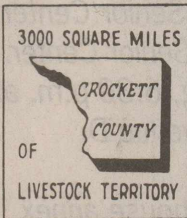


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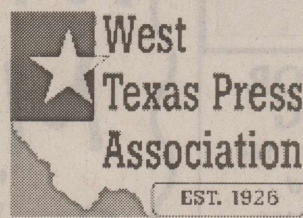

TxDOT officials remove Bonilla in runoff landscaping from project with Rodriguez

Landscaping and beautification has been taken out of the Ozona downtown project.

Officials from the Texas Department of Transportation presented new plans at a Nov. 9 committee meeting and also at Monday's Commissioners' Court meeting.

The commissioners unanimously approved the plans.

TxDOT District Engineer Walter McCullough said that all landscaping items will be removed from the contract, and the curbs by the museum and Dollar General will be removed and replaced with concrete pavement.

McCullough also said that the handicap ramp by Dollar General will be removed, but that a review of the American Disabilities Act in the next few years could prompt for the ramp to be placed back in.

"When our consultant comes in and looks at it we may

have to put it back in. If we do Dollar General will lose parking. This is something we will have to look at for a future date," McCullough said.

During the Nov. 9 committee meeting, it was discussed to place the sidewalk that is in front of the wall, at the town square park on State Highway 163, to inside the park.

McCullough said that this does not meet the ADA requirements for TxDOT and that the sidewalk will be left in place.

Curb bumpers will be placed parallel to allow for 30-degree angle parking or parallel parking.

Striping may be put in place as a guideline to show motorists on how to park.

"One of the things is that the park is not TxDOT property, it is county property. It would be a

benefit for the county to do that but it is not part of the ADA requirements," McCullough said.

The traffic signal at Avenue E and 11th Street will be upgraded and brought up to current standards. TxDOT plans on using a Video Imaging Detection System, which will involve a camera being placed on the pole that will detect a vehicle approaching a light.

The light may be single or double phase depending on which one TxDOT chooses based on the traffic situations, McCullough said.

"A lot will depend on the traffic flow," McCullough said. The new traffic light system is digital and computerized if changes need to be made at a later date.

U.S. Rep. Henry Bonilla has another battle ahead of him.

Bonilla, R-San Antonio, will face challenger Ciro D. Rodriguez in a runoff election for the District 23 spot. The election is expected to be in December, but the Texas Secretary of State's office has yet to set a date.

"We knew it was going to be very close because of the very challenging political environment," Bonilla said. "In many cases, people skipped over my race because of the position on the ballot. Hopefully, this time there will be an easier ballot to follow."

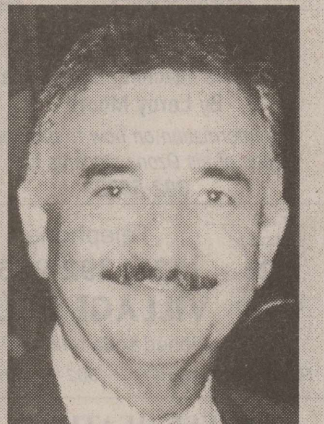
Bonilla needed 50 percent of the vote to avoid the runoff, but only received 48 percent. Rodriguez was the second highest vote getter with 20 percent. There were five Democrats and one independent in the race.

With Thanksgiving and Christmas shopping looming, Bonilla said his office will be doing "everything possible to make sure voters remember to get out and vote."

2006 OZONA LIONS DISTRICT 7-AA CHAMPIONS

Ozona faces arch-rival Sonora Saturday in first-round of the playoffs

The Ozona Lions had already won the district championship, but the 42-15 win over Kermit added a perfect district record Friday night.

Ozona will now face arch-rival Sonora in the first-round of the playoffs at 7 p.m. Saturday at San Angelo Stadium.

The momentum changed for the Lions when, on fourth and three, Kermit's quarterback Austin Grubbs would attempt a pass into the end zone that was picked off by Silva who then took it 102 yards to the other end zone for the Ozona touchdown.

"A good football team comes up with big plays when you need them. Ely's interception was huge. That is a big turn-around," said Coach Benny Granger. "It was great to see his little brother Steven make an interception and a great return also."

The Lions would get the ball rolling on their first series as Caleb Mitchel drove the ball down field and found the end zone for the 11-yard touchdown. Mark Tambunga's extra-point

kick was good to put the Lions up 7-0.

On the kickoff, Kermit would drop the ball and it was picked up by Matt Turland to give Ozona a second turn on offense.

