

Tomatoes-cut and come again

tomatoes, there is really little reason to set out new plants in the garden (unless yours are burned to crisp)! Just prune them back rather severely, using pruning loppers, after they have stopped setting fruit, usually in late June and July. It is important to note that tomatoes will not set fruit if daytime temperatures exceed 92 degrees combined with night time lows of 75 degrees or higher. Be sure to leave several healthy stems with some foliage on each plant. Put the trimming in a garbage bag (not in the compost bin) and remove from the garden.


Next, add a generous amount of compost and a couple Also, a wide fluctuation in soil

If you have spring-planted of tablespoons of a complete fer- moisture can contribute to fruit tilizer around the base of each plant to add new organic matter removed from the soil during the spring. Also, replace any mulch that has washed away or broken down. Tomato roots spread out much wider than the plant, so keep that in mind when you are applying these amendments.

> To reduce the risk of disease, use drip irrigation or a soaker hose for water needs. Apply supplemental moisture two or three times each week if it does not rain. It is important to keep tomatoes evenly watered. If they become too dry, blossom end rot can become a problem.

Once your revitalized toma- Crockett Monument, from 11:30 and replace nutrients that were to plants begin to set fruit, it is important to top-dress them with a tablespoon of nitrogen fertilizer once a week. If you start topdressing before they set fruit, you will end up with giant plants but few tomatoes. By applying advance with the Chamber fertilizer once fruit has begun to set, you will maximize your producing yields of 20 pounds or more per plant.

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New laws take effect Sept. 1

Department of Public Safety

The 79th session of the Texas Legislature passed several bills of interest to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

All of the bills listed below go into effect Sept. 1, unless otherwise noted.

* HB 183 - states that all children younger than 5 years of age (old law was younger than 4) and less than 36 inches tall are required to be in a child safety seat system. It also classifies seat belt and safety seat infractions as moving violations for the first time.

* SB 1257 - prohibits use of wireless communications devices (including cell phones) for the first six months after teenagers get their driver licenses. The bill also prohibits passenger bus drivers transporting minors from using wireless communications devices, except in emergencies or when the bus is stopped.

* HB 1357 - creates a sixmonth driver license (DL) suspension for a person convicted of providing alcohol to a minor (one year for second offense), and increases the DL suspension to one year for minors who are convicted of a second alcohol offense.

* HB 1481 - makes it a Class B misdemeanor if a person drives around a barricade where a warning sign or barricade has been placed because water is over any portion of a road, street or highway. It also specifically creates a traffic violation for driving around a barricade put in the roadway because of dangerous conditions.

Another classified as a moving violation, the judge must require the driver to complete a driving safety course—and, if the driver holds provisional driver license (under 18 years of age), submit to a DPS road test.

* HB 1484 - specifies that a person commits a traffic offense if they are involved in a crash on the main lane, ramp, shoulder, median or adjacent area of a freeway and don't move their vehicle to an area that minimizes interference with freeway traffic (assuming the vehicle is

* HB 51 - requires an ignition interlock device if a driver's blood alcohol level is determined to be .15 or more (upon conviction).

* HB 1596 - clarifies the definition of neighborhood electric vehicles and motor assisted scooters and allows municipalities to regulate the use of motor assisted scooters on roadways and sidewalks.

* SB 1257 - disqualifies a person from operating a commercial motor vehicle if the person's driving is determined to constitute an imminent hazard.

* HB 754 - allows fines up to \$500 for violating the laws for transporting loose material in commercial vehicles.

* SB 1258 - specifies that an original commercial driver license or commercial driver learner's permit expires in five years instead of six years. * HB 87 - allows cities to

lower residential speed limits from 30 mph to 25 mph in certain instances. This bill took effect immediately.

* HB 2257 - allows the * SB 1005 - provides that if TxDOT commission to establish a driver younger than 25 years a daytime speed limit of 80 mandatory newspaper notifica- call (512) 424-2080.

