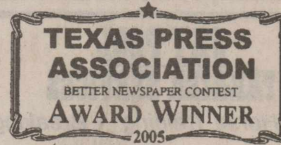

Lions get first district win against Grape Creek

GRAPE CREEK - The Ozona Lions picked up their first district win of the year with a 39-6 victory over the Grape Creek Eagles Friday night.

The Lions, coming off a tough district opener against Wall, faced this game without starting quarterback Jordan Long. David Esparza and Drew Clayton both took turns at the helm, with positive results.

"The kids played great from the beginning. I was really proud of them," said Coach Benny Granger.

The Lions would get on the board early in the first quarter on a four-yard run by Jack Rodriguez. Rodriguez would rush for 134 yards for the Lions. Matt McGuire's extra-point kick was good to put Ozona up 7-0.

Esparza would go on a passing spree on the Lions next possession hitting Jared Espino for five yards and Caleb Mitchel for seven.

With 2:17 left in the first, Esparza found Espino for a 25-yard pass for the second touchdown of the game. McGuire's kick was good to put Ozona up 14-0.

The second quarter would start out well for Grape Creek as the Eagles managed to get down to the Ozona 16-yard line.

However, Espino would catch an interception to give Ozona the ball back.

Rodriguez and Nick Perez would rush the ball down the field, including a 24-yard by Perez, to get Ozona deep into Eagle territory at the 15-yard line.

Rodriguez would then run it in for his second touchdown of the game with eight minutes left in the second. McGuire's kick would be good to give Ozona a 21-0 lead.

Both teams would battle defensively with Ozona's Levi Vargas, Rodriguez, McGuire and Espino putting the pressure on the Eagles to stop them at the Lions 24-yard line.

Grape Creek would come back on their next possession to score their only touchdown of the game with five seconds left.

"The only touchdown we gave up was mostly my fault. They changed coverages on us and I sent in a pass play that did not have much of a chance. It was a bad call and I put the team in a bad situation. I, too, must eliminate mistakes just as I ask them to do," Granger said. "It was great to see the kids not get their heads down after Grape Creek scored. We came back and scored on our next two offensive plays. Any momentum Grape Creek gained from their touchdown was erased

in a hurry."

Ozona would answer right back with a second left in the half on a 63-yard touchdown run by Rodriguez to increase Ozona's lead to 27-6.

The Lions would start off the second half just as well on a 66-yard touchdown run by Perez to put Ozona up 33-6.

Ozona would score its final touchdown after Esparza threw a 30-yard pass to Tate Collis to put the Lions into Eagle territory. Rodriguez would run it in two plays later for 33 yards for the 39-6 win.

Defensively, the Lions hold the Eagles at the goal line several time with tackles by Kyle Fish, Colby Mayfield, Mitchel, Jose Galvan, Rodriguez, Ely Silva, McGuire, Perez, Vargas and Freddy Fierro.

The Lions will take on the Sonora Broncos at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Lion Stadium.

Off-road vehicle park second hearing Thursday

The Texas Motorized Trails Coalition has made an application to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for a federal grant from the Recreational Trails Fund to acquire property and to develop a public recreation area in Crockett County.

Changes approved to drug testing policy at school board meeting

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Board of Trustees unanimously approved changes to the district's Drug Testing Policy at the Sept. 27 monthly board meeting.

The changes deal with consequences associated with positive drug tests.

Under the new policy, if a student tests positive the first time, they will be subject to a 15 calendar day suspension while school in session, be required to run 25 miles on the track at 6 a.m., all of which is to be administered by the athletic director, along with missing the first athletic/academic contest.

On the second test, the suspension increases to 20 calendar days and running 30 miles. Third offense is 25 calendar day suspension and running 35 miles.

On the fourth positive, the

student will be removed from the program for one calendar year. Any subsequent violations will result in dismissal from the athletic program for the remainder of the student's high school career.

Counseling and conference with parents or guardians is also part of all positive drug testing consequences.

Scrimmages and dual meets do not count as athletic contests and the violations are concurrent throughout a student's high school career.

"It's a little stiffer on the first offense and lighter on the second and third, but I still think it gets the point across," said Athletic Director Benny Granger. "I, or someone from my staff, will be out there with them counting laps and watching every bit of their running. The biggest part of the punishment is getting up at 6 a.m."

"I'm for going on what you've got right now and let's see how it goes this year. If we need

to adjust it we can," added Board Vice President Laurie Hale.

The board also discussed the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas report they received. The district received a rating of above standard achievement. The report was for the 2003-2004 school year.

Interim Superintendent John King said that one area of concern to watch is the enrollment numbers. In 2002, the district's enrollment was 842 students. Since then it has slowly declined from 831 in 2003, 818 in 2004 to 770 today.

On the other hand, the district is showing 97.5 percent in student attendance.

"The staff is working hard to keep close tabs on our attendance here. You're probably going to hear some complaints about some home visits because we feel their children need to be in school. It's hard to teach an empty desk," he said. "This is a good report."

