Gomez elected district judge

Deaton, Tobar, Puckett, Hearne win other local races

Sonora native Pete Gomez became the first Hispanic to be elected to the 112th Judicial District Judge's seat, during Tuesday's Democratic Primary

Gomez defeated opponent Albert Valadez with 2,867 votes to 2,194.

Gomez won Crockett County with 1,024 votes to Valadez's 199. In Reagan County Gomez won with 58 votes to 27.

In Upton County Gomez won by three votes, 249 to 246. In Pecos County Valadez

won with 1,681 votes to 1,075. In Sutton County Gomez won with 461 votes to 41

Since there is no Republican opponent, Gomez will take office in 2007. Incumbent Brock Jones announced earlier that he plans to retire this year.

In Crockett County contested races, Fred Deaton defeated Larry Williams to become the next Crockett County Judge. Deaton had 739 votes to Williams 581.

In the three-way race for Crockett County Commissioner, Precinct 4, Alfredo Tobar won with 192 votes to incumbent Rudy Martinez's 137 and Enemencia Flores had 27 votes.

Incumbent Debbie Puckett will remain the Crockett County District/County Clerk. Puckett defeated incumbent Debra Brown 835 votes to 462.

Incumbent Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne will remain in office, defeating Lou Carson 914 votes to 348.

With no Republican opponent in any of these races, newly elected officials will take office in 2007

For the third consecutive year the Ozona High School tennis team has qualified to play in the TTCA Team Tennis State Championships this weekend in the Round Rock.

"This is truly an amazing accomplishment as we lost eleven out of our eighteen players from last year's team, and this year's team is comprised of mostly freshmen and sophomores. All of the 'young Lions' stepped up this past weekend and played fantastic tennis to defeat some polished and very experienced teams. We also had some great leadership and play exhibited by our four seniors: Jessica Moore, Joseph Tambunga, Patsy Larson, and Jared Espino," said Coach Rick Bachman.

OHS entered the tournament as the Number Two seed behind defending State champion Mason and received a first round bye.

In their quarter-final match against Jim Ned, the Lions and Lady Lions took control of things from the beginning and defeated the Indians 10-4 to advance to a very tough and crucial semi-final showdown with the Number Three seeded Eldorado Eagles.

The Eagles proved to be a formidable foe as they started out with an early lead only to see it evaporate under the relentless play of the OHS boys and were soundly defeated 10-5.

SHEFFIELD - Walking down a narrow hallway, Sergeant Edward Covington looks into classroom doors and talks into his handheld radio.

It's time again for students to change classes, but unlike other schools the preparation for students to move at Sheffield Boot Camp is one that is perfectly coordinated before anyone makes a move.

One classroom at a time the cadets move out in a single line down the hall. Eyes are straight ahead, pace is quick and steady and the only words uttered are 'excuse the platoon, ma'am.'

Sheffield facility provides second chance for teens

for teenage boys and the employees at the boot camp, located in what use to be Sheffield Elementary School.

Sheffield Boot Camp is a 128-bed facility for male juvenile offenders, teenagers who have committed crimes and are placed in the facility for a second chance at making their life better. The facility is owned by the Texas Youth Commission (TYC). The camp currently houses 108 cadets ages 15-19.

"It's military guidelines and military discipline," said Covington, who works at the camp as a iuvenile correctional officer.

One wonderful aspect of working at the Small Business Development Center is that I get the opportunity to meet people who are truly excited at the prospect of starting their own business. Entrepreneurs should exhibit a certain amount of optimism and enthusiasm for their proposed ventures - they will need to rely upon it during the tough times!

Many prospective small business owners I meet have gone past a casual courtship with the idea of owning a business by conducting extensive research and planning. Others, however, are still in a state of romantic nirvana at the thought of being their own boss. "It's going to sell like hotcakes!" or "I know someone else has tried this and failed, but this time it's going to be different!" My favorite is, "I like beer, so I thought, why not sell it?"

I've learned that playing the devil's advocate with someone who has no real tolerance for true discourse on their idea doesn't get you very far. But, hey, that's my job. In my experience, making your business idea a reality involves accepting that you may have to learn a trick or two about simple business concepts. Below are my favorite business tips sure to help the serious entrepreneur and to draw the

1. If you have bad credit, you will probably have difficulty obtaining a business loan. Unfortunate, but true. Maintaining good credit is a strong step in the right direction for obtaining financing for your venture. Serious attempts at restoring your credit prior to application for a business loan may help as well.

