Polling places for the March 7 election will be: Precinct 1 - Crockett County Courthouse Building; Precinct 2 - Crockett County Senior Center; Precinct 3 - Crockett County Civic Center and Precinct 4 - Ozona Primary School.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Tuesday, March 7.

Races for district judge, county judge, Commissioner Precinct 4, justice of the peace and district/county clerk will be contested in the upcoming March Democratic Primary.

Fred Deaton and Larry Williams have filed for the position of county judge. Incumbent Johnny Jones announced previously that he will retire at the end of this year.

Debra Brown and incumbent Debbie Puckett have both filed for the district/county clerk.

Incumbent Rhonda Shaw filed for county tax assessorcollector.

Incumbent Pleas Childress III has filed for another term as Commissioner of Precinct 2.

A unanimous vote was given on approving the 2006-2007 school calendar.

The first day of school will be Aug. 10 with the final day being May 25. That is a total of 180 days of instruction. There will be seven Staff Development Days in which teachers will attend school but students will be off.

The first day of school may change if the State Legislature comes back with a bill requiring school to start the day after Labor Day, said Superintendent

The district will also have to apply for a waiver to start the 2006-2007 school year on Aug. 10. In 2001, the state legislature passed legislation requiring dis-

tricts to start classes no sooner than the week of Aug. 21.

In order for classes to start Aug. 10, the school district must apply for a waiver and send it to the Texas Education Agency to be approved.

Spring Break will be March 5-9, the same as Midland College to coincide with high school students taking college classes.

In his superintendent's report, Gott reported on some building improvements the district needs to start working on.

How much do you know about Texas history?

Thursday, March 2, is Texas Independence Day. For those of you who don't know the meaning of this, it's when Texas gained its independence from Mexico in 1836. March 2 is picked because it was the day the Texas Declaration of Independence was signed.

Test your knowledge on these questions from The Great Texas Ouiz, Part II which can be found at the Handbook of Texas Online:

1. One of the early explorers was shipwrecked on Galveston Island in 1528. He traveled inland and encountered three of his lost shipmates near what is thought to be the Guadalupe River. They traveled onward through present-day Mexico to the Pacific. His Relación was composed shortly after the journey ended in 1536, nearly 500 years ago, and effectively became the first literature of Texas. The surname of this prominent explorer literally means "the head of a cow." Which explorer

2. The Spanish explorations led to the founding of a series of missions which were an important part of the early settlement of Texas. Texas has focused recently on restoring many of the great missions, including the Alamo, otherwise known as the San Antonio de Valero mission. The following missions have also been restored. Which of these are located in the San Antonio

3. Stephen F. Austin is certainly the best-known of the Texas empresarios, but he was by no means the only one. The word "empresario" in Spanish means "agent" or "entrepreneur." One empresario was active in the settlement of Texas as a translator and clerk to Stephen F. Austin. For the next 13 years he was Austin's lieutenant, writing deeds, keeping records, and directing colonial activities during Austin's absences. For his various services he received eleven leagues (49,000 acres) of land, including lands on Oyster Creek and Buffalo Bayou. He was active in raising significant capital for the Texas revolution in 1835 and 1836. Which empresario is

4. Texas has had 254 counties since the organization of Loving County in 1931. The largest county in square miles is located in the Trans-Pecos region of West Texas, and is also the site of Big Bend National Park. Which

5. The largest lake or reservoir struction began in 1964 and was completed in 1969. It is located ers about 180,000 acres. Which body of water is it?

6. Texas is blessed with approximately 22 million acres of forest. There are four national forests and five state forests in Texas. All of these are located in one region. Which region is it?

7. The first successful railroad in Texas was organized by Gen. Sidney Sherman, one of the heroes of the battle of San Jacinto, with financial support from William Marsh Rice and other investors. It opened on September 7, 1853, running from Harrisburg (now a part of Houston) west to Stafford's Point. Which railroad is it?

8. The first national park or preserve in Texas, includes more than 1,250 square miles of land and is thus slightly larger than Rhode Island. The Rio Grande flows for 107 miles along its southern boundary. It opened to the public in 1944. Which park or preserve is it?

9. Texas has been well represented in the Olympic games. One of them, a native of Port Arthur, captured two gold medals and one silver at the Los Angeles Olympics in 1932 while setting a world record in the hurdles. She is certainly one of the best all-around female athletes in history, excelling in eight track and field events, baseball, basketball, and billiards. She tried golf for the first time in 1933 and soon qualified for the Los Angeles Open, a men's PGA event. She went on to win 17 consecutive women's tournaments and helped found the Ladies Professional Golf Association. She was diagnosed with colon cancer in 1953, but came back to win five tournaments in 1954. She died in 1956, at the age of 45, but not before financing a tumor clinic for the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston. Which great Texas Olympian is it?







Walk Across Texas is a pro- all, let's have some fun!!!! gram created by Texas Cooperative Extension in 1996 to help establish the habit of regular physical activity. From border to border, you or your team can walk 830 miles across the state, seeing your progress across the state via the on-line website, or on a Texas road map.