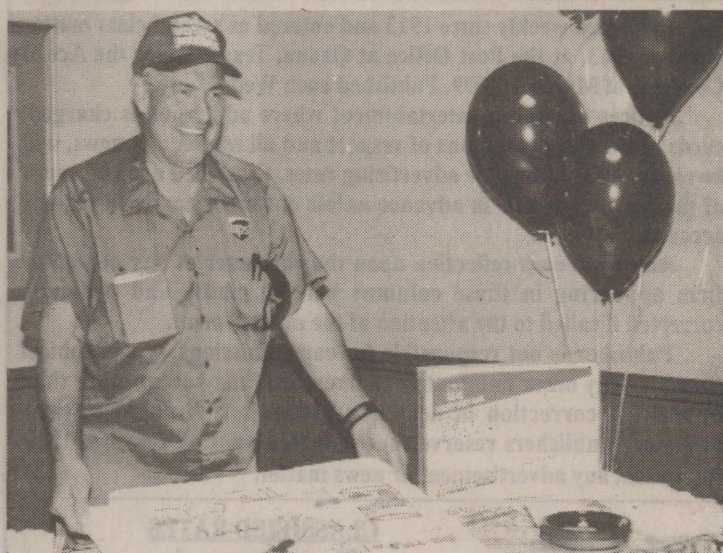

The new chief on the court

With all of the media attention surrounding the nomination of Judge John Roberts to the Supreme Court, most people feel like mini-experts on the Judge. Yet many individuals still may be asking, who is John Roberts the man and what is his life story?

Roberts was born in Buffalo, New York on January 27, 1955. He has three sisters and is the second-eldest. His father worked as an executive in a steel company. When he was in grade school, his family moved to Indiana.

He attended a small private high school in Indiana where he was very active in sports, student government, newspaper, choir and drama. He also studied six years of Latin and ended up graduating first in his class. He truly was a jack of all trades.

After high school, Roberts decided to attend Harvard and earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in just three years, graduating summa cum laude.

He went on to obtain his law degree from Harvard as well, where he graduated magna cum laude. There he worked as an editor for the Harvard Law Review. Life after college bore success after success for Roberts. He has served as a judge and a lawyer, as well as a husband and a father. He worked as a public attorney, serving in the position of Deputy Solicitor General, where he argued and won many cases for the United States before the Supreme Court.

Roberts has also worked on and off as a private attorney for Hogan & Hartson, where he ultimately became a partner. He most recently served as a judge for the Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, a position that the President of the United States had to appoint him to and the Senate had to confirm. Too say the least, Judge Roberts has had years of experience and success with the law in both the private and public sectors. Law is a subject of true passion for Roberts.

John Roberts is an equally passionate husband and father. Roberts is married to Jane Marie Sullivan, also a lawyer, and they live in Bethesda, Maryland. The couple was not able to conceive so in 2000 they adopted two children, Josephine and Jack. You may remember seeing Jack dancing to the delight of the international media when President George W. Bush formally introduced Judge Roberts as his nominee.

Now that Judge Roberts has been formally approved by the U.S. Senate he will go-on to serve as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The title of Supreme Court Justice is a life-time appointment. During his life he will review approximately 7,000 cases each year, although only 70 - 90 cases receive formal written opinions. Roberts has a whole lot of law ahead of him, especially since he is the second youngest Chief Justice in US History.

It's my honor to congratulate Judge Roberts and thank him in advance for his service.

Sanchez wins police games medals

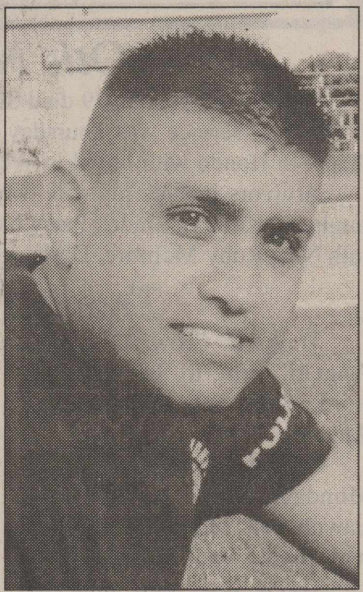

Kerrville police officer Danny Sanchez is becoming accustomed to finding success the Texas Police Olympics.

Sanchez, who competed in the Monday-Wednesday games in June at Harlandale Memorial Stadium in San Antonio, won three medals in the competition, winning a gold medal in the 200-meter dash, and grabbing silver medals in the 1,500 and 5,000 runs.

The effort marked the third consecutive year Sanchez, 34, has medaled in the annual games, posting times of 25.1 seconds in the 200, a 4:42 timing in the 1,500, and a 17:50 clocking in the 5,000. He has won medals in the 1,500 run all three years.

"It was very important," Sanchez said of his training for the games, where he bounced back from a hamstring injury in the 100 dash in last year's competition. "I lost a lot of weight, did a lot of road work. I figured

if I stayed off the track, my hamstring would be a little better."

Sanchez's sprint-distance double is somewhat unusual by track and field standards, where athletes often concentrate on one particular discipline. The officer, however, believes speed and endurance are vital to his profession.

"When I was in high school

I was a distance runner," Sanchez said. "Being with the police department, you get to chase people short distances. I enjoy both. I guess I'm versatile."

At Ozona High School, Sanchez was an all time record holder in track and cross country.