Ely Silva and Mitchel would drive the ball to the 1-yard line. Levi Vargas then ran the ball in for the score. Tambunga's kick was good to put the Lions ahead 14-0. Mitchel was also strong on defense with 12 1/2 tackles in the game.

"We stressed to the kids all week that we needed to get started early and not let Kermit get up on us like they had with other district opponents. Man, did the kids ever come through," Granger said. "I think the quick start allowed us to relax and just play ball the rest of the game."

Kermit would come back on the next series and Thompson would score on a 37-yard pass from Austin Grubbs to narrow the margin to 14-7.

Ozona would start the second quarter on a scoring drive. Quarterback Jordan Long would keep the Lions going on a 14-yard pass to Turland on fourth and 10.

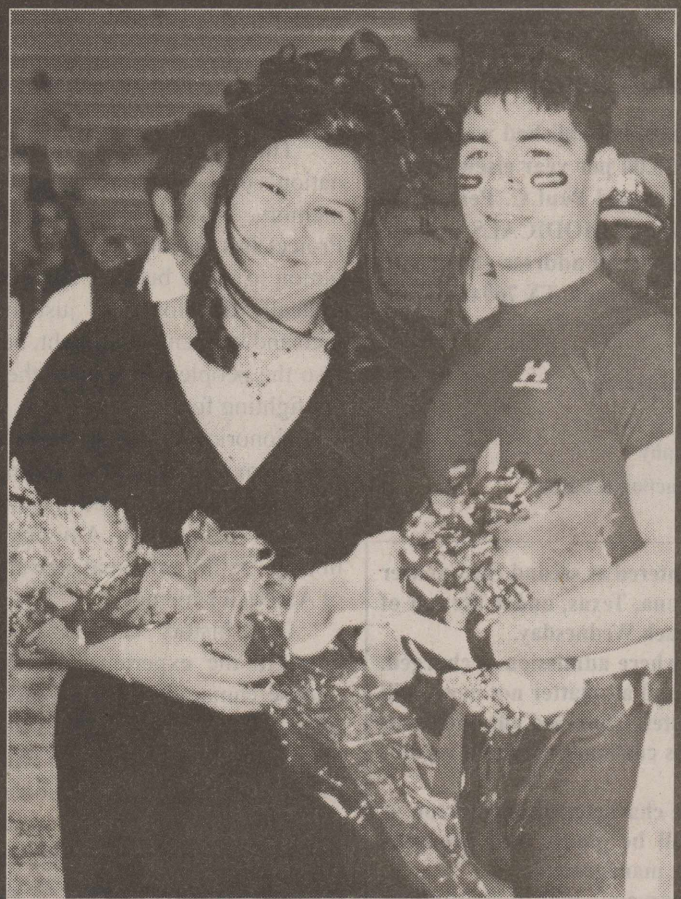

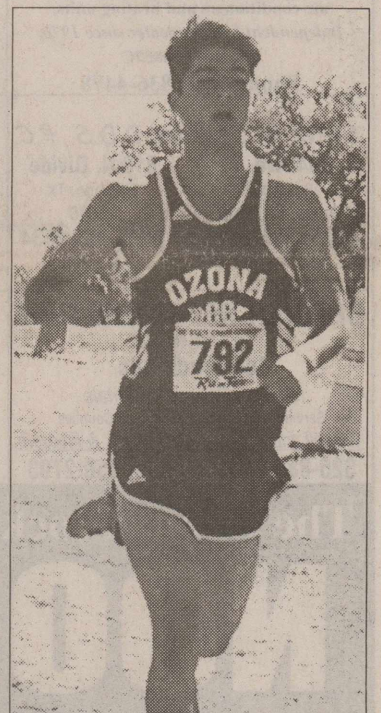

We must remember, we can never forget our Veterans

Last week our nation celebrated Veterans Day. The day reminded us that throughout America, and particularly in the Lone Star State, there are thousands of veterans with a wealth of unique memories and perspectives from their years of service in the U.S. Armed Forces. To gather and preserve those memories for future generations, the Library of Congress has launched the Veterans History Project. I strongly encourage all veterans of all wars to participate in this exciting effort to capture first-person accounts of wartime experiences that helped make America great. Created by Congress in 2000, the Veterans History Project coordinates and expands a national collection of veterans' oral histories and writings. Part of the Library of Congress' American Folklife Center, the Project honors those who served in the military and those civilians who have worked in dedicated support of our armed forces. The Project builds on our nation's ever-evolving collective memory. The Veterans History Project has an important contribution to make because war can radically transform not just the men and women who fought, but also the people and society they are fighting for. Honoring our past plays a key element for understanding our shared identity, and the Library of Congress - America's library - is the principal steward of America's memory. Oral history can bring us close to the experience of the intense camaraderie with others upon whom your life literally depends; the fear that comes with being under siege; or the uncertainty of waiting on the home front for a loved one to return. So many men and women from World War I to Operation Enduring Freedom have powerful stories that must be recorded for future generations. Oral history brings history down from a lofty distance. While many histories of war capture the perspective of the generals and admirals, much can also be learned from the letters of a young man in combat and his young bride and mother of his children. The Veterans History Project recruits Americans of all ages, veterans and non-veterans, to be part of this process. The project also serves as a tremendous outlet