
Members of the Woman's Forum met Nov. 15 at Ozona Senior Citizens' Building where they were treated to a program on Costa Rica. Diane Phillips shared, through narrative and photographs, her experiences on a Lindblad Expeditions ecotourism cruise to Costa Rica and Panama.

Her audience was astonished to learn that in Costa Rica's biologic reserve at Monteverde alone there are 100 species of mammals, 120 species of amphibians and reptiles, 400 bird species and 2,500 plus plant species including 500 orchid species. The country itself has roughly 10,000 plant species, including about 1,500 orchids and 1,800 tree species, some 360 species of amphibians and reptiles, at least 500,000 insect species, including a few thousand species of butterflies is many times considered an arid and 10 species of hummingbirds found nowhere else on Earth.





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

Everyday driving: minimize the risks by managing the distractions

Have you ever talked on a cell phone while driving? Changed the radio station or put in a new CD? Had something to eat or drink while you were driving? Reached into the backseat or leaned over to pick up something that had dropped on the floor? Read a map or directions? How about just talked to friends in the car with you? If you're like most people, you answered 'yes' to one or more of those questions.

Distracted driving is defined as the failure to pay attention while driving. It occurs anytime motorists take their concentration away from the road or oncoming traffic hazards. As Peter Kissinger, President of the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety, points out, "Distraction has been a problem ever since we started driving. It continues to grow because there is more traffic, more congestion, and more things to distract us." According to the National

Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), distracted drivers are a factor in 25 to 50 percent of all vehicle crashes. Of the more than 6 million motor vehicle crashes reported to law enforcement agencies each year in the United States, between 4,000 and 8,000 crashes related to distracted driving occur each day.

In general, a distraction is anything that takes you eyes, hands, or mind away from the task at handdriving. According to studies by the

University of North Carolina Highway Safety Research Center for the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety (2003), there are a great number of distracting activities that drivers engage in. Some of the most common are: reaching, leaning, etc.; manipulating music/audio controls; eating, drinking, etc.; conversing; grooming; reading or writing; using a cell phone and smoking.

The best advice is to keep your eyes on the road; keep your hands on the wheel, and keep your mind on the ride. The following tips can help manage distractions: Review maps before hitting the road, do your personal grooming at home, not in the car, don't take notes or look up a phone number while driving, before you get behind the wheel, familiarize yourself with the features of your vehicle's equipment, preset radio and climate controls, secure items that may move around when the car is in motion, don't try to retrieve items that fall to the floor while driving, instead wait until your vehicle is parked, avoid smoking, eating, drinking, and reading while driving, teach your children the importance of good behavior while riding in the car, pull safely off the road and out of traffic to tend to them, recognize that driving requires your full attention, if you find your mind wandering while you are driving, remind yourself to stay focused on the road, if neces-

sary, stop and take a break from driving, ask a passenger to serve as copilot and help you with activities that may be distracting, such as maps, directions, or unfamiliar navigation systems, monitor traffic conditions before engaging in activities that could divert attention away from driving, don't use a cell phone while driving, but if you must, use memory dialing or have a passenger dial for you; don't engage in emotional conversations; keep the conversation short, and don't combine distracting activities, always access the current traffic situation before making or receiving calls and do not answer or dial the phone when driving in hazardous conditions.

Miller, Terri Extension Associate and Safe Communities Project Director, stresses that driving is a common activity - one that we often take for granted. But, it is a serious responsibility, and it deserves your full, undivided attention. The bottom line: stay focused; pay attention, and expect the unexpected.







State spent \$1.3 billion on Katrina, Rita

State Capital Costs of responding to the ruin caused by hurricanes and a Katrina and Rita are adding up fast. HIGHLIGHTS On Nov. 16, By Ed Sterling

Texas' pursestring agency, the Legislative Budget Board, estimated \$1.3 billion had been spent by the state on hurricane relief since the storms hit.

Costs to local governmental entities have been at least that much, making the combined costs more like \$3 billion, so far. Yet, while this amount of money addresses the short-term impact, it does not take into account such long-term costs as housing, feeding, schooling, health care and employment.

For now though, it is easy to guess how some of the state's \$3 billion budget surplus over the next biennium may be used.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency is supposed to reimburse Texas for many costs related to the hurricanes if all goes according to to get the congressman's trial design.

AUSTIN - saying the current method of funding public education benefits wealthier school districts and hurts poorer school districts to the point of being unconstitutional. If the high court upholds the lower court ruling, the abiding question will be how the tax system can be re-engineered to give property owners tax relief and improve public education to an acceptable level in all schools.




