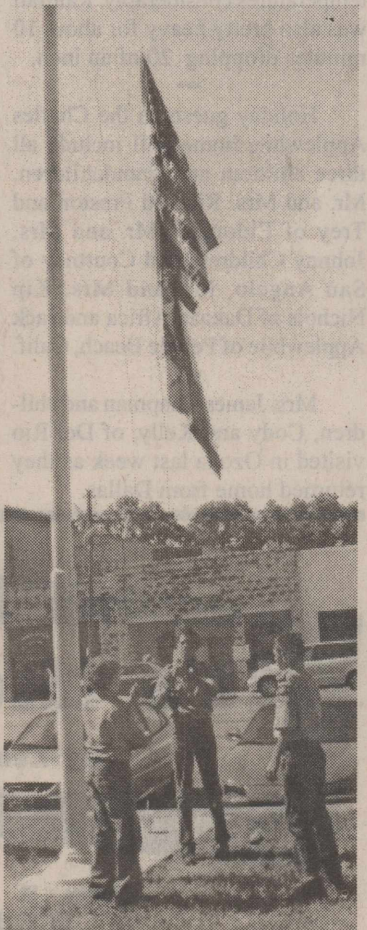
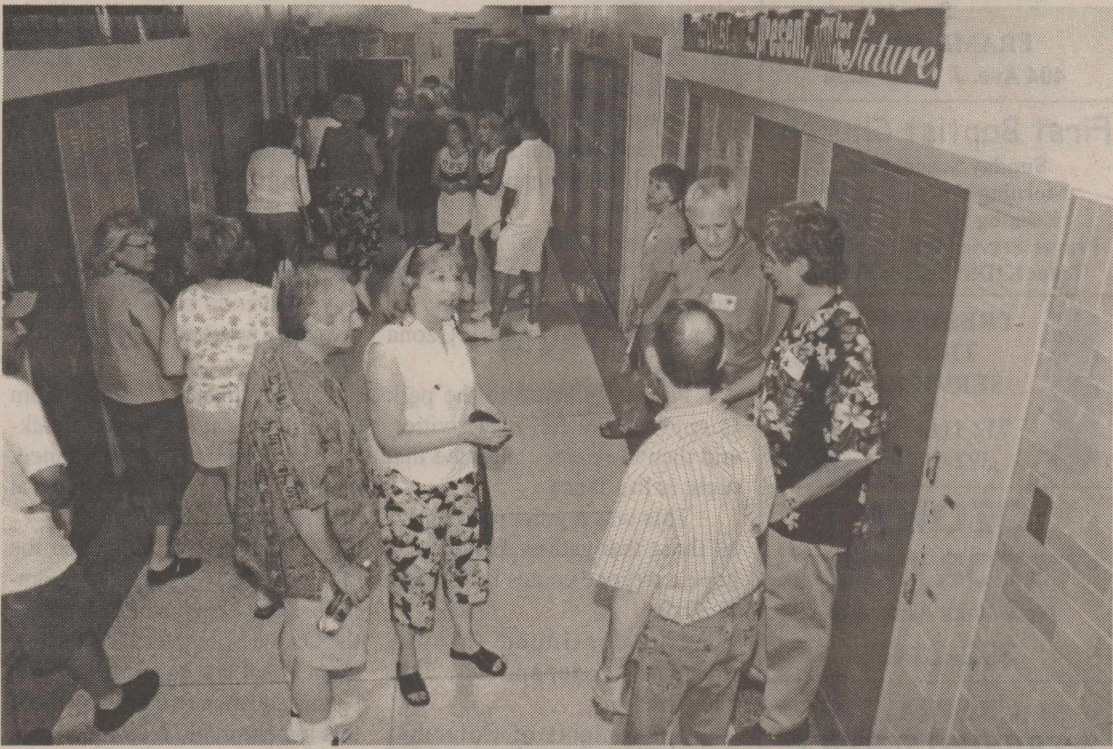
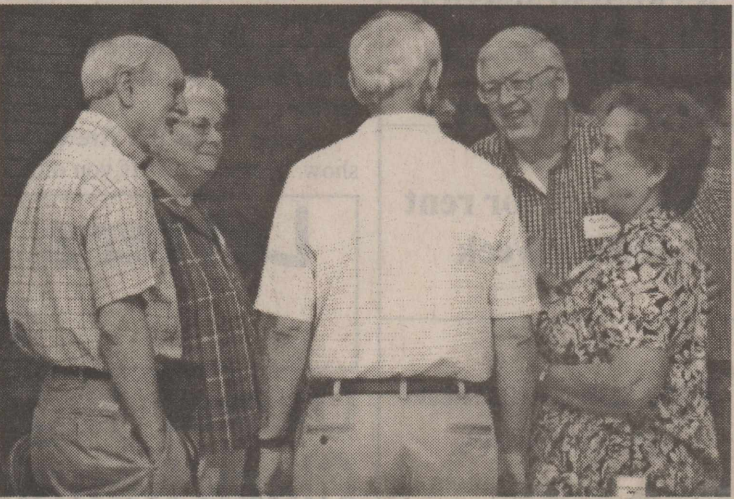