for veterans' sons and daughters, many of whom have long been curious about their father or mother's wartime stories but never heard them. By sitting down with audio or video recorders and guiding veterans through their military and civilian exploits, these volunteers add rich details to our nation's great history. Almost 19 million war veterans live in America now, according to the Project. Tragically, more than 1,500 die every day. The time to record these oral histories is now! For more information on how you and your family may contribute to the Veterans History Project, please visit the Project's web site at www.loc.gov/veterans or simply call the Project at (202) 707-4916. The staff at the Project will send you a starter kit and put you in touch with local volunteers to assist you in your efforts to contribute to this important collection. It is up to those who served to share with America exactly why freedom isn't free.

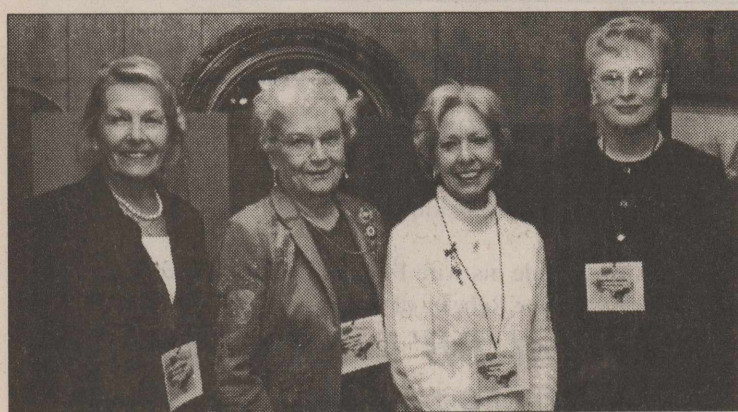

The approaching District VIII Convention was discussed. It took place Nov. 10 at the Hitchin' Post Restaurant and Nov. 11 at the Civic Center.

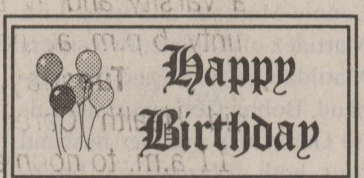
Jerri Lynn Pierce presented the new 2006 Garden Club Cookbook, ready for sale at \$15 per book. Anyone interested may call any member of the club.

Medicare D season opens

Medicare D (medication coverage) has now been available for about one year. Anyone with Medicare A or B is eligible for Medicare D and has the option to choose which insurance plan they want. If a person does not enroll in Medicare D when they become eligible, there is an increased monthly premium. If you are currently receiving medication through Medicaid and become eligible for Medicare, an insurance plan will be automatically assigned to you if you do not make the choice yourself within the allotted time frame.

Beginning Nov. 15 and continuing Dec. 31, those already enrolled in Medicare D may change plans. During this same time, insurance companies may change their coverage. If you are

interested in looking at a new plan, now is the time to do so. If you are satisfied with your present coverage, be sure and read any information you may receive from your current insurance plan to see if changes are being made to your coverage.

There are also several insurance plans that want to replace your Medicare A and B coverage. They sometimes offer more coverage at a lower premium. Do not replace your Medicare A and B with any other insurance until you have made sure your doctor and hospital accepts the insurance plan you are wanting to change to.

In a press release from Bonilla's campaign office, the 14-year congressman has agreed to two debates with Rodriguez.

The invitations for the debates come from the Executive Committee of the South San Antonio Chamber of Commerce and the Fort Stockton Economic Development Corporation. The dates for the debates have not been determined.

During the campaign, Bonilla declined to participate in a number of candidate forums, due to scheduling conflicts, according to his campaign office.

