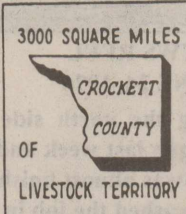

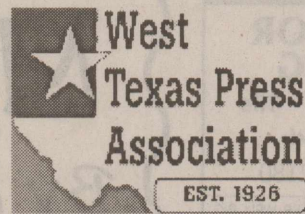

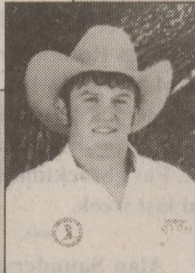

## A place to rest their wings

### Ozona becomes overnight stop for women air racers

The buzzing sounds of Cessna, a Mooney, a Piper Scout and a group of Beechcraft Bonanza Babes could be heard in the skies over Ozona last week.

On June 20-21, the Ozona Airport was host to 32 airplanes on route to Michigan as part of the 30th annual Air Race Classic.

This women-only air race made its way from Mesa, Ariz. to Menominee, Mich. in four days. Along with, a variety of planes coming through Ozona, the second stop in the race, there also was a variety of women with them.

The first stop was in Santa Teresa, N.M. The stop after Ozona was in Bryan, Texas and then Bastrop, La., Ada, Okla., Lawrence, Kansas, Albert Lea, Minn. and then the finish in Menominee. The race covers 2,478 miles.

Gretchen Jahn, of Kerrville, and her co-pilot Carol Foy, of Spicewood, Texas, were the first to land in Ozona. Jahn, the CEO of Mooney Airplane Company in Kerrville, was flying her own Mooney M20R that has 280 horsepower.

The plane also had a glass cockpit.

"It's the latest in aviation," Jahn said.

This was the first time for Jahn and Foy to fly together. The two only paired up four weeks before the race.

"I've known (Jahn) for a little while," Foy said. "It's very exciting to be racing with her."

Unlike a typical race, where the first one to arrive is the one who wins, each airplane has a handicap and the racers are racing against that handicap, Jahn said. Whoever has the best time against their handicap at the end of the race wins.

There are also prizes for the

best times on each leg.

While Jahn and Foy continued on to the next stop, many of the racers were seeking air conditioning and rest when they landed in Ozona on the hot Tuesday afternoon.

"Very few small aircrafts have air conditioning," said 88-year-old Ruby Sheldon, of Phoenix, Ariz. "An air conditioner has too much weight."

Sheldon has been a pilot for nearly 50 years and has logged more than 15,000 hours in both fixed wing aircraft and helicopters. She was the first person to get an instrument rating for helicopters.

"We've known each other since the early 1970s and have worked with the Air Classic since the early 1980s," said Sheldon's co-pilot Marge Thayer,

of Mesa, Ariz.

Donning a train engineer's hat, Thayer is the pilot of a Cessna 182 RG with 235 horsepower. Thayer has more than 3,600 hours in her logbook with more than 25 years of flying experience.

The duo of Thayer and Sheldon flew together for 13 years before they split up for seven.

"Now, we're back together," Sheldon said. "We just had to have one more race together."

The team of Janet Yoder, of Wichita, Kansas, and Caroline Baldwin, of Silver City, N.M., both said they enter the race to "get away from home." Yoder has been in 26 Air Classic Races and this was Baldwin's third Air Classic.

"You see old friends, fly into airports you've never seen

before and over country you've never seen before," Baldwin said.

The duo's plane, a Cessna 182-S with 230 horsepower, only had 25 hours logged on it when they landed.

"It's brand new with the new glass cockpit and so many new little gadgets," Yoder said. "It gives you the time, weather and we even have XM radio too."

On the other end of the flight experience in the race were four college teams, made up of young pilots, many racing for the first time.

Teams from Purdue University, Western Michigan University, Kansas State University and Central Missouri State University all competed in the race.

## Creditors meeting held in Wool Growers bankruptcy case

A creditors meeting was held on June 20 dealing with the Wool Growers Central Storage bankruptcy case.

This one and only meeting must be held 20-40 days after a bankruptcy is filed, said Byrnie Bass, attorney who is handling the bankruptcy case.