Hearing set for mother whose children perished in local fire
State department pursuing custody of newborn

The Texas Department of Family and Protective Services is seeking custody on the newborn baby born to the mother of two children who died in a tragic fire in April.

A hearing has been set for 10 a.m. Friday to determine custody of Faith Elizabeth Villarreal, who was born to Sylvia Cardenas on June 28 in San Angelo. The hearing will take place at the Crockett County Courthouse.

Two days after the baby's birth, District Judge Brock Jones signed an emergency order turning Faith Elizabeth over to the state department due to a "continuing danger to the physical health or safety of the child if returned to the parent..." according to Crockett County court documents.

Friday's hearing will determine whether or not the emergency order will be extended and Faith Elizabeth placed into foster care, the documents stated.

Two of Cardenas's children, Felipe Villarreal, 10, and Belia Cardenas, 5, perished in a fire earlier this year. Although the state department is waiting final autopsy results, "there is a preponderance of evidence" that suggests Cardenas was neglectful to her children, according to an affidavit by Lynn McFadden, caseworker for the department of family and protective services.

On the night of the fire, Cardenas said she put her children to bed around 9:30 p.m. and then lay down in her bed to watch television, the affidavit stated.

She awoke during the night, possibly to her son crying out. She walked down the hall and saw a glow in the bedroom, the affidavit stated.

She thought she heard her son say that something was wrong and then went back down the hall to get her glasses.

Reliving history through patriotic songs

Franklin D. Roosevelt's "fireside chats," Eli Whitney's cotton gin and the travels across the west by Lewis and Clark all had patriotic songs accompanying their historical events.

These songs and events can be seen as part of a new exhibit called "American Anthem: An Exhibition of Songs and Symbols of American History" at the Crockett County Museum.

Through a grant from the Trammell Crow Companies in Dallas and the Texas Committee for the Humanities, the museum was able to acquire the 16-panel display through July 12.

Featuring 39 color and 26 black and white photographs, the exhibit tells the story of America's history through its patriotic songs.

The inspiration of American Anthem came from the poem "I Hear America Singing" written by Walt Whitman in 1860. The artifacts in the exhibition are inventions that had a profound effect upon the people of the United States.

Beginning with "Hail Colum-

bia," written in 1798, the song personifies George Washington during his presidency.

"Jefferson and Liberty," written in 1800, sings about Thomas Jefferson and his campaign for president.

As Lewis and Clark explore the American West, the song "Shenandoah" follows them.

With the invention of the cotton gin, it is the popular song "Dixie" that sings about the South in 1859.

"The Wabash Cannonball" in 1904 focuses on the start of the railroad and travel in the U.S. "America the Beautiful" exemplifies the "Pioneer Spirit" in 1893.

"We're Coming, Father Abraham" tells the story of the black soldiers fighting in the Civil War in 1862.

