Board unanimously approves to uphold expulsion of student

Scholarships to be presented at high school academic awards ceremony instead of graduation

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Board of Trustees met voted unanimously to uphold the expulsion of a public school child during their monthly meeting on June 16. The board met in executive session to discuss the appeal of the expulsion hearing that was conducted on May 16. The board's vote was 6-0. Board member Kenny Wadsworth was not present. Also during executive session, the board voted to offer 2005-2006 teaching employment positions to Elizabeth (Betsy) Nanny and Sarah Ryan. The offer of an employment position as Ozona High School Counselor was approved for Carole Ann Allen. Graduates for the Class of 2006 will receive their scholarships during the OHS Academic Awards

Ceremony instead of graduation. The board approved the change in order to shorten the graduation ceremony and focus on the graduation of all OHS graduates. Approval for the CCCCSD Board of Trustees to attend the 45th annual TASB/TASA Convention on September 23-25 in Houston was approved. The annual convention is a time when board members can obtain the required school board training hours. First year board members are required to obtain a minimum of 16 hours plus local district orientation. Experienced board members are required to annually obtain eight hours of continuing education plus the TEC Update. The continuing education includes; updates to the Texas Education Code, team-building session/assessment of continuing education needs of the board-super-

intendent team, additional continuing education based on assessed needs and the framework for governance leadership. Each year at the meeting, at which the board would normally issue the call for the board election, the president of the board must announce publicly which members of the board have met their annual obligation and which have not. This information must also be made available to the media. In addition, the Texas Education Agency (TEA) may request evidence at any time of board member compliance with the continuing education rule. Failure of one or more board members to comply with the rule can affect a district's accreditation status. Other agenda items approved: • The 2005-2006 fuel bid proposal from Griffin Fuel and all proposals received for the 2005-

2006 athletic supplies. • Nomination of Eddie Albin to be reelected to the position of TASB Director. • To continue with Southwest Drug Education and Deterrent Service for the 2005-2006 contract inspections. The next regular meeting of the CCCCSD School Board is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. July 26 in the Administration Building. The meeting will also include a budget workshop to discuss the 2005-2006 school finance budget. The public is invited and encouraged to attend all school board meetings. Visitors are invited to address the board with comments and school related concerns during the open forum segment of each meeting. No injuries in collision between freightliner and vehicle towing trailer

