Commissioners ban the use of fireworks Knights of Columbus display will still take place on the Fourth of July

The only fireworks that can legally fly this Fourth of July will be the ones at the Knights of Columbus annual display.

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court voted to ban all sales and use of all private and individual fireworks, except for the Knights annual display. The vote was 4-1 with Commissioner Frank Tambunga voting against the motion.

Tambunga said he was for banning all aerial fireworks, which was done last year.

Commissioner Rudy Martinez said that lack of rain and the hot weather have made brush and grass very dry this year.

"For me, there should be no fireworks this summer," Martinez said.

"I think all fireworks will be a problem, unless you have it in a controlled situation," added

Eddie Moore, road and parks department supervisor.

The Knights of Columbus will be able to hold their annual fireworks display this Fourth of July because of it being a controlled situation where the fire department is on hand.

The commissioners unanimously voted to reinstate the burn ban until the next commissioners' court meeting.

The burn ban prohibits outdoor burning, except for those that are related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, such as firefighter training, public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations, planting or harvesting of agricultural crops and burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station or prescribed burn manager.

The order also does not prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

Violation of the fireworks or burn ban is a Class C misdemeanor, which is punishable up to a \$500 fine.

The commissioners also decided to leave the age limit for children attending the swimming pool without an adult at 10 years of age and older.

During a special called meeting on June 6, the commissioners voted that children under age 10 must be accompanied by an adult or a parent to attend the swimming pool.

Kelly West, a local parent, said that the age limit was too high and that many children don't get to go to the swimming pool because their parents work during the day.

West said that the age limit at Sonora was 8-years-old and it is 7 years at Mertzon.

Ozona prepares for women's air race

Most people have heard of the Powder Puff Derby, (an all women's airplane race) in which Amelia Earhart flew the first race. Same race, the group has just reorganized and renamed themselves and the event, the Air Race Classic. The Air Race Classic mission statement: As a means to encourage and educate women pilots, to increase public awareness of general aviation, to demonstrate women's roles in aviation and to preserve and promote the tradition of pioneering women in aviation.

Now in its 30th year, the four day race will begin on Tuesday, June 20 and run through Friday, June 23. Teams competing, (for a \$5000 cash prize) in the 2006 Air Race Classic will start their journey in Mesa, Ariz. and finish in Menominee, Mich. In between, each crew will fly to Santa Teresa, N.M.; Ozona and Bryan, Texas; Bastrop, La.;



Ada, Okla.; Lawrence, Kansas; and Albert Lea, Minn.

Planes are expected to begin arriving in Ozona between 1-2 p.m. on Tuesday, June 20.

Ozona will be the second leg or stop in the race. The Ozona Chamber of Commerce is working with Airport Manager, Charles McCleary to prepare for the race. There may be as many as 37 planes with a minimum of two pilots per plane,

and some with a third passenger. Ozona is preparing for 90-100 women, ranging from 17 to 90 years of age, representing 14 different states, and a variety of occupations. Local volunteers will be prepared to act as timers and greeters. Timers will be responsible for recording and documenting each race contestants fly-by time. After landing, greeters will direct pilots to fuel, refreshments and restrooms before helping them to quickly get back into the race.

Race planes are limited to "stock" or minimally modified "stock" aircraft with not less than 145 hp or more than 750 hp. They have to be rated for maximum continuous operation. Each airplane is competing against its own assigned handicap, based on manufacturer's data and flight tests. The highest score, in knots per hour, above the plane handicap is the goal. Spectators can expect to see Sessna and Mooney type aircraft that will run between 100-250mph.

Voters will elect county attorney in November

Crockett County voters will get a chance to elect the next county attorney during the Nov. 7 general election.

According to the Texas Secretary of State Office and the Texas Election Code, if a vacancy is created at any time between now and Aug. 25, 2006, for purposes of the elections process, the office goes on the November general ballot.

