

## The history of Christmas carols

As we celebrate another holiday season, I thought it would be have religious meaning and that the fun to see where some of our Christmas carols come from.

To decorate the house with all sorts of greenery (not just "boughs of holly"). Traditionally, to "deck the halls" before Christmas Eve is considered bad luck.

3. In the song "Here We Go A-Wassailing," the word "caroling" is often substituted for "wassailing." But caroling and wassailing are not the same. What's the difference?

Caroling is, of course, the act of singing Christmas carols. But wassailing is the ancient practice\_almost cut out of the final version. of toasting one's crops and livestock to ensure prosperity for the coming year. Often, wassailing parties were held in the barn, and farm animals were sometimes

**Days of Christmas?** 

The twelve days between Christmas Day and the Feast of it made its debut that year at a the Epiphany (Jan. 6). Traditionally, this period represents the time it took for the wise men to travel to see the Baby Jesus.

Some claim that the gift items song was written as a teaching aid. But most scholars believe it originated as a parlor game in which a leader recited a verse, and the others had to add on verses until someone made a mistake. Whatever significance the gifts had is now lost. The song is believed to have originated in France, but the first published version appeared in England around 1780.



Food and fun, family and favorite friends - what better formula for holiday festivities? To insure pleasant holiday memories, keep food safety in mind.

Foodborne illness, with its symptoms of diarrhea, nausea, fever and vomiting, is always an unwanted guest, but never is it less welcome than during the holiday season. Harmful bacteria, which grows best in moist, protein-based food at temperatures between 40 degrees F and 140 degrees F is the culprit.

During this time of year, when groups of people get together to celebrate, large amounts of food are served. To maximize food safety it is important to keep in mind:

- The length of time necessary to prepare the food;

- How much refrigerator storage space will be available to keep food cold and how much oven or stove space will be available for cooking and keeping food hot; and

- The practice of not letting food stay at room temperature for more than two hours.

Perishable foods, such as meat, poultry, seafood, eggs, dressing, gravy and dairy products are included in many favorite holiday foods. Unfortunately, these foods are also favorites of the bacteria that cause foodborne illness - and this kind of bacteria grows best at room temperatures. That's why perishable foods should be kept in the "danger zone" - 40 degrees F to 140 degress F - for no longer than two hours.

Further recommendations for keeping holiday foods safe from foodborne illness-causing bacteria include:

- Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator. Food thawed in a microwave should be cooked immediately. Do not interrupt the cooking process and never thaw food on the counter.

- Keep hands and preparation areas, such as counter tops and stoves, clean when preparing food.

- Make sure foods are cooked to the proper internal temperature. For whole chicken and turkey, that's an internal temperature of 180 degrees F; raw ham, 160 degrees F; beef, veal or lamb, 170 degrees F for well done; ground beef or pork dishes, 160 degress F; egg casseroles, 160 degress F; and leftovers, 165 degrees F or boiling hot. Seafood should become opaque. - Do not serve egg dishes such as eggnog - made with undercooked or raw eggs, which may contain the harmful bacteria Salmonella.

- Don't transfer bacteria from raw meats to cooked foods or food that will be eaten fresh.

- If cooking large amounts of food ahead of time, make sure it is cooled quickly by dividing large portions into smaller ones and storing in shallow containers (less than 3 inches deep) at temperatures of 40 F or below.

- Serve hot foods at or above 140 degrees F, and cold foods at below 40 degrees F. Make sure foods served on a buffet are at room temperature for no more than two hours.

- If serving buffet style, put out small quantities of food and replace often. If a serving dish empties, replace it with a fresh one.

- Discard any foods that have been at room temperature for more than two hours; don't keep them as leftovers. Use refrigerated or frozen foods within recommended storage times.







## Supreme Court sets June 1 deadline for school finance fix AUSTIN -State | Capital The Texas Supreme Cou-

rt on Nov. 22 agreed that parts of Texas' school finance system are un-

headed by John Sharp, currently is studying various tax issues and will make recommendations.

"I am ready to resolve this issue. So are many legislators and so are the people of Texas," Perry said.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst said he would appoint the Senate Select Committee on Education Excellence and Public School Finance Reform to respond to the Supreme Court's decision.

Dewhurst said a special session on school finance should "address not only significantly lowering our local school property taxes, but reforming and improving our public education system."

Texas House speaker Tom Craddick said he looked forward to working with Perry and Dewhurst "to find a solution that will appropriately answer the court's ruling" by the deadline.

Audit finds faults at SOS


Significant weaknesses in the Office of the Secretary of State's controls over its revenue processes limit its ability to safeguard revenue that it collects from citizens and businesses for providing various services, the state auditor's office found in an October report.

The audit found that the agency does not immediately log cash and checks upon receipt, its revenue process is decentralized and its staff's revenue processing duties are not properly segregated. Those factors contribute to an inadequate system of internal controls, the report cited.

In about 38 percent of cases that auditors tested, the agency did not deposit revenue into the State Treasury within three business days of receipt as required by state law.