The idea behind Walk Across Texas is to encourage more residents of the Lone Star State to start a program of regular exercise.

Walk Across Texas is an 8 week physical activity program. The goal is to establish walking or another regular aerobic physical activity as a habit for life. Teams, consisting of eight members, support each other to keep walking so their teams can walk across the state first. It is proven effective, significantly increasing weekly mileage for participants. Other studies have shown a significant number of people continue to walk with no further intervention. This type of program was identified as a best practice with likely positive results by the U.S. Preventive Health Taskforce.

Teams and individuals walk--or run, bicycle, garden, swim or do any form of exercise--for an eight-week period. A mileage equivalent sheet is available for those who prefer activities other than walking. This will allow individuals to accurately log their number of miles and keep things "fair" for all teams. At the end of that time each team's or person's total mileage is added up. A quick look at a map of Texas will reveal how far across the state, teams could have traveled had they been walking in a straight

Locally, winning teams and individuals may get awards, though nothing fancy-no trips to Disney World, no jewelry, no cash. But everyone who participates gets the same thing, an opportunity to take the first step toward a healthier future and the chance to have some fun along the way. And of course, local bragging rights are at stake for those who walk across Texas first, walk the farthest, have the most creative team name, etc.



out of town visitors, are welcome to stop and take a look.

There is also plans to do landscaping on the outside including the addition of native plants and foliage.

"Our grand Visitor Center is a means to capture vehicles into our community," said Debbie Long, chairman of the chamber board of directors.

Travel Services Section

Manager Brenda Harper said visitor centers are the "oasis for the traveling public."

"This visitor center is the front door to Ozona," she said.

not under the National Historic Registry, it's not as big an issue. "We want to maintain the historical view, but we need to think of energy efficiency and some of the widows won't open," Gott said. "This project needs to be done over the summer; some of the windows are pretty bad."

Starting in April, parents have until the 10th of each month to pay their cafeteria charges. If payment is not made, then the child gets a meal chosen for them by the school, such as a sandwich, some carrots and milk.

"They can't go without food but we can choose the meal they get," Gott said.

The plan is flexible in that the entire amount can be broken down into payment. If payments are being made, then children will get

regular meals, Gott said.



Candidates gear up for primaries



Who will speak for Texas in 2007?

A lot of people are trying their best to hold on to power, in-

crease their power or gain it for the first time.

With party primaries set for Tuesday, March 7, and early voting ending March 3, candidates in contested races are popping up around the state saying things like, "I'm proud of Texas. How about you?" and "I want to be your next governor" and "I want to represent you in Austin."

In the race for governor, candidates such as incumbent Gov. Rick Perry and his archfoil, Carole Keeton Strayhorn, the sitting comptroller of public accounts, are struggling for preeminence in the minds of moderate to conservative voters, mostly.

But there's no primary for Independents like Strayhorn and singer-writer Richard S. "Kinky" Friedman of Medina County.

Both will have to gather up enough signatures to earn themselves a spot on the November ballot, and they will have from after the primaries until May 11 to do it.

Perry has three opponents in the Republican primary.

In the Democratic primary, former U.S. Rep. Chris Bell and former Texas Supreme Court justice Bob Gammage - both experienced politicians and well qualified to be governor - will duke it out.

Friedman, a quip-spinning, headline-grabbing non-lawyer the best qualified of the potential governors to entertain Lone Star voters - says he is serious about fixing some of the state's more pressing problems: school finance, tax reform and border security.

The drama of Friedman's campaign went up a notch after The Dallas Morning News broke a story that Friedman has not voted regularly in the last dozen or so years. But Friedman said there hasn't been anyone worth voting for.

As for the ballot Friedman cast in November 2004, he voted for George W. Bush, and described the president as a nice guy trapped in a Republican

with something the state's chief elections officer said. Secretary of State Roger Williams, a Perryappointee, put out some broadcast commercials to prompt Texans to get out and vote in the primaries.

Friedman said it was unfair for Williams to say that, because Texans who vote in the primaries won't be qualified to sign his petition to get on the ballot.

Strayhorn, who is bound by the same rules as Friedman, didn't seem to mind the Williams spots. Her camp said the secretary of state would be "derelict" if he didn't encourage voters to vote. And, if the primary elections are typical, only about 20 percent of registered voters will turn out, leaving about 10 million non-primary voters to sign petitions.

Earlier in February, Williams said it might take his office a couple of months to verify all of the signatures on Strayhorn's and Friedman's petitions.

Each Independent candidate must log at least 45,540 valid signatures.

To count, a signature must be from a registered voter who did not vote in either the GOP or Democratic primaries or, if required, the runoffs.

At any rate, the signatureverifying job will be completed and the ballot certified in time for ballot printing in August.

Toxic substance scare at UT

White powder fell out of a student's roll of quarters as she prepared to wash clothes in her University of Texas dormitory coin-op laundry on Feb. 23.



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

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