The secretary of state's office also states that the person appointed by the commissioners' court to fill the vacancy shall hold office until the next general election.

Steve Taliaferro was appointed county attorney during a June 6 meeting to replace Bill Mason who filed his

resignation.

The called meeting on June 6 was due to actions taken at the May 8 regular meeting. During the May 8 meeting, Mason's resignation and Taliaferro's appointment were made from a supplemental agenda that was posted after the 72-hour notice requirement from the Texas Open Meetings Act.

After the commissioners' appointed Taliaferro to office on June 6, it was brought up during the meeting on how long Taliaferro was to be appointed.

Jody Upham and Joe Warren Friend both had expressed an interest in the position at the June 6 meeting.

Filing dates to be placed on the ballot for the county attorney position will be July 30-Aug. 29.

Early voting will be Oct. 23-Nov. 3.

Hearing to lower Laughlin, Stalcup's bails set for today

A district court hearing to discuss the lowering of Donnie Laughlin and Tonya Stalcup's bails is expected to take place sometime today, June 14, at the Crockett County Courthouse. District court begins at 10 a.m.

Laughlin and Stalcup have both been charged with misapplication of fiduciary property over \$200,000. The charge is a first degree felony, which is punishable up to 99 years in jail and up to a \$10,000 fine.

Laughlin, the former manager of Ozona Wool Grower's Central Storage Co. and Stalcup, the current bookkeeper, allegedly "intentionally, knowingly and recklessly misapplied approximately \$2,072,326.56," over the past five years, in unauthorized wool and mohair proceeds, according to an affidavit filed in the Crockett County Justice of Peace office by Texas Ranger Brooks Long.

According to court documents filed by Gonzalo P. Rios, Stalcup's attorney from San Angelo, the bail that was set is "excessive" and in violation of Stalcup's right to reasonable bail. Stalcup's bail was set at \$250,000.

The documents state that Stalcup has attempted, both individually and through family and friends, to post bail in this amount but has been unsuccessful in raising the money neces-

sary to post a cash bond or pay a professional bondsman the premium required for a surety bond.

The documents also state that Stalcup has only minimum financial resources, but could raise the funds required to post bail through a professional bondsman or through a cash bond in the amount of \$10,000.

In court documents filed by Richard F. Gutierrez, Laughlin's attorney from Del Rio, it states that Laughlin's confinement and restraint is illegal because the bond is excessive, oppressive and beyond Laughlin's financial means.

The documents then state that the amount of the bail should be reduced to a reasonable amount in order for Laughlin to have an opportunity to obtain release from incarceration pending trial.

Laughlin, who was terminated on April 8 as manager of Wool Grower's, confessed his role in the unauthorized transfer of sale proceeds from the sale of mohair from the wool and mohair account to the regular checking account, and wrote checks from the regular checking account to cover routine business expenses, the affidavit said.

Also according to the affidavit, examination of bank statements and checks revealed that Laughlin and Stalcup received approximately \$605,935.92 in total salary and unauthorized salary advances from September 2001-April 2006.

Lightning causes two grass fires in Crockett County

Lightning caused a grass fire on June 8 off of Pandale Road, causing the Texas Forest Service and the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department to respond.

The fire, located on property owned by Fletcher Graham, which is off of County Road 412 off of Pandale Road, was located on top of a hill.

Around 25-30 acres was burned, according to Jim Bowling working with the Texas Forest Service.

An airplane spotted the fire and called the Texas Forest Service around 3 p.m. The fire was contained at around 8 p.m.

Around 10-12 members of the forest service from Fort Stockton responded to the scene as well as nine members of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department.

"It was creeping and smoldering around when we arrived," Bowling said about the fire.

Helicopters from the forest service dumped water, which knocked out most of the flames, Bowling said. The ground crews then worked on getting the area contained.

The road to the top of the hill was decent enough for the four-wheeled drive vehicles to get up to the fire, Bowling said.