"Bread and Roses" shows the struggles of the women's movement and the passing of the 19th Amendment in 1919.

The exhibit ends with "Happy Days Are Here Again" as America enters into the Great Depression and looks to President FDR and the New Deal for hope.

The museum is open from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday and 10 a.m.-3 p.m. Saturday.

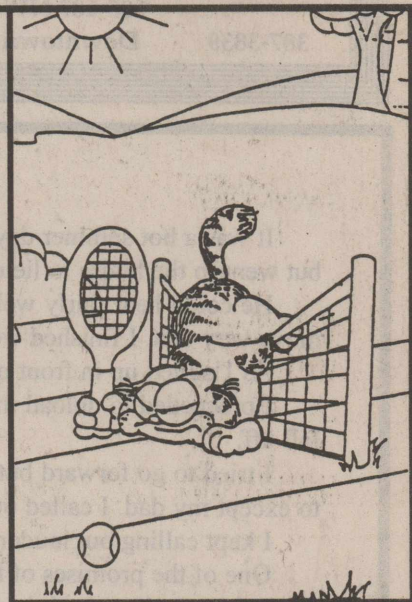

Hilderbran plan reduces frequency of appraisal caps

AUSTIN - Rep. Harvey Hilderbran (R-Kerrville) filed legislation today that would prohibit real property from being reappraised more than once every two years, effectively reducing the appraisal cap to less than 5 percent a year. The tax code currently reads that property should be appraised at least once per three-year period, capping the increase at 10 percent per appraisal. This wording allows property to be appraised every year, leaving many homeowners

to see an increase of more than 30 percent over three years.

"My bill takes a different route than what many of my colleagues have been trying to do in the House," Hilderbran said. "Instead of reducing the appraisal cap, we can reduce the frequency of reappraisals, thereby getting the same results in a more effective manner."

For example, should the Texas House of Representatives pass legislation reducing the appraisal cap from 10 percent to 7 percent, a homeowner whose

property was valued at \$100,000 would see their value increased to \$114,490 in two years. With Hilderbran's plan, the increase over two years would only be to \$110,000.

"Right now we are trying to fund education without relying so heavily on property taxes that we drive people out of their homes," Hilderbran said. "Limiting the number of reappraisals will lower taxes just as effectively as lowering the appraisal cap."

Hilderbran's legislation is HB83.

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HEARING: Cardenas refused counseling services after April fire

She then noticed the power was out in her sleeping area, where she had run an extension cord from her mother's house because the trailer house had no electricity, the affidavit said.

When Cardenas entered the bedroom, she said she saw a fire "taller than I am" located between the dresser and the bed where the children were sleeping, the affidavit stated.

She then went outside, found a wheel rim and broke the east window to the bedroom. Then, the fire got a lot bigger, the affidavit stated.

In an interview with a CPS worker, Cardenas said she usually took a combination of Xanax, Loritabs and Tamazapan, a muscle relaxer, before going to bed at night, the affidavit said. On the night of the fire, she said she took a sleeping pill, one half of a muscle relaxer and a Tylenol, the affidavit stated.

She also said that she did not know why the children didn't run out of the house, and could not explain why they were found dead in their beds, the affidavit stated.

Cardenas told the worker that Felipe did have access to candles and would light one in the bedroom despite her telling him not to, the affidavit stated.

Cardenas could not tell the worker why she did not rid the home of candles and lighters, the affidavit stated.

The state department did offer counseling services but Cardenas refused them, the affidavit stated.

The worker also interviewed Eusebio Vasquez Gaytan, the alleged father of Faith Elizabeth. Gaytan said that he had seen Cardenas after the children's death and that she "looked too relaxed" and was not "crying like she should have been," the affidavit stated.

Crockett County Fire Marshal Steve Kinley said Cardenas told him she heard an exploding sound during the time she was walking back down the hall, which knocked her down and burned her back, the affidavit stated.

Kinley also said that children who die in a fire are found hiding

in a closet, and that the way these children were found seemed "abnormal," the affidavit stated.