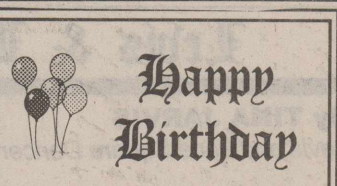
Sanchez's performances earned him berths in the July Police World Games in Alberta, Canada, but the officer says he will bypass that competition. He thanked Sandy Lumley of Kerr County Federal Credit Union and the KPD for their support of his effort in the state games, and says he'll look for a fourth year of state medals in 2006.

"I don't want to feel like I'm getting old," Sanchez said of continuing to compete. "I stick to competing and running to make myself feel young."

Sanchez is a 1988 graduate of Ozona High School.

He is the son of Daniel Sanchez and Chayo Sanchez of Ozona.

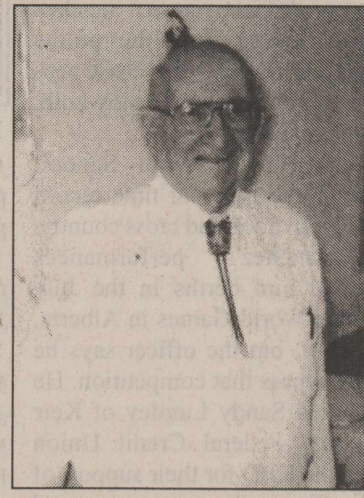

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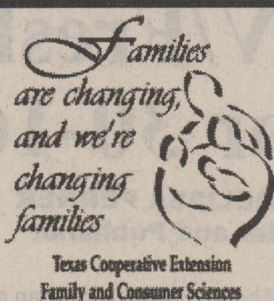

Conquering obesity is community effort

Like the weather, the topic of overweight in children is a hot topic of conversation these days.

But unlike the weather that no one ever does anything about, a group of nutrition and school food service experts want to do something about the issue of children who are overweight. About 40 of them met in College Station to attend a seminar hosted by the Texas Beef Council and the Texas A&M University Institute of Food Science and Engineering.

"The issue of childhood overweight is a hot topic in the news these days," said Dr. Jenna Anding, Texas Cooperative Extension nutrition specialist and one of the speakers for a panel on "The Role of Schools in Promoting Healthy Weight in Children."

Overweight and obesity are not just cosmetic or self-image problems, Anding said. "We have children as young as 9 being diagnosed with Type II diabetes - 10 years ago Type II diabetes was something people over 40 got. Not anymore."

Because it affects so many people of so many ages and so many different life situations, overweight is not a simple issue with a simple cause.

Many factors contribute to Americans' rising weight, she said, including:

- * Health factors: Some medical conditions and the use of certain

medications;

- * Genetics: Inherited physical characteristics;

- * Eating habits: Frequent restaurant or fast food meals, portion sizes (tendency to "super size");

- * Home and family life: Frequency of eating out and/or fast food meals, presence of a television set in the bedroom, family meals or lack thereof, time constraints, parenting styles.

But one of the major factors in Americans' weight gain is lack of physical activity, Anding said. "Seventy percent of adults and 50 percent of youth are considered sedentary" because they get less than 30 minutes of physical activity a day.

Some of the reasons listed for this lack are:

- * For adults: Lack of time, lack of motivation, fear of injury and lack of social support.

- * For children: Preference for indoor activity, lack of energy, time constraints, lack of opportunity and lack of social support.

Obesity is a growing problem, in more ways than one, Anding said. "The two leading causes of death (are) heart disease and cancer." And both have been linked to nutrition. Research suggests that heart disease may be present in some people as early as age 20, she said.

And "one-third of all cancer deaths are believed to be nutrition-related."

Obviously this is not an easy problem with an easy solution.

"It has to come from the community," Anding said, from everyone including families, children, schools, health care system, food supply, urban design and transportation, medical care and legislation.

Among her suggestions:

- * An increase in physical activity, including more physical education classes and less TV and computer time.
- * A decrease in fast food consumption and an increase in consumption of fruits and vegetables.
- * Parents who exercise, showing by their own behavior how beneficial physical activity is.

With a partnership of parents, educators, officials and legislators, the growth in America's girth can be stopped, Anding said, but it will take time and effort on everybody's part.

Healthy Recipe:

Peanut Butter Raisin Cookies

- 1 cup peanut butter
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 large egg, beaten
- 1 1/2 cups raisin

Place oven rack in center position. Preheat oven to 350F. Combine all ingredients in a large mixing bowl and stir well with wooden spoon until smooth. Divide the dough into 24 portions, about one heaping tablespoon each. Roll each portion between your hands to form a smooth ball. Place the balls of dough on an un-greased cookie sheet. Dip a fork in water several times to help press down on the ball of dough in two directions with a fork to form a cross-hatch pattern. Bake in the oven until the cookies rise and turn lightly golden, about 10 minutes. Remove cookies from the oven and let cool on the baking sheet before removing. Yields 24 cookies. Serve with milk if desired.

Fall ideal for planting trees and shrubs

Finally, fall is here. The weather is becoming slightly cooler, and gardeners are slowly migrating back outdoors after record-breaking heat this summer. Now is a perfect time to add a new tree or a grouping of shrubs to the landscape. Or perhaps you have an area in the landscape that needs 'remodeling' or rejuvenating. The fall may be the best season to plant, surpassing even the spring.