"The helicopters pretty well controlled it for us," said Ozona Fire Chief Bob Falkner. "We were glad to see them."

Along with the helicopters, the forest service had a spotter airplane, two bulldozers, a one-ton truck and a tractor-type truck. Ozona responded with two grass fire trucks and a tanker truck.

Another grass fire on June 7 was also started by lightning at the Thompson Ranch near the Ozona airport.

The fire burned about three acres, Falkner said.

Ozona firefighters responded in two grass trucks and a tanker, Falkner said.

Died in the Wool

In my life I have worked as a roustabout in the oilfields, cowboied on a ranch, stacked hay and picked lemons, oranges, and avocados. None of those jobs were as hard as being a barber to a bunch of sheep.

Ah, but the financial rewards of shearing sheep made it all worth while! I only got \$1.25 per head if the sheep was a bald-face ewe or a lamb but I GOT TO KEEP THE WOOL! If the sheep had a woolly face, or was a mature ram, I charged 25 cents extra for the additional work involved. And if anyone wanted to keep the wool I added on a dollar per head. By keeping the wool from the three years that I shaved sheep I was able to time the wool market and sell at exactly the lowest point in the last 50 years!

And yet I still had people complain about my extravagant prices.

A lamb named Pooley showed up one day at a fairgrounds where I was shearing for small flock owners. Pooley was accompanied by his 4-H owner, a boy who wanted to be there even less than Pooley, and his domineering mother from the hoity-toity part of town. She was as out of place at a sheep shearing as a cow buyer in church.

I learned that Pooley had been a 4-H fair project gone terribly wrong. Due to a lack of care and feeding on the part of the young man, Pooley had been a nutritional underachiever and had failed to make weight. And because the urbane family could NEVER eat anything they'd raised, Pooley was now part of the family. Much to the consternation of the young boy who probably never wanted the lamb to begin with and now had to feed and care for Pooley until one of them died of old age.

Pooley's adopted mother watched me as I sheared and every time I'd nick a sheep she carried on as if I was an ax murderer. These were harmless cuts that are inevitable when shearing sheep but whenever there was the smallest sign of blood Pooley's mother began shrieking. It was okay, mind you, if the blood was my own.

At times like this I'd employ a little psychology I learned from a veterinarian. He told me that whenever he was unable to diagnose an illness he'd always give the animal an injection anyway. Usually just a shot of vitamins. This made the animal's owner feel better, although it didn't do much for the injured party. Then if the animal got well the vet got credit for making it better and if the animal died, well, he'd done everything he could to save it. So every time I nicked a sheep I'd brush on my secret mixture of pine tar. This usually calmed the owner right down.

When it was Pooley's turn the mother argued with me for 15 minutes about my extravagant prices. She was especially irate that I charged a buck and a quarter PLUS I wanted to keep the wool too! As if she was going to spin yarn and knit a sweater!

The minute I flipped Pooley gingerly on his rump I knew that something was wrong. Pooley's legs were inoperable, his eyes glazed over and he was as lifeless as a teenager in chemistry class. Pooley had either just experienced a cardiac event, had committed suicide or was exhausted from watching me work. Whatever the reason poor Pooley was now taking "the big nap", as they say.

As I pulled the wool over poor Pooley's eyes the mom realized that the lamb was deader than a can of corned beef. "You killed Pooley. You killed Pooley," she wailed.

"I'm very sorry," I said. "I've never had this happen before." I tried to explain that sheep spend their lives looking for creative ways to die but the damsel in distress would hear none of it. I was feeling terrible when the young son approached with a glow on his face as if he'd just been let out of jail. He seemed to be delighted that his lamb was now deceased. "Here's two dollars," he said with a wink. "Keep the change."

It was the first and only time in my life I'd been tipped for shearing a sheep, albeit a dead one.

"And you can keep the wool too," said the young boy as he skipped merrily away.