"The fire burned so hot and fast, that there was no way of knowing certain things," Kinley said in the affidavit.

Cardenas, 37, has had nine children, including Faith Elizabeth. Two other children died previously. Raul Palacio died in 1985 by allegedly choking on a pacifier while in Cardenas's care, the affidavit stated.

The death of two-year-old Juanita Palacio in 1989, allegedly drowning while drinking a glass of water, was investigated by the state department. Cardenas was criminally charged for the death but was acquitted, the affidavit stated.

The rest of Cardenas's children are or have been placed in care with other relatives or adopted.

On the day of Faith Elizabeth's birth, Cardenas said "I am going to keep having children until CPS lets me keep one to raise," the affidavit stated.

Cardenas does not face criminal charges at this time.

Del Rio graduate earns doctorate degree

David Jesse Sanchez was awarded a Doctorate of Philosophy in biomedical science in May from the University of California San Francisco.

Sanchez's dissertation was on Modulation of Immune Recognition by Kaposi's Sarcoma-associated Herpesvirus.

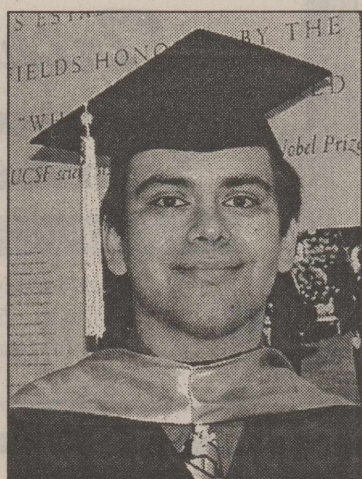
This work helped to understand how a virus that is known to cause cancer in AIDS patients and the elderly (KSHV) is able to stay inside a patient for so long without being destroyed by the immune system.

The research was directly supported by the National Institutes of Health through a National Institute of General Medical Science grant to Sanchez and by the Howard Hughes Medical Institute by a grant to Sanchez's thesis advisor, Don Ganem M.D., a professor of medicine and member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academies.

Sanchez also served as an advisor to undergraduates interested in health sciences, especially for those with ethnic backgrounds underrepresented in science, for several years at UCSF.

Sanchez is now working on a postdoctoral fellowship at the University of California Los Angeles in the Department of Microbiology, Immunology and Molecular Genetics.

He plans on continuing to develop an independent research program aimed at understanding

how some viruses can setup persistent, often life long infections.

He is being supported by a NIH grant focusing on the biology of tumors and will be focusing on several viruses that can lead to cancer such as Hepatitis C virus and some Herpesviruses.

Sanchez was recently appointed to be an instructor of microbiology at Los Angeles City College.

He is the son of Sharon Paniagua Sanchez and the late David Lopez Sanchez.

He is the grandson of Abelardo Sr. and Gloria A. Paniagua and Juanita and the late Jesus C. Sanchez, all of Del Rio.

He graduated from Del Rio High School in 1995 and went on to attend the University of Texas where he received a degree in biochemistry and was awarded the President's Leadership Award from the TexasExes.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- The market or special appraised value of your property
- The unequal appraisal of your property
- The inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- Any exemptions that may apply to you
- The qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- The taxable status of your property
- The local governments which should be taxing your property

• The ownership of the property
• The change of use of land receiving special appraisal
• Any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 909 Avenue D, Ozona, TX, (325) 392-2674.

