Lions hold off Owls for win

BIG LAKE - The Ozona Lions defense created a wall around the Reagan County Owls Friday night to keep a one-point lead and an 8-7 win.

The Lions held off the Owls to gain their second District 2-AA

"Friday night was a tough game. We were so emotionally spent from the week before and we had a bad week of workouts," said Coach Benny Granger. "Somehow, the boys were able to find a way to win. I've coached many games that if you didn't play great, you lost. We were fortunate to get a win due to the fact that we played so poorly. We will put this one behind us and move on."

Ozona would trail to Reagan County, 2-7, until the fourth quarter when quarterback Justin Maldonado completed a 32-yard pass to Matt McGuire to put the Lions on the Owls' 19-yard line. Maldonado, who just moved up from the JV squad two weeks ago, would lead the Ozona most of the game after Drew Clayton was injured in the second quarter.

Jack Rodriguez would then get the ball into the end zone on fourth and 12 to give the Lions the one-point lead.



Turf grass fertilizer applications

grasses, especially Bermuda freeze and winter dormancy. grass and St. Augustine, benefit wo greatly from fall fertilizer applications. Lawns receiving a fertilizer boost in the fall are more winter hardy, have a healthier root system, and green-up earlier next spring. Area lawns need all the help they can get after the last three hot, dry summers.

What kind of fertilizer should I use?

We recommend using a 3-1-2 ratio fertilizer. This means fertilizer that contains 3 parts nitrogen to 1 part phosphorus and 2 parts potassium. This ratio will supply the correct proportion of the three phorus and potassium. Examples include 21-7-14 or 15-5-10 fertilizers. Depending on the fertilizer used, several micronutrients may also be supplied.

When should I fertilize? Applications should be

How much fertilizer should I apply?

Apply the fertilizer at a rate of 1 pound actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Using more than this at a time can promote excessive growth, turf diseases, and other problems. Nitrogen is very water soluble and excess nitrogen can lead to nitrate problems in runoff during rainfall.

How do I determine the area or square footage of my lawn?

Measure or step-off your turf grass areas in both directions. Be sure to include smallmain nutrients - nitrogen, phos- der areas next to driveways, sidewalks, and between houses. Length (feet) x Width (feet) = Area Example: 50 feet x 50 feet = 2500 square feet

What is meant by actual nitrogen?

The first number always given the percent nitrogen (N), the second is percent phosphorus (P) a, the third percent potassium (K). For example, a 50 pound bag of a 21-7-14 fertilizer is 21 percent Nitrogen 7 percent Phosphorus and 14 percent Potassium. To figure the actual pounds of the nutrient just multiply the weight of the bag times the percent - $50 \times 0.21 =$ 10.5 pounds of actual nitrogen in the 50 pound bag. The actual pounds of phosphorus and potassium are figured the same way and in this case are 3.5 pounds of phosphorus and 7.00 pounds of potassium.

At the recommended rate of pound actual N per 1,000 square feet, a 50 pound bag of 21-7-14 fertilizer will cover 10,500 square feet. Most yards are not that large. It may be necessary to weigh out the amount of fertilizer needed and store the remainder in a sealed container in a cool, dry place.



Our refreshments of punch, cookies and cakes were provided by the CCCC Family Council.