"This was not court. There is no judge. It's just an appointed trustee and the lawyers," Bass said. "We meet to answer questions."

Around 220 people have filed claims against Wool Growers due to not receiving money for wool or mohair that was sold with the company.

"Everybody is going to get some money," Bass said. "Whether or not people will get

## Construction continues in Ozona

Construction and landscaping is expected to continue throughout Ozona through the end of the year.

Currently, paving is being done on 11th Street down toward the Hitchin' Post Restaurant and will continue on toward the Travel Lodge Hotel.

Paving will also be done on State Highway 163 from Gurley Draw to 1st Street.

Paving on 163 is inspecting to be in full force by July 12, if not sooner, said Karen Threlkeld, public information officer with the Texas Department of Trans-

portation. The total amount of what they are owed depends on the total amount of claims."

Bass said he doesn't know who all is owed money due to large amount of claims, but that it is a combined effort of records submitted by those who have filed claims and records that Bass has been able to obtain.

The claims came when the board of directors started an investigation into former manager Donnie Laughlin and then former bookkeeper Tonya Stalcup.

If you need transportation to the Crockett County Senior Center call Lynn English at 392-9094. I will arrange a ride for

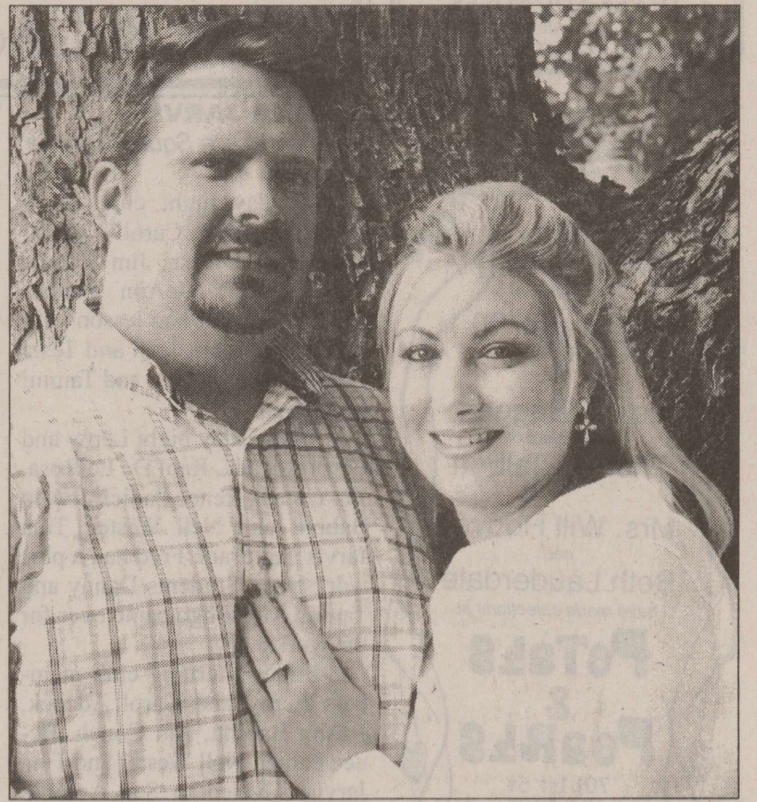

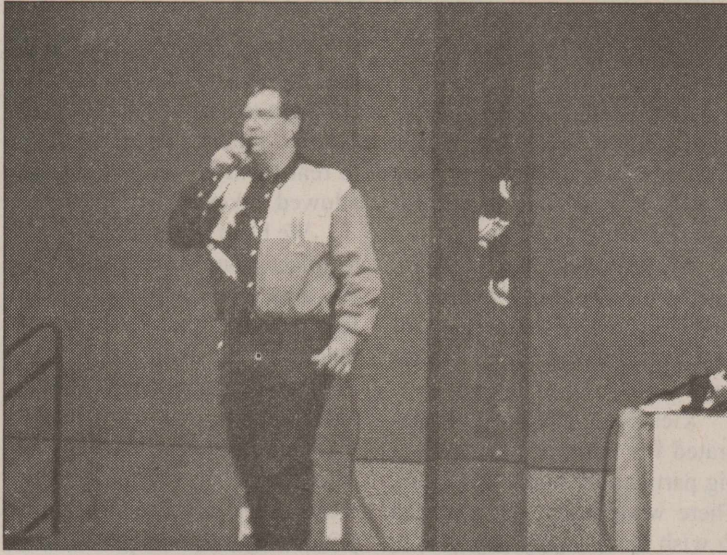

**Report from the Crockett County Attorney's Office**

As most of you are aware by now, I have recently been appointed as Crockett County Attorney. There was quite a stir over when the former County Attorney actually resigned and I actually took office. The dust has now settled on that particular controversy and I am in the office and working.

At the time that I took office, the Crockett County Clerk's Office had 321 active criminal cases in the County Court. These cases are broken down by year and number of cases as follows: 1995 - 1; 1996 - 5; 1997 - 11; 1998 - 15; 1999 - 18; 2000 - 24; 2001 - 39; 2002 - 16; 2003 - 40; 2004 - 70; 2005 - 72 and 2006 - 10.

In addition to the active files, I found 146 cases that the Sheriff's Office and the Department of Public Safety had presented to the County Attorney's Office for prosecution. These cases were from November 2005 until May 2006. No formal charges have been filed in County Court for any of these cases. All of these files have to be reviewed and formal charges filed in the County court where necessary. There have been virtually no County Criminal Cases filed since December 2005.

Since I have been in office, the Sheriff's Office and the DPS have brought me another 51 cases to be reviewed and filed in the County Court. These are cases that arose during May and June 2006. Again, all these files must be reviewed and formal charges filed where necessary.