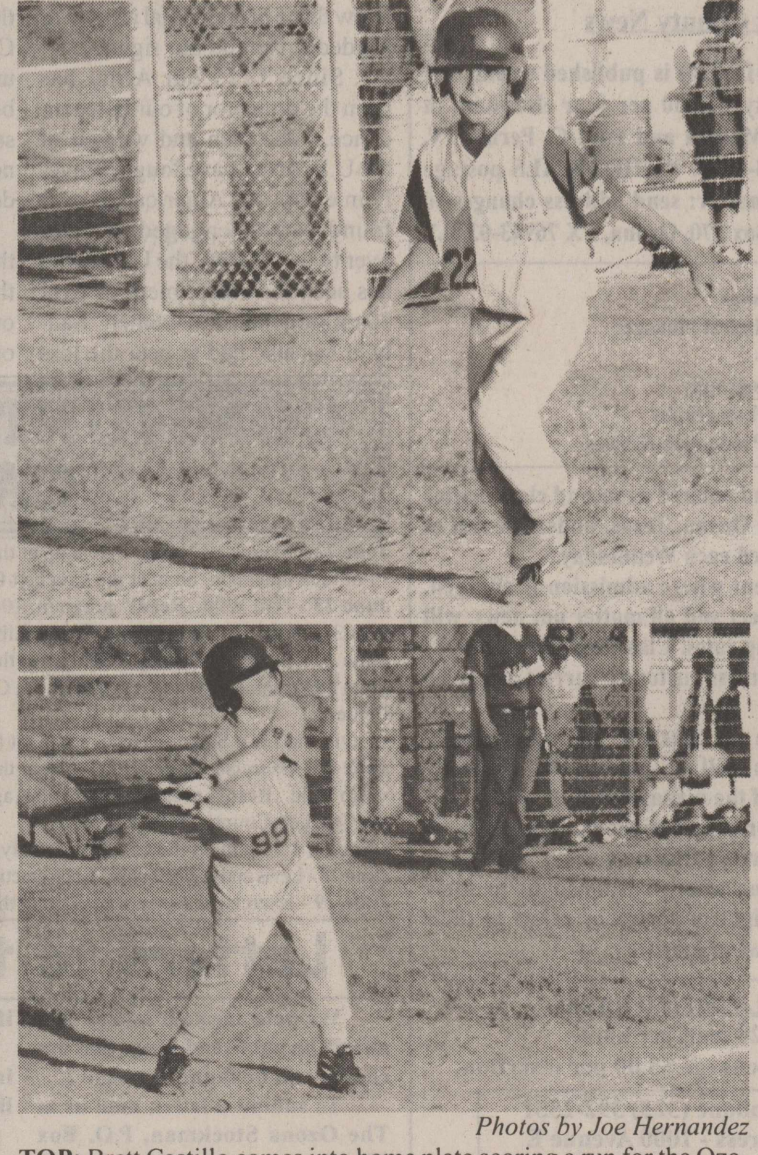
A collision between a car and a freight liner resulted ended in no injuries on June 15 at the 334 mile-marker on Interstate-10. Christina Burns, of Austin, was driving a silver Mazda pulling a U-Haul trailer in the eastbound lane, according to a report from the Texas Department of Public Safety. The freight liner, driven by Jose Gonzales of El Paso, was traveling in the outside lane going the same direction, when the Mazda began to pass the freight liner, the report said. The U-Haul trailer then began to fishtail and Burnes lost control of the vehicle and went into the outside lane, the report stated. Gonzales took evasive action but was unable to avoid striking the Mazda, causing the Mazda to skid off the roadway into the south ditch, the report said.

I have to cook, there's all these funny creatures that can come along and at any moment any number of things can happen that you would least expect.

The bumpy roads and wild bump gates were not my friends at times. My family thought I had lost my mind at times when they visited me.

As I hit the second bump gate and pulled up to my house, I took a deep breath.

"This is home," I thought.

Now, as I sit outside watching the sun set and the stars come out, I think to myself "Who wouldn't want to live here?"