If established, this speed does not apply to truck tractors, trailers, semi trailers, or trucks, other than light trucks and light trucks pulling a trailer. This bill takes effect immediately.

* SB 1670 - requires TxDOT, in conjunction with Department of Insurance, to establish a verification program for vehicle insurance in order to try and reduce the number of uninsured drivers.

* HB 120 - creates an organ donor education and registry program. Eventually, Texans will be able to indicate their wish to become an organ donor when they are issued or renew their driver license or ID card.

* SB 122 - requires peace officers to report notification of ID theft to their employing agency. It provides penalties for the unauthorized use of personal information.

* HB 699 - increases the penalty for using someone else's DL or ID card to a Class A misdemeanor. It also clarifies that use of a false ID by someone under 21 for purchase of alcohol is a Class C misdemeanor.

* HB 1239 - makes DPS more involved with drug task forces operating in Texas, including any "multicounty" drug task forces. (Effective August 1.)

* HB 164 - places restrictions on the sale of pseudoephedrine products and allows children exposed to meth production to be removed from the home.

provision deals with postcard notification for high-risk sex offenders. DPS is now required to send the postcards to all addresses within the distribution area, except post office boxes. Prior law specified residential addresses only.

* HB 1068 - creates an independent commission with investigational oversight involving complaints against DNA crime labs in the state. It also requires DNA sampling from some 60,000 current Texas prison inmates who do not have DNA profiles in the CODIS (Combined DNA Index System)

* HB 823 - describes the conditions under which a person will be presumed to be "traveling" for the first time. It applies to people who have a handgun in their vehicle but do not have a concealed handgun license (CHL). It also places the burden of proof on prosecutors to prove the driver was "not traveling."

* HB 225 - extends the renewal time for a CHL from four to five years, which will reduce the average annual cost of a license.

* HB 322 - lowers the age requirement for active duty or retired members of the military applying for a CHL from 21 years of age to 18, and reduces the original license fee and any renewal fees for active duty members of the armed forces by 50 percent.

* HB 1038 - reduces CHL renewal fees by 50 percent for anyone over 60 years of age.

state will head back to school soon. The Texas Department of does not have to stop for a Public Safety reminds all drivers to watch out for children walking to school or waiting for school buses--and to obey all traffic laws related to school

Drivers also need to slow down and pay attention in school zones. Children may not be looking for oncoming traffic when they step into the road-

"Although school buses are the safest form of transportation for students, the most dangerous time of the journey is when kids are entering and exiting the bus," said Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr., director of the DPS. "When a school bus is loading or unloading students, the law requires that drivers stop on most roadways."

State law requirements

State law requires approaching drivers to stop when a school bus is stopped and operating a visual signal (red flashing lights or a stop sign). Drivers should not proceed until the school bus resumes motion; the driver is

School children across the proceed; or the visual signal is no longer activated. A driver school bus if it is on a highway with roadways separated by an intervening space or physical barrier. (If a highway is divided only by a left-turning lane, the roadways are not separated, and drivers must stop for school buses.)

Punishment for drivers who do not stop

Drivers who do not stop way, so drivers must remain for school buses face a fine of up to \$1,000. If a driver is convicted of this offense more than one time, DPS can suspend their license for up to six

"DPS has zero tolerance for vehicles that pass stopped school buses," Davis said. "Drivers must slow down, obey school zone speed limits and stop for school buses to ensure the safety of Texas school chil-







Plano senator's school finance bill awaits House's scrutiny



AUSTIN -Month-long II of the 79th Texas Legislature ends Friday, Aug. Lt. Gov.

David Dewhurst resorted to news releases to coax the House into accepting the Senate version of school finance reform. He did this after closed-door meetings with House Speaker Tom Craddick failed to result in agreement and days left until the deadline hit single digits. In reply, Craddick produced news releases of his own. He suggested that Dewhurst quit sending "watered-down" bills that "lack meaningful reform."