Highlighting the DC tour was a wreath-laying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery. Students Sean Davis, Emalee Hamilton, Johnna Pullig, and Rebecca Pierce participated in the ceremony whereby they presented a wreath on behalf of OMS. Also viewed at the cemetery were the changing of the guard, the Kennedy eternal flame, as well as the more recent burial site of Chief Justice William Rehnquist. At the Smithsonian complex, students visited the Museum of American History, Museum of Natural History, the National Air and Space Museum, and the new American Indian Museum. Popular items on display at the museums included Fonzie's jacket,

Dorothy's ruby red slippers, the "Star Spangled Banner," and the Hope Diamond.

Another popular spot was the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. The group observed the four-step process that is now involved in printing the nation's colorful currency. Members were able to purchase uncirculated bills and sheets of currency.

The trip included a tour of the capitol led by aides from U.S. Representative Henry Bonilla's office. The group was led through an underground tunnel into the capitol and was allowed to go into the House of Representatives. Other sites of interest included Ford's Theatre, Embassy Row, and a quick stop at the National Zoo to view the famous panda exhibit which is on loan from China. Managing diabetes through nutrition

Diabetes is a fact of life for millions. According to figures from the American Diabetes Association, more than 17 million Americans are living with diabetes, and 16 million of them have type 2 (formerly known as adult onset diabetes).

Diabetes can cause health problems throughout the body, but those who have type 2 can do a lot about improving their own health by keeping a careful watch on their nutrition.

People with diabetes can live long, healthy lives if they take good care of themselves - particularly by controlling blood glucose levels through good nutrition.

The first step in making good food choices is understanding the U.S. Department of Agriculture Dietary Guidelines, which were developed by nutrition experts. The goal of establishing these guidelines is to help people understand how their eating habits can affect their health.

These simple "ABC" guidelines can help everyone improve their health, whether or not they have diabetes:

- Aim for fitness by reaching a healthy weight and being physically active each day.
- Build a healthy base by following the Pyramid guide food choices. Each day eat a variety of grains (especially whole grains) and a variety of fruits and vegetables, and keep foods safe.
- Choose a sensible diet that is low in saturated fat and cholesterol and moderate in total fat.

Limit intake of sugars and salts, and drink alcohol in moderation, if at all.

Within these basic guidelines, the keys to controlling diabetes are: making wise food choices, exercising and taking prescribed medication as recommended by a health professional.

People with diabetes also must monitor their blood glucose levels regularly and make adjustments when needed. Blood glucose levels can be controlled by: reducing intake of starches and sugars, controlling portion sizes, increasing exercise and monitoring blood glucose levels.

Monitoring blood glucose levels can help people with diabetes reduce their complications affecting eyes, nerves and kidneys.

Planning meals may look like an impossible task, but it's really not that difficult. Information from the American Diabetes Association and the American Diabetic Association is available by calling (800) 342-2382 or (800) 366-1655, or by visiting the Web at <http://www.diabetes.org/> or <http://www.eatright.org>.

People with diabetes don't have to follow complicated meal plans or eat special foods. All they need to do is eat healthfully, the same foods as everyone else in the family. The key is making better food choices.

First, add up the amount of fiber you eat every day - fiber is found in fruits, vegetables, whole grains and beans.

Then, carefully monitor intake of sugar, fat and salt - eat

less each day.

And be sure to choose foods from a wide selection each day.

These mealtime choices are good for everyone, whether they have diabetes or not. Healthy eating is a goal for everyone in the family.

Here are some tips to help make meal management easier:

- Eat meals and snacks at about the same times every day. People with diabetes especially need to do this, in order help their bodies utilize carbohydrates.

- Eat about the same amount of food every day. Follow the meal plan and portion sizes ordered by your health professionals.

- For more interesting and appetizing meals, experiment with new foods and be willing to try new ones.

- Don't skip meals. That can lead to overeating at the next one.

- Use portion control; keep serving sizes monitored. And plan for eating out.