All of the cases referred to above are County Court cases. There are also 144 cases in the Justice of the Peace Court that have requested trials on various traffic and Class C Misdemeanor cases. All of these files have to be reviewed and prepared for trial or plea bargain.

In visiting with our probation officer, I was informed that there have only been 9 County Probation cases in the last 2 years. The County Judge has also informed me that probation fees for Crockett County Cases for the period from Sept. 1, 2005 to Sept. 16, 2006 were \$3,942.00 compared to Sutton County's \$24,179.33 for the same time period. Total Collections for Crockett County Probationers was \$12,123.75 compared to Sutton County's \$55,519.01.

The obvious reason for this vast difference is that very few are being put on probation for Misdemeanors in Crockett County.

Since taking office, we have pled 8 individuals to various offenses and closed 14 cases associated with those individuals. The following are pleas that have been taken and the punishments assessed:

- Fictitious Registration - 14 days jail.
- Prohibited Weapon - 18 days jail.
- Driving While Intoxicated 2nd - \$1,500.00 fine, \$374.00

Both have been charged with misapplication of fiduciary property over \$200,000. Both are currently out on bond.

Wool Growers filed Chapter 11 bankruptcy in April.

Chapter 11 prevents creditors or people who have claims from suing the business. Bass said.

"If the company is a good business, then it's just a matter of operating the business as usual and a matter of paying back what is owed," Bass said.

According to Bass and documents filed in bankruptcy court, Wool Growers made a net profit of around \$14,000 for its first month after filing bankruptcy.

"Come heck or high water, they plan on staying open," Bass said.

Court Costs, 6 months jail, probation for 2 years, 80 hours community service.

- Possession of Marijuana less than 2 oz. - \$500.00 fine, \$374.00 Court Costs, 1 year Deferred Adjudication.

Deferred Adjudication is when a defendant is put on probation for a period of time. If that defendant pays the fine, court costs, probation fees and completes all the terms of probation, at the end of the probation term, the charge is dismissed. If the defendant breaks the terms of probation and a Judge determines that the probation has been violated, the defendant can be sentenced to any punishment within the range of punishment for that crime. For Possession of Marijuana less than 2 oz. the range of punishment is up to a \$2,000.00 fine and/or 1-year in jail.

- Driving While Intoxicated 1st - \$1,000.00 fine, \$374.00 Court Costs, 3 days in jail
- Driving While Intoxicated 1st - 90 days in jail.

