

Jimmy Roland Sanchez was arrested in Odessa on Sept. 19 and transferred to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office.



## 'spacious' bus **Crockett County EMS receives** new ambulance

Organization and storage are two key elements ambulance personnel need when on emergency calls.

The Crockett County EMS now has a new ambulance that seems to fit the bill.

The vehicle, purchased with county funds as approved by the commissioners's court, is not any larger than the other two ambulances the EMS currently has, but the way it was built has created more areas for storage.

"It's spacious," said EMS member Leesa Marshall.

The EMS had a "Meet the Ambulance night" on Sept. 18 at the EMS barn. County officials, EMS members and DPS personnel attended the event.

The new bus was designed by EMS member Dee Keilers, and is filled with storage throughout the inside and outside.

"It took out the wasted space," Marshall said.


'This is uniquely our own," added Vonda Flanagan, EMS member.

The new ambulance has the capability to hold three minor-injured patients and two critically-injured patients.

The older ambulances can only hold up to two minor-injured and one critical.

## **TexasPecosTrailBoard** meets in Rocksprings

The Board of the Texas Pecos Trail Region (TPTR) met in Rocksprings on Sept. 14 to review the progress being made in the early implementation of heritage tourism throughout the 22 counties in the region.

The meeting, which included a hearty lunch, was generously hosted by the Edwards County Historical Commission.

The TPTR covers about 35,000 square miles and includes the counties of Andrews, Crane, Crockett, Ector, Edwards, Glasscock, Kimble, Kinney, Loving, Martin, Maverick, Midland, Pecos, Reagan, Reeves, Sterling, Sutton, Terrell, Upton, Val Verde, Ward and Winkler.

A major emphasis of heritage tourism is communities working together to promote each other as tourist destinations.

At its meeting, the board reviewed its work plan for calendar years 2006 and 2007.

The plan's goals are: 1) educating the public about the TPTR; 2) securing funding for the TPTR; 3) preserving and protecting cultural and historic resources; 4) marketing the TPTR; 5) establishing advocacy outreach (i.e., creating public

TPTR) and 6) assessing the effectiveness of the TPTR Program

Along with these goals, planning is currently underway for the Texas Historical Commission (THC) to conduct site evaluation trips throughout the region. These evaluations will be made by experts in marketing, museum practices, interpretation, architecture, and tourism.

Reports will then be given to communities providing assessments of their readiness and potential for the promotion of heritage tourism, along with recommendations for developing sites for this purpose. The schedule for the site evaluation trips will be discussed when the board meets in November.

The board seeks to take a local educational tour as part of each meeting and, before departing Rocksprings, the board was given a guided tour of the nearby Devil's Sinkhole.

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# Buying a Used Motor Vehicle

Effective October 1,2006, state law changes the method to calculate motor vehicle sales and use tax due when you buy a used vehicle. The tax will continue to be due when you title and register the vehicle at the county tax office. A purchaser must pay the tax within 20 county working days from the date of purchase or the date the vehicle was brought into Texas for use.

#### How much tax is due?

If you buy the vehicle from a licensed dealer, the tax is 6.25% of the sales price. If you buy from a private party, such as a friend or relative, the tax is 6.25% of:

- the sales price, if you paid 80% or more of the vehicle's standard presumptive value (SPV);
- 80% of the vehicle's SPV, if you paid less than that amount; or
- the certified appraised value, if you paid less than 80% of the vehicle's SPV and you get a certified appraisal.

#### What is a vehicle's Standard Presumptive Value (SPV)?

The law requires the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to determine and publish a SPV data base for used vehicles. Check the TxDOT Web site at www.txdot.gov.

#### Where do you get a certified appraisal?

You have two options. Get a certified appraisal from a licensed dealer for your vehicle type. Depending on the type of vehicle (car, truck, motorcycle), a dealer's fee can range from \$40 to \$500, with most fees from \$100 to \$300. Or get an appraisal from a licensed insurance adjuster for a fee to be determined by the adjuster. Submit the appraisal with your title application within 20 county working days of purchase or the date the vehicle was brought into Texas for use. Be aware that an appraisal fee may offset any tax savings. For example, tax on \$1,600 of value = \$100. In other words, a \$100 appraisal must reduce the vehicle's SPV by more than \$1,600 to save money.



## **Texas Forest Service closes the** book on state's worst fire season

COLLEGE STATION - After 515 days of wildfire response, Texas Forest Service closed the book on Sept. 19 on the worst fire season on record for the state.

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The latest season actually began on Jan. 1, 2005, with little to no reprieve from major, sustained fire activity up until today.

However, since April 22, 2005, state-wide conference calls have been held on almost a daily basis to coordinate for and plan the attack on the dangerous fire season that lasted beyond the normal two month period

"The local fire departments are the first responders to wildland fires in Texas," said Mark Stanford, chief of fire operations for Texas Forest Service. "However, if they determine that their capacity to control the fire is exceeded, they request suppression assistance from us. We are called on to manage the situation and fight these fires along side of the local firefighters."

> Regrettably, 19 lives were lost since November 2005. In addition, 734 homes were lost, along with 1,320 other outbuildings. It is an estimated \$628 million loss to the citizens of the state.

In the last scheduled conference call, Bobby Young, associate director and state fire chief thanked the out-of-state personnel for their help and commended all the Texas Forest Service personnel who have made the sacrifices during the past 18 months to protect the state.

"You have put your lives on hold, and you have sacrificed time with you r families to do your jobs," said Young. "I know your efforts are appreciated by the executive team of Texas Forest Service, as well as the citizens of Texas.'

People who hold public office must report gifts they receive to the Texas Ethics Commission. But what if a gift is a check?

Presently, reporting rules are vague: vague enough to allow an official to report that he received a check from Jane Doe, but not the dollars and cents written on it

The Texas Ethics Commission, the state agency that handles such matters, has been asked to decide if check amounts need be disclosed.

A decision on the matter is not likely to occur until after the election, if at all. Why? With the Texas Legislature convening in January, lawmakers will be able to rewrite the state election law, where campaign finance tuning takes place.

State Reps. Fred Hill, R-Richardson, and Elliott Naishtat, D-Austin, plan to file legislation requiring disclosure of amounts. **Child identification** 

#### effort begins

From now through October, 2 million Texas school children in grades kindergarten through sixth will bring home child identification kits and letters to parents or guardians.

Each kit will contain an inkless fingerprint card, two swabs to obtain a child's DNA from their saliva, and a laminated wallet card to keep an updated photograph and physical description of the child, according to a governor's office news release.

Funding for the program comes through a \$1.8 million state grant to the Sheriff's Association of Texas, plus private donations.