If you adopt good eating habits and eat nutritionally balanced diabetes meals, you will be making a great start. Add to that all the other healthy habits - such as exercising regularly - and you will be on the road to staying healthy, whether you have diabetes or not.

"I've been going with my daughter and she's 9. She can't go unless I go and my 15-year-old can't go with her," West said. "A lot of 7-8 year-olds can swim. I think it should be 7 or 8. Lots of kids lying about their age. Why punish the kids? When you think of a pool, you think about kids. They just want to swim and now a lot of them can't."

County Judge Johnny Jones said the decision was made to ensure the safety of all children.

"It's a hard deal to set," Tambunga said. "There's some way or another we have to draw the line of controlling."

Commissioner Pleas Childress III said that before any changes are made to the rules, he would like to hear from the pool manager and staff to see how they felt.

The commissioners then approved a \$3,000 additional fee for Hibbs & Todd Inc., the engineering firm for the new

swimming pool and bathhouse. The fee is because the firm had to do the bidding process on the bathhouse twice. Tambunga voted against the motion.

The new pool is estimated to be open by July 10, Moore said.

Bonilla introduces a bill to overturn immigration loophole

WASHINGTON, DC - On June 8, Congressman Henry Bonilla introduced the Fairness in Immigration Litigation Act of 2006. The legislation will close a loophole that allows thousands of illegal aliens to remain in our country every week.

Currently, the Orantes injunction mandates that the U.S. Government afford all Salvadoran immigrants the benefit of full deportation proceedings and undermines the authority of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to apply expedited removal procedures.

The court order was issued in 1988 when El Salvador was in the midst of a bloody civil war and was designed to protect those seeking refuge in the United States. However, on January 16, 1992, a peace accord was signed ending 11 years of civil war and implementing strict human rights restrictions. Today El Salvador enjoys a democratically elected government and a developing economy.

"Illegal aliens are streaming across our porous border by the hundreds on a daily basis. They are presenting an immediate danger to the lives of people in every Texas community and across the United States of America," said Congressman Bonilla. "For over 14 years I have worked to raise awareness on Capitol Hill about the crisis facing our border communities. I have met with law enforcement officials along the border and discussed this critical issue with my colleagues in Congress, providing those in Washington with a first-hand perspective on how to increase our border security."

However, gangs such as Mara Salvatrucha, otherwise known as MS-13, and members of drug cartels are now exploiting this loophole in our legal system to thwart our immigration laws and obtain release into our communities. This legislation would remove obstacles that prevent our government from effectively enforcing the immigration laws that Congress intended.

Representative Lamar Smith (R-TX-21) shares Congressman Bonilla's apprehension over the threat created by this loophole in the immigration process.

Recently Rep. Smith, former chairman and current member of the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Immigration, Border Security and Claims, signed on to the bill as an original co-sponsor.

"The Expedited Removal Program was first created in my 1996 immigration bill, the 'Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act.' Over the last 10 years, the program has been a useful tool in removing illegal immigrants from the United States. But all programs need a little tweaking over time. This bill closes a loophole created by the federal courts in the deportation process. The U.S. government expanded the number of people subject to expedited removal in recent years, and this bill will continue that expansion," said Rep. Smith.

The Fairness in Immigration Litigation Reform Act, which has broad support from the Department of Homeland Security and the Bush Administration, would:

- Establish standards for courts to apply when issuing injunctions that impact the enforcement and administration of immigration laws;

- Set deadlines for the expiration of injunctions;

- For our expedited removal program, eliminate the jurisdiction of the district courts to issue injunctions; and

- For permanent injunctions already in place, allow the government to file a motion to terminate the injunction if that order interferes with the government's implementation of the expedited removal program.

Co-chair of the Congressional Border Caucus and Vice-Chair of the U.S./Mexico Caucus, Bonilla has been a leader for several years promoting stronger security along the Texas/Mexico border. Having more than 700 miles of Texas/Mexico border in his district, Bonilla regularly tours the border and meets with those who are working to protect it.