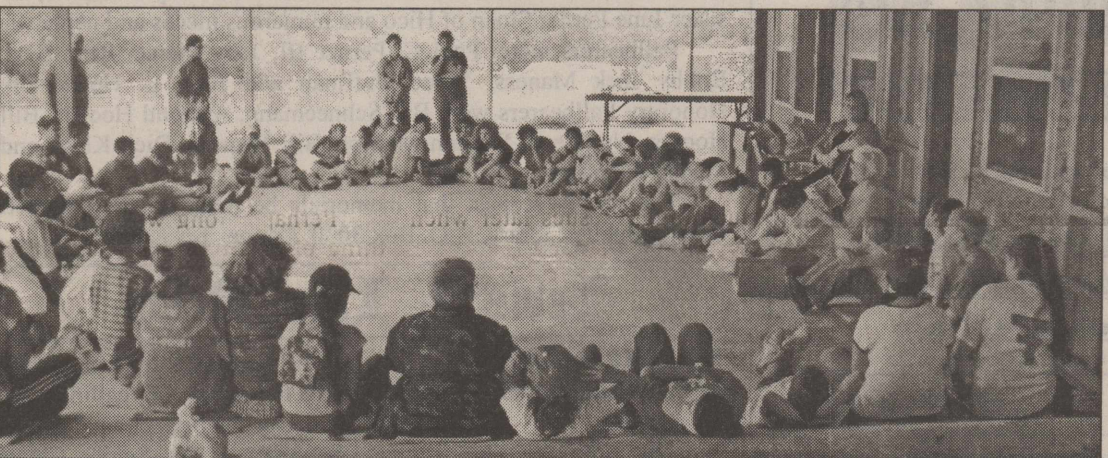

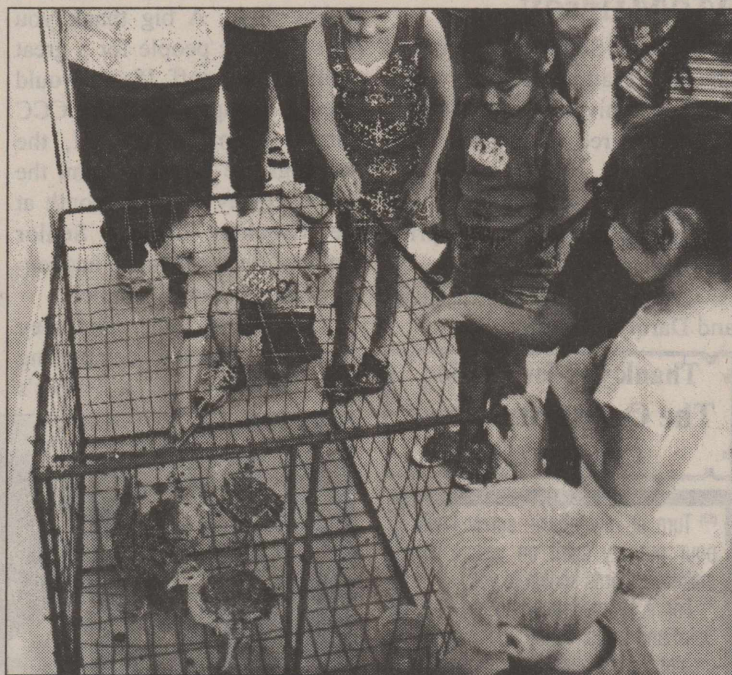

Obituaries

Chris Doty Perner

Chris Doty Perner died Monday, June 13 in a San Angelo hospital. Memorial services were held at the Friendswood United Methodist Church in Friendswood on Monday, June 20, 2005.

Funeral services for Chris Doty Perner were held Thursday morning, June 16, 2005, in the Ozona United Methodist Church. The Rev. Jerry Moore of Paris, Texas officiated along with Dr. John Fluth. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery in Ozona under the direction of Preddy Funeral Home.

Chris Doty Perner, son of Marie Doty and Sam Stephens Perner, was born on Aug. 1, 1932 in the home of his grandmother Perner in Ozona. He was named for his maternal grandfather Christopher Columbus Doty, a pioneer sheep man and rancher best known for bringing the first herd of sheep into West Texas.

Chris played basketball and met his wife, Millie, at Texas Christian University in 1950. He served in the U.S. Army in England, and then attended Texas Tech University where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science in electrical engineering. Chris was first employed at Lockheed Missile and Space Co. where he worked on the Polaris Missile Systems in nuclear submarines and as a Tender Ship Specialist.

Chris came to NASA Manned Spacecraft Center (now Johnson Space Center) in 1964. His initial assignment was the lead engineer for the Apollo Command Module displays and controls. Like many others, Chris was a key to the success of the Apollo Program which put a man on the Moon. He continued to support the other programs; Skylab, Apollo-Soyuz, and Shuttle. Chris was noted for his competence and being a professional gentleman in all his work. Chris was brought into the management.

He served as Crew Station Subsystems manager, Crew Station Branch Chief and then Chief of the Man-Systems Division and Flight Crew Support Division. He was a mentor to many young engineers and scientists that came into the organization. His management, technical expertise, his reputation for fairness, being calm during periods of stress, and a sense of humor was appreciated across the Center. During his career at the Johnson Space Center, he received many awards and citations for his outstanding contributions to the space programs. He retired in 1997.