"I am happy to accept these two invitations to debate my opponent and compare my conservative record which includes numerous economic, educational and health care accomplishments. I look forward to discussing my voting record. It has been my great pleasure to help eliminate wasteful spending and useless regulations while also supporting small businesses, our active military, veterans and agricultural projects in communities throughout my Congressional District," Bonilla said. "It is my hope that Mr. Rodriguez quickly agrees to these debates so that the citizens of my district can listen to and learn more about the issues discussed before

the United States Congress and how we would address them on their behalf."

Rodriguez's campaign stated that the challenger has agreed to the debates.

"If (Bonilla) is going to accept the invitations, we're there," said Rodriguez's campaign manager Gina Castaneda, in an article by the San Antonio Express-News.

The article also stated that the day after Nov. 7, Rodriguez said "I'm willing to debate him anytime because we need to talk about our records."

According to the Express-News, Rodriguez ran a cash-poor, grass-roots campaign.

Rodriguez, also from San Antonio, served four terms (1997-2004) as U.S. Rep. for District 28, which neighbors District 23. District 23 stretches from San Antonio to El Paso, contains 20 counties and more than 700 miles of the Texas-Mexico border.

As of Nov. 9, Rodriguez was already receiving support from his fellow Democratic challengers that lost in the race. Among them are August "Augie" Beltran, of San Antonio; Lukin Gilliland Jr., a San Antonio businessman; Adrian DeLeon, of Carrizo Springs and Rick Bolanos, of El

Paso. Independent challenger Craig T. Stephens also pledged to support Rodriguez.

According to the Secretary of State's office, Bonilla finished with 60,147 votes. Rodriguez finished with 24,593.

Others in the race were: Albert Uresti 14,529; Beltran 2,650; Bolanos 2,563; DeLeon 2,198; Gilliland 13,725 and Stephens 3,344.

In Crockett County, Bonilla won heavily with 713 votes over Uresti who had 115. Rodriguez was third with 103.

The special election was held due to a June 28 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that 100,000 Hispanics were carved out of District 23 when Republicans redrew the map during the Voting Rights Act in 2003.

A panel of three federal judges responded Aug. 4 with a map that eliminated four Republican-strong Hill Country counties and added South Bexar County, which is mainly Democratic.

Bonilla grew up in the southside of Bexar County, but he never had represented the area in Congress. During the Nov. 7 Election night, Bonilla said "This is the first time my mother was able to vote for me."

The ruling threw the race open to new candidates.