2. There is no warehouse full of government grants to help you get started in business. Again, an unfortunate truth... no matter what the crazy guy covered in question marks says on television.

3. You will have to put some of your own money into the venture. I cannot tell you how many people come in wanting to open their business without a dime to invest in the venture. If you are looking to obtain bank financing, typically a bank wants to see a 20 percent capital investment by the owner.

4. You may need an attorney's/ accountant's advice. Sometimes owners are reluctant to spend a little money up front on an expert's advice to keep them out of trouble, instead opting to spend a ton of money later on an expert's advice to get them out of trouble. 5. Go Whole Hog

for FFA and 4-H families every year is what species of animal their offspring will show at the county fair. I think I can help in this regard.

As a young FFA member I took several sterile steers to the fair and grew into an adult without any children or exciting job prospects. My sister showed pigs in the 4-H and she ended up with a great job where she gets to boss people around, a good man and two really great kids. So parents I know it's not the macho thing to do but if your little darling wants to show a pig at he county fair I'd suggest you go whole hog.

I had to get up early every morning to feed my steer because if I didn't he'd bawl and wake up the entire neighborhood. I'd carefully weigh out the correct amount of feed because if I was slightly off my steer would bloat up like a Senator from Massachusetts. My sister slept in till midmorning, filled a self-feeder for her pig about once a month and her hog was smart enough to get its own water from an automatic drinking faucet. While I was slaving away on my steer every summer my sister was going on vacation.

Raising a hog is excellent training for young girls to become excellent wives. They learn that in raising a husband all they have to do is occasionally throw him some slop, let him lay around in his own filth and only expect that once in a blue moon he might bring home the bacon.

I kept my steer pen cleaner than many living rooms while my sister kept hers as neat as a pen... a pig pen. And parents, if you are worried about the smell I can only say that where we lived the hog aroma actually improved the air quality.

I walked my steer everyday, hosed him down so he'd grow long hair and styled his hairdo in the latest fashion of the day. I had to buy brushes, halters, fans, combs, a show stick and an assortment of beauty aids whereas to show her pig my sister stole one of my brushes and used my Grandpa's cane. That's it.

She never washed ther hog till show day. Then she slapped

One of the biggest decisions a little baby powder and perfume on it and was done.

While my steer was stepping on my toes and trying to kill me my sister never got close enough to her hog to get hurt. Or dirty. Even at the fair, when my sister's hog would occasionally go after another pig, someone was always there to stick a board between the two. Once again, this is excellent training to become a mother: my sister learned to let her kids fight to the point of bloodshed and then to separate them.

Showing my steer required months of work and training whereas all my sister had to do was occasionally tap her hog on the jowl and then pretend that whatever way it went was exactly the way she intended. We all know that getting a hog to actually do what you want is like trying to sort cats or frogs: It can't be done. Showing a pig is all a bunch of hogwash. The trick is to just let it do what it was going to do anyway and then take credit for it. This develops job skills and is excellent training for a person to become a CEO in one of the huge corporations that rule our world today.

When all was said and done I had owned my steer for half a year, worked on it daily and in the end lost a total of thirteen cents for every hour I worked on it. I think my sister made about five bucks per hour with her hog at a time when minimum wage was about a buck and a quarter.

Despite my steer's lack of profitability I cried my eyes out when I had to say goodbye while my sister was in hog heaven. She laughed all the way to the bank. She was living high on the hog for years.

selling and using drugs. His lifestyle caused him to hurt a lot of people, including his family, he said.

In order to get to Sheffield Boot Camp, juveniles are first sent to the Orientation and Assessment Unit at Marlin, Texas and then assigned to a TYC facility. Youth assigned to Sheffield Boot Camp are generally from 14 to 20 years of age, and must have the mental and physical capacity to be amenable to treatment through the Boot Camp program.

Juveniles assigned to the camp are usually "general offenders" meaning they were convicted of breaking and entering or burglary of a habitation, Covington said. Other cadets sent to the camp may have committed crimes such as aggravated assault toward a peace officer or other juvenile, stolen cars or abused drugs.

Juveniles who have been convicted of murder or attempted murder or any other major violent crime are not sent to the camp, Covington said.

The majority of the cadets come from the Houston, San Antonio and El Paso areas, with a few from the Rio Grande Valley, Covington said.

When a cadet first arrives at the camp, he is placed in the security unit. Not only are firsttime cadets housed here, but cadets who break any of the rules or who start to have some behavior problems are sent to the security unit.

"The maximum stay for behavior modification problems is up to 120 days," Covington said. "There's a different criteria in here. Time stops for the cadets in here."