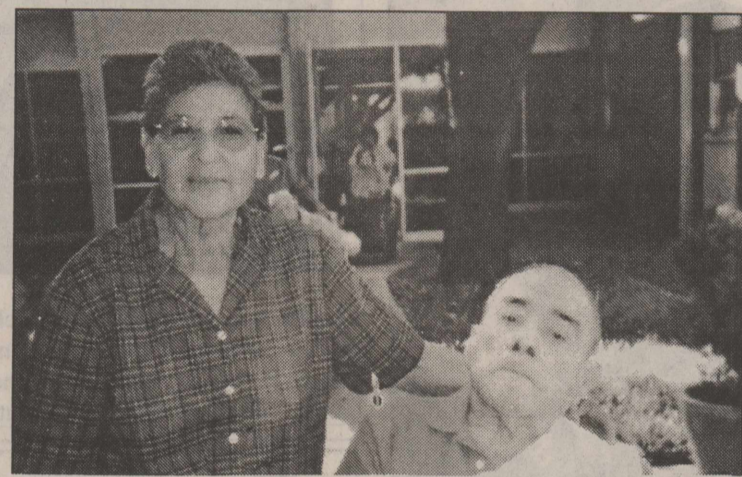

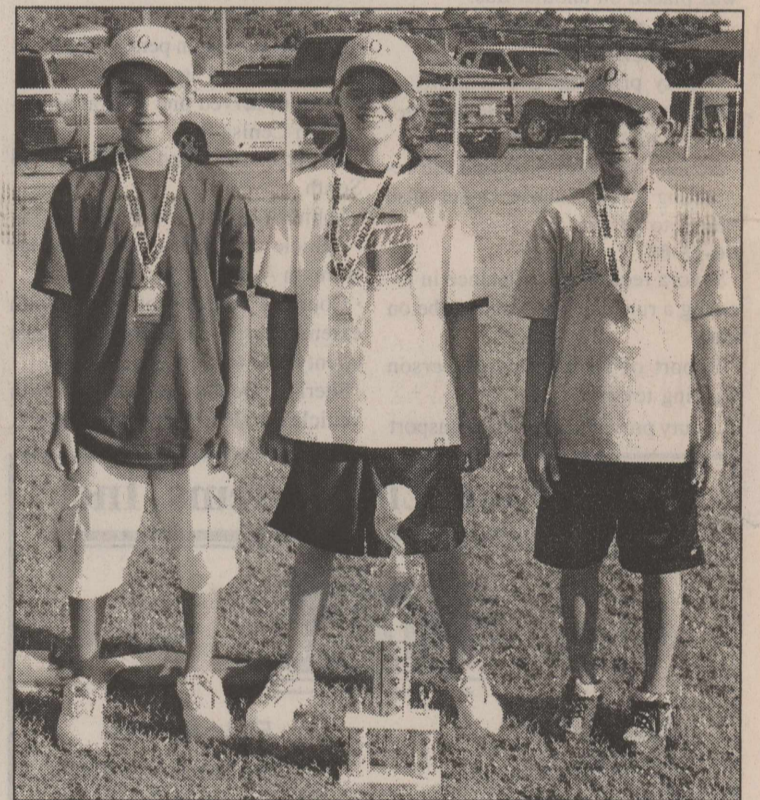

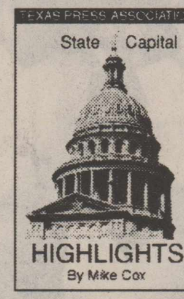

Governor Perry calls immediate special session



AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry announced June 18 that he was calling lawmakers back to Austin for a special session to solve the school finance issue left hanging during the just-ended regular session.

And just to give the call some teeth, he used his line-item veto authority to strip \$35.3 billion in public school funding from the state's new budget.

That forces the Legislature to act soon or face the prospect of schools being unable to open in August.

The Legislature was scheduled to convene at noon on June 21 to come up with a plan.

The governor announced his veto and legislative call at noon June 18, which happened to be the same time Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn staged an event in downtown Austin to make an announcement of her own - her intention to try for Perry's job in next year's Republican primary.

