The team of Justin Maldonado and Rocky Munoz finished second in the tournament as they



Fireguards to be cleared by **TxDOT** at landowners request

With the existing dangerous grass fire conditions, the Texas Department of Transportation has initiated a program to start clearing fireguards along statemaintained highways, if it's requested by the landowners.

A fireguard or firebreak is a break in vegetation down to mineral soil that will stop a fire from spreading, said Ron Perry, Fire Prevention Specialist with the Texas Forest Service.

State Rep. Scott Campbell, R-San Angelo, urged TxDOT to start the program due to the recent outbreaks of wildfires.

Fireguard blading will be

limited to 10-feet wide and 0.4 miles on each side of the road, according to the TxDOT Fireguard Blading Procedures. The state is not allowed to clear ground on private property.

TxDOT will prioritize each request, using such things as whether there are nearby houses or other structures as standards for which projects to do first.

"We will limit our blading to the vicinity of an asset such as a home or commercial facility," said Walter G. McCullough, P.E., District Engineer with the TxDOT San Angelo District. "We would welcome any blading assistance the counties wish to provide but those efforts must conform to our guidelines."

The procedures also state that TxDOT should work with county judges where needed to coordinate efforts between the use of county equipment and Tx-DOT in blading.

"TxDOT appreciates the concerns of citizens during this drought," McCullough said.

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
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Cell phone manners, or lack thereof

Consider this: illnesses traced to fresh produce and vegetables are now responsible for more large scale outbreaks of food borne illnesses than meat, poultry and eggs. Produce now accounts for

12 percent of food borne illnesses and 6 percent of the outbreaks. That compares to only 1 percent of illnesses and seven-tenths of one percent of the outbreaks in 1970. So you vegetarians out there can stop acting so smug.

And no... this information was not brought to you by the Beef Board or preschoolers but by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which just happens to be the same people that used to tell everyone not to eat beef. (They also report that meat related e coli infections are on the decline.)

The scientists say that illness from eating fruits and veggies are rising due to increased centralization of produce distribution, the rise of imports and the growing popularity of prechopped fruits and vegetables. To this list I would add one of my own reasons from personal observation: people sneezing into the salad bar.

The news is not quite as ons, lettuce and green onions, all foods which I actually love to eat. I was hoping the guilty parties would be Brussels sprouts, spinach and Lima beans but no such luck. But I do have even better news. Guess what's now good for you?

Beer. That's right, the Breakfast of Champions. At least that's according to Anheuser-Busch who may not exactly be a disinterested party. 


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

Many families spend more money than they need to spend on home utility bills because a large portion of the energy is wasted. The good news is, there is a lot you can do to save energy and money at home. By making a few small changes, you can reduce your energy costs by 10 to 50 percent.

The key to achieving these savings in your home is a wholehouse energy efficiency plan. To take a whole-house approach, view your home as an energy system with interdependent parts. For example, your heating system is not just a furnace—it's a heat-delivery system that starts at the furnace and delivers heat throughout your home using a network of ducts. Even a top-ofthe-line, energy-efficient furnace will use a lot of excess energy if the ducts, walls, attic, windows, and doors are not insulated and leak. Taking a whole-house approach to saving energy ensures that dollars you invest to save energy are spent wisely. The following tips will help you to save energy at home:

· Set your thermostat comfortably low in the winter and comfortably high in the summer. Install a programmable thermostat that is compatible with your heating system.

· Use compact fluorescent light bulbs. You can even purchase ones to use with dimmers. Study your family's lighting needs and use patterns, paying special attention to high-use areas such as the living room, kitchen, and outside lighting. Look for ways to use lighting controls-like occupancy sensors, dimmers, or timers—to reduce lighting energy use, and replace standard (also called in

tures with compact or standard fluorescent lamps. Fluorescent lamps create less heat than incandescent bulbs. This is important if you are trying to cool the

· Air dry dishes instead of using your dishwasher's drying

· Turn off your computer and monitor when not in use.

Plug home electronics, such as TVs and DVD players, into power strips; turn the power strips off when the equipment is not in use. (TVs and DVDs in standby mode still use several watts of power.)

· Lower the thermostat on vour hot water heater to 120E F. • Take short showers (5 minutes or less) instead of baths.

· Wash only full loads of dishes and clothes.

· Close fireplace dampers when not burning wood in the fireplace.

· Look for the ENERGY STAR® label on home appliances and products. ENERGY STAR products meet strict efficiency guidelines set by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

In addition to these actions, do a home energy audit. When auditing your home, keep a checklist of areas you inspect and problems you find. This list will help you prioritize your en-


agriculture industry strong and



Texas fails to submit hurricane aid application in time



Top officials thought Texas was going to get \$2 billion of a \$20 billion hurricane relief appro-

priations supplement from Congress.

U.S. Sens. Kay Bailey Hutchison and John Cornyn were among those surprised to learn Texas was left off the list of requestors.

Gov. Rick Perry's office said Texas' request was made.

Railroad Commissioner Michael Williams, whose job it was to communicate with the White House on hurricane-related funding needs and provide details, said he did his part.

Both senators said they would continue to work to get adequate funding for Texas.

Funds coming for services

On Feb. 16, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick, R-Midland, jointly announced the Legislative Budget Board had authorized the Health and Human Services Commission to draw upon funds to pay for nursing homes, mental health care, trauma care and other programs.

The funding, which totals about \$240 million, is a stopgap measure.

Last summer, Gov. Perry asked for \$655 million to cover the programs.

Since then, the agency has have been waiting for the 10member Legislative Budget Board to exercise its budget execution authority.

Dewhurst and Craddick sit on the board.

Expenditures include:

• \$4.3 million in general revenue and \$4.3 million in federal funds to increase the personal needs allowance for long-term care facility residents from \$45 to \$60;

• \$75 million in general revenue and \$115.7 million in federal funds for nursing facility rate increases;

• \$27.6 million in general rev-

enue for EMS/trauma care; and, • \$13.4 million to expand the capacity of mental health

state hospitals. "By funding these services," Dewhurst said, "we are one step closer to delivering the highest-quality care to those who really need it - the elderly and the frail."

Report out on AP exams

Despite a 61 percent increase in the number of Texas students taking Advanced Placement high school classes since 2001, Hispanic and African-American students are underrepresented in these classes, based on percentage of population.

This information comes from the College Board's Advanced Placement Report to the

The report said 35 percent of the state's high school students are Hispanic, but only 32.2 percent of AP examinees are; and, African-American students, who make up 13.5 percent of the Texas high school population, make up only 6.8 percent of the Texas students who took AP exams.

"Ideally, the student population in AP classes should reflect the demographics of the school system as a whole," Education Commissioner Shirley J. Neeley

Boosters work for bigger kids Children who have out-

grown their car safety seats but aren't quite big enough for adult safety restraints need an intermediate solution, the Texas Department of State Health Services said earlier this month.

"If children have outgrown a safety seat but are less than 4 feet 9 inches tall, they need a booster seat," said Frank Luera, director of the state health agency's Safe Riders Traffic Safety program.

The booster seat lifts the child so that the seat belt fits correctly - low on the child's hips, Luera said.