Many people prefer January through March for planting, but fall months of September through December have distinct advantages. Fall planting follows the heat of summer, before a cool winter season, and trees and shrubs planted in the fall use this to good advantage. Plant roots grow anytime the soil temperature is 40 degrees or higher, which may occur all winter in Texas. During the winter months, the root systems of the fall-planted specimens develop and become established. When spring arrives, this expanded root system can support and take advantage of the full surge of spring growth.

Fall is the optimum time to plant balled and burlapped trees and shrubs. Balled and burlapped plants have ample time to recover from transplanting and proliferate roots before spring growth begins. Remember, however, all bare root plants, including roses and pecan and fruit trees, should be planted in late winter when they are completely dormant.

When buying plants for your landscape, be sure to get healthy, well-grown plants. Always buy from a reputable dealer. Those in the plant-selling business year-round depend on repeat customers, and

only by selling customers quality plants can there be assurance of future business. Beware of plant bargains. They can easily turn out to be real headaches. A bargain is no good, if it dies. The price tag, especially the cheapest one, is not the best guide to quality.

All plants have growing requirements. Think about the plant's needs before you invest. Is it adapted to your area's soil? Will it grow in sun or shade? Does it need a wet or dry location? Is it cold hardy? Some nurseries have this type of information on tags beside the plant. If not, ask a nursery professional or the county Extension agent.

"Plan before you plant" is always a good rule of thumb. Whether you are planting a single plant or an entire landscape, plant first, and then plant. Good planning is a worthwhile investment of time that will pay off in greater enjoyment of attractive and useful home grounds, and in increasing the value of your home. It's much easier to move plants on paper than to dig them after planting in the wrong place. A plan saves many planting mistakes.

Every plant in the landscape should serve a purpose. Ask yourself if you want a plant for screening, for privacy, or for shade. How large will it be five years from now? Plants, like people, grow up. Remember, that a small one-gallon-size plant will look entirely different after a few years of growth in your landscape.

Plant properly for success. Here are a few guidelines on getting the job done right:

- * Dig a hole large enough in diameter so that the root system has at least six inches of clearance on all

sides. The root ball should rest on a solid foundation, so dig the hole much deeper than the ball.

- * Plant the tree or shrub slightly above the level of the surrounding soil, to allow for settling and increased soil drainage.

- * Carefully place the tree or shrub in the hole. Handle the plant by the root ball, not by the trunk. A broken ball of earth can mean a dead plant. Always remove any container before you plant.

- * Backfill the hole, using only the native soil removed from the hole; do not use soil amendments when planting large shrubs and trees. Fill the hole, and firm the soil around the plant. Water thoroughly to settle the soil around the roots and to eliminate any air pockets.

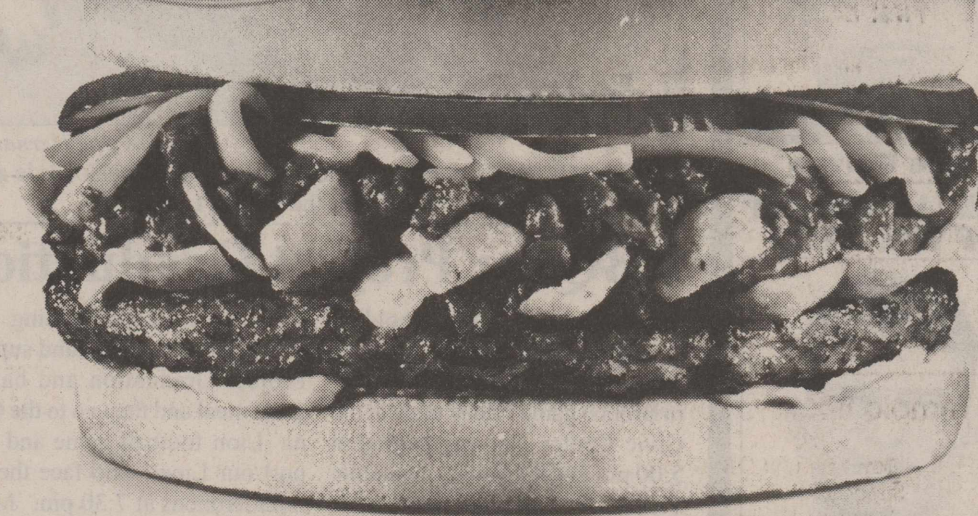
- * Do not fertilize your tree or shrub after planting. Wait until early in the spring to do this, and even then, go lightly. Heavy applications of fertilizer may burn and injure the root system, and could possibly kill the plant.

- * Watering has been and remains paramount in transplanting. At the time of transplanting, soak the root ball and surrounding soil. A thorough watering every 7 to 10 days dramatically increases the success ratio. More frequent watering may encourage root rot. Remember more trees and shrubs fail from over watering than from under watering.

- * Before calling it a day, add 4 to 6 inches of mulch around the base of newly planted trees and shrubs. This helps to keep down weeds and conserve soil moisture. Use pine bark, compost, grass clippings, or leaves.

Fall is for planting. Visit your nursery today, and beautify and add value to your home.