"Now is the time to replace this do-nothin' drugstore cowboy with one tough grandma," she said.

Strayhorn's formalization of her long-obvious aspiration for higher office came after U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison ended speculation that she might also run for governor.

The Texas senator issued a statement June 17 that she would run for another six-year term in Washington.

Reading the budgetary fine print...

Line items in the state's budget have given some state agency heads as much as \$48,000 more a year in salary.

The biggest increase will go to Col. Tommy Davis, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, who will see his salary jump from \$102,000 annually to \$150,000.

The attorney general, comptroller, and land and railroad commissioners will get \$32,000-a-year pay hikes.

Transportation bill signed...

The governor signed into law last week a bill that gives the electorate the power to decide if an existing highway paid for with gas tax revenue can be converted into a revenue-generating toll road.

The measure also requires the Texas Department of Transportation to pick up the tab for any private land made much less valuable by a new roadway. Sponsor Rep. Mike Krusee (R-Round Rock) had said the bill and its provisions were intended in part to ease public concerns over the planned Trans-Texas Corridor.

Transportation Commission member stepping down...

When the Texas Transportation Commission meets June 30, the five-member panel will be down to only four members following the resignation of Commissioner Robert Nichols of Jacksonville.

Appointed in 1997 by then-Gov. George W. Bush, Nichols has said he intends to step down from the commission to run for the state Senate seat being vacated by Todd Staples (R-Palestine).

Staples announced earlier this month that he intended to seek election as agriculture commissioner.

Yellow light for red light runners...

A bill that would have prohibited cities from setting up photographic red light enforcement programs got stuck in traffic in the Legislature, with the Senate declining to take up the measure.

Accordingly, the city of Houston is planning to continue its existing program.

Proponents say the idea saves lives and prevents injuries by photographing and then fining drivers who bust red lights. Critics say traffic-signal cameras contribute to more accidents and are an invasion of privacy.

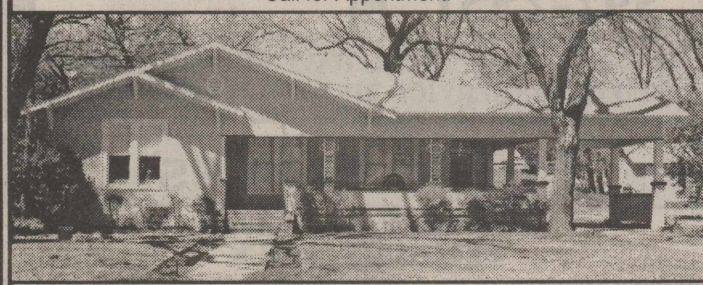

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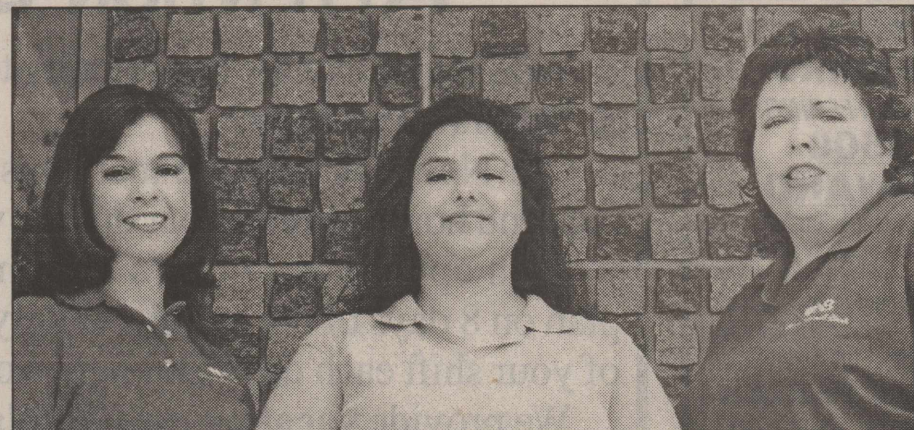
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