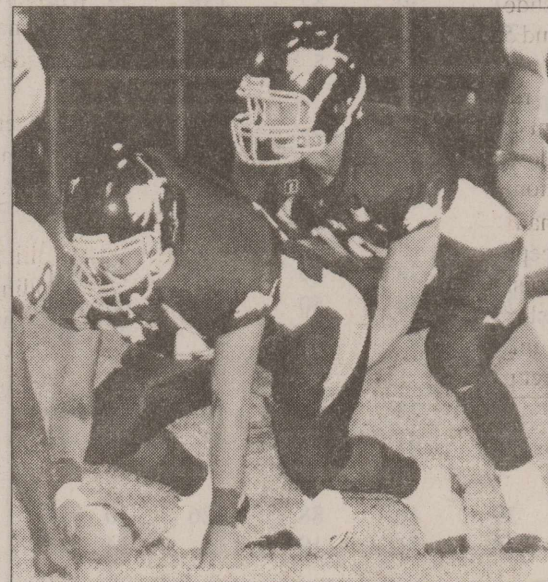

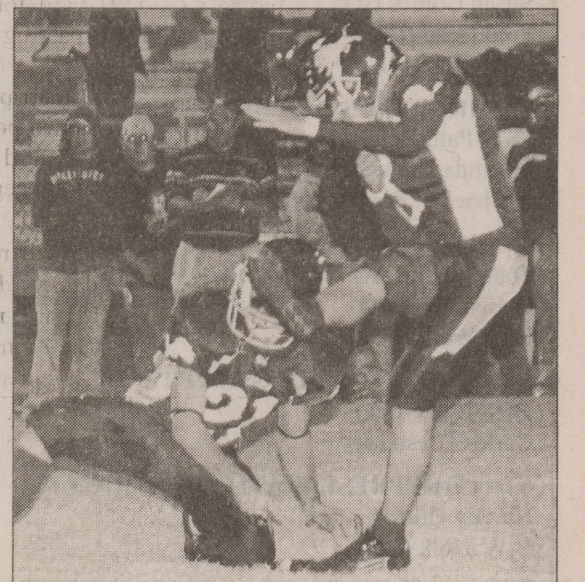

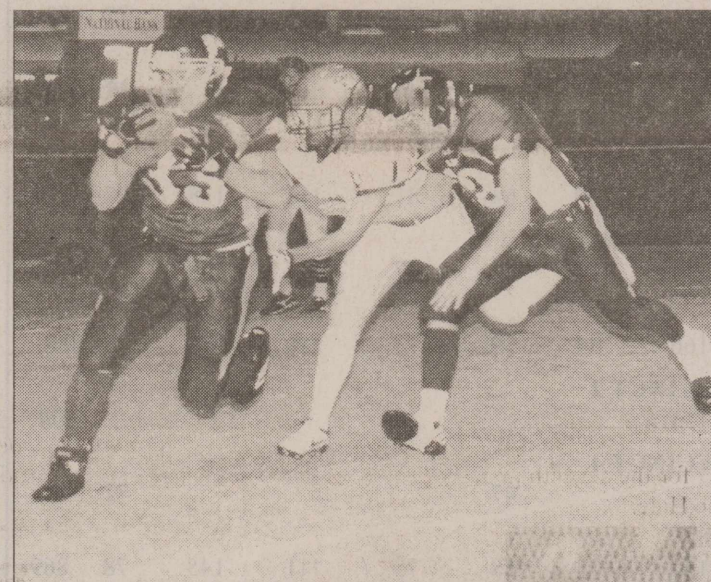

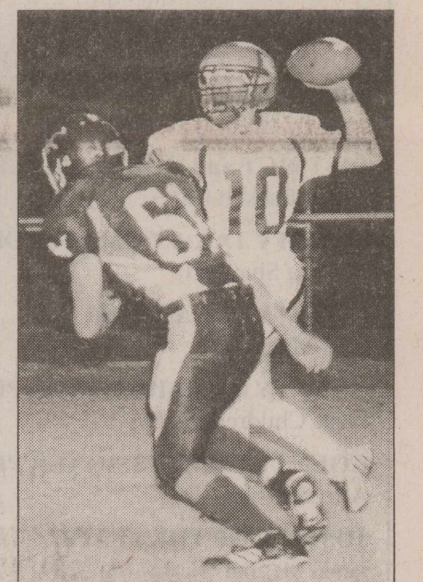

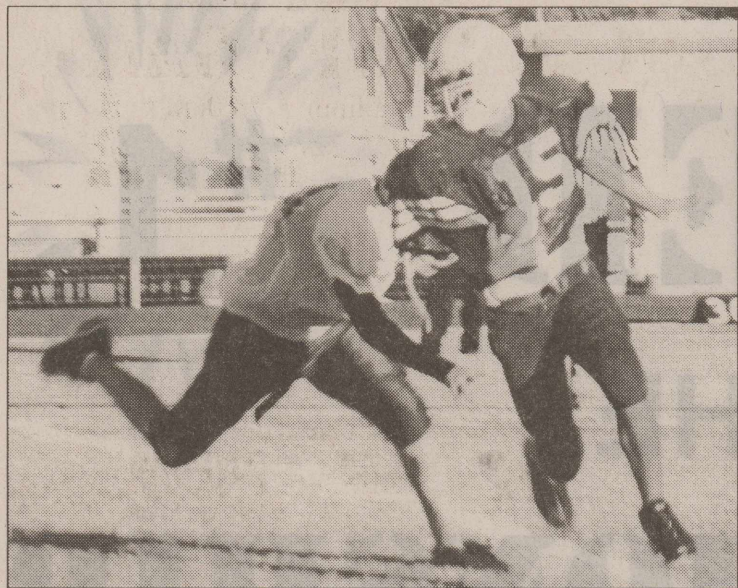

The Lions finish 5-2 overall and 3-2 in district play.