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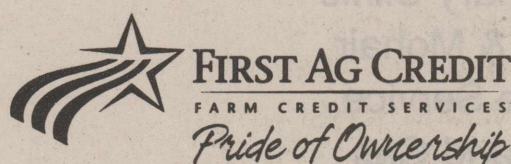
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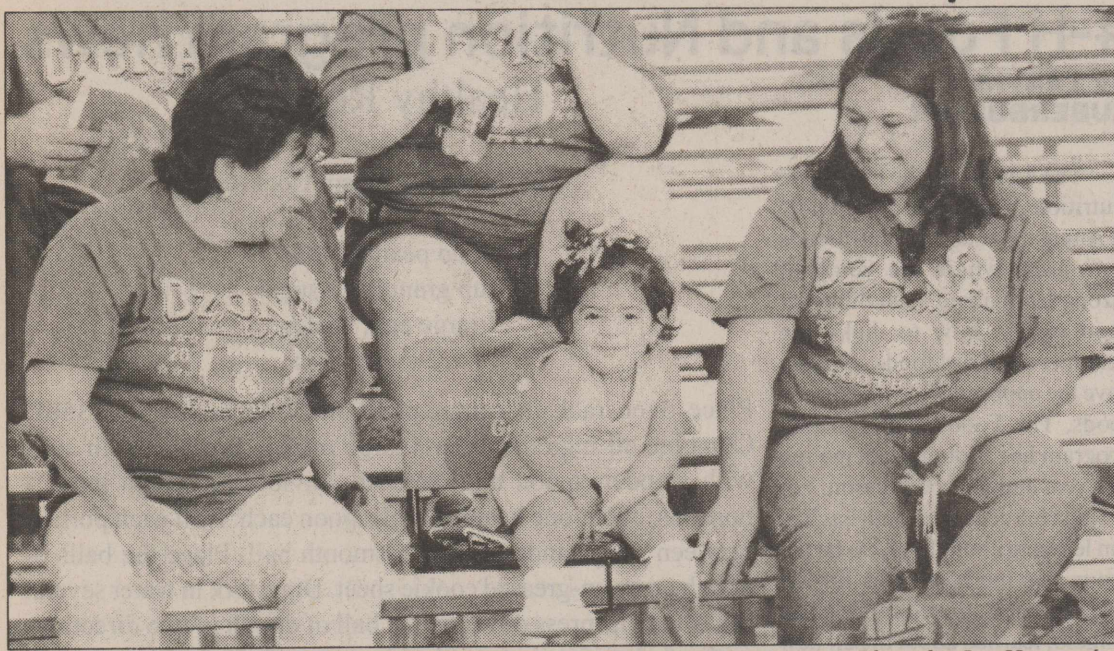

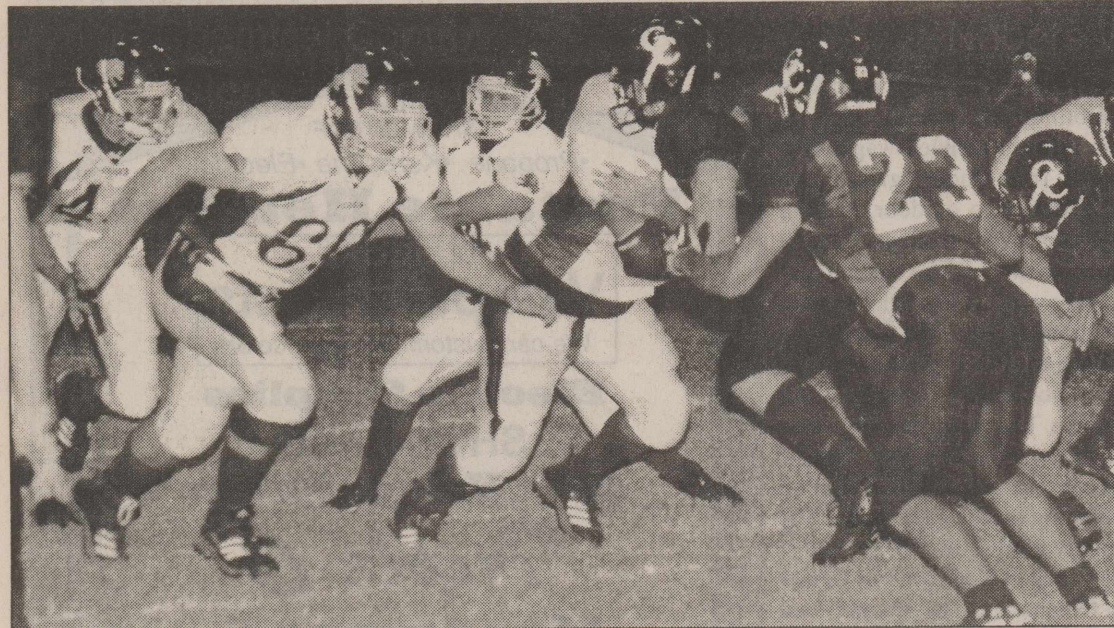

TATE COLLIS LOOKS DOWN THE FIELD waiting for the 30 yard catch that set up a touchdown for the varsity Lions.

