

#### District Attorney's office donates digital cameras to local law enforcement

New digital cameras Upton counties. were presented to the Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers, the Crockett County Constable and deputies of the Crockett County Sheriff's Department from 112th Judicial District Attorney Laurie English on April 12.

The District Attorney's Office will distribute 95 cameras throughout Reagan, Crockett, Pecos, Sutton and

"These cameras will enable law enforcement to take photos as they investigate an incident," English said. "The photos will provide juries a better insight of details with each case."

The cameras were purchased with seizure and forfeiture money.

### Jury trial is next step in baby custody battle

The decision of who will get custody of Faith Elizabeth Villarreal will be decided by a jury within the next six months.

During a hearing on April 12, the Texas Department of Child Protective Services for- are requesting jury trials. mally stated that they plan to sever Sylvia Cardenas's parental rights in keeping Faith Elizabeth.

The baby was taken away from Cardenas, 38, because of safety concerns, due to the fact that Cardenas has lost four of her nine children in the last 20 years, according to court documents.

Attorney's Office is investigating the recent deaths of five-year-old Belia Cardenas and 10-year-old Felipe Villarreal, who died in an April 2005 fire.

During the hearing, CPS officials stated that the agency is seeking to cut Cardenas's legal ties to her daughter.

The father, Eusebio Gaytan, is also seeking sole custody of his daughter.

Attorneys for both parties

The trials must take place before the end of the year or the case will automatically be dismissed due to state law.

State law states that CPS has one year from the date of removal to resolve the case. Faith Elizabeth was removed June 30,

> She had visions for the children of our town. She wanted to help those in need and she wanted everyone to know that the Lord loves them.


Often when I read the verses that she picked out, I wondered why she picked those or what the reason was behind them.

maybe when I look back on some of the past issues the answer will come to me from above.



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
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#### Governor to Speaker: Main goal for session is tax reform



On April 12, five days before the opening of a special session of the Texas Legislature, Gov.

Rick Perry sent a letter to House Speaker Tom Craddick.

In the letter, Perry declares: "Once legislators have met the goal of reforming the current tax system, I will then consider expanding the call to other meaningful issues facing our state."

Picture an ox and cart in Perry's mind, with tax reform as the ox and school finance reform as the cart. Perry has been pressured to put the ox and cart side by side.

The ox must lead, however, because the Texas Supreme Court ordered legislators to do one thing: give local school districts the freedom to adjust property tax rates meaningfully, instead of merely fixing rates at the maximum. The task must be accomplished by June 1.

Perry's Texas Tax Reform Commission, chaired by former state comptroller John Sharp, produced a 92-page document with language that substantially reforms the tax code.

In those pages are words to create a business tax based on adjusted gross receipts. Adjustments, or deductions, are based on how much compensation is paid to a firm's employees, or, on the amount of a business's cost of goods sold.

Note: Cost of goods sold is found by establishing the cost of a company's beginning inventory and adding net purchases in a business year to get a cost of goods available for sale. Cost of ending inventory is subtracted from that amount, and the total is cost of goods sold.

Most businesses would pay a 1 percent tax, but retailers and wholesalers would pay 0.5 percent under the Perry-Sharp plan. On April 11, the Texas Association of Business, which represents more than 140,000 businesses and millions of employees, added its stamp of ap-

But as of April 16, no House member had come forward and offered to carry the Perry-Sharp plan as a bill in the special session, which started April 17.

Dems ask for new ethics rules State Reps. Jim Dunnam,

D-Waco, Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, and Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, on April 13 proposed to amend House rules so that issues before the Legislature in the special session would be more "transparent" to all Texans.

The trio's "Open the People's House Reform Plan," outlined in a letter to all House members, would take some of the mystery out of the legislative process by requiring:

· real-time record votes on all questions so the public can hold officials accountable;

• real-time Internet access to all floor amendments;

· conference committees to meet and vote in public; and

· the House to abide by the same open meetings laws required of every other governmental body.

Perry ad blitz raises hackles

Gubernatorial candidates Chris Bell, a Democrat, and Carole Keeton Strayhorn, running as an independent, complained about Gov. Rick Perry's advertising campaign promoting his tax reform proposal.

Perry supporters raised some \$6 million from corporate and other donations to pay for the advertising.

With the campaign on and the special session about to commence, Strayhorn questioned the ethics of soliciting corporations. Bell said, "Just because it's

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

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