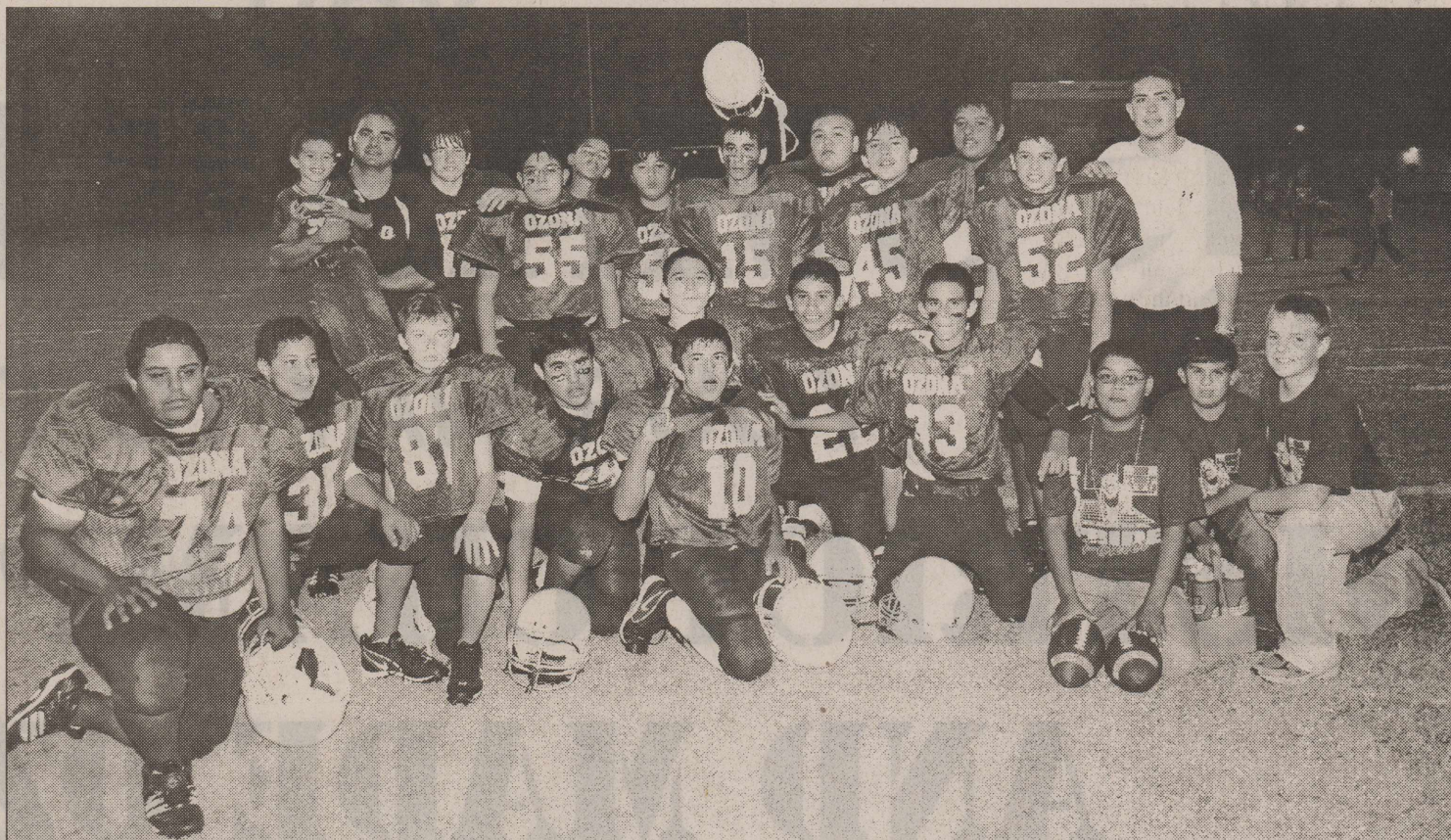

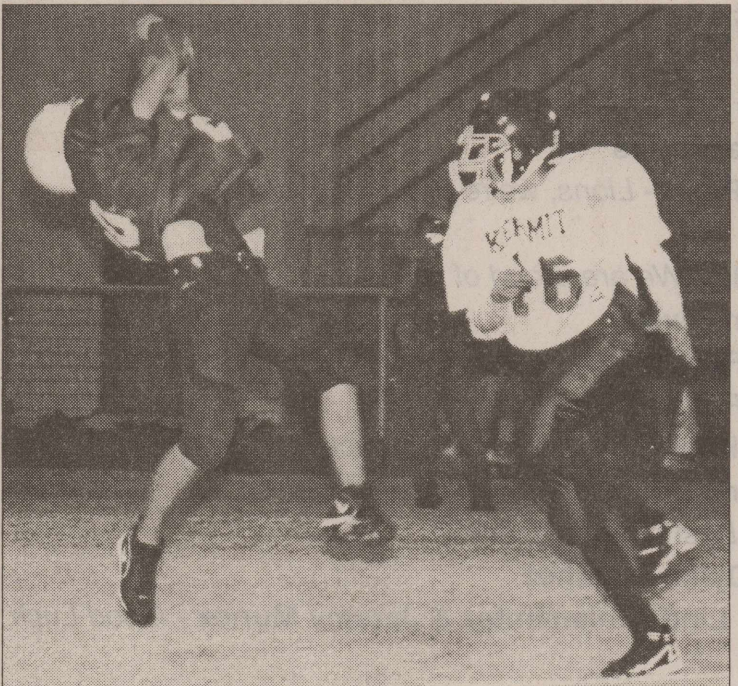

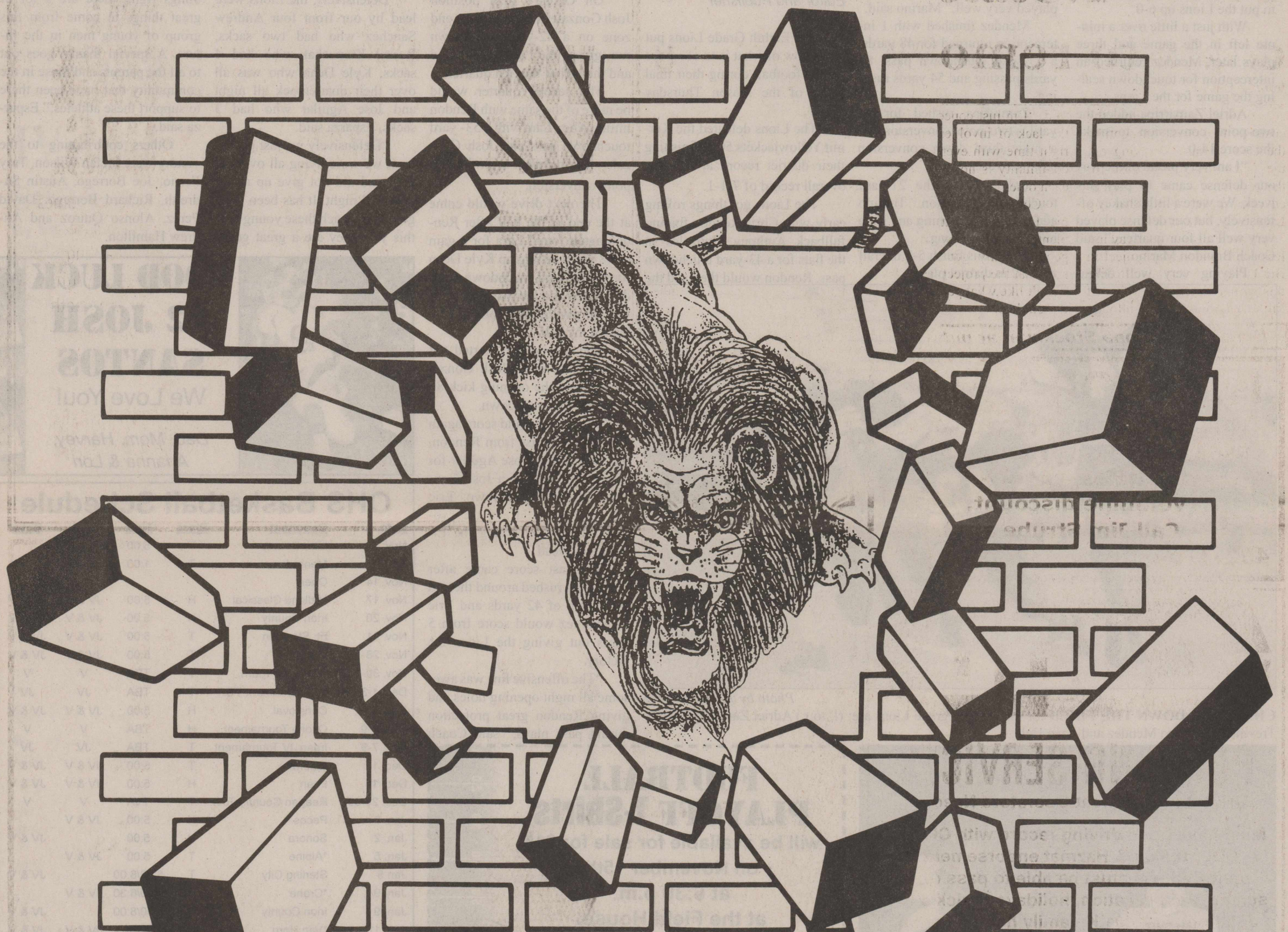

TxDOT will assume the costs of having to renegotiate the contract and of taking out the curbs. The total cost for the project, which also included working being done in Big Lake, is \$1.8 million.