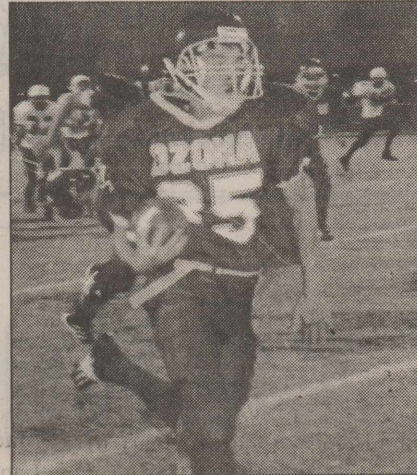

The Lions will take on Sonora Thursday with games starting at 5 p.m. in Sonora.

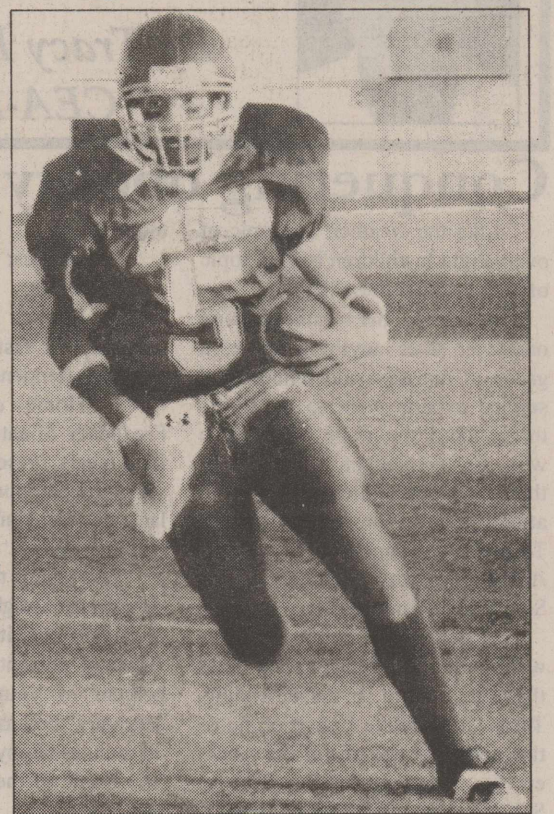

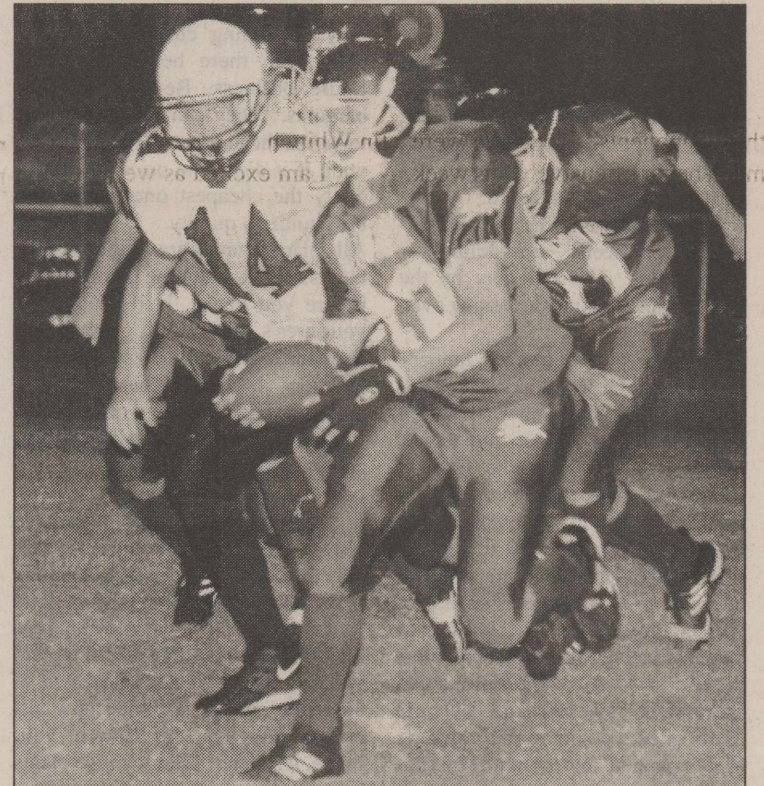

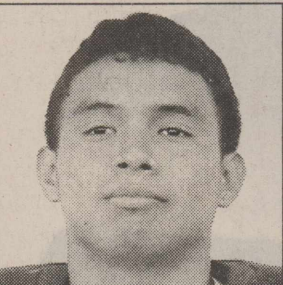

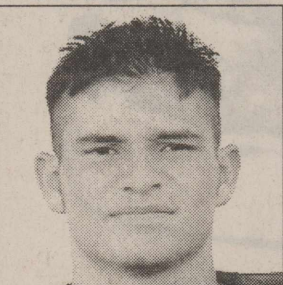

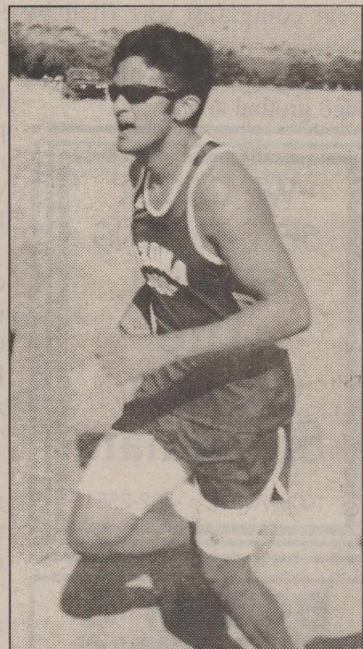

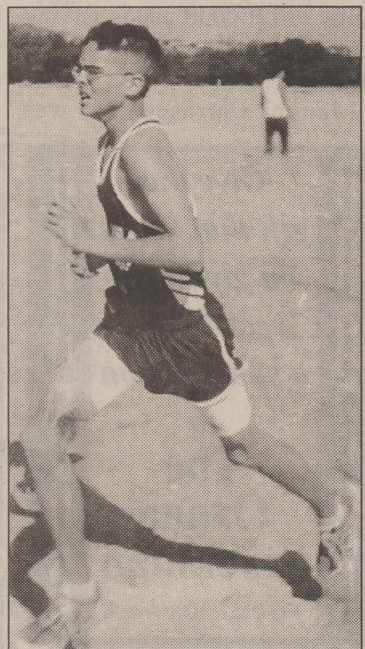

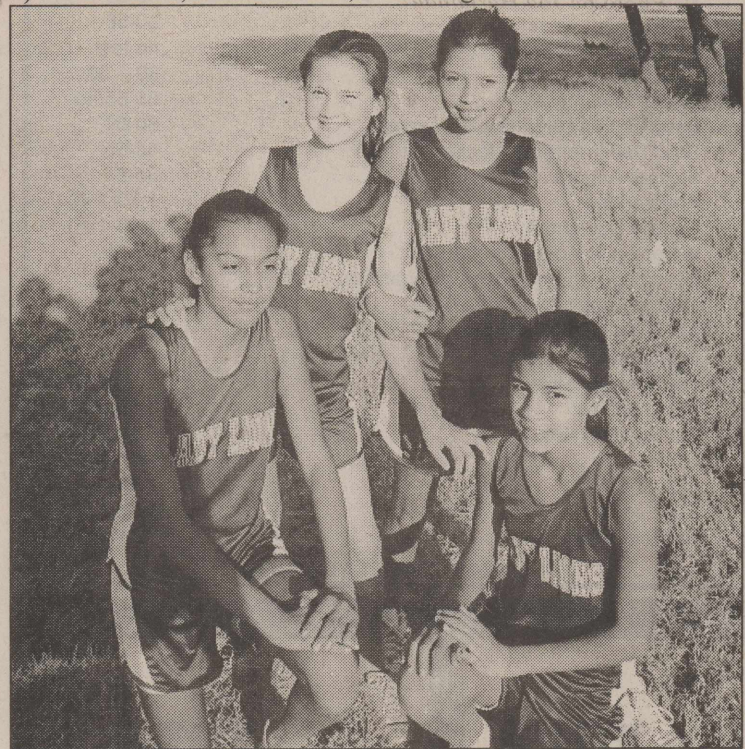

Travis County grand jury indicts U.S. House majority leader DeLay



AUSTIN - A Travis County grand jury indicted U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay of Sugar Land on a charge of conspiring to

violate a state election law that prohibits the use of corporate contributions to campaigns for elected office.

DeLay, in accordance with U.S. House rules, resigned his position as majority leader. That means he will no longer decide which bills will make it to the House floor for debate.

In a post-indictment news conference, DeLay said he was innocent and called Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, the prosecutor, a "partisan zealot" and the indictment "baseless."

Earle, a Democrat, did not say exactly how DeLay broke the law, but did say that evidence would emerge in the trial. The charge stems from the 2002 midterm election, in which DeLay's political action committee, Texans for a Republican Majority, sent corporate donations totaling \$190,000 to the Republican National Committee.