NOTE: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

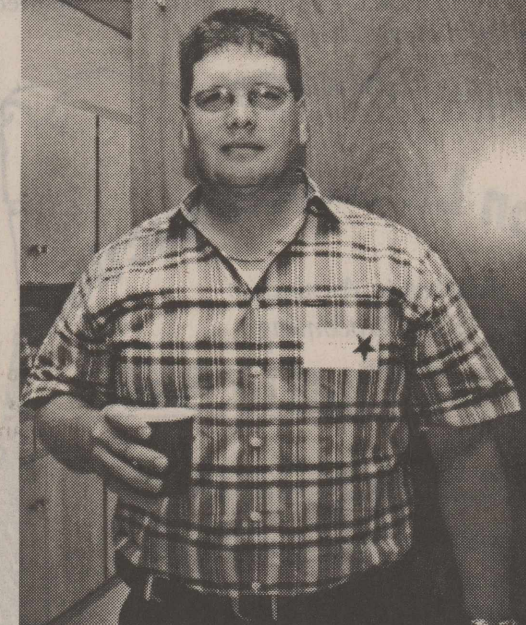
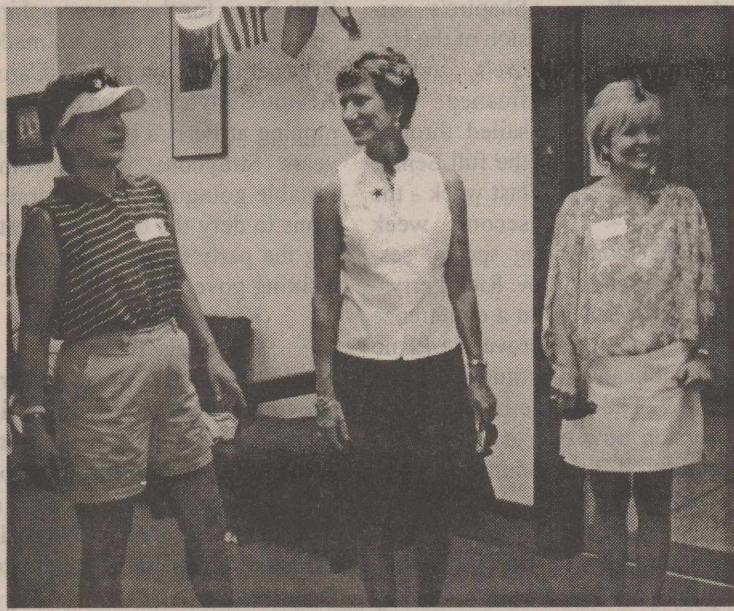

