Texas is not mentioned on the gates; but right alongside there is a big statue in the likeness of Col. Gregg, a Texan, who fought at Vicksburg. He was killed in action in 1864. a year after Vicksburg had fallen.

'I've been home canning as long as I can remember; canning every-Beatrice helped her mother with canning as a youngster; started w ning home-canning prizes from her first days as a member of the 4-H when she was a mere 11 years old, and has continued rolling up a high score for her home canning ever since. In 1953, she demonstrated at the St. Louis County Fair (Minnesota), where she also won the championship for her canned vegetables; and that same year she took the blue ribbon at the Minnesota State Fair.

Last year, Beatrice put up over 100 quarts of pickles with the results again proving this young lady's remarkable ability for successful food preservation. Her sliced cucumber pickles, which she says are more tender when peeled, are made like this:

6 cups sliced cucumbers

Wash and peel cucumbers. Slice thin, Peel and slice onions, Seed and shred pepper. Mix vegetables, add sait, cover with lid and let stand at

Place in a colander to drain excess liquid; and then rinse well by running cold water over the mixed vegetables. About 75 counties comprising the heart of Texas could be termed critical due to drouth conditions. This area would follow a line from Grayson County on the Red River, south to Washington pasture damage, prematuring County, southwest to Wilson, northwest to Midland Odessa and a portion of the plains.

This 75 county area generally produces approximately two million bales of Texas' annual cotton crop. About 500,000 bales in this territory has been lost to the weather this year due to lack of growth or premature openings.

Figuring each bale worth about \$250, this means a minimum loss of \$125 million in cotton alone. Approximately 17 million bushels of Texas' average 80 million bushel grain sorghum crop is grown in this area. But the critical area has lost about half that



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
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
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