When a cadet is moved out of security they are placed in a platoon. There are currently six platoons, with the first one being the orientation platoon to help break-in new cadets.

Each platoon has around 16-18 cadets. In these platoons, cadets learn to work together in the classroom, inside their dorms and out on the physical activity field.

Students also concentrate on their resocialization program, which is a program where cadets learn to recognize and break negative behavior cycles. The key elements are academic, be-



'Usually the crimes these students commit are for love, attention, acceptance and belonging," said Dr. Michael Grimmitt, resident psychologist.

The same discipline and dedication to daily life, is also expected in the classroom.

EDUCATION Unlike other TYC facilities, Sheffield Boot Camp is the only that gets its education from outside the TYC system. Teachers from the Iraan-Sheffield Independent School District come over to provide education for the education for the cadets.

For two and half years, Candra Cade has been the principal at the boot camp. The experience, she said, is one that has been filled with rewards.

"I am so proud of working with my teachers and teachers' aides," she said. "We are willing to do whatever it takes."

The majority of the cadets come into the camp with the last positive school experience being fifth grade, which means that the facility teachers have to re-teach middle school lessons to catch most of the students up to the high school level.

TAKS testing on the exit ievel is also taught as well as getting students prepared to reach the goals of achieving their high school diploma and their GED.

AG lodges clawback complaint



AUSTIN Texas and other states on March 3 filed suit against the U.S. Department of Health Human Services over

how states are forced to fund the new federal prescription drug

Attorney General Greg Abbott, on behalf of Texas, Kentucky, Maine, New Jersey, and Missouri, presented the U.S. Supreme Court with a complaint about the requirement that states pay a portion of the costs associated with federal Medicare drug coverage for persons eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid.

Abbott questioned the constitutionality of annual "clawback" payments - money states must send each month to the federal government to compensate for savings Congress anticipates states will realize from no longer providing prescription drug coverage for individuals enrolled in Medicaid.

The program is projected to result in net losses to Texas of approximately \$100 million from 2006-2009.

Texas Lottery drops bonus ball

After soliciting public comments on how to shore up sagging participation in Lotto Texas the Texas Lottery Commission on Feb. 27 jettisoned the "bonus ball."

The commission revised the game, which debuts April 23, so that players will pick six numbers from a field of 54.

"While there may not be an immediate and magic fix to the decline of our Lotto Texas game," said Lottery Commission Chairman C. Thomas Clowe, "I feel it's our responsibility to take action today to remove the one feature we've heard players disapprove of the most, the bonusball feature, and change Lotto Texas back to a pick-six game."

Without the bonus ball, the odds of winning the jackpot will be one in 25.8 million and overall odds of winning any prize will be one in 71, the agency said. Court hears redistricting case

The U.S. Supreme Court on March 1 heard arguments in the Texas redistricting case relating to the November 2004 election and the dynamics that set the stage for a shift from a 17-15 seat majority for Democrats to a town metro area ranked third.

21-16 seat majority for Republi-

Attorneys for Mexican-American and African-American plaintiffs said the Texas Legislature violated the federal Voting Rights Act by watering down communities of interest and thus, voting power, in moving district lines.

Furthermore, attorneys for Democratic state legislators said it was unprecedented for district boundaries to be redrawn in the middle of a decade. Federal law requires redistricting after the U.S. Census is taken every 10 years, at the beginning of each decade.

In its defense, the state of Texas argued that it is the Legislature's privilege and legal responsibility to redraw districts when the collective will exists.

The court is expected to render a decision on the case before its term ends in June.

Award recognizes voter turnout

On March 2 - Texas Independence Day - Secretary of State Roger Williams presented Travis and King counties with the first annual Stephen F. Austin Champions of the Republic Award.

The award recognizes the counties for having the highest percentage of voter turnout in the November constitutional amendment election.

King County's 54 percent was the highest voter turnout for small counties and Travis County won the large county group with 25 percent.

Magazine cites Texas job growth

Gov. Rick Perry announced Site Selection magazine, a national business expansion and relocation tome, has for the second straight year awarded its Governor's Cup to Texas for the most job creation announcements in the nation for 2005.

To be counted, businesses must have a capital investment of at least \$1 million, create 50 or more jobs or involve 20,000 square feet of new floor space. Texas secured 842 such projects in 2005 - a 26 percent increase from the previous year, Perry's office said.

The magazine also cited two Texas metropolitan areas among the strongest in the nation for job growth. The Dallas-Forth Worth metro area ranked second and the Houston-Sugar Land-Bay-