"The money goes away unless we use it on the project in Big Lake. It's not cheap to take this stuff out. It's just a fact of life at this point," McCullough

said. "I'm just concerned about the lack of involvement at the right time with everybody. The community is not in sync with each other."

Committee member Debbie Long said that when the planters and curbs were in place people finally got to visually see what the project was, and it wasn't like what people thought it would be.

"Visualization is hard to translate," McCullough said. "This is not the first time it has happened."

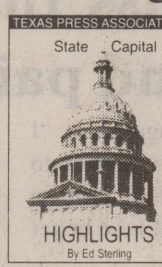

Texas gives Perry another 4 years



AUSTIN - Enough voters signified their happiness with Gov. Rick Perry in the Nov. 7 election to reward the 56-year-old Republican with another four-year term in the governor's mansion.

An estimated 1.7 million voters - 39 percent of the registered voters who actually cast ballots - picked Perry. This was widely reported as the lowest percentage for winning the high office of governor in more than a century. But, should Perry serve out the next four years, he will have held the office 10 years - a period two years longer than any of his predecessors.

Democrat Chris Bell, a former U.S. representative from Houston, placed second in the race for governor with 29 percent of the vote, or 1.3 million votes.

Outgoing State Comptroller Carole Keeton "Grandma" Strayhorn, a Republican running as an independent, placed third with 18 percent.

Writer and entertainer Richard S. "Kinky" Friedman, also an independent, placed fourth with 12 percent.

James Werner, a Libertarian from Austin, drew 0.6 percent.

Secretary of State Roger Williams' office reported the statewide voter turnout at 32.97 percent of the 13,074,279 Texas residents who registered in time to vote.

Proceeding down the ballot in some of the major statewide races, rounded results taken from unofficial results showed the two biggest vote-getters in each race, as follows:

Incumbent Republican Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst was re-elected over Democrat Maria Luisa Alvarado, 60 percent to 36 percent.

Incumbent Republican Attorney General Greg Abbott was re-elected over Democrat David Van Os, 61 percent to 37 percent.

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs, a Republican, was elected to succeed Strayhorn as comptroller of public accounts. Combs' vote percentage was 61 percent compared with Democrat Fred Head's 36 percent.

Incumbent Republican Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson was re-elected over Democrat Valinda Hathcox, 55 percent to 41 percent.

Former State Sen. Todd Staples of Palestine, a Repub-

lican, was elected to succeed Combs as agriculture commissioner, over Democrat Hank Gilbert, 55 percent to 42 percent.

Incumbent Republican Railroad Commissioner Elizabeth Ames Jones was re-elected over Democrat Dale Henry, 54 percent to 42 percent.

Incumbent Republican Supreme Court Chief Justice Wallace Jefferson was re-elected over Libertarian Tom Oxford, 76 percent to 24 percent.

Republicans swept the other Supreme Court seats on the ballot. In the courts of criminal appeals races, it was almost a GOP sweep.

The spoiler was Diane Henson, a Democrat, who won against Republican Will Wilson in the race for Place 3, 3rd Court of Appeals.

The margin was 50.32 percent to 49.68 percent.

The GOP also won all but one seat up for re-election on the State Board of Education.

DEMOCRAT TAKES DELAY DISTRICT

Former U.S. Rep. Nick Lampson, a Democrat, emerged the winner in the race for former U.S. Rep. Tom DeLay's U.S. Congressional District 22 seat.

Former House Majority Leader DeLay resigned from Congress in June, having been indicted by the state's chief ethics officer on charges of campaign ethics violations. The story was covered by state and national media for months.

The Republican Party promoted Houston City Council Member Shelley Sekula-Gibbs as its write-in candidate but she lost to Lampson in a field that included other write-ins and a Libertarian. Sekula-Gibbs will serve out DeLay's unexpired term and in January Lampson will take the oath of office and begin service.

JUDGE RULES IN FAVOR OF STATE LAW

U.S. District Judge Rob Junell in Pecos ruled the Texas Open Meetings Act is not in conflict with the U.S. Constitution.

A present member and a former member of the Alpine city council sued the state, alleging the opening meetings law violated their right to free speech because it prevented them from privately discussing matters of public business and was "unconstitutionally vague."

The act requires state and local government officials to notify the public and meet in an open forum when they plan to deliberate on matters of public interest.