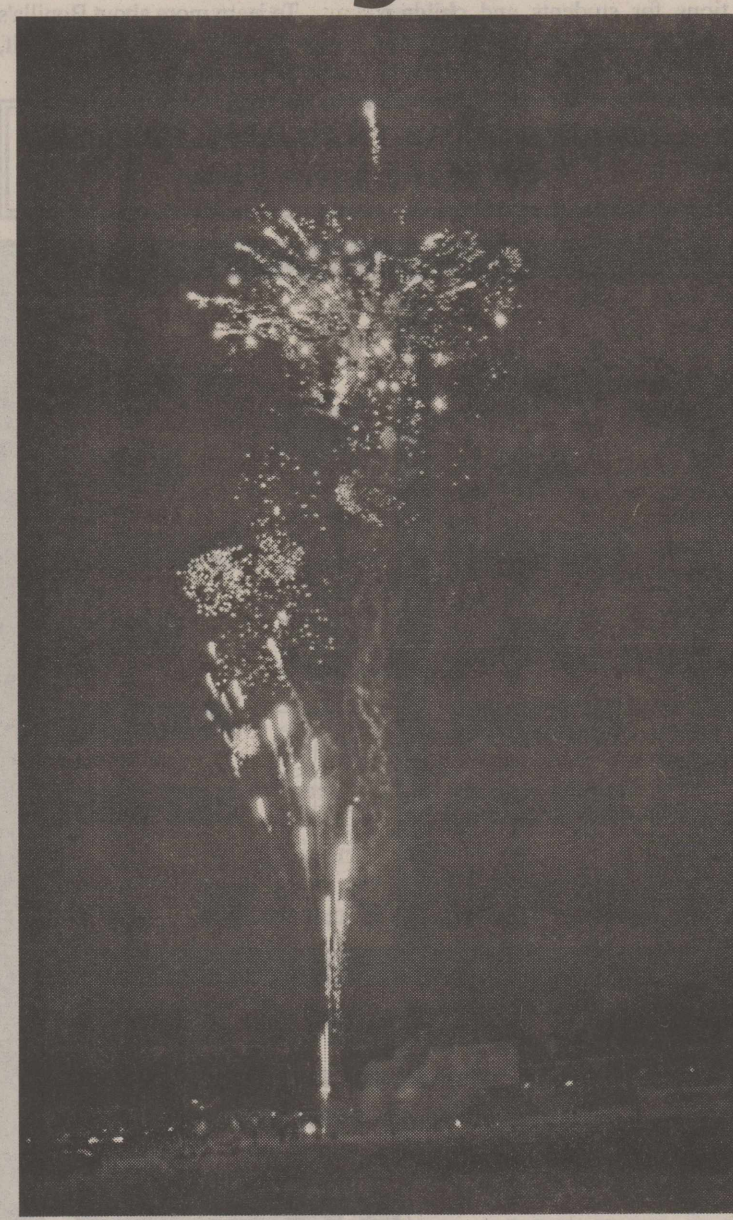

Two versions of school finance must blend or die



AUSTIN -- Sen. Florence Shapiro's version of the House's school finance bill sailed through the full Senate last week - the second week of the month-long special session called by Gov. Rick Perry.

Now it's up to a conference committee to approve the Plano Republican's substitute to House Bill 2. The trouble is, the House version now carries 68 amendments. If the committee composed of House and Senate members fails to reach consensus the bill will die. If the committee resolves differences, next stop for the legislation will be the governor's office, for a signature or a veto.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst expressed optimism that Senate and House members could come to a reasonable agreement. House Speaker Tom Craddick was silent on the issue.

In any case, it's too early for supporters or opponents to declare victory, because the school finance, appropriations and property tax reform bills behave like giant amoebas. All three are squeezed into the petri dish we call the legislative process, and when one changes shape, the others do too. Appropriations (HB 1) and property tax reform (HB 3) moved past the committee level but have not yet reached the House floor.

Even if the Legislature fails to pass school finance reform in this or any subsequent called session, Texas public schools still can open in September. An estimated \$23 billion of the \$35 billion school budget vetoed by Gov. Perry in the regular session rests safely in the general revenue fund managed by the Legislative Budget Board. Money to operate may be disbursed at the discretion of the governor.

Meanwhile, the House and Senate have adjourned for the Fourth of July holiday. House members will return for business on Tuesday and senators will be back at their desks on Wednesday.

Hutchison Decides to Stay Put
 Republicans won't have to split loyalties in the March primary, because Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison announced she will

run for her third term in the U.S. Senate, rather than challenge Rick Perry for the governorship.

The senator's decision made it easier for Comptroller Carol Keeton Strayhorn, who has been nipping at Perry's boot heels for years. Strayhorn, who is comfortable going against the grain, plans to defy the odds by wrestling the party's nomination from a sitting governor.

Kinky Campaign Travels Texas

Hill Country singer-writer-storyteller Kinky Friedman is stumping around the state, getting people used to the idea of his now-serious drive to earn a spot on the November 2006 ballot as the Independent candidate for governor.

Friedman needs 45,539 valid signatures to get on the ballot, but can't begin to collect them until after the Democratic and Republican state primaries next March.

Only registered voters who have not voted in either primary can sign his petition and be counted.

His slogan is "Save Your Vote for Kinky."

Commandments monument stays

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled the six-foot-tall Ten Commandments monument on the state Capitol grounds does not violate the establishment clause of the First Amendment.

In a separate case, the high court ruled that framed copies of the Commandments on the walls of two Kentucky courthouses were unconstitutional.

Erected in 1961 by the Fraternal Order of Eagles of Texas, the granite-hewn monument sits near the oval drive on the northwest side of the Capitol.

Waiting and waiting for a train

Attorney General Greg Abbott ruled that the Federal Railroad Safety Act passed in 1995 preempts a Texas law imposing a criminal penalty against a railway company if its train blocks a railroad crossing for more than 10 minutes.

Pass this test before you arrest

Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, filed legislation that would require law enforcement officers to take a certification course on handling the arrest of a foreign national.