- Driving While License Suspended - 90 days in jail.

- Possession of Marijuana less than 2 oz. - Probation Revoked, sentenced to 14 days in jail and court cost of \$374.00.
- Assault - 3 days in jail.

In reviewing files, I discovered \$1,054.00 in blank money orders that were meant to pay off restitution, fine and court costs in a failure to comply with requirements upon striking an unattended vehicle. The funds are being transferred to the proper authority for payment to the victim and to the county for the fine and court costs. In another file, I found \$500.00 in blank money orders meant to pay the fine in a

possession of marijuana case that had never been filed. I have now filed formal charges in this case and the money will be turned over to the County Clerk for payment of the fine. In yet another file, I found \$375.00 in blank money orders meant to pay on restitution, fine and court costs in a criminal mischief case. No formal charges had been filed in this case. I have now filed formal charges and the money is being transferred to the proper authority for payment to the victim and to the county for fine and court costs.

At the last county criminal docket call, 7 individuals failed to appear. I have prepared bond forfeiture documents that the County Judge has signed. A warrant will be issued for the arrest of those individuals and the bonds previously posted will be forfeited.

I will be working hard over the next several months to diligently prosecute all misdemeanor cases in Crockett County. There is a lot of work to be done to get the case load under control. I will be in the County Attorney's Office full time and I am looking forward to working with law enforcement officers and the public to prosecute misdemeanor cases in Crockett County. Please feel free to come by or call the County Attorney's Office if you have any questions, comments or problems that I can help you with. The office is located in the Courthouse Annex and the telephone number is 392-3920.

I plan to make monthly reports here to keep you informed about what is going on in the County Attorney's Office and how the prosecution of cases in County Court is progressing.

**Bull tests positive for anthrax in Crockett County**

A bull located on a ranch 18 miles south of Ozona has tested positive for anthrax, according to Dr. Gary Vannoy at the Ozona Veterinary Clinic.

Anthrax has existed in the soil forever, according to the Texas Animal Health Commission.

When there is a good, wet rain and then the weather suddenly turns hot and dry, that's when anthrax starts to "bloom" and contaminate the surface soil, the TAHC stated.

Cattle, sheep, goats, and deer are all susceptible by consuming the contaminated grass.

Anthrax only grows during the warm months and then becomes dormant in the winter.

The first symptom of anthrax is sudden death, making the animal bloated and blood continually running out of the nose, mouth and other areas without clotting, the TAHC stated. Animals can also run fevers of up to 106 degrees.

When animals ingest the bacteria, symptoms can start showing within two to seven days until death.

Vaccination is the best line of defense in protecting healthy livestock and preventing the spread of the bacteria, the TAHC stated.

Properly dispose of animal carcasses by burning or burying to prevent exposure to other animals, such as predators or dogs. Remove healthy livestock from the area, the TAHC stated.

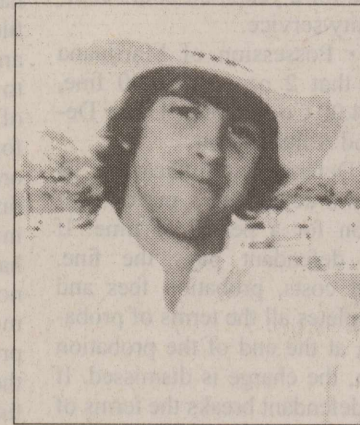
## Coates, Wadsworth qualify to compete at the National High School Finals Rodeo