The money allegedly returned to Texas as cash infusions to specific House members' campaigns in the final months of the election. Those races resulted in victories that bolstered GOP majorities in the Texas House and Senate. Legislative redrawing U.S. congressional districts passed in 2003.

The grand jury also reindicted Washington, D.C., fundraiser James W. Ellis and Austin fundraiser John D. Colyandro, both associates of DeLay, on charges of money-laundering and conspiracy related to the election.

DeLay was ordered to appear in Austin Oct. 21 for pre-trial processing. His attorneys are asking for the trial to begin before the end of the year.

Top officials address Rita issues

Gov. Rick Perry and other statewide officeholders toured East Texas counties hit Sept. 23

& 24 by Hurricane Rita, doing what they could to speed relief and recovery efforts.

Perry issued a proclamation authorizing utility companies to lay temporary power lines. Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst made calls to bring in needed supplies.

Lawmakers from the area visited their districts. Meanwhile, having seen what a tangle of life-endangering inefficiencies hurricanes Katrina and Rita exposed in federal, state and local government, Perry appointed an 11-member task force to improve responses in the future.

Perry's Task Force on Evacuation Transportation and Logistics will meet in early October.

In other news, the Texas Department of State Health Services initiated a toll-free number (877-623-6274) to help family members locate hospital and nursing home patients evacuated because of Hurricane Rita. Callers need the name, date of birth and gender of the patient.