"The threat of terrorism is real. Each day our border communities witness the violence and fear created by the ruthless members of drug cartels. We must not allow terrorists and criminals from around the world to abuse loopholes in our legal system, turning our southwest border into a revolving door," said Cong. Bonilla. "The efforts of our law enforcement officials to catch, detain, and deport those who enter illegally must not be obstructed by those looking to abuse the system. Congress must overturn the outdated and obsolete Orantes injunction and protect the integrity of our legal immigration process."

Gubernatorial candidates prefer to use nicknames, 4-0

AUSTIN - Candidates for governor of Texas seem in agreement on at least one thing: they favor their nicknames over their given names while on the campaign trail.

Gov. "Rick" Perry's given name is James Richard Perry, and "Chris" Bell, the Democratic challenger and former U.S. representative from Houston, is officially Robert Christopher Bell.

State Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, a former Republican who filed as an independent candidate for governor, is asking that her name appear on the November ballot as Carole Keeton "Grandma" Strayhorn.

In case any confusion should result, Grandma was Carole McClellan when she was mayor of Austin (1977-83) and Carole Keeton Rylander when she was on the Texas Railroad Commission (1994-98).

Since her first successful "One Tough Grandma" political advertising campaign for the office of comptroller eight years ago, Strayhorn has widely been identified as a grandma and most recently as the only grandma in the race for the governorship of Texas.

Richard S. Friedman, also an independent candidate for governor, is known more by his nickname "Kinky" than his given name. Friedman, 61, said he's had his nickname for more than 40 years.

Friedman and Strayhorn must be certified for ballot spots by the secretary of state because independent candidates have no statewide primary.

Both submitted petitions carrying many times more registered voter signatures than necessary, but for each candidate the secretary of state must verify as true and accurate a minimum of 45,540 signatures.

The secretary of state's office has not announced that either of the two independents has met the requirement.

Dems granted restraining order

An Austin state district court granted the Texas Democratic Party a temporary restraining order preventing the Republican Party of Texas from appointing a candidate to replace U.S. Con-

gressional Dist. 22 Rep. Tom DeLay on the November ballot.

The Democratic Party alleges DeLay asserted his candidacy during the GOP primary, but intentionally pulled out later so no vote for a replacement would occur at the primary. The court scheduled a June 22 hearing on the matter.

Earlier this year, DeLay stopped his reelection campaign as allegations of ethical breaches mounted against him, and he withdrew from the race.

He resigned from office June 9, facing criminal indictments on charges of election law violations.

Border watch to involve citizens

Imagine Texas' 1,240-mile border with Mexico from Port Isabel to El Paso dotted with Texas-side video cameras to monitor illegal crossings.

With volunteer landowners pitching in, it would be kind of like a neighborhood watch. Gov. Perry suggested.

The cameras are part of a multi-million dollar plan teaming the public with local law enforcement, the U.S. Border Patrol and the National Guard in border security operations.

Toll road project to open sooner

Gov. Perry announced that at least part of the state's three-toll road project will be open to traffic in December, nine months ahead of schedule.

Drivers will be able to avoid notoriously heavy traffic through the capital city on Interstate 35.

Drivers who purchase the special electronic "TxTag" will enter the toll road without stopping at a booth, and save 10 percent.

Agency chief resigns from post

Dr. Eduardo J. Sanchez resigned June 6 as commissioner of the Texas Department of State Health Services, effective Oct. 6.

A native of Corpus Christi, Sanchez was appointed to the post in 2001 by Gov. Perry. The agency has 11,500 employees and an annual budget of \$2.3 billion.

Parties hold biennial conventions

State party conventions were held earlier this month. The Republican Party of Texas met June 1 and 2 in San Antonio.

The Texas Democratic Party met in Fort Worth June 8 and 9.

Both parties focused on immigration policy and border security issues.



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
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