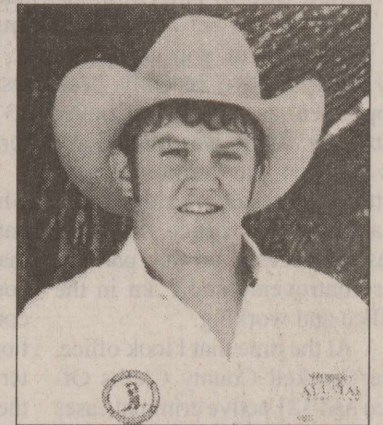

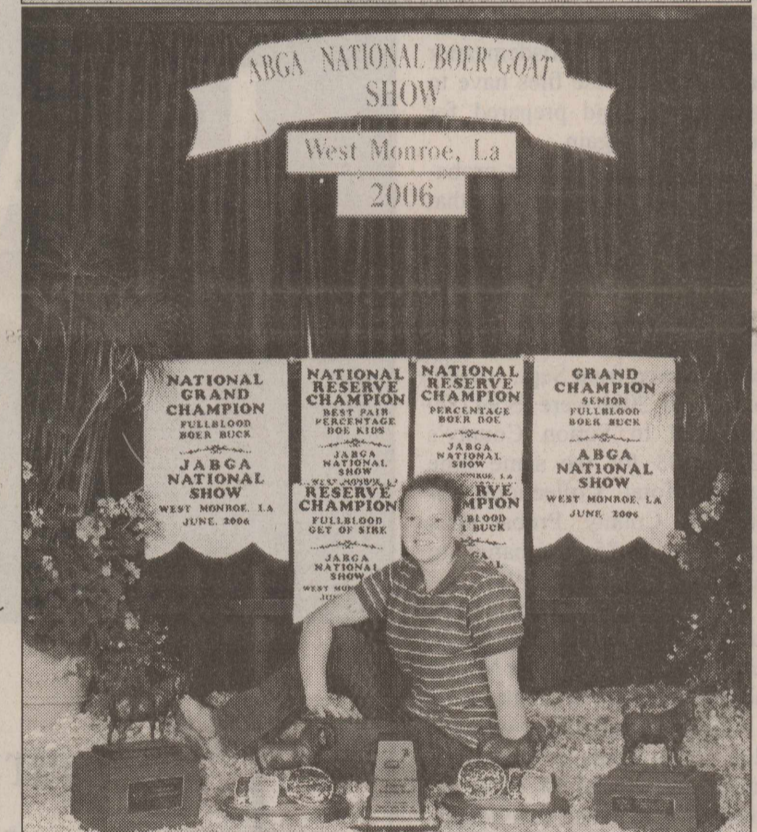

The board also unanimously approved a new 2006-2007 Employee Compensation Plan, which gives every district employee a pay raise.

Also with unanimous approval was the purchase of automated external defibrillators, which will cost around \$13,592 for eight machines.

A manual defibrillator works by giving the heart a controlled electric shock, forcing all the heart muscles to contract at once, and hopefully jolting it back into a regular rhythm, according to the American Red Cross.

Historically, only trained medical professionals were able to interpret the heart rhythms on manual defibrillator devices.

However, today's new Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) use embedded computer chips to analyze the rhythms instantly and accurately, making it possible for non-medical professionals to administer the same vital service without risking an accidental shock, according to the American Red Cross.

"This machine does a test on your heart rhythm to see if

you need to be shocked and what type of shock you need," said Superintendent Abe Gott. "It does not give you a shock bigger than the one you need."

Gott said faculty and staff will be trained on how to use the machines and that one will be placed at every campus, in every gymnasium and at the field-house.

Gott also said that the brand of AEDs that will be purchased are used by the Grape Creek, Miles, Irion County and Killen school districts as well as the University of Texas at Austin, Texas A&M University and North Texas State University.

In his report, Gott said the legislature's new school finance plan will allow CCCSD to keep \$1.2 million dollars, instead of having to send it out to poorer school districts. However, the district will have to send out \$16.9 million.

Gott also said that he plans on looking outside Region XV to find some poor schools to send the money.

The board also unanimously approved to request bids on

a new cafeteria roof at the high school campus.

Maintenance and Transportation Supervisor Ray Don Myers said that the proposed cost is \$40,000 to \$60,000 to replace the whole roof. The amount is within the budget, Myers said.

Myers also said that his staff has had to fix eight leaks this year in various places on the roof.

In the May meeting minutes, a correction was made to a vote. Carol Buie voted against a motion instead of abstaining as it was written.

Other agenda items approved:

- Bid of \$7,085 from the National Educational Music Company for band instruments.
- Bid from Griffin fuels for \$2.193 gasoline and \$2.25 diesel fuel.
- All bids for athletic supplies and allowing the coach to decide which company to go with.