In cooperation with the Texas Hospital Association, DSHS will provide the hospital name and location, if available, in its directory but not the patient's health status.

Also, Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott started a toll-free hotline to assist in restoring child support payments to parents in the hurricane-ravaged Beaumont, Orange and Port Arthur areas. The number is 866-291-6604.

No word yet on school finance
 As reported in late August, the Texas Legislature did not meet state District Judge John Dietz's Oct. 1 deadline to find a way to give Texas schoolchildren equal access to a good education.

The Texas Supreme Court didn't have it done by Oct. 1 either. Since July 6, the high court has been deliberating on the state's appeal of Dietz's year-old ruling that the method of funding public education fails to satisfy the state constitution.

With March primaries on the horizon and new budgetary obligations related to hurricane recovery, there does not appear to be a collective rush to solve school funding and its twin issue: property tax relief.

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BOARD: New sound system is needed for Lion Stadium

Maintenance and Transportation Director Ray Don Myers said a new sound system is needed for Lion Stadium.

The current one is set up for voice speakers, which can't handle music or bass very well. A new system is expected to arrive and be installed by Oct. 21 that will handle both voice and music, he said.

Technology Director Rod Miller said it will take about a month or longer to get the primary school computers back online due to all computer parts being shipped to the hurricane affected areas in Texas and Louisiana.

A few weeks ago, an 18-wheeler truck drove through the primary school parking lot and struck the fiber optic cable knocking out the networking and Internet on the school's computers.

Miller said he is hoping to get the Grade Speed software back up on the computers while waiting for the new cable to come in and

be installed. Other agenda items approved:

- Revisions to Local Board Policy EHBC (local) in order to draw funds on homebound students.
- Donations of \$500 each to the Crockett County EMS, Ozona Volunteer Fire Department and the Crockett County Sheriff's Department DARE Program.
- Menard Special Education Cooperative Special Education Shared Services Arrangement Agreement.
- Interlocal agreement with La Porte ISD to obtain reimbursement of School-Based Medicaid Administrative Claims.
- Purchasing of a Chevrolet Impala for \$15,167.

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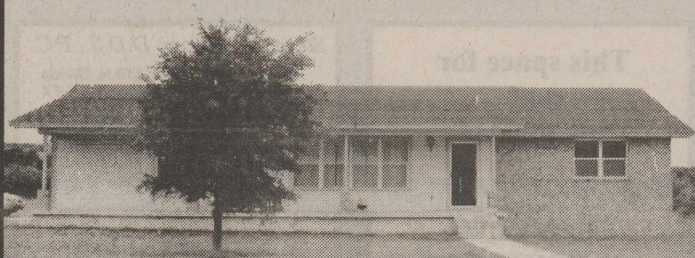

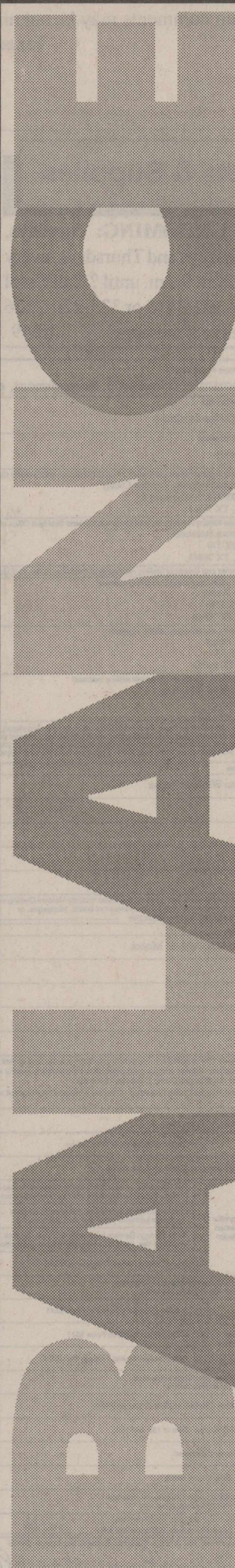

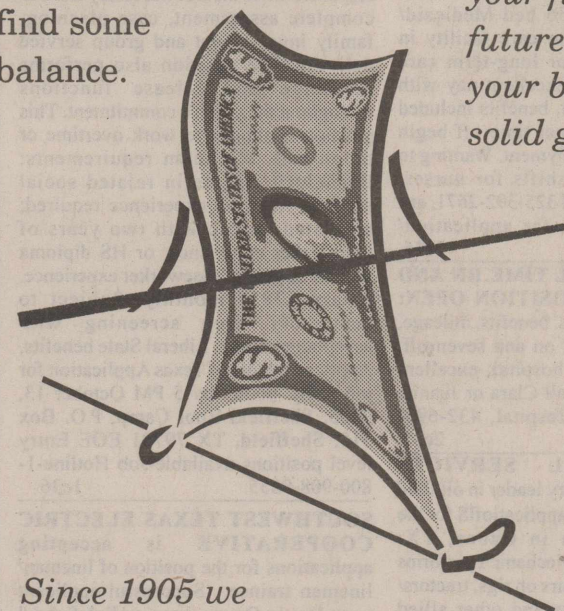
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
