decide not to get in the Perry-Hutchison fight and instead opt to make an end run at lieutenant governor.

Just as a Hutchison gubernatorial candidacy would arguably close the governor's mansion to Strayhorn, it would open what is really the most powerful elective job in Texas to the comptroller.

Why? Because the buzz is that Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst is interested in replacing Hutchison in Washington if she comes to Texas to run against Perry.

Should Hutchison decide not to take on Perry, the scenario could default to a Perry-Strayhorn primary battle.

Next station: Name change... A bill to rename the Texas Railroad Commission the Texas Energy Commission ended up on a side track when the gavel closed the 79th Legislature, but lawmakers did move all the commissioner's railroad responsibilities to the Texas Department of Transportation.

Rep. George "Buddy" West's House Bill 1078, the bill that would have changed the name of the 114-year-old commission to reflect what it really is, hit the end of the tracks on April 20. That's when it was left pending in the House Energy Committee.

So, once the commission's remaining railroad functions are rerouted to TxDOT, the Railroad Commission will have nothing to do with railroads and everything to do with energy. Maybe next session...

New insurance commissioner... The No. 2 person at the Texas Department of Insurance, deputy commissioner Mike Geeslin, got the top job last week when Gov. Perry appointed him as former Commissioner Jose Montemayor's successor.

One of the biggest servings will be overseeing TDI's legislatively mandated absorption of the duties currently handled by the Worker's Compensation Commission. That includes adding a fourth commissioner whose responsibility will be worker's comp issues only.

It's 'skeeter time... If you've been to the coast lately, or anywhere else in Texas that gets a lot of rain, you know there are plenty of mosquitoes out and about.

According to the State Health Department, so far this year no cases of West Nile infection have been reported in Texas. Last year, 119 human cases occurred in 40 of the state's 254 counties.

This year, only six cases affecting birds, three carrier mosquitoes and two infected horses have been reported.

The solution: A good insect repellent and wearing long sleeve shirts and pants. (But the insect spray still is important because a mosquito bite can penetrate clothing.)

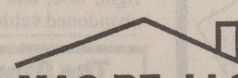

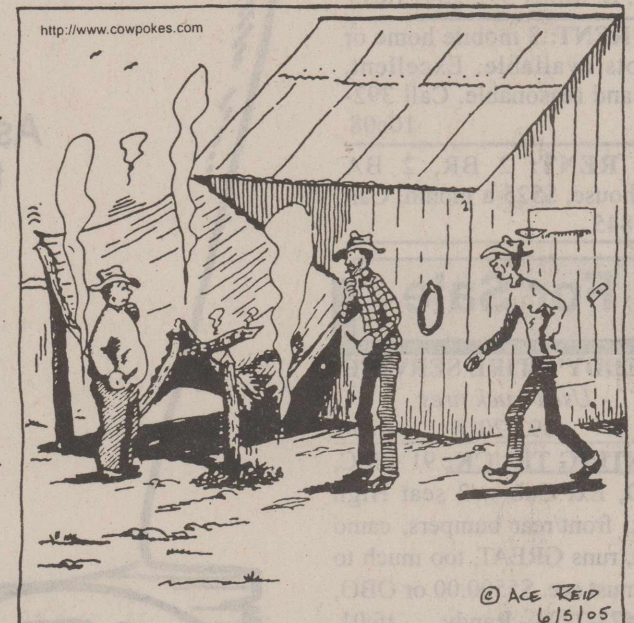