The board will have a special called meeting at 7 a.m. today, June 28, at the Administration Building on 797 Avenue D. The main action item on the agenda is resignations/new hires.

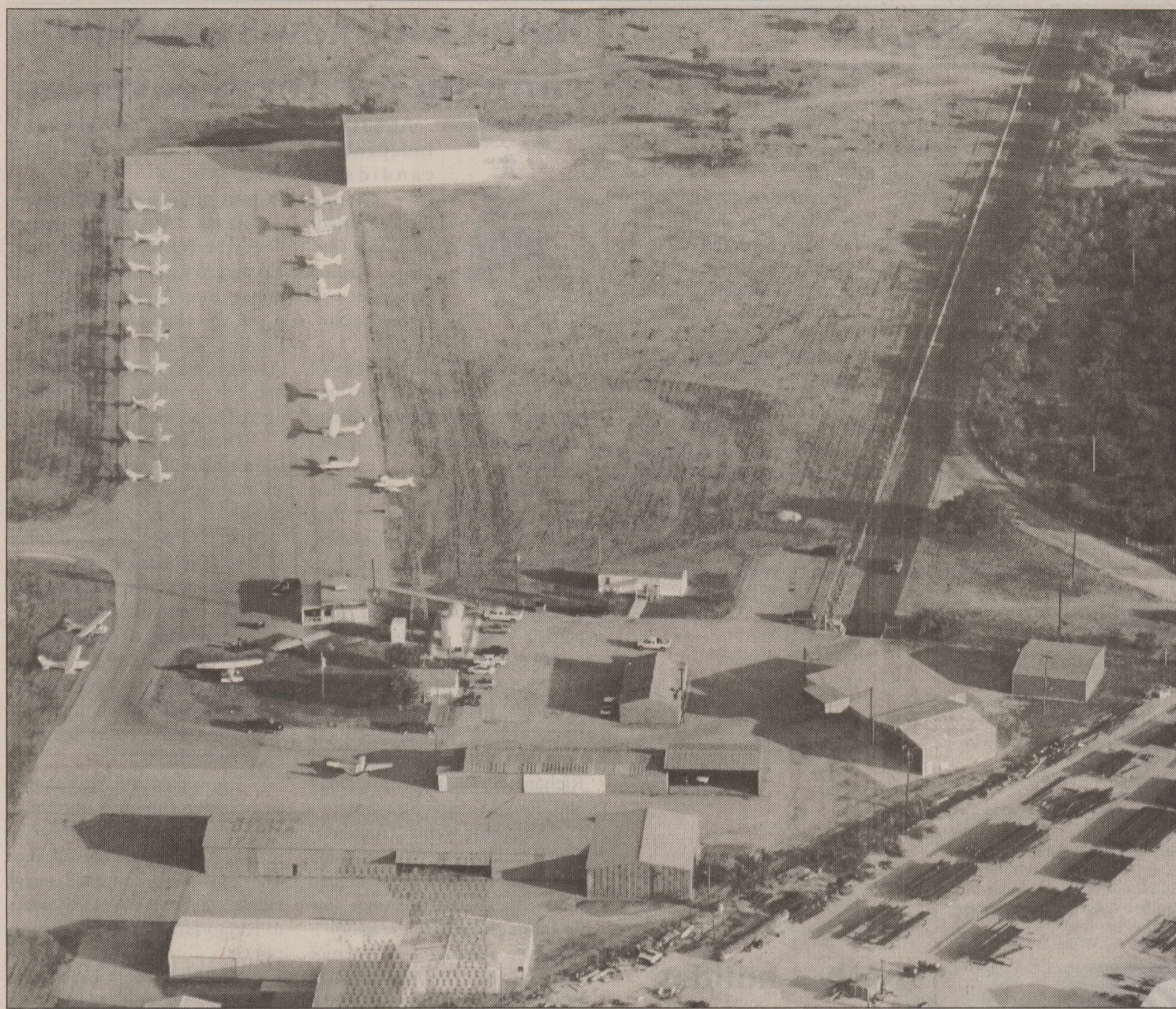
